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GATE AND GRANDSTAND ADMISSION

Admission will be charged to the fairgrounds after 8 a.m. Only 4-H members, leaders and superintendents will be given a wristband for free admission. Those exhibiting only in the Junior Show must purchase a Season Pass (\$18.00). Passes can be purchased prior to Wednesday, July 23, at the Lee Co. Extension Office, 280 W. Wasson Rd., Amboy OR by calling Lee Co. Fair Association at (815) 857-2603.

Front Gate: Season Pass—\$18.00 Daily Admission—\$5.00 12 & Under—Free

Grandstand Show:

Thursday, Tractor/Truck Pull w/ Back Road Pullers – \$6.00 Friday, Tractor/Truck Pull w/ Illini State Pullers – \$10.00 Saturday, Rodeo w/ T&A Bucking Bulls – \$7.00 5 and under – FREE all days

Grandstand Pit Pass: (available at south gate by horse barn)

Thursday & Friday - \$20.00

Save \$8.00 with a FUN PASS - \$35.00 (includes 4 days of admission to fairgrounds and grandstand shows)

4-H FUN PASS – \$15.00 (for Lee Co. 4-H members only; includes entrance to all grandstand events; does not include pits)

GENERAL FAIR RULES

- 1. All exhibits are entered at owner's risk. Neither the Lee Co. Fair Association nor Lee Co. Extension will assume liability for lost or damaged exhibits.
- 2. Lee Co. Extension Staff and Fair Association members reserve the right to remove any exhibitor or exhibit.
- 3. All judges' decisions are FINAL!
- 4. Exhibits may enter the fairgrounds between 3 p.m. and 8 p.m. on Wednesday and between 8 a.m. and 10 a.m. on Thursday. Arrival before 3 p.m. on Wednesday is prohibited unless authorized by the Fair Association and the Department Superintendent.
- 5. All livestock exhibits shall be in place by 10 a.m. on Thursday, with these EXCEPTIONS: RABBITS need to be in place by 8 p.m. on Wednesday, and HORSES & CATS in place as specified in their department pages.
- 6. Livestock exhibitors shall wear an Exhibitor Number while in the show ring. If you have two entries in a class, an additional card bearing your exhibitor number may be requested at the Fair Office. All animals shall be shown by the owner. If additional help is needed another youth should be asked. See Rule #25 in General 4-H Show Rules for 4-H members.
- 7. Department shows that judge both 4-H and Jr. shows on the same day will run the specific 4-H class followed by the Jr. show class. They are two distinct and separate shows. ALL ANIMALS SHALL BE SHOWN BY THE OWNER. If a 4-H livestock exhibitor cannot show their animal, the exhibitor must notify the Extension Office and the Department Superintendent prior to the fair that they are unable to show their own livestock due to extenuating circumstances. The animals can then be exhibited by another 4-H member.
- 8. Judges and Superintendents shall be notified if a 4-Her is unable to exhibit their own non-livestock project with a written statement about what they have done and learned in their project. Members who complete this step should not be penalized for their absence. See 4-H rule #15.
- 9. Health papers for beef cattle, dairy cattle, goats, sheep and swine must be stamped by the Fair Veterinarian at the Fair Office at one of the following times: 7-8 p.m. on Wednesday or from 11a.m. to 12 p.m. on Thursday. All other animals, follow rules stated on specific department pages.
- 10. The Department Superintendents will check purebred registration papers. These papers (or copies) must remain on the grounds for the duration of the fair. Animals not registered in the 4-H member's or Jr. Show participant's name may not be shown in registered classes.
- 11. All animal exhibits must be owned and have been personally cared for by exhibitor. Exception horses, ponies, and dogs may be leased, but should still be cared for by the exhibitor.
- 12. Stalls and pens must always be kept clean. Load waste into spreaders or designated areas.
- 13. All exhibitors are expected to thoroughly clean out their pens and exhibit areas and have approval of Superintendent before leaving at the end of the fair.
- 14. No alcoholic beverages will be allowed on the grounds by anyone of any age during fair events.

- 15. Overnight accommodations for Wednesday—Saturday evenings: Youth under the age of 18 staying overnight, must stay in a registered camper in the camping area accompanied by at least one of their parents or an adult chaperone. See Camper Space Rental Form in "Special Events & Other Information" section.
- 16. Only Livestock exhibitors can stay overnight in respective barns. All overnighters are required to sign in at office each night. An "Overnight Barn" form must be on file in the fair office with parent signature prior to the first night's stay. See form in "Special Events & Other Information" section.
- 17. Barns close (lights out) each night at 10:30 p.m.
- 18. EXHIBITS ARE TO REMAIN IN PLACE IN EXHIBIT AREA UNTIL PUBLISHED RELEASE TIMES.

Non-livestock exhibits are released at 2 p.m. on Sunday. Livestock exhibits are released at 3 p.m. on Sunday. No trailers are to be brought to barns before 3 p.m!! Exception—If an animal is ill or uncontrollable, the owner must first inform the superintendent and the fair veterinarian and then move it to another location on the fairgrounds. If the owner wishes to remove the animal from the grounds at this point, it requires the written approval of the fair vet; the department superintendent; and the Fair Association President, Vice President or other designated board member. If the animal is returning to the grounds the next day, it must be back on the grounds by 8 a.m. the following morning. If all these procedures are not adhered to, Jr. Show premiums will be forfeited.

- 19. On matters regarding Animal Health Rules, the decision of the Fair Veterinarian is final.
- 20. There will be no night guards on Sunday night. Animals left will be at owner's risk.
- 21. In accordance with the Americans Disability Act, if you need a reasonable accommodation to participate in the 4-H Show, please contact the Lee Co. Extension office two weeks prior, at (815) 857-3525.
- 22. No bicycles, skateboards or motorized scooters or vehicles (ATVs, UTVs, golf carts, etc.) may be driven or ridden on the grounds unless approved by the Lee Co. Fair Association. Submit your request to (815) 857-2603.

DISTURBANCES AT THE FAIR

Fair Association members, Department Superintendents and Extension Staff have the right to evict a person from the grounds for a minor disturbance (i.e. foul language, unsportsmanlike conduct or any inappropriate behavior). Major disturbances (i.e. bringing malice, harm to other exhibitor's property, continuing minor disturbances repeatedly) may warrant more serious punishment (i.e. evicting from entire fair, banning from next year's show).

GRIEVANCES/PROTESTS

A Grievance Committee shall consist of two Fair Association members and, if the situation warrants, Extension staff and Department Superintendent. The committee will meet as needed during the fair to address any concerns regarding fair policies. Judging concerns and questions should be addressed to the Department Superintendent first. If the concern is not resolved, then the situation may be referred to the Grievance Committee. Grievances should be filed with the fair office in writing within 24 hours of the incident. All parties will be notified of the committee's meeting time and should be present at that meeting.

CAMPING AT THE FAIR

Camping is allowed during the fair only as a convenience for exhibitors and is regulated by the Fair Association. They will set prices and supervise the area during the fair. Camper price is \$20.00 per night. No electrical hook-ups are available. There is a \$25.00 per day charge for campers arriving prior to Wednesday or leaving campers after Monday. Camping reservation form can be found in this fairbook or online at Leecountyfairgrounds.com. 20 spaces available on a first reserved basis. No vehicles are to be parked with campers. Please remove any vehicles by noon each day and park in designated parking areas.

LEE COUNTY 4-H SHOW RULES

Please read and understand all rules and regulations before coming to the 4-H show.

Membership:

- 1. Youth who are five years of age and have not yet reached their nineteenth birthday on or before September 1 of the current 4-H year may enroll in 4-H clubs.
- 2. Members must be in good standing, have an active enrollment and attended at least one club meeting, to exhibit at the 4-H Show.
- 3. Exhibitors must be **re-enrolled** in 4-H *and* the project areas by May 1.
- 4. New members may enroll in 4-H clubs, 4-H/Extension programs, or as an independent member at any time during the 4-H year. 4-H enrollment is found online at: https://4h.zsuite.org/


Fair Entries:


- 5. All exhibits must be products of the current 4-H year.
- 6. All animals must be owned by the exhibitor prior to the ownership deadline. See department requirements for specific ownership dates.
- 7. Leases are allowed for horses, ponies and dogs. All ownership and lease dates must be adhered to despite project enrollment deadlines.
- 8. Fair entries for all members, 4-H and Cloverbud, must be made on-line at fairentry.com by the following dates:

Public Speaking Contest – February 12, See ZSuite for registration.

- 9. It is the responsibility of the 4-H member to have exhibits entered on time. 4-H leaders are not responsible for entries. Please contact the Extension office with questions or assistance regarding fair entries.
- 10. Late entries are not eligible for State Fair Delegate or Alternate, Best of Show, or Grand Champion awards.

Judging:

- 11. Exhibits in each class will be rated and will receive ribbons indicating their ratings: blue, red or white. Cloverbuds will receive a participation ribbon. Champion and State Fair ribbons may be awarded in classes at the discretion of the judge.
- 12. Only items listed for exhibiting will be judged. Exhibitors should refer to each exhibit department for rules and policies relating to that exhibit.
- 13. Conference judging will be used in all project areas. 4-Hers will show their projects to the judge in each area. Parents cannot participate in the judging process. However, parents of Cloverbuds or first year 4-H members may accompany their child to the judging area.
- 14. If the exhibitor requires a reasonable accommodation to participate, please contact the Extension office or an Extension staff member two weeks prior to judging.
- 15. Score sheets for each general project area are available online at: 4h.extension.illinois.edu
- 16. If a member cannot be present for General Projects conference judging, please attach a written essay answering the following questions: steps for completion of the project; time required to complete the exhibit; challenges in creating the exhibit; what did the 4-Her learn; what would the 4-Her do differently next time.
- 17. The decision of the judge is final. Please remember many judges volunteer their time and expertise and should be treated with respect.

Fair/Show Admission

- 18. Admission passes:
 - 4-H exhibitors, screened volunteers, and superintendents will be provided a fair pass courtesy of the Lee County Fair Association.
- 19. Parents and others attending the 4-H Show will be required to purchase an admission ticket to enter the fairgrounds. Admission will be charged for entrance into the fairgrounds.

Animal Exhibits

- 20. Animal health requirements are listed on "GENERAL LIVESTOCK HEALTH RULES" on page 19
- 21. If you are showing **Dairy**, **Beef**, **Sheep**, **Swine or Goats** you must complete the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) training every year by June 1, please send your certificate to kmcbr2@illinois.edu.
- 22. If you are showing **Poultry, Rabbits, Horses, Cats, Dogs, or Guinea Pigs** you must complete the Quality Assurance and Ethics Course (QAEC) at least once in your 4-H career. To be eligible to show you must complete the training before June 1 of the current year. This training can be found on ZSuite under Clover Academy.
- 23. Exhibitors are responsible for their own animals. 4-H exhibitors showing animals will be familiar with and practice proper care and showing of the animal species.
- 24.4-Hers must exhibit projects in the correct class at the proper time. 4-H members are responsible for knowing show order and being in the class at the proper time.
- 25. Due to conflicts with livestock judging times, another registered 4-H member from the same county may show a member's animal project.

4-H Premiums

- 26. Exhibitors will receive premiums for one entry per class.
- 27. County projects will not be paid a premium.

Tax Implications for Prizes, Gifts or Awards

Program participants (including minors) will be required to provide their social security number or foreign national tax ID number prior to receiving a premium, prize, gift or award to ensure proper IRS reporting as required by law. This sensitive information is kept confidential and handled through security protected software. Participants will not be eligible for a premium, prize, gift or award if social security or foreign national tax ID information is not provided.

The Department of Agriculture shall use its best efforts to secure sufficient appropriations to fund premiums. In any year for which the General Assembly of the State of Illinois fails to make an appropriation sufficient to pay such premiums, premium amounts may not be accurately reflected in this Premium Book.

4-H premiums will be paid using the X-factor. The X-factor system ensures that all monies available for premiums are distributed to those 4-H members who exhibited their projects. *X factors are unit value figures and not dollars and cents.* Premiums may not be awarded in every project area. At the conclusion of the 4-H Show, the computer tallies a total number of X's awarded. The total of X's is divided into the amount of premium money available from the State Agriculture Premium Fund. Premiums will be distributed at the following levels:

Level 1 – Livestock exhibit classes including dogs and cats: Blue=7X Red=5X White =3X

Level 2 – All non-livestock classes including Animal Science: Blue=5X Red=3X White=1X

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ANIMAL WELFARE

Fair season is rapidly approaching once again. 4-H youth should be sure to present their animal projects to the benefit of the animal and the public. This behavior is encouraged both in and out of the show ring.

Animal welfare is a growing concern in this country today and warrants some attention during county fairs and any other 4-H livestock event. Livestock exhibitors should be aware of the fact that animal welfare and animal rights groups have been known to show up uninvited at county fair livestock events. Therefore, it is imperative that we show all general audiences at these livestock events that we, as keepers of animals, do know the right way to raise and care for livestock.

While we are at the fair showing livestock we are under the watchful eye of the general public. This gives us a great opportunity to show all kinds of people the method in which we care for our livestock.

The following is a list of guidelines, which should be helpful in preventing any misconceptions that the public or any special interest groups may have about the way we raise livestock. The proper care of animals in a public setting should receive primary attention.

