Tips for Growing Herbs:

- In general herbs are easy to grow and have few insect and disease problems.
- Most herbs need at least 6 hours of sunlight, full sun to part shade.
- Most herbs tolerate a wide range of soils except wet, poorly drained soils.
- Herb plants need good air circulation.
- Consider growing herbs in containers. This is a good idea for herbs that need good drainage. Container should have drainage holes. Combination planters, plants should have the same growing needs. Growing media should be lightweight, well-aerated, fast draining yet retain moisture.
- Perennial herbs should overwinter each year.
- Tips for perennial herbs: Avoid late summer fertilizing and pruning. Divide or replace every 3 to 5 years.
- Annual herbs grow, flower and produce seed during one season and then die.
- Tips for annual herbs: Prune leafy annuals as flowers start to fade. Harvest herbs such as dill and cilantro for seed as seeds turn light brown.
- Many herb plant flowers are beneficial to bees, butterflies, hover flies, parasitic wasps and other pollinators.