- 1. Provide fresh, clean water to all animals at all times.
- 2. Keep your pens clean and dry with good bedding at all times.
- 3. Be aware of animal comfort zones, i.e. temperature, space.
- 4. Sort and load animals safely and with concern for them.
- 5. Train animals to lead or be handled at a young age before the fair. This will make them more manageable at the fair.
- 6. Arrange for veterinary care in case of an animal emergency.
- 7. Handle animals in a very humane way.
- 8. Adhere to all antibiotic, drug, and water or feed additive withdrawal times.
- 9. Animals should be fed on a routine basis.
- 10. Avoid stressing the animal.
- 11. Keep animals clean a clean animal is viewed as a healthy animal.
- 12. Use show sticks, whips, and canes for showing only and try to use them as gently as possible. Do not use electric prods.
- 13. Review your 4-H project manual and follow the care recommendations. This is also a good way to answer any questions the public may have.
- 14. Have a plan of action if a problem should arise and who to contact to help solve it or answer questions.
- 15. Know who and where fair officials are and how to get in contact with them.
- 16. If questioned about animal care by a stranger, remain calm, be polite, answer the questions the best you can, don't argue, and refer the person to the department superintendent if a tough question or situation arises.

ETHICAL PREPARATION FOR THE 4-H SHOW

As 4-H is an educational program and not a competitive one, the main objective of the 4-H Show is to evaluate each 4-H member on his or her knowledge of their project. In non-livestock projects this involves conferencing with the judge about what one learned, why the 4-H member made certain choices concerning their project, and what improvements could be made.

Conference judging is utilized by 4-H to continue the learning process for each 4-Her, not simply to grade the child's product. It is an expectation of all 4-H members to prepare their exhibit for the fair. Parental teaching and guidance are certainly encouraged but should not dominate a 4-Her. A 4-H exhibit should clearly represent what the 4-Her is capable of doing and what they have learned.

Similarly, it is an expectation that each 4-Her be responsible for care, fitting and grooming of their animal projects during the 4-H year and at the fair. The Extension office recognizes that there are always circumstances and safety issues to consider. We expect each 4-H family to see to it that the 4-Her is doing as much of the animal's care, fitting and grooming as possible. Parents are certainly encouraged to teach their children and assist when necessary. Please be responsible and reasonable with this issue. Rather than focusing on winning, 4-H focuses on helping youth learn and becoming the best that he/she can be.

Thank you for helping make the 4-H Show a learning experience for youth.

The University of Illinois Extension personnel or their assigned agents do not assume liability for loss, theft, or damage to any exhibit. EXHIBITORS:

- 1. Exhibitors must have been pre-selected by their county 4-H Extension program as an Illinois State Fair exhibitor.
- 2. Exhibitors must be currently enrolled as a 4-H member and have been at least 8 years old as of September 1, 2024.Parents and leaders should make provisions for the adequate care and supervision of exhibitors.
- 3. Exhibitors must be enrolled in the project or have participated in the activity in which they are exhibiting during the current year. Due to the nature of the conference judging process, exhibitors must be present with the exhibit on their assigned county exhibition day. Scheduling adjustments for religious reasons may be requested by contacting the local Extension office. County Staff will submit the request to the Illinois 4-H Office via the Teams Approval App by August 1, 2025.
- 4. Exhibitors must be present for judging. No Skype or Face Time style sessions will be allowed. If a 4-H member needs a reasonable accommodation to participate in the General Project Show, please contact the local Extension office. County Staff will submit the request to the Illinois State 4-H Office via the Teams Approval App by August 1, 2025.
- 5. A 4-H member may enter only one individual exhibit and one group exhibit in the 4-H General Project Show.

ENTRY PROCEDURE:

- 6. Local Extension offices will make all entries for their 4-H members via Fair Entry by August 1, 2025. Counties needing permission for late entries after August 1 (due to late local shows) should contact the Illinois State 4-H Office at illinois4H@illinois.edu by July 1, 2025.
- 7. Each county may make the number of entries allowed in each project area as stated. Counties with more than 500 members are allowed 12 additional exhibits/exhibitors for state fair. These additional exhibits may be entered in any class/classes of the county's choosing. Current enrollment figures should be used to determine entry numbers. Multicounty Extension units have the option of combining enrollments from all counties within the unit to determine a total number of entries, using the quota systems. This procedure, if used, must be used for ALL State Fair class entries from that multi-county unit.

GENERAL EXHIBIT GUIDELINES:

- 8. All exhibits must be products of the current 4-H year (September 1, 2024 August 15, 2025). The same product that is selected at the county level must be the one exhibited at the State Fair (except for Food & Nutrition (must be the same recipe), Crops, Floriculture, and Vegetable Gardening exhibits (must be the same specie/type (i.e. slicing tomatoes, snap beans, onions, etc.)). Modifications can be made to the original county exhibit to meet State Fair class requirements or to incorporate suggested improvements made by the local judge. Determination of exhibit eligibility rests solely with the University of Illinois Extension Assistant Dean and Director, 4-H and designated persons.
- 9. Exhibits illustrating inappropriate subject matter and/or graphics are not acceptable. The Superintendents reserve the right to remove exhibits deemed inappropriate or dangerous for youth audiences. The content of any 4-H competitive presentation does not necessarily reflect the beliefs or views of the Illinois State Fair or the University of Illinois Extension 4-H program.
- 10. Many exhibit areas may have size limitations. Read the descriptions carefully. Please choose a display size which is most appropriate for the exhibit you are bringing. Larger does not always mean better; use good judgment in creating your exhibit. Exhibitors will need to carry their project from the distant parking lots on the fairgrounds. *Tables are provided, do not bring your own.*
- 11. **INNOVATION CLASSES** are open to all 4-H members in the project areas listed. Members choosing to exhibit in the Innovation class may be enrolled in any level of the project they are studying. Members choosing to exhibit in the Innovation class decide the best way to show off their project mastery and knowledge for the year in that project category. Some suggestions are provided for each category, but members may choose any method they want for demonstrating project learning as long as it does not fit in any other class in that category. Only selected projects categories have an Innovation option.
- 12. **GROUP PROJECT OPPORTUNITIES HAVE EXPANDED.** They include Civic Engagement, Diversity and Cultural Awareness, Leadership, Passport to the World, Service Learning, and Video.

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13. PROJECT MANUALS: Some projects require a project manual, book, workbook or guide. Please read the project exhibit guidelines and follow all project manual requirements. These are indicated with a book icon in the exhibit guidelines.

COPYRIGHT AND CLOVER USAGE:

- 14. Copyright Reminder: It is illegal for youth to use an image or brand that someone else owns as part of their 4-H project exhibit without the permission of the copyright/trademark holder.
- 15. Copyrighted or trademarked designs are not acceptable; this includes team logos, school logos, and/or characters from television, movies such as Disney characters, Iron Man etc.

- 17. Use of the 4-H Name and Emblem: Chartered 4-H Clubs and enrolled 4-H members are authorized to use the 4-H Name and Emblem. This includes permission for an enrolled 4-H member to use the 4-H name and emblem in exhibits you create for personal use as part of 4-H sponsored events. This includes 4-H decorated cookies, a 4-H Clover printed out for use in a scrapbook, etc.
- 18. Please note: Any use of the 4-H name and emblem on items intended as gifts or for sale require prior permission using this UNIVERSITY AGREEMENT. This should be signed by the County Director. Any uses of the 4-H name and emblem for sale or promotion online, and/or in statewide events should be signed by the Illinois 4-H Director (illinois4H@illinois.edu).
- 19. Use of the green clover shaped image is not protected. The 4-H Emblem is distinguished by the four H's that signify Head, Heart, Hands, and Health. No creative rendering, changing in color or shape of the official 4-H emblem is allowed.

EXHIBIT JUDGING PROCEDURE & SCHEDULE:

- 20. The County Extension office will provide official exhibit tags for all exhibitors prior to the Illinois State Fair. This entry tag should be filled out and securely attached to the exhibit. County exhibit tags and ribbons should be removed.
- 21. All exhibitors from a county will exhibit the same day (see schedule below). A 4-H member may also show in the junior livestock show, but they must be present at the required time for their General Project judging. If possible, attempts will be made to accommodate livestock exhibitors within the judging time span, but no premium will be awarded if the exhibitor misses their judging time.
- 22. The General Project Exhibit will be held in the Orr Building of the state fairgrounds. Members must drop off their projects any time from 8:00 a.m. 9:00 a.m. All projects should be in place by 9:00 a.m. Judging is scheduled throughout the day. The judging schedule will be posted in each project area. Members should check the judging schedule and return to the judging area about 15 minutes before their scheduled judging time. Projects may be released during the day 30 minutes after the final project in the class has been judged. You can find updates in the State Fair app. All projects must be removed no later than 4:30 p.m. daily. If you cannot pick up your project, you may make arrangements with another person from your county to pick up your project on your behalf.

RECOGNITION:

- 23. All exhibitors will receive a ribbon for participating. Additional awards may be given at the judges' discretion and will be listed on the 4-H State Fair website. Judges consider the display and information provided during the interview in determining awards. Exhibitors who do not follow the exhibit class guidelines and requirements are ineligible to receive champion or reserve champion. The judge's decision that is posted on the official judge's class list is final unless it has been determined that an exhibitor has not followed the guidelines or rules for that exhibit
 - **Ribbons and Awards:** The top score in each class receives a champion medal and receives 2X value premium money. The second highest score in each class receives a reserve champion medal and receives 1X value premium money. Exhibitors who present inspirational, innovative, or unique exhibits may receive an Inspire Award.
 - Champion and reserve champion exhibits are not eligible for Inspire Awards.
- 24. Premium checks may be awarded to exhibitors. The amount of the individual premium is determined by total number of awards given. Exhibits must remain on display until the posted release time or whenever judging is completed, whichever is later, to be considered for a premium. Premiums offered by State Fair in the 4-H division total \$15,000. NOTE: The Department of Agriculture shall use its best efforts to secure sufficient appropriations to fund premiums. In any year for which the General Assembly of the State of Illinois fails to make an appropriation sufficient to pay such premiums, premium amounts may not be accurately reflected in this document.

LEE COUNTY JUNIOR & OPEN SHOW

GENERAL RULES

- 1. The Illinois Department of Agriculture shall use its best efforts to secure sufficient appropriations to fund premiums. In any year for which the General Assembly of the State of Illinois fails to make an appropriation sufficient to pay such premiums, premium amounts may not be accurately reflected in this Premium Book.
- 2. Entries MUST be submitted online or the Fair Office by July 1, 2025. Entries received after July 1 will be assessed a \$2.00 late fee for each entry listed. No entries will be accepted after July 15, 2025. NO EXCEPTIONS. Entries can be mailed to Lee Co. Fair Association, 1574 Nachusa Rd., Dixon IL 61021. NEW: Online payment for entries available.
- 3. Do not reserve extra pens or stalls for tack, equipment or feed. Do not tack hoses or "claim" any spigot or hydrant on the grounds or wash racks.
- 4. Premium checks will be handed out Sunday after 3 p.m. by Fair Association staff. Time could vary. Check with the fair office. Exhibitors MUST sign their premium statement to receive their check.
- 5. Premium checks must be deposited / cashed within 90 days of receipt. Checks will not be reissued.
- 6. Exhibitors must be between 8 and 20 years of age as of September 1, 2024.
- 7. Ownership dates are to be adhered to or an exhibit or exhibitor will be disqualified.
- 8. Livestock exhibitors must wear an exhibitor number while in the show ring. If you have two entries in one class, additional cards bearing your exhibitor number may be requested at the Fair Office.
- 9. Rabbit exhibits must be in place by 8 p.m. on Wednesday. All other livestock exhibits must be in place by 10 a.m. on Thursday.
- 10. Health papers for beef cattle, dairy cattle, goats, sheep and swine must be stamped by the fair vet in the Fair Office between 7 and 8 p.m. on Wednesday, or between 11 a.m. and 12 p.m. on Thursday. All other animals should refer to the health requirements as listed in specific department pages.
- 11. The Department Superintendents will check purebred registration papers. These papers (or copies) must remain on the grounds for the duration of the fair. Inability to produce purebred papers will cause entries to be placed in grade or market classes.
- 12. Stalls and pens must be cleaned by 9 a.m. each day and manure and bedding are to be loaded into spreaders or designated areas. Pens are to be kept neat and clean throughout the day for the health and safety of fair animals and fair attendees. If spreaders or designated dumping areas are full, please inform the fair office.
- 13. Exhibitors are responsible for thoroughly cleaning pens and exhibit areas before leaving at the end of the fair.
- 14. Overnight accommodations for Wednesday-Saturday evenings: Youth under the age of 18, staying overnight, must stay in a registered camper in the camping area accompanied by at least one of their parents or an adult chaperone. See Camper Space Rental Form in "Special Events & Other Information" section.
- 15. Only Livestock exhibitors can stay overnight in respective barns. All overnighters are required to sign in at office each night. An "Overnight Barn" form must be on file in the fair office with parent signature prior to the first night's stay. See form in "Special Events & Other Information" section.
- 16. Barns close (lights out) each night at 10:30 p.m.
- 17. Any exhibits removed before the published release times (except as per #18) will forfeit their premiums and will not be allowed to show at the following fair.
- 18. If an animal is ill or uncontrollable, the owner must first inform the department superintendent, a Fair Association representative and the fair veterinarian and then move the animal to another location on the fairgrounds. If the owner wishes to remove the animal from the grounds, the written approval of the fair veterinarian, the department superintendent; and the Fair Association President, Vice President, or designee is required. Barring illness, the animal is to be returned to the fairgrounds by 8 a.m. the following morning. If all these procedures are not adhered to premiums will be forfeited.
- 19. The Lee County Fair Association reserves the right to remove any exhibitor or exhibit from the grounds.
- 20. No bicycles, skateboards or motorized scooters or vehicles (ATVs, UTVs, golf carts, etc.) may be driven or ridden on the grounds unless approved by the Lee Co. Fair Association. Submit your request to (815) 857-2603.
- 21. The Lee County Fair Association, its designated agents, and fair committees are not responsible for accidents, damage or theft of projects.
- 22. No person shall possess alcoholic beverages, illegal drugs or firearms upon entering the Lee County 4-H Center & Fairgrounds. For the safety of guests, all persons, vehicles and belongings are subject to search at any time by the Lee County Fair Association or its designated agents. Any prohibited items that are found are subject to seizure, discard or disposal. Persons who fail to comply with this policy are subject to removal from the premises and possible arrest and or prosecution. Admission may be refused at any time, for any reason, subject to law.

2025 Exhibition Livestock Health Requirements County Fairs

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

These Exhibition Health Requirements apply to all livestock present at the fair including those animals that are not entered in competitive events.

- 1. Exhibitors are required to familiarize themselves with all rules applicable to their exhibits.
- 2. All out-of-state animals shall require an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.
- 3. All animals, except as noted, shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) which shows that the animal meets all health requirements for the State of Illinois. CVI's shall be made available to Bureau of Animal Health Personnel on request. If an official electronic CVI is utilized, the exhibitor should be able to log on and show Bureau of Animal Health Personnel the completed CVI.
- 4. CVI means a legible record made on an official form from the state of origin which has been issued, signed and dated by an accredited veterinarian and which shows the name and address of the animal's owner or exhibitor and the results of all required tests or vaccinations. A CVI shall list only one animal identification per line; shall be presented on the form on which it was initially issued; and shall not be corrected, changed or altered in any manner.
- 5. All animals shall be officially identified. The animal(s) official identification shall be recorded on the CVI.
- 6. Animal identification number (AIN): A numbering system for the official identification of individual animals in the United States that provides a nationally unique identification number for each animal. The AIN consists of 15 digits, with the first 3 being the country code (840 for the United States or a unique country code for any U.S. territory that has such a code and elects to use it in place of the 840 code).
- 7. If animals are from tuberculosis accredited, brucellosis certified, pseudorabies qualified, or brucellosis validated herds, the identifying herd number(s) along with the date of the last herd test(s) shall appear on the CVI.
- 8. CVIs for out-of-state livestock shall be void thirty (30) days after issuance.
- 9. CVIs for Illinois-origin livestock shall be void ninety (90) days after issuance.
- 10. All livestock shall be subject to examination upon entry to any Illinois fair or exhibition. Any animal showing evidence of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases shall be immediately withdrawn and held in quarantine at the owner's risk and expense until properly treated and recovered, or until the animal is released to return to the owner's premise.
- 11. Any livestock infected with scabies, mange, active lesions of ringworm, soremouth, or multiple warts which are easily visible without close examination shall not be permitted to exhibit and are subject to quarantine or removal from the fairgrounds.
- 12. Sheep and goats with caseous lymphadenitis as evidenced by draining abscesses shall not be exhibited and are subject to immediate quarantine or removal from the fairgrounds.
- 13. In the event of the suspicion of or diagnosis of a foreign animal disease, emerging animal disease, or other actionable disease, animals may be subject to quarantine on the fairgrounds until such time that it is determined that the disease is no longer a threat.
- 14. Illinois Department of Agriculture personnel or designee may collect blood, tissue, milk or urine samples from any animal being exhibited and/or raced at any Illinois fair to test for the presence of illegal drugs or banned substances. Examination techniques, such as ultrasound, may also be used at anytime while the animals are on the grounds of any Illinois fair or exhibit.
- 15. The Illinois Department of Agriculture or designee may collect urine, blood, tissue or other test samples from

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- exhibition animals at the time of slaughter.
- 16. All exhibitors of animals at any Illinois fair or exhibition shall comply with the provisions of the Illinois Humane Care for Animals Act. If violations are observed, the animals(s) will be excused from exhibition and ordered removed from the grounds with all awards being forfeited.
- 17. Any practice or deviation from normal, accepted care, including physical, medical or mechanical application, shall constitute a violation of show rules and may result in the animal(s) disqualification and removal from the fairgrounds.
- 18. Any Illinois cattle, bison, cervidae or goats being exhibited in non-accredited free states must be isolated from the remainder of the herd/flock upon return to Illinois and retested for tuberculosis 60-120 days post-entry.

CATS

No health certificate required, but proof of current immunizations against distemper (panleukopenia), feline rhinotracheitis and rabies are required at judging. The preceding shots must be listed on vet invoice with cats name. Cats must also be free of fleas, lice, ear mites and mange. Any cat showing symptoms of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases will not be permitted to show.

CATTLE

Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be by a USDA official animal identification number ear tag, ("840" tag). The identification tag must be able to be read both visually and electronically.

Illinois Cattle

- Brucellosis
 - o Illinois is a Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Illinois cattle.
- Tuberculosis
 - Illinois is an Accredited Tuberculosis- Free State. Tuberculin testing is not required for Illinois cattle.
- Please note: Illinois calves under 6 months of age are not required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

Out-of-State-Cattle

All out-of-state cattle are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.

Brucellosis

- 1. Female cattle six (6) months of age and older and bulls eighteen (18) months of age and older shall be negative to an official test for brucellosis within thirty (30) days prior to entry, unless exempt by one (1) of the following:
 - A. Originate directly from a certified brucellosis-free herd.
 - B. Official vaccinates of dairy breeds under twenty (20) months of age or official vaccinates of beef breeds under twenty-four (24) months of age.
 - C. Animal originated from a "Class Free" state (if entire state is so classified)
 - D. Steers and spayed heifers are not required to be tested for brucellosis.
- 2. The negative brucellosis test shall be conducted at a state or federal laboratory within 30 days prior to exhibition.

Tuberculosis

- 1. Accredited Tuberculosis Free States
 - A. No tuberculin test required. All cattle, including steers, originating from an Accredited Tuberculosis Free State, may enter Illinois for exhibition when accompanied by a CVI issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days.
- 2. Non-Accredited Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
 - A. Cattle must originate from a herd where a complete herd test was conducted within the past year.
 - B. The individual animals entering Illinois must be negative to an additional tuberculin test conducted **within 30 days prior to exhibition**. Cattle that enter Illinois for exhibition and remain in Illinois (animal does not return to the state of origin within 30 days) must be isolated and retested for TB 60-120 days from the last official TB test date.

SWINE

Illinois Swine

- Identification
 - o Individual identification of each animal shall be by a USDA official animal identification number ear tag, ("840" tag). The identification tag must be able to be read both visually and electronically.
- Brucellosis
 - o Brucellosis testing is not required for Illinois swine.
- Pseudorabies
 - Pseudorabies testing is not required for Illinois swine.

Out-of-State Swine

- All out-of-state swine are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.
- Identification
 - Individual identification of each animal shall be by a USDA official animal identification number ear tag, ("840" tag). The identification tag must be able to be read both visually and electronically.
- Brucellosis
 - Breeding swine 4 months of age and older shall be negative to an official test for brucellosis within 30 days
 prior to exhibition unless exempt by one (1) of the following:
 - o Originate immediately and directly from a validated brucellosis-free herd.
 - Originate directly from a validated brucellosis-free state.
 - Swine brucellosis tests for exhibition shall be conducted at a state or federal laboratory.
- Pseudorabies
 - Swine originating from a Pseudorabies Stage IV or V state are exempt from the pseudorabies testing requirement.
 - Swine originating from a Pseudorabies Stage III state shall be negative to an official test for pseudorabies conducted within thirty (30) days prior to entry or originate immediately and directly from a qualified pseudorabies negative herd.
 - Swine originating from a Pseudorabies Stage I or II state shall be negative to an official test for pseudorabies conducted within the 10 days prior to entry.
- Barrows and females in market classes must meet the same requirements as breeding swine.

SHEEP

Identification

- Individual identification of each animal shall be by an ear tattoo or official metal or plastic tag. A microchip ID is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.
- Ear tattoos may be used when a registration certificate, listing the tattoo number, accompanies the animal.
- When using ear tags, the tag must indicate the premises ID and state of origin. The tag number must be assigned
 by a state or APHIS representative and recorded in the Scrapie Record Database.
- Market Lambs
 - All market lambs must be slick shorn (show ring ready) before weigh-in so that show lamb fungus can be identified.

Illinois Sheep

- Sheep originating from a flock that has previously been classified as either an infected or source flock can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved flock plan.
- The CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

Out-of-State Sheep

- All out-of-state sheep are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.
- Sheep originating from a flock that has previously been classified as either an infected or source flock can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved flock plan.
- The CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

GOATS

Identification

- Individual identification of each animal shall be by an ear tattoo or official metal or plastic tag. A microchip ID is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.
- Tattoos may be used when a registration certificate, listing the tattoo number, accompanies the animal.
- When using ear tags, the tag must indicate the premises ID and state of origin. The tag number must be assigned by a state or APHIS representative and recorded in the Scrapie Record Database.
- Ears should be used for tattooing when possible. If there is no space in the ear, the flank or tail fold may be used.

Illinois Goats

- Goats originating from a herd that has previously been classified as either an infected or source herd can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved herd plan.
- The CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

Out-of-State Goats

- All out-of-state goats are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.
- Goats originating from a herd that has previously been classified as either an infected or source herd can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved herd plan.
- Tuberculosis- Goats from areas or states that are not Accredited Bovine Tuberculosis Free, must be accompanied by a CVI indicating that the goats originated from a herd where a complete negative herd test has been conducted within the past twelve (12) months and the individual animals are negative to a tuberculin test conducted within thirty (30) days prior to entry. The CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

HORSES, PONIES, MULES AND OTHER EQUIDAE

Illinois Equine

- All horses and other equidae, twelve (12) months of age and older attending an advertised equine event, shall be
 accompanied by a negative test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) conducted within the last twelve (12) months. A
 copy of this test shall accompany the animal.
- AGID (Coggins) or ELISA tests are accepted.
- An advertised equine event means a show, rodeo, sale, auction, exhibition, trail ride, or horse fair that is posted or media promoted.
- A CVI is not required for Illinois equine.

Out-of-State Equine

- All out-of-state equine are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.
- All horses and other equidae entering Illinois that are twelve (12) months of age or older, shall be accompanied by a negative test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) conducted within the last twelve
- (12) months. A copy of this test shall accompany the animal.
- AGID (Coggins) or ELISA tests are accepted.
- All horses and other equidae shall be accompanied by a CVI issued within thirty (30) days prior to entry.

POULTRY

- All entries (except waterfowl, i.e. domesticated fowl that normally swim, such as ducks and geese) in a show or
 exhibition shall have originated from a U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or equivalent hatchery or flock OR have a
 negative pullorum-typhoid test within 90 days prior to exhibition. Exhibitor shall show proper information as to
 name and address of owner or exhibitor, name and address of the authorized testing agent, date of the testing and
 the number, breed, and species of those tested.
- Prior to being used to transport poultry to a show, all crates, boxes, containers and vehicles shall be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected.
- Any poultry vaccinations must be performed at least 4 weeks prior to delivery to the show.
- Upon admission to a show, all entries shall be examined by the official county fair veterinarian or qualified state
 personnel who shall also receive and examine all certificates necessary for admission of birds to a show. Birds not
 in show condition will be excused from exhibition and removed from the premises. Any fowl showing signs of
 illness during the fair will be removed from the exhibition grounds.

·

- All out-of-state turkeys must originate from flocks that are officially classified as U.S. Mycoplasma Gallisepticum
 Clean in accordance with the provisions of the National Poultry Improvement Plan or be negative to a test for
 Mycoplasma gallisepticum within 30 days prior to entry.
- A permit is also required for out-of-state poultry. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.

RABBITS

There are no requirements governing the movements of rabbits within or into Illinois.

LLAMAS

 There are no requirements governing the movement of llamas within Illinois. A permit and health certificate is required for out-of-state llamas. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx

WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN 4-H SHOW, JR SHOW & OPEN SHOW?

What is the Difference between 4-H Shows, Jr. Shows, Open Shows and Other Burning Questions

The Lee County Fair and 4-H Show is a joint effort by the **University of Illinois Extension-Lee County** and the **Lee County Fair Association**. The event is designed, first, to give youth an opportunity to showcase their talents in a county fair environment and, second, to give Lee County residents and visitors a positive family fair experience.

Because the two groups share so many resources and rely on each other to coordinate the fair, confusion as to who handles what is inevitable.

So, what makes the 4-H portion of the fair different from the Jr. & Open Show portion? Here's a side-by-side comparison.

The Lee County Fair & 4-H Show is not classified as a true county fair because members of the Lee County Fair Association are not appointed by the county board and the group does not receive any funds from the county. The decision to organize in this manner was made years ago, when fair volunteers decided to make a go of it without involvement from a government entity.

- 2. In order for a 4-H member to exhibit, the member must have individual or immediate family ownership of the dog or be leasing the dog being exhibited by June 1.
- 3. *NEW 2025* All new Dog Show Exhibitors must complete the Canine Good Citizen (CGC) testing. If you are unable to be evaluated by an AKC qualified evaluator, your DOG SPIN Club Leader/instructor can also sign off on the skills needed to pass the CGC test.
- 4. Dogs must have correct training equipment such as a flat buckle collar or a choker collar and 6-foot leather or nylon lead to enter obedience classes. No Flexy or retractable leashes allowed. Harnesses will not be allowed in obedience classes. Slip chain "training" or pinch/prong collars will be NOT allowed.
- 5. 4-H'ers and dogs entered in the "Beginner I" or "Beginner II" obedience class must have written proof (form signed by trainer) of at least 6 sessions of obedience training. Training for agility is recommended, but not required.
- 6. All dogs must be current on vaccinations and owners must present a copy of those vaccination records and signed certificate from the vet (within 30 days of show). Please present these forms at check-in for each dog entry certifying dog has had current rabies, distemper-hepatitis-leptospirosis and parvo inoculations.
- 7. Dogs must be on a leash at all times, unless crated.
- 8. Dogs not registered to compete will not be allowed in the building.
- 9. Exhibitors are responsible for bringing any supplies they wish to have on hand, including, but not limited to: water bowls, soft treats, grooming supplies, and crates. Exhibitors should also consider bringing their own seating as limited chairs will be available. Concessions will be available for purchase.
- 10. Dogs in season will not be permitted to show.
- 11. If your dog has a cough, do NOT attend. Coughing dogs will be sent home.
- 12. Unruly or aggressive dogs will not be allowed to show and may be excused by the superintendent and/or judge.
- 13. No treats are allowed in the ring or to be given during judging. Treats are allowed during showmanship.
- 14. A runoff will be held in case of a tie for total score.
- 15. Clean-up equipment will be available. You must clean up after your own dog.

- 3. Dogs are only eligible for Agility On Leash for 2 years before they must advance to Agility Off Leash.

Agility On Leash



Dogs will be led by handler through an obstacle course. They will be judged on their ability to maneuver through the obstacles. No choke collars may be used: only flat buckle collars.

Agility Off Leash

Dogs will be judged on their ability to navigate course and maneuver through obstacles while off leash.

Costume Division (Not eligible for State)

- 1. Dog and handler to be dressed in costume.
- 2. Dog will be dressed at show time ONLY to avoid the risk of dog overheating.
- 3. As soon as the class is finished, the costume will be removed from dog and handler may also remove their costume.
- 4. Dog must enter and exit the ring on leash.
- 5. Exhibitor will be judged on the thought and creativity put into the costume for the dog and handler.
- 6. Participants cannot share a dog.

Costume Class

Showmanship Division

- 1. Exhibitors will be judged on handling skill, knowledge of breed standards of their dog, dog show terminology and elementary dog anatomy. The judge has the right to question exhibitors in one or all of these areas.
- 2. Exhibitors should have appropriate "show" lead for their dogs.
- 3. A county may be represented by one junior showmanship dog/handler team and one senior showmanship dog/handler team who have earned/won their county competition. If a county- winning team(s) cannot attend, alternate team(s) may be entered. (Limited to 1 junior and 1 senior team.) Handlers must be members in the county they are representing. A dog may compete in only one showmanship class.
- 4. Judge's decisions are final.

Junior Dog Showmanship

Handlers ages 8-13 as of September 1 of current 4-H year.

Senior Dog Showmanship

Handlers ages 14 and older as of September 1 of current 4-H year.

Obedience Division

- 1. Inexperienced handler refers to exhibitor who has not previously shown dogs. Inexperienced dogs refer to dogs who have not been trained before this year.
- 2. Handler and dog teams may only enter Beginner I class for one year, then must move to Beginner II. Handler and Dog teams may only enter Beginner II for one year, then must move to Graduate Beginner. In all other obedience classes, dogs qualifying the previous year must advance to the next class, with a maximum of two years in any one class.
- 3. AKC rules will be used as a guideline for judging. Maximum 200 points per class.
- 4. Either a command or signal may be given when the dog is to be in motion. A command and/or signal may be given when a dog is to stay.
- 5. Exhibitors planning to enter the State 4-H Dog Show in "Obedience" must have a score sheet signed by the judge of the county show certifying the dog scored 170 points for class handler/dog entered at county show.
- 6. 4-H is based upon Positive Youth Development meaning that the dog training project is for the youth only, not for a parent to train the dog and the youth to show it.
- 7. For the Rally class: depending on the number of entries, classes may be combined.

Rally Excellent

15-20 signs are used (not including start, finish, or call marker). Dog must jump twice. 2 or more of the signs must be "advanced" signs. 3 or more of the signs must be "excellent" signs. Must include a "Sit Stay" sign. Performed **off leash.** Cannot pat leg or clap hands for encouragement.

- 4. **Required:** Check-in Wednesday at the Fair Office from 6-7 p.m. Coggins, class entries, and stalls will be confirmed. NO additional classes can be added after this time. This will help to eliminate any incorrect entries and ensure the smooth operation of shows.
- 5. No stallions over 12 months of age are permitted on the grounds.
- 6. Horses and ponies may be measured by committee and must show in the class(es) for which they are measured.
- 7. Health papers are not required but proof of a negative test for E.I.A. is required, i.e. Coggins/Elisa. Immunizations recommended are: Equine Influenza, Rhino-Pneumonitis, Potomac Horse Fever, Eastern & Western Encephalitis, Tetanus, and Streptococcus (Strangles). Temperatures may be taken before horses enter the barn.
- 8. All 4-H members are required to wear a properly fitted equestrian helmet whenever mounted or driving at all 4-H horse and pony events, shows, activities, or practices. Original tags must be present in all approved helmets. The 4-H member is responsible to see that this specified headgear is properly fitted with the approved harness fastened in place whenever mounted. Protective helmets are required for all riders and drivers at all times. It is recommended that all adults working with 4-H members model the desired youth behavior by also wearing protective helmets whenever mounted or driving.
- 9. Western Attire Western hat (or safety helmets) and boots. No chaps allowed.
- 10. English Attire Appropriate pants, boots, and hat (or safety helmet). Tie is optional.
- 11. Boots are to be worn in the show ring at all times!
- 12. ALL horses and ponies MUST BE KEPT OFF the midway, tractor-pull track, and west parking areas.

Beef Premiere Class

- 1. An exhibitor may enter one steer or heifer from the weigh-in held in February. At initial weigh-in, each 4-Her is allowed to weigh a maximum of 3 head.
- 2. Minimum weight of 450 pounds at February weigh-in. Maximum weight of 900 pounds.
- 3. Steers or heifers must be weighed out at the Sublette Grain Elevator on Monday morning, July 14, before being delivered to Country Village Meats in Sublette for slaughter. Notification of weigh-out will be given to those registering for class.
- 4. Entries must weigh a minimum of 875 lbs. at the time of weigh-out. No upper weight limit.
- 5. To be eligible for placing, carcasses must meet the following standards:
 - a. Minimum USDA Quality Grade of low choice.
 - b. USDA Yield Grade of lower than 4.0.
- 6. Carcasses will be placed on the basis of adjusted retail yield per day on feed.
- 7. Ribbons and premiums paid on rail placing.
- 8. The top 3 qualifying carcasses (1st, 2nd, and 3rd) will be sold at auction on Friday evening of the fair.
- 9. Owners are responsible for deposition of their animal carcass by having it processed, taking it home or selling it.

Rate of Gain Class

- 1. Steer and heifer calves must be initially weighed in February. At initial weigh-in, each 4-Her is allowed to weigh a maximum of 3 head.
- 2. Minimum weight of 450 pounds at February weigh-in; maximum weight of 900 pounds.
- 3. Placing will be made on basis of Rate-of-Gain per day from weigh-in to weigh-out.
- Final weights will be taken on Monday morning at Premiere weigh-out (Sublette Grain Elevator) or at steer weighin at the fair.

SHEEP

Lamb Carcass Class

- 1. Top 3 carcasses will be sold at auction Friday of the fair if they received a blue rating.
- 2. Wethers or ewes must be nominated, weighed and ear tattooed on or before May 15.
- 3. Lambs must be castrated prior to weighing and ear tattooing.

- 3. Castration must have been done prior to March 1.
- 4. Barrows must be delivered to Country Village Meats for processing on Monday, July 21, between 8 and 9 a.m. See Schedule for Premiere Contest dates.
- 5. Carcasses will be placed on a fat free lean and pork quality basis using the following formula:

Pounds of FFL = $8.588 - (21.896 \times 10^{th} \text{ rib fat depth, in.}) + (3.005 \times 10^{th} \text{ rib loin muscle are, sq. in.}) + (0.465 \times hot carcass wt., lbs.)$

To convert to %FFL, divide by hot carcass weight and multiply by 100.

- 6. Entries must have a minimum hot carcass weight of 170 pounds.
- 7. Maximum hot carcass weight of 235 pounds.
- 8. Minimum 10th rib fat thickness of 0.5 inches.

<u>Color</u> - NPPC Official Color Standards range from 1.0 (pale pinkish gray to white) to 6.0 (dark purplish red). Loin muscle color scores of 2.0 or lower and 6.0 are disqualified.

<u>Marbling</u> –NPPC Official Color Standards range from 1.0 (1% intramuscular fat) to 10.0 (10% intramuscular fat). Loin muscle with a marbling scores of greater than 6.0 is disqualified.

<u>Firmness/Wetness</u> – A three-point scale of assessing wetness and firmness of loin muscle will be utilized. Loin muscle firmness and wetness score of 1 will be disqualified.:

1 = exudative and soft; 2 = moist and firm; 3 = dry and firm

Pet Rabbit Class

The Pet rabbit class is designed for those 4Hers who have rabbits as pets. These rabbits are raised specifically for the pleasure of the owner. Only one pet rabbit can be shown by one exhibitor and may be used as a costume class rabbit and/or showmanship. Rabbits will be judged based on the 4Hers apparent care of the animal, and his / her knowledge about the rabbit.

Meat Pen

- 1. Pen of 3 rabbits, must stay together.
- 2. All rabbits must be of the same breed.
- 3. Rabbits must be max 70 days or less.
- 4. Rabbits must weigh between 3.5 (min) and 5.5 (max) pounds.

Single Fryer

- 1. The single fryer may be a rabbit from the Meat Pen (exhibitor's choice), or it may be a separate entry.
- 2. Max 2 entries. Only one entry available for premium. Second entry cannot be entered in any other class.
- 3. Rabbits must be max 70 days or less.

Rabbit Premiere

- 12. The exhibition size requirements for all photographs will be:
 - Minimum image size: 5" X 7"
 - Maximum image size: 8" X 10"
 - Maximum exhibit size (including frame): 18" X 20"
 - Maximum image size 8" x 24" panorama photography Photography 2 only
- 13. All exhibitors must include unframed (taped to the back of the framed exhibit or attached to the project booklet) original or unedited versions of either the same subject or the examples of the same technique that the framed image represents. This will assist the judge in understanding the choices made by the photographer to build the exhibited composition.
- 14. Three State Fair Delegates may be selected from the following photography classes: 50268, 50269, 50270, 50271.
- 15. Two trophies may be presented to: Best of Show Photography.

NOTE: Images taken with devices that apply an automatic filter will not be eligible for award.

Photography 1 (SF 50268) Level 1: Photography Basics – Required

Exhibit one framed photo which demonstrates your understanding of a technique you learned from your Photography 1 project manual. No photo editing is allowed in this class except cropping and red eye removal. Be prepared to show the page in the manual of the technique you are demonstrating.

Photography 2 (SF 50269) Level 2: Next Level Photography – Required Exhibit one of the options listed below:

- Exhibit one framed 8" x 10" close-up photograph using the skills learned on pages 58-61 (section: Bits and Pieces) of the project manual titled Level 2 Next Level Photography. No photo editing is allowed in this class except cropping and red eye removal; Be prepared to show the page in the manual of the technique you are demonstrating. OR
- Exhibit one framed 8" x 24" or smaller panorama photograph using the skills learned on pages 62-65 (section: Panorama) of the project manual titled Level 2 Next Level Photography. No photo editing is allowed in this class

No photo editing is allowed in this class except cropping and red eye removal. Be prepared to show the page in the manual of the technique you are demonstrating.

Photo Editing (SF 50271)

Open to members in Photography 1, Photography 2, and Photography 3

Exhibit one framed 8" x 10" photo that has been altered using digital photo-editing techniques (beyond cropping and redeye reduction). Include a print of the original photo(s), taped to the back of the photo frame. Photos in which an automatic filter was applied at the time the photograph was taken will not be eligible for award. Must exhibit in Photography 1, 2, or 3 to enter in this class.

- 1. All rules (pages 9-14) apply.
- 2. Firmly attach exhibit tag on <u>upper right-hand corner</u> of exhibit (where applicable).
- 3. Three State Fair Delegates may be selected from the following classes: 50299, 50300, 50301, 50302.

Neither the University of Illinois Extension nor the Lee County Fair Association will assume liability for loss or damage, which may occur to artwork exhibited. All possible precautions will be taken to protect the exhibits.

Theater Arts 1 (SF 50299)

Exhibit one of the following items:

- Portfolio of acting activities completed during the current year. This should include at least 3 of the following: list of roles/performances, pictures or description of hair or makeup, pictures or description of a favorite costume, pictures or description of a particular set piece or prop, ticket stubs or marketing materials, playbill, description of audition process, highlights of acting skills honed (such as stage directions, auditioning, projection, diction, character development, physicality, vocal expression, facial expressions, memorization, understanding of how to read a script, ability to take direction, confidence, collaboration with scene partners etc.) Note: A video of performances is not considered a portfolio and will not be accepted for exhibit. OR
- **Display illustrating a picture story** developed by the exhibitor. Your picture story should include a minimum of 3 boxes with a character, problem, and solution. **OR**
- Write a personal monologue. Create a character, decide what your character wants, what are the obstacles, and create your character's thoughts and struggles.

Theatre Arts 2 (SF 50300)

Exhibit one of the following items:

- **Block a scene.** Choose a scene from a published play and become the director. Clearly mark stage directions, blocking, entrances and exits, and any additional notes you would want to share with the actors. **OR**
- Write a scene. Create a scene that includes at least 2 characters, has an established setting, plot, and time, and include stage directions. **OR**
- Create a mask that either represents a character of your choice or models a mask from a given historical time period integral to the history of theatre.

Theater Arts 3 (SF 50301)

Exhibit one of the following items:

- Display that includes sound, props and costume charts appropriate for a selected scene from a story or play (limited to no more than 8 items) **OR**
- Display a scenic design model to depict a scene from a script OR
- Display illustrating a character with make-up drawn or colored in. Include a photograph of a person wearing the make-up & information on the character's personality or part in the play.

Theatre Arts Innovation Class (SF 50302)

Open to youth enrolled in Theatre Arts.

Demonstrate the skills and knowledge you have gained through Theatre Arts project. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. Your exhibit should not fit in the other exhibit options for this project. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

4-H VIDEO/FILMMAKING

- 1. All rules (pages 9-14) apply.
- 2. Firmly attach exhibit tag in lower right-hand corner of exhibit.
- 3. Videos can be produced as an individual or a group of up to 5 members.
- 4. Member must have knowledge about the camera used in project.
- 5. All exhibits must include project manual with at least 2 activities completed this year.
- 6. Video submissions should be no longer than five (5) minutes in length (unless noted differently in class description).
- 7. Videos are to be original and a result of the member's current year's work.
- 8. All videos should comply with copyright regulations and display an image that is appropriate for 4-H audiences.
- 9. No time or date should be imprinted on the video footage.
- 10. All videos should include an opening title screen, as well as closing credits which include date of production, name of video exhibitor and research sources if appropriate.
- 11. All Video/Filmmaking exhibitors must include a printed copy of materials which will remain on display.
- 12. Photo/Model releases from individuals appearing in the videos are required unless the video is of a group in a public place where identification would not be an issue. The photo release can be obtained at: go.illinois.edu/PhotographyProject.
- 13. Three State Fair Delegates may be selected from the following classes: 50324 A & B, 50325 A & B, 50326 A & B, 50327 A & B, 50328 A & B.
- 14. One Trophy may be presented to: Best of Show Video.

Criteria for judging shall include: (1) Evidence of story line; (2) Use of camera angles; (3) Use of zooming techniques; and (4) Smoothness of scene changes. Image and sound quality will be considered in relation to equipment available to and used by exhibitor.

County 4-H Show: Exhibitors may bring their own laptop or electronic tablet to play the video. No internet access will be available, the video should already be on the laptop/tablet. If you need to borrow laptop for judging, please contact the Extension Office.

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State Fair: All Exhibitors must bring their video to be judged on a USB flash drive and saved in .MP4 format. Wireless Internet access is not necessarily available. Exhibitors are encouraged to post their video on YouTube.com in advance of State Fair. Exhibitors may choose whether to make the video "public, unlisted" (someone must have the link to view it) or "private" (only people you choose may view it). This will allow fairgoers to view the exhibits on display. There will be TV monitors at the exhibit table for viewing videos so exhibitors will NOT need to bring a laptop or device for viewing at the State Fair.

Commercial or Promotional Video Individual (SF 50324 A) or Group (SF 50324 B)

Prepare a short video (30 seconds to 1 minute in length) that promotes an event, advertises a specific project/product, or is a public service announcement. The video should demonstrate skills in making and editing video.

Animated Video Individual (SF 50325 A) or Group (SF 50325 B)

Video in this class should represent creative animation of original artwork created by the exhibitor and may include stop motion techniques. Media might include images created with graphics software or hand-drawn images.

Documentary (SF 50326)

Video in this class should represent a research-based investigation into a topic of choice. Video credits should list research sources and may include paper or electronically published materials, as well as, and/or interviews with experts or constituents related to the topic of investigation.

Short Story or Short Narrative Individual (SF 50327 A) or Group (SF 50327 B)

Prepare a short video that tells a story. The video should demonstrate skills in making and editing video.

Video/Filmmaking Innovation Class Individual (SF 50328 A) or Group (SF 50328 B)

Open to all youth enrolled in Video/Filmmaking

Demonstrate the skills and knowledge you have gained through the Video project. Your exhibit should not fit in the other exhibit options for this project. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

360° Video (County Only)

Open to youth enrolled in Video or Computer Science 1 or 2

Videos in this class must be no longer than 5 minutes in length. Criteria for judging shall include: (1) The use and effectiveness of using 360° video equipment to tell story (including stitching); (2) Use of camera angles and lighting to capturing whole 360° scenes without equipment interference; (3) Use and placement of titles and graphics in the 360° environment; and (4) Smoothness of scene changes. Image and sound quality will be considered in relation to equipment available to and used by exhibitor. All videos should comply with copyright regulations and display an image that is appropriate for 4-H audiences. No time or date should be imprinted on the video footage. All videos should include an opening title screen, as well as closing credits which include date of production, name of video exhibitor and research sources if appropriate.

Videos entered in this class can fall under any of the following categories: Commercial or Promotional, Animated Video, Documentary, or Short Story/Short Narrative. Guidelines for each category can be found above. **Exhibitors choosing to use 360° video are to film and edit videos using 360° Cameras and editing software.** Videos should be edited and stitched keeping in mind the limitations and complexities unique to filming and editing in 360°. Each exhibit should come on a jump drive, and MUST be preloaded to a VR headset or Google Cardboard to demonstrate for the Judges. These exhibits are designed to demonstrate the filmmaking processes unique to 360° film making, as opposed to the development of the technologies behind them (as seen in Computer Science).



4-H VISUAL ARTS

- 1. All rules (pages 9-14) apply.
- 2. You may enter up to 2 entries in one class but will only be paid for one entry per medium class. Max 10 entries total in visual arts.
- 3. All entries must be properly prepared for exhibit. Items intended to be hung must be matted and/or framed and have a hanging device that is sturdy enough to support the weight of the object.
- 4. Firmly attach exhibit tag on <u>upper right-hand corner</u> of exhibit (where applicable).
- 5. Both original and non-original works can be shown however, a project's eligibility for State and whether it is original or non- original, will be determined by the judges.
- 6. Best of Show Cake Decorating Advanced and Best of Show Cake Decorating Master will be auctioned off on Friday night. All items auctioned must have received a blue rating.

Neither the University of Illinois Extension nor the Lee County Fair Association will assume liability for loss or damage, which may occur to artwork exhibited. All possible precautions will be taken to protect the exhibits.

Criteria for State eligibility are listed below.

Exhibitors must be enrolled in the Visual Arts project category in which they are exhibiting. Exhibitors are encouraged to date the project when it is made. Exhibitors must be able to carry or cart their exhibits across the fairgrounds from the parking lots. All visual arts exhibits are evaluated using a visual arts rubric which takes into account correct use of design elements; craftsmanship; and creativity.

Articles exhibited must be an original design created by the exhibitor (except in Heritage Arts, which may follow a pattern, AND Fiber-Non Original Ages 8-10 ONLY). Copyrighted or trademarked designs are not acceptable; this includes team, school logos and/or characters from movies such as Mickey Mouse, Iron Man, etc. Kits and preformed molds are not considered original and are not acceptable in any Visual Arts Class. Combining parts of different patterns (pictures, photographs, images from the internet or a magazine) with the member's own ideas can result in an original design, but simply changing the color, pattern and/or size of a pattern does NOT make the design original. This also applies for ideas found on a site such as Pinterest. If you see something on Pinterest that you like, you can use that idea as your inspiration, however, create something which is fundamentally different. It MUST NOT BE AN EXACT REPLICA OF something the judge

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can search for and find on Pinterest. The exhibit may combine parts of different patterns and/or ideas with the concepts of the member, however changing the color or changing the size of the item or pattern used does NOT make it original. If you create an exact replica of what you see somewhere else, it is not your original design. If a photo, sketch, or other idea source was used, submit it with your entry, firmly attached to your exhibit. Be prepared to explain how and where you got the idea for this project.

Use of the 4-H Clover: Chartered 4-H clubs and enrolled 4-H members are authorized to use the 4-H Name and Emblem. This includes permission for an enrolled 4-H member to use the 4-H name and emblem in exhibits created for personal use and as part of 4-H sponsored events. This includes 4-H decorated cookies, a 4-H clover printed for use in a scrapbook or included as part of any other 4-H exhibit. Use of the green clover shaped image is not protected. The 4-H "emblem" is distinguished by the four H's that signify Head, Heart, Hands and Health. No creative rendering, changes in color or shape of the official 4-H emblem is allowed.

NOTE – Any use of the 4-H name and emblem on items intended as gifts or for sale locally requires prior permission from your local Extension office. Your Extension office will be able to provide you with the form which must be signed by the Extension County Director. Any uses of the 4-H name and emblem for sale or promotion online, and/or in statewide events should be signed by the Illinois 4-H Program Leader (Illinois4H@illinois.edu).

Quilts entered in Visual Arts should **ONLY** be entered in the Quilting Project area in either Level 1 *You Can Quilt* (SF 50331A) OR Level 2 *Quilting the Best Better* (SF 50331B). All work on the quilt **MUST** be completed by the 4-H member. You cannot exhibit a quilt that was quilted by someone else.

Unless otherwise noted, due to space limitations, projects should be no larger than 48" x 48".

Chalk/Carbon/Pigment Classes

Enter Division based on the type of material the art was created on.

Division A (SF 50336 A): Canvas

Any original artwork created with pencils, chalk, pens, ink, paint, charcoal, dyes, etc. on canvas. This would include all painting, sketching, drawing, cartooning, original non-computer-generated graphics, printing, etc. Drawings and paintings should be matted or framed under glass. (Exceptions: Oil and acrylic paintings do not require glass and are not required to be matted.) Watercolor, chalk, pen & ink, etc. do require some protective covering. Gallery frames are acceptable. Canvas paintings that continue "over the edges" are acceptable without frames; however, the piece must still be prepared for hanging. Matted pieces without frames are acceptable, however the piece must be prepared for hanging OR it must include a photo of the artwork being displayed in a non-hanging manner. There is no specific requirement for the type of mat used.

Division B (SF 50336 B): Paper

Any original artwork done with pencils, chalk, pens, ink, paint, charcoal, dyes, etc., on paper. This would include all painting, sketching, drawing, cartooning, original non-computer-generated graphics, printing, etc. Drawings and paintings should be matted or framed under glass. (Exceptions: Oil and acrylic paintings do not require glass and are not required to be matted.) Watercolor, chalk, pen & ink, etc. do require some protective covering. Gallery frames are acceptable. Matted pieces without frames are acceptable, however the piece must be prepared for hanging OR it must include a photo of the artwork being displayed in a non-hanging manner. There is no specific requirement for the type of mat used.

Division C (SF 50336 C): Glass, Wood, Metal, or Textiles

Any original artwork done with pencils, chalk, pens, ink, paint, charcoal, dyes, etc., on glass, wood, metal, and textiles. This would include all painting, sketching, drawing, cartooning, original non-computer-generated graphics, printing, etc. Painted and/or glazed pre-formed ceramics and painted porcelain dolls are not eligible for the State Fair exhibit. Drawings and paintings should be matted or framed under glass. (Exceptions: Oil and acrylic paintings do not require glass and are not required to be matted.) Watercolor, chalk, pen & ink, etc. do require some protective covering. Gallery frames are acceptable. Matted pieces without frames are acceptable, however the piece must be prepared for hanging OR it must include a photo of the artwork being displayed in a non-hanging manner. There is no specific requirement for the type of mat used.

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Clay (SF 50337)

Any item made of clay. It may be fired or unfired, hand formed or thrown on a wheel. Self-hardening clays are fine. Fire/ oven-cured and cornstarch clay could be accepted. Items can include, but are not limited to, clay statues, bowl, jewelry, etc. Pre-formed ceramics and porcelain dolls ARE NOT eligible for State Fair.

Computer-Generated Art (SF 50338)

Any original art created in any software package. Exhibit may not include scanned work, clip art, downloaded images from the internet, any imported image, or photographs. All pixels must be original. Photo mosaics are NOT allowed. Exhibitors in this class (like all other classes in this sub-section) must be enrolled in Visual Arts. Computer project enrollment is not required. NOTE: Wood and metal exhibits created through the use of laser cutting programs/devices should be entered in this class. Plastic exhibits with an artistic focus created using a 3-D printer should be entered in this class. If the art created is designed to hang, then the entry should have some protective covering, such as a glass frame, and prepared for hanging. If the art is something that has been created with a laser cutting program/device and is NOT designed to hang, it does not require protective covering nor does it need to be prepared to hang.

Computer-Generated Art Graphic Design (SF 50370)

Any original art created in any software package that displays visual information, such as an advertisement, publication, website, or any other type of visual communication by effectively combining text and graphics. If using clip art, downloaded images, imported images, or photographs, they must be either royalty-free or owned by the exhibitor.

Fiber (SF 50339)

Any original item made of fiber. Examples include but are not limited to fabric collage, soft sculpture, stitchery, weaving, embroidery, cross-stitch, wearable art, hooking, braiding, duct tape artistry, string art, and baskets. Original cross-stitched, knitted, or crocheted items belong in this Fiber class. Non-original cross-stitched, knitted, or crocheted items should be entered in Heritage Arts. Machine knitted items are not appropriate for this class.

Fiber: Non-Original AGES 8-10 ONLY (SF 50350)

Any non-original item made of fiber. Examples include but are not limited to fabric collage, soft sculpture, stitchery, weaving, embroidery, cross-stitch, crocheting, knitting, weaving, hooking, and felting. Exhibitors may use a pattern and/or an idea generated from another source.

Glass/Plastic (SF 50340A, 50340B, 50340C)

Any original item made of glass or plastic.

- 50340A Glass Possible items to exhibit include stained glass, etched glass (original design), mosaics made of glass, glass beading.
- 50340B Plastic Possible items to exhibit include plastic jewelry (friendly plastic); recycled plastic art; plastic that can be molded into 3D shapes.
- 50340C Plastic Block Art Any original item made entirely of plastic building blocks. This must be an original design created by the exhibitor. Structures are NOT eligible in the Visual Arts Plastic Block Art exhibit area. The exhibit will be judged using a Visual Arts rubric. The exhibit must be attached to a board or frame for display and prepared to be hung or presented as 3-dimensional piece of table art, however NOT a structure (unacceptable items would include buildings, rollercoasters, etc).

Interlocking building block creations (i.e. LEGOS) are ONLY suitable for 50340C exhibit option of the Visual Arts Glass/Plastic class. Steppingstones can be entered as a Visual Arts exhibit in Glass & Plastic; however they must have an intentional design created using glass and/or plastic and the exhibitor must be prepared to discuss the design elements associated with their exhibit. Due to space limitations, any single exhibit in the Glass & Plastic project should NOT exceed 48" x 48".

Heritage Arts (SF 50341)

Exhibit an item of traditional art learned from another person or from a pattern (NO KITS may be entered in this class). Non-original cross-stitched, knitted and crocheted items by pattern fit in this class. ALL ORIGINAL cross-stitched, knitted and crocheted items should be exhibited in Fiber Arts. (Machine knitted items ARE NOT acceptable for this class.) Other possibilities include: needlepoint, counted cross-stitch, crewel, embroidery, cut work, hardanger embroidery (embroidery openwork), macramé, candles, blacksmithing, pysanki (decorated eggs), baskets (made using a traditional pattern), traditional handmade dolls with handmade costumes, soaps made using nature dyes and/or candles. Exhibitors in Heritage Arts MUST also bring 1) the pattern or a copy of the pattern they used to create their traditional art; and 2) be prepared to explain the traditional origins of their art choice.

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Leather (SF 50321)

Exhibit one of the following options using leather.

- Leather Stamping: Exhibit should utilize one or more stamping techniques exhibit examples include items such as belt; coasters; bookmark; key chain; wrist bracelet.
- Leather Carving or Tooling: Exhibit should use simple swivel knife tooling techniques or may incorporate several swivel knife-tooling designs or patterns exhibit examples include items such as belt; pictorial carving; key case.
- Leather Lacing: Exhibit to include stamping and/or carving techniques incorporated with lacing techniques exhibit examples include items such as wallets; purses; etc.
- Leather Stitching: Exhibit may include stamping; carving and/or lacing techniques and should be a leather item or article of apparel, which incorporates hand-sewing and/or machine stitching techniques. Hand-sewing and/or machine stitching must be the work of the exhibitor.

Metal (SF 50342)

Any original item made of metal such as sculpture, tin punch, engraved metal, or jewelry. Items intended for industrial use (such as tools and/or shop items) are not considered part of the Visual Arts project are not eligible. Metal items that have been partially or totally created through the use of laser cutting programs/devices should be entered in Computer-Generated Art.

Nature (SF 50343)

Any item made of natural material such as wreaths, cornhusk dolls, etc. Items should be made of natural materials (which may be purchased) but securing elements such as glue and wire may be used in the inner construction as long as they don't detract from the overall "natural" appearance. Engineered wood may be utilized as part of the exhibit to adhere natural materials, not as an element of the design. Articles such as dried pressed flowers may be displayed under glass if viewed as necessary for protection/preservation of the natural materials. Candles are not suitable as entries and instead should be entered in Heritage Arts. All baskets should be entered in Heritage Arts.

Paper (SF 50344A & 50344B)

Any original item made of paper. Exhibitors should create an exhibit that aligns with one of the following categories:

- **50344A** Two-Dimensional Paper Art Exhibits should be a 2-dimensional image. Paper art which falls into the 2-dimensional category includes: greeting cards; paper-cut designs; hand-made paper; paper collage; quilling.
- **50344B** Three-Dimensional Paper Art Exhibits should be a 3-dimensional image. Exhibits in the 3-dimensional category must have multiple layers and/or levels. This is defined as more than 3 layers so the image truly has dimensions that can be viewed from at least three sides; or is at least ½" tall. Paper art which falls into the 3-dimensional category includes but is not limited to: origami; paper mache; Paper models of architecture, paper-cut designs; quilling.

PLEASE NOTE THE FOLLOWING:

- 1. Paper-cut designs and quilling have the potential, depending on the design, to align with either of the categories. The key design element is whether the design is 2-dimensional or 3-dimensional.
- 2. Paper twist articles made from a kit or directions in a craft book or store ARE NOT original and not appropriate in the Visual Arts Paper exhibit area. Scrapbooks are also not eligible in for Visual Arts Paper and should be exhibited in Visual Arts Scrapbooking.
- 3. If creating origami, folded pieces should either be used to create a bigger project such as a mobile or wreath, or multiple pieces of origami should be displayed. Exceptions would be if exhibitor created their own folding pattern.

Three-Dimensional Design/Mixed Media (SF 50348)

Art pieces in this class must be comprised of at least three different media. No one medium can make up more than 40% of a piece. The piece should be free-standing or should be prepared to be hung. It must be observable on at least three different sides. Originality and design are important concepts. Craft and preformed or assembled projects are not acceptable. Due to space limitations, any single exhibit in the Three-Dimensional Design/Mixed Media project should NOT exceed 48" x 48".

Three-Dimensional Design/Mixed Media - Diorama (SF 50351)

Exhibit a model representing a scene with three-dimensional figures. The display must be built on rigid wood (i.e., plywood). Exhibits may include but are not limited to, farm displays, historical events, landmarks, habitats, or scenes from



a book. Exhibits may include pre-manufactured items such as tractors, animals, or figurines, but should also include artistic elements where possible. Due to space limitations, any single exhibit in the Three-Dimensional Design/Mixed Media: Diorama project should NOT exceed 48" x 48".

Wood (SF 50349)

Any item made of wood (carving, sculpture, collage, wood burning, etc.). Utilitarian wood items made from patterns or kits (e.g. outdoor or indoor furniture, shelves, etc.) should be entered in woodworking **NOT** Visual Arts. Popsicle stick crafts are not eligible for State Fair Entry. Wood items that have been partially or totally created through the use of laser cutting programs/devices should be entered in Computer-Generated Art. All Visual Arts Wood exhibits MUST have an artistic element that the exhibitor can explain. Furniture built by the exhibitor aligns with the Woodworking project area – unless the element to be judged is wood carving or wood burning that is one element of the exhibit. Exhibits will be judged using a Visual Arts Rubric and not a woodworking construction rubric.

Quilting: You Can Quilt: Level 1 (SF 50331A)

Exhibit one of the following quilting options. All exhibits should include a card which 1) Identifies the item as an original design created by the exhibitor; as a pattern created by someone else; OR as a pattern that has been adapted by the exhibitor. AND 2) Identifies the type of batting used. The item may be quilted using any method – tie, hand, or machine quilted. All work must be completed by the 4-H member. Exhibit one of the following:

- A Doll Quilt (maximum size of 24" x 30"); OR
- A Baby Quilt (maximum size of 48" x 48"); OR
- A Quilted Table Runner (maximum size of 18" x 36"); OR
- A small Wall Hanging (square or rectangular (maximum size of 36" x 36"). Hanging should include tabs or a pocket on the back for it to be hung.

Quilting: Quilting the Best Better: Level 2 (SF 50331B)

Exhibit one of the following quilting options. All exhibits should include a card which 1) Identifies the item as an original design created by the exhibitor as a pattern created by someone else; OR as a pattern that has been adapted by the exhibitor; 2) Identifies the type of batting used; AND 3) Provides details on any special techniques that were used (applique, embroidery, free-motion quilting, etc.). The item may be quilted using any method – tie, hand, or machine quilted. **All work must be completed by the 4-H member**. Exhibit one of the following:

- A Lap Quilt (width ranging from 42" 58", length ranging from 56" 70"): OR
- A Large Quilted Wall Hanging (can be rectangular or square, sized larger than 36" x 36"). Hanging should include tabs or a pocket on the back in order for it to be hung; OR
- A Quilt that fits any size bed (Twin, Double, Queen or King).

Scrapbooking: Beginning (SF 50345)

Exhibit one album or notebook, either 8 ½" x 11" or 12" x 12", with a front and back cover. The album/notebook must have a minimum of 4 pages (front and back, 8 sides), exhibited in page protectors. **NOTE** – the front and back album covers are NOT part of the "page" count. "Embellishments" are defined as the decorations or special details and features that add to a page and make it more visually appealing. Embellishments may include, but are not limited to, ribbon, clips, stickers, special lettering, etc. Beginners must use a **minimum of four embellishments** in their 4 scrapbook pages (a minimum of four embellishments on the 4 required scrapbook pages, not four per page), 8 sides and tell a story with pictures.

Scrapbooking: Intermediate (SF 50346)

Exhibit one album or notebook, either 8 ½" x 11" or 12" x 12", with a front and back cover. The album/notebook must have a minimum of 6 pages (front and back, 12 sides), exhibited in page protectors. **NOTE** – the front and back album covers are NOT part of the "page" count. "Embellishments" are defined as the decorations or special details and features that add to a page and make it more visually appealing. Embellishments may include, but are not limited to, ribbon, clips, stickers, special lettering, etc. Intermediate level exhibitors must use **a minimum of eight embellishments** in their 6 scrapbook pages (a minimum of eight embellishments on the 6 required scrapbook pages, not eight per page), 12 sides and tell a story with pictures and journaling.

Scrapbooking: Advanced (SF 50347)

Exhibit one album or notebook, either 8 ½" x 11" or 12" x 12", with a front and back cover. The album/notebook must have a minimum of 8 pages (front and back, 16 sides), exhibited in page protectors. **NOTE** – the front and back album covers are NOT part of the "page" count. "Embellishments" are defined as the decorations or special details and features that add to a

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page and make it more visually appealing. Embellishments may include, but are not limited to, ribbon, clips, stickers, special lettering, etc. Advanced level exhibitors must use a **minimum of 12 embellishments** in their 8 scrapbook pages (a minimum of twelve embellishments on the 8 required scrapbook pages, not twelve per page), 16 sides and tell a compelling story with pictures, journaling, and other media.

Food Decorating – for more information about cake decorating techniques: go.illinois.edu/caketechniques

Food Decorating: Beginning (SF 50332)

Exhibit one of the following:

- Exhibit four decorated cookies, using a minimum of four different Level 1 techniques. Exhibit may use cookies OR cookie forms
- Exhibit four decorated cupcakes, using a minimum of four different Level 1 techniques. Exhibit may use cupcakes OR cupcake forms.
- Exhibit a single-layer decorated cake, using a minimum of four different Level 1 techniques. Exhibit may use cake OR cake form.

Food Decorating: Intermediate (SF 50333)

Exhibit one of the following:

- Exhibit four decorated cookies, using a minimum of five Level 2 techniques. Exhibit may use cookies OR cookie forms.
- Exhibit four decorated cupcakes, using a minimum of five Level 2 techniques. Exhibit may use cupcakes OR cupcake forms.
- Exhibit a single-layer or two-layer cakes, using a minimum of five Level 2 techniques. Exhibit may use cake OR cake form.

Food Decorating: Advanced (SF 50334)

Exhibit a decorated, stacked, multi-layer cake, and/or tiered cake, using a minimum of four Level 3 techniques. Exhibit may use cake OR cake form.

Food Decorating: Master (SF 50335)

Exhibit to include a one-page written description of your project, including goals, plans, accomplishments, and evaluation of results. Include up to four pictures of your accomplishments **AND** exhibit an original design decorated cake using more than five techniques. Exhibit may use cake OR cake form.

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4-H CLOTHING & TEXTILES

- 1. All rules (pages 9-14) apply.
- 2. Each garment and/or constructed article (pillow, tote bag, etc.) must be exhibited on a hanger with exhibit tag slipped over top of hanger to show your project to its best advantage. Only articles to be judged will be displayed. Fasten all pieces of outfit securely together. It is recommended that your exhibit be covered with a clear plastic garment bag—garment bags will not be provided.
- 3. If an exhibitor cannot be present for judging, submit a picture that shows fit and a report. For report guidelines see 4-H Show Rules #15 on page 11.
- 4. Everyone using a pattern must bring the pattern envelope and instruction sheet.
- 5. Accessories should **only** be brought for judging. NO ACCESSORIES ARE TO BE LEFT WITH GARMENT.
- 6. Garments constructed for another person are eligible for exhibiting, however, the individual for which the garment was constructed must be present for judging.
- 7. Three State Fair Delegates may be selected from: 50151 A-C, 50152 A-C, 50153 A-C; Two entries may be selected from 50154, 50155, 50156; 1 entry from 50157 A & B, and 1 entry from 50158 A-C.
- 8. Trophies may be presented to: (1) Best of Show Sewing & Design, (1) Best of Show Shopping in Style

Costume Design & Clothing Embellishment

All exhibits entered in the Costume Design & Clothing Embellishment projects will be judged based on their creativity, planning, and execution. Exhibitors bringing garments should not wear their garments when they arrive for judging. The garment will be reviewed by the judges for construction first. Exhibitors will be asked to change into the garment as the second step of the judging process. If the garment was created for another individual, that person can come to judging to model the outfit, or photos of that person in the outfit can be supplied. (Only the exhibitor who made the garment is eligible for ribbon and premium.) If a pattern was used to make the item, the pattern instructions, either written or electronic, are to be included with the exhibit. Exhibit tags should be attached to the garment (preferably with a safety pin and string), not to the hanger. Garments may be worn before exhibiting but should be in good, clean condition. Both projects require youth to complete a project workbook and bring it to judging.

All clothing projects in these categories should follow copyright guidelines. See project resource guides for additional details.

Costume design members wishing to be judged primarily on the sewing construction techniques and fit of their costume should consider entering the Sewing projects instead of costume design. The level to be entered will depend on the sewing techniques used.



Costume Design Costume Design Workbook – Required

Exhibit one costume, created by the member. The costume may contain multiple items. The costume may include supporting accessory pieces (shoes, jewelry, hats, etc.) that complete the look. Accessory items will not remain on display. If the member created any prop weapons as part of their costume (e.g. swords, firearms, bows, etc.) they may not bring them to judging. Those props can be included in the photographs of the completed look in the Illinois 4-H Costume Design Workbook. Bring a completed copy of the Costume Design Workbook (go.illinois.edu/4HCostumeWorkbook) to show your project journey. Youth should enter the class that aligns with their experience with costume design in any form (including outside of 4-H).

Costume Design Beginner (SF 50157A)

For members with 2 or less years of experience in costume design (including this year)

Costume Design Advanced (SF 50157B)

For members with 3 or more years of experience in costume design (including this year)



Clothing Embellishment Clothing Embellishment Workbook – Required

Exhibit one look or outfit, consisting of no more than three coordinated pieces that have been embellished with 1 or more clothing embellishment techniques. Bring a completed copy of the Clothing Embellishment workbook (go.illinois.edu/4HEmbellishmentWorkbook) to show your project journey. No accessory items (such as shoes, jewelry, hats, etc.) should be brought to judging (they can instead be used in the final look photos in the project workbook). Youth should enter the class that aligns with the technique(s) used in their outfit).

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Clothing Embellishment Applied (SF 50158A)

Decoration is attached by gluing, fusing, or painting. Examples: jewels, puff paints, appliqués, tie dye.

Clothing Embellishment Stitched (SF 50158B)

Decoration is hand-or machine-stitched. Examples: machine or hand sewing, such as adding a collar or skirt, appliqué, satin stitch, embroidery, quilting, beading, knitting or crochet (4-H'er does not need to create the knit or crochet piece themselves, it could be purchased or made by others but attached by the 4-H'er).

Clothing Embellishment Combination (SF 50158C)

Decoration includes any combination of both applied and stitched techniques across the outfit.

Sewing 1-3

All exhibits entered in Sewing 1-3 will be judged based on their construction and fit (if applicable). Exhibitors bringing garments should not wear their garments when they arrive for judging as the garment will be reviewed by the judges for construction first. Exhibitors will be asked to change into the garment as the second step of the judging process. If the garment was constructed for another individual, that individual must be present to wear the garment for the judge. (Only the exhibitor who made the garment is eligible for ribbon and premium.) Construction and appearance will both be considered during judging. If a pattern was used to make the item, the pattern instructions, either written or electronic, are to be included with the exhibit. Exhibit tags should be attached to the garment, not to the hanger.

Members wishing to exhibit knitted items should enroll in Visual Arts Fiber (if original) or Visual Arts Heritage Arts (if made from a pattern). We strongly encourage youth interested in pursuing quilting to enroll and exhibit in the Visual Arts Quilting project area. Youth may still exhibit quilts in any level of Sewing as a "Sewn Non-Clothing" item, but these quilts will be judged using the Sewing rubric that evaluates the sewing skills and construction of the item. If exhibiting quilts in the Sewing area, all work on the quilt MUST be completed by the 4-H member. You cannot exhibit a quilt that was quilted by someone else. Quilts can be hand OR machine quilted as long as ALL work is completed by the exhibitor.



Sewing 1 STEAM Clothing 1: FUNdamentals – Required

Exhibit one of the following in either the Non-Sewn, Non-Clothing or Clothing exhibit divisions:

Non-Sewn Exhibits (SF 50151A)

- Clothing Portfolio Complete at least three different samples/activities from Chapter 2 and/or Chapter 3 of the project manual. Examples of samples you might include: How Two Magically Become One, pages 85-86; No Fear of Fray, pages 93-95; Two Sides of the Moon, pages 97-99; On the Flip Side, pages 101-104; Basic Hand Sewing Skills, pages 106-108. The Portfolio should be placed in an 8 ½" x 11", 3 ring binder. Include an appropriate cover, dividers, and table of contents. NOTE - additional pages can be added each year but must be dated with the year. See pages 9-10 of project manual for portfolio formatting.
- Fabric Textile Scrapbook Must include at least 5 different textile samples. Use Textile Information Cards template on page 41 in project manual to identify fabric swatches. Completed textile cards should be placed in an 8 ½" x 11", 3 ring binder. Include an appropriate cover. See project manual, pages 42-74, for fabric options and fabric science experiments.
- What's the Difference What's the Price Point Exhibit may include a notebook, poster, small display sharing a project comparison and price point. See activity, pages 118-120. Exhibit should include PHOTOS; NO actual PILLOWS.

Sewn Non-Clothing Exhibits (SF 50151B)

- Pillowcase
- Simple Pillow no larger than 18" x 18"
- Bag/Purse no zippers or buttonholes
- Other non-clothing item using skills learned in project manual

Sewn Clothing Exhibits (SF 50151C)

- Simple top
- Simple pants, shorts, or skirt no zipper or buttonholes
- Simple Dress no zipper or buttonholes



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Other – other wearable item using skills learned in project manual (apron, vest, etc.)

Beginning Sewing Exhibits – Exhibits in Sewing 1 must be made from medium weight woven fabrics that will sew and press smoothly, flannel/fleece is acceptable. Solid color fabrics or those having an overall print are acceptable. We strongly advise youth do not select fabrics with plaid or stripe patterns as judges will expect stripes to match at seams, which is a more advanced-level skill. NO NAPPED or JERSEY KNIT fabric. Patterns should be simple WITHOUT DARTS, SET-IN SLEEVES, or COLLARS. Raglan and loose flowing sleeves are acceptable.

Sewing 2 STEAM Clothing 2: Simply Sewing – Required

Exhibit one of the following in either the Non-Sewn, Non-Clothing or Clothing exhibit divisions:

Non-Sewn Exhibits (SF 50152A)

- Clothing Portfolio Complete at least four different samples/activities from Chapters 2, 3 AND/OR 4 of the project manual. The Portfolio should be placed in an 8 ½" x 11", 3 ring binder. Include an appropriate cover, dividers, and table of contents. NOTE - this can be a continuation of a Portfolio created in Sewing 1. Additional pages can be added each year but must be dated with the year created. See project manual, pages 9-11 for portfolio formatting.
- Expanded Textile Science Scrapbook Must include at least 10 different textile samples. Use Textile Information Cards template on page 39 in project manual to identify fabric swatches. Completed textile cards should be placed in an 8 ½" x 11", 3 ring binder. Include an appropriate cover. See Project, pages 40-82, for fabric science experiments.
- Design Basics Understanding Design Principles Exhibit should include a learning experience that demonstrates the design principles and elements involved when selecting fabric for clothing and accessories. See project manual, pages 17-20, for design suggestions.
- Entrepreneurial Sewing Exhibit should highlight items you made for sale online. Create an exhibit that displays products you made and posted online. Refer to the project manual, pages 161-167, for information on how to analyze the cost of similar purchased items to determine pricing of your products. The exhibit may be a notebook, poster or small display.

Sewn Non-Clothing Exhibits (SF 50152B)

- Recycled Clothing Accessory Create a clothing accessory made from a used item. The item must be changed in some way in the redesign process. The finished accessory must reflect at least one skill learned in the project and exhibitor should be able to identify the skill used. A before picture and a description of the redesign process must accompany the exhibit. Clothing accessory may include: hat, bag, scarf, belt, etc.
- Non-clothing item OR Clothing Accessory Create a non-clothing item or clothing accessory using at least one skill learned in this project. Exhibitor should be able to identify the skill used.

Sewn Clothing Exhibits (SF 50152C)

- Recycled Clothing Create a garment from used textile based items. The original used item must be redesigned (not just embellished or decorated) in some way to create a new wearable piece of clothing. The finished garment must reflect at least one skill learned in this project and exhibitor should be able to identify the skill used. A before picture and a description of the redesign process must accompany the exhibit.
- Constructed Garment Any garment with facings or curves. Should use at least one skill learned in this project and exhibitor should be able to identify the skills used. Garment should be appropriate for the age and experience of the member.

Sewing 3 STEAM Clothing 3: A Stitch Further – Required

Exhibit one of the following in either the Non-Sewn, Non-Clothing or Clothing exhibit divisions:

Non-Sewn Exhibits (SF 50153A)

• Clothing Portfolio – Complete at least four different samples/activities from Chapters 2, 3 AND/OR 4 of the project manual. The Portfolio should be placed in an 8 ½" x 11", 3 ring binder. Include an appropriate cover, dividers, and table of contents. NOTE – this can be a continuation of a Portfolio created in Sewing 1 and/or Sewing 2. Additional pages can be added each year but must be dated with the year created. See project manual, pages 11-13, for portfolio formatting.

Project Check In: Thursday 8-11 a.m. Judging: Friday 10 a.m.



- Expanded Textile Science Scrapbook Must include at least 10 different textile samples. Use Textile Information Cards template on page 29 in project manual to identify fabric swatches. Completed textile cards should be placed in an 8 ½" x 11", 3 ring binder. Include an appropriate cover. See Project, pages 39-52, for fabric science experiments.
- Advanced Entrepreneurial Sewing Using knowledge gained in project manual, Chapter 5, display one sample product with a business plan that includes a business ID and logo. The Exhibit may be a notebook, poster or small display.

Sewn Non-Clothing Exhibit (SF 50153B)

- Recycled Clothing Accessory Create a clothing accessory made from a used item. The item must be changed in some way in the redesign process. The finished accessory must reflect at least one skill learned in the project and exhibitor should be able to identify the skill used. A before picture and a description of the redesign process must accompany the exhibit.
- Non-clothing item OR Clothing Accessory Create a non-clothing item or clothing accessory using at least one skill learned in this project. Exhibitor should be able to identify the skill used.

Sewn Clothing Exhibit (SF 50153C)

Recycled Clothing – Create a garment from used textile-based items. The original used item must be redesigned
 (not just embellished or decorated) in some way to create a new wearable piece of clothing. The finished
 garment must reflect at least one skill learned in this project and exhibitor should be able to identify the skill
 used. A before picture and a description of the redesign process must accompany the exhibit.
 Constructed garment – Any garment constructed by the member which is appropriate for the age and experience
 of the exhibitor. Should use at least one skill learned in this project and exhibitor should be able to identify the
 skills used. Possible examples are wool garment, dress or jacket with set in sleeves and zipper or buttons and
 buttonholes, suit, evening gown or sport outfit.

Shopping in Style Shopping in Style Digital – Required

Members are encouraged to spend more than one year involved in this project, so they have time to learn what clothing styles look best on them while they also gain skills in building a versatile wardrobe and staying within their budget. Each year enrolled in Shopping should build on previous year's learning experience. For all levels of this project, participants should bring a garment to display and model for the judge.

Exhibit one of the following options that align with the Shopping in Style level:

Shopping in Style: Beginning (Levels 1 & 2) (SF 50154)


Choose one of the following activities from Unit 1 or Unit 2 of the project book to exhibit:

- Exhibit should consist of a garment that reflects your personal style along with a poster or report that 1) explains how this garment reflects your style and how it influences what others think of you; **OR** 2) how your personal style either aligns or contradicts what is considered to be "in style" today **OR**
- Exhibit should include a garment you purchased along with a poster or report that explains or illustrates how this garment is either 1) a modern version of a fad or fashion from an earlier decade; **OR** 2) how this garment reflects a different ethnic or cultural influence. Exhibit should include garment you purchased along with a poster or report that provides 1) a body shape discussion and how body shape influences clothing selections; **OR** 2) a color discussion that provides an overview of how different colors complement different hair colors and skin tones and how that influenced garment selection. Poster or report may include pictures from magazines, the internet or actual photos of garments **OR**
- Exhibit should include garment you purchased along with a poster or report that 1) explains how this garment uses the principles of design lines to create an illusion to alter appearance; **OR** 2) explains how color and texture of fabrics can complement or enhance appearance. Poster or report may include pictures from magazines, the internet, or actual photos of garments.

Shopping in Style: Intermediate (Levels 3 & 4) (SF 50155)

Choose one of the following activities from Unit 3 or Unit 4 of the project book to exhibit:

Project Check In: Thursday 8-11 a.m.





- Exhibit should include two clothing items that were previously a part of your wardrobe that still fit but you don't wear anymore and pair them with something new to make them wearable again. Also include a report that explains why the garment was not being worn and what you did to transform it into a wearable garment again
- Exhibit should include at least five pieces of clothing that exhibitor can mix and match to create multiple outfits. Include a poster or report that includes a clothing inventory AND describes what you have learned by completing this activity. Please bring at least one complete outfit from the selected clothing to display and model for the judge **OR**
- Exhibit should include garment you purchased along with a poster or report that 1) includes a wardrobe inventory which indicates why you selected the garment you did, clothing budget, and cost of garment; OR 2) explains how advertising influences clothing purchases making a distinction between wants and needs; and how the purchase of this garment compliments and/or extends your wardrobe OR
- Exhibit should include garment you purchased along with a poster or report that 1) describes a cost comparison of this item completed by the exhibitor when purchasing the garment; should include variety of shopping options and/or price tracking at stores over a period of time; **OR** 2) provides a quality comparison rating the specific clothing item purchased based on care, construction, cost and unique features; should include construction quality details, design features that influenced selection, cost per wearing, and garment care.

Shopping in Style: Advanced (Levels 5 & 6) (SF 50156)

Choose one of the following activities from Unit 5 or Unit 6 of the project book to exhibit:

- Exhibit should include garment you purchased along with a poster or report that summarizes care requirements not only for this garment but also for garments made of other natural and synthetic fibers; exhibit should also include a care cost analysis for garments of different fibers OR
- Exhibit should include garment you purchased which you have repaired or altered along with a poster or report that provides a clothing inventory list which includes cost savings for repaired items as compared to purchasing replacement garments **OR**
- · Exhibit should include multiple garments you purchased along with a poster or report that provides plans and commentary for a fashion show that would capture the attention of an audience. Fashion show plans should identify target audience, include show venue, purpose of the show, and logistical plan for the fashion show. This should also include a financial plan. Exhibitor should be prepared to demonstrate modeling skills and bring at least one garment to display and wear.

4-H INTERIOR DESIGN

- 1. All rules (pages 9-14) apply.
- 2. Two State Fair Delegates may be selected from the following classes 50242, 50243, 50244, 50245
- 3. One Trophy may be presented to: Best of Show Interior Design

All interior design divisions (beginning, intermediate, and advanced) are required to provide visual documentation of their project process. This can include photos or videos showing the steps they took to create, refinish, or redesign their furniture items.

Design Decisions: Beginning (SF 50242)

For members with 2 or less years of experience in project area or related experiences.

Any exhibit must have been created or redesigned by the exhibitor as part of their current Interior Design 4-H project. Exhibitors should be knowledgeable about various aspects of the project. Exhibits could include items such as, but not limited to, comparison studies of different products or techniques; made accessories, wall-hangings, window coverings, or furniture items; refinished or redesigned furniture; or a plan to solve some type of interior design problem.

Design Decisions: Intermediate (SF 50243)

For members with 3 to 4 yeas of experience in project area or related experiences.

Fruit will be judged using the same general criteria used for vegetables. Fruit will be judged for the stage of maturity normal for that season and growing location. Emphasis will be placed on how well fruit approaches market quality. When selecting fruits for exhibition, keep in mind that the judge will evaluate them on the basis of cleanliness, uniformity, condition, quality, and trueness to variety. (Lists are provided by UI Extension Horticulturists; Items are listed according to the correct definition of fruit varieties at go.illinois.edu/fruittrees.

- Exhibit must include a single fruit plate. (Exhibitor will furnish the disposable plate.)
- Exhibitors must provide the name and variety of all vegetables/fruits used.

*Note For State Fair:

- a. Exhibit must include TWO single fruit plates.
- b. Only one variety on each plate.
- c. An exhibitor cannot show two plates of the same type fruit. (i.e.: Cannot exhibit Gala & Jonathan Apples, Mazzard & Gisela Cherries, etc.)

Vegetable/Fruit Basket Display (SF 50314)

Open to youth in Vegetable Gardening A, B, C, or D

- This class is allowed a 2' 6" x 2' 6" space for each display.
- Display must include 6 or more different kinds of vegetables or fruits. There may not be more than 2 different varieties of any vegetable/fruit. Herb Container Display (SF 50313)

Herbs should be grown in pots (8" maximum diameter). Categories: Mint, Oregano, Rosemary, Sage, Thyme, and all other herbs. Herbs should be labeled with common and Latin names. Herbs should be in your care for a minimum of three months for state fair exhibits. Remove dead leaves from plants and check that the soil is clear of debris such as dead leaves. When exhibiting herb plants, be sure to grow the plants in the container to be displayed to avoid transplant shock. Exhibits will be evaluated based on cleanliness, uniformity, condition, quality, and trueness to variety. Additional herb resources are located on the project resources section of the Illinois 4-H website.

- Display must include 4 or more different kinds of herbs. There may not be more than 2 different varieties of any herb. For example, peppermint and chocolate mint would be classified as two different herb varieties.
- In instances where containers display more than one variety of herb, special care should be taken that each distinct variety is accessible and clearly visible to the judges to ensure full points for cleanliness.

Exhibit should be educational in nature and should inform others of steps taken to engage group members in 1) identifying a local need, conducting a local needs assessment to find a need that is already visible in the community; 2) determine types of activities group members can/want to do; 3) List all of the activities, projects, or needs identified to review with group members; 4) create a plan and timeline for completing the service project (including-project goals; tasks involved; time commitment; permission needed from community stakeholders; a budget, a source for securing those funds; insurance needs; equipment and supplies; publicity; potential partners if additional help is needed; a risk management plan; and a process for evaluating the project; 5) prepare for group members to engage in the service project which may include instruction on completing specific tasks and/or educating members on how the project will benefit the community; 6) complete the project; 7) documentation of service experience with photos, videos; or written reports; 8) once project is completed, reflect on success and/or challenges encountered during execution of the service project; consider what you might do differently in future service projects.

Create a display which will educate the public regarding the impact of the service project for both the community and the group members. The display must be accompanied by at least 3 but no more than 10 4-H members at the time of the judge's critique. Babysitting Video Tutorial (SF 50141b)

Create a short (1-5 minute) tutorial video intended for internet publishing that teaches the general public about a topic you learned about in your project learning. Topics for the tutorial video might include, but are not limited to, preparing healthy snacks for kids, looking for hazards in the home, things to avoid when selecting toys for kids, age-appropriate games or activities to use when babysitting, how to change a diaper, basic child first aid, etc.

As part of the video, youth must cite the sources of the information they present (either vocally or on screen as text). Videos should not include video or photo content not recorded by the 4-H'er. Videos should not promote any products and should follow all copyright guidelines. Videos in this category will be judged on the quality and accuracy of the information shared, as well as clarity of presentation, and how engaging they are to a general audience (not on filmmaking techniques).

Youth should have a signed model release for anyone appearing in the video besides themselves, and those should be brought to judging. Forms are available at go.illinois.edu/modelrelease.

You must furnish any equipment you need to show your video to the judge (laptop, tablet, etc.). Internet service is not guaranteed, so please have a hard copy of the video downloaded to your device to play. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period. All Exhibitors should also bring a copy of their video to be judged on a USB flash drive and saved in .MP4 format as a backup. In order for something to be on display at your local fair or show, fill out the video information sheet and bring it with you to judging: go.illinois.edu/4HBabysittingVideo. Note: While exhibitors are encouraged to post their video on www.YouTube.com in advance of the fair, they are not required to do so. If they choose to upload to YouTube they may choose whether to make the video "public" (the video is searchable on the site), or "public, unlisted" (someone must have the link to view it). This will allow fairgoers to view the exhibits on display. Youth ages 13 to 17 should only be posting content to the internet with parental permission. Youth under 13 would need their parents to post the video for them.

Perishable foods may not be included in the display. 4-Hers may use food models (commercially purchased or homemade), pictures from magazines, etc. Non-perishable items such as sealed canned products may be used with no commercial names visible on products used.
- 8. Requirements for State Fair may be different than for county. Please check individual project requirements.
 - For Cooking 101, 201, 301 and 401: Due to space limitations at State Fair, the size of the activity document should be no larger than an 8 ½" x 11" binder or folder.

If icing is used on the tea ring or sweet rolls, the recipe for the icing must also come from the project manual. The yeast bread/roll dough may be prepared in a bread making machine; however prepared mixes are not permitted. No ingredient additions or substitutions should be made to the recipes, unless they are to accommodate food allergies, sensitivities, or special diets (i.e. nut allergy, gluten intolerance, vegetarian/vegan diet, etc.). If you make changes to the recipe due to the reasons listed above, bring a copy of the recipe with your changes and be prepared to discuss them with the judge.

In addition to your food exhibit, complete one of the six experiments: Experiment with Flour, p. 33-34; Experiment with Kneading, p. 35-36; Experiment with Yeast, p. 37-38 or 39; Experiment with Butter, p. 62-63; or Experiment with Cheese, p. 104-105. Copies of all experiments are available to download at *qo.illinois.edu/Cooking301Experiments*. Bring a document with a printed picture of your experiment and the answers to the experiment questions to remain on display with your project. Due to space limitations at State Fair, the size of the experiment document should be no larger than an 8 ½" x 11" binder or folder. *NOTE Foods General Rules 2-5. Exceptions to 4 & 5: Rolls could be in disposable tin and tea ring in disposable, covered deli tray OR on a covered cardboard inside a clear self-sealing plastic bag.

- 2.) What did you learn that can help you in other ways besides preparing food?

Due to space limitations at State Fair, the size of the activity document should be no larger than an 8 ½" x 11" binder or folder. *Note Foods General Rules 2-5.

- Focaccia Bread (50203A) Exhibit 1/4 of a 15" x 10" loaf of focaccia bread; AND/ OR
- *Pie Shell (50203B) Exhibit one baked pie shell-traditional or whole wheat (no graham cracker or oil shell);
 AND/OR
- Sponge Cake (50203C) Exhibit 1/4 of a Golden Sponge Cake (top side up) without frosting; AND/OR
- French Bread (50203D) Exhibit 1/2 loaf French Bread; AND/OR
- *Pie (County Only) Exhibit a two crust pie using fruit filling of your choice. Top two pies will be sold at the auction Friday night, and each must have received a Blue rating. Place in a cardboard pie box OR on a disposable covered deli tray.

*For Pies and Pie Shells display in disposable aluminum pie pans.

Youth interested in exhibiting a food item from the project book not listed above, making changes to the provided recipes, or exhibiting a display related to information in the project manual should investigate the Foods Innovation class.

Food Preservation

- All preserved products should be prepared and processed according to the current USDA/Extension information.
 USDA information on preserving food, including recipes, can be found at: www.homefoodpreservation.com or https://extension.illinois.edu/food-preservation/food-preservation.
 Recipes must be processed in a water-bath or pressure canner.
- 2. All food preservation exhibits must be labeled with 1) The name of the food; 2) The date preserved; 3) Appropriate method(s) of food preservation (for canned projects: boiling water bath or pressure canner; for drying projects: Specify equipment used (food dehydrator, oven, etc.)) Per the 4-H general show rules, entries must be produced (preserved) this 4-H year (between September 1, 2024 and August 31, 2025). Examples:
 - Strawberry jam, boiling water bath. July 13, 20XX.
 - Green beans, pressure canner. July 13, 20XX.
 - Beef jerky, food dehydrator and oven. July 13, 20XX.
- 3. All food preservation exhibits must be accompanied by the recipe(s) typed or written, with the source of the recipe(s) listed. Required Recipes and Sources for Food Preservation Exhibits all food preservation recipes be from an approved source. Those sources are:
 - PUT IT UP! Food Preservation for Youth website or manuals
 - National 4-H Home Food Preservation Project Manuals
 - U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA)
 - National Center for Home Food Preservation
 - Ball/Kerr Canning (recipes after 1985)
 - Mrs. Wages
 - DO NOT BRING RECIPES FROM: Magazine or newspaper clippings, Pinterest (unless it is from a source listed above), Grandma's or a recipe from a family member or friend without a source, Cookbooks (excluding the Ball, Kerr, Put It Up! And 4-H Home Food Preservation books).
- **4. Canning Equipment Requirements**: All canned products must be canned in clear, standard jars in good condition (no chips or cracks). Jars must be sealed using two-piece canning lids (flat lid and band). Must use a new, unused flat lid. Bands must not be rusty or severely worn.
- 5. Canned food will NOT be tasted at the State Fair.



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Food Preservation (SF 50208A, 50208B, 50208C, 50208D, 50208E, 50208F)

Prepare an exhibit using ONE of the following food preservation methods: canning; freezing; drying; pickles/relishes; jams jellies and preserves; **OR** a combination of these (see Preservation Combination option below), excluding Freezing. **No** freezer jam exhibits will be allowed for Freezing; Jams, Jellies, and Preserves; or for the Preservation Combination options. Be sure to review all of the Food Preservation rules that follow the class list so you can follow all exhibit requirements.

- <u>Fruits/Vegetables</u> (SF 50208A) The exhibit should include two different canned foods in appropriate jars for the products. Food may be fruit, vegetable, or tomato product (i.e., salsa, juice, etc.).
- <u>Freezing</u> (SF 50208B) Prepare a nutrition display that illustrates a freezing principle. There is NOT a food exhibit option for this preservation method.
- <u>Drying</u> (SF 50208C) Exhibit two (2) different dried foods packed in plastic food storage bags. Choose from fruit, vegetable, fruit leather or meat jerky.
- <u>Pickles and Relishes</u> (SF 50208D) Exhibit two pint jars of different recipes of pickles and/or relishes made from produce.
- Jams, Jellies, and Preserves (SF 50208E) Exhibit half-pint jars of two different jams, jellies, and/or preserves.
- <u>Preservation Combination</u> (SF 50208F) Exhibit two different preserved food products, from two different categories above, excluding Freezing, in appropriate jars/packaging (drying). For example, exhibit 1 jar of tomatoes (Fruits/Vegetables) and 1 half-pint of jelly (Jams, Jellies, and Preserves).

The Chicagoland Food Science Foundation will be providing a \$50 Amazon Gift Card to the overall Food Science winner in each county.

Global Gourmet (SF 50205) Global Gourmet – Required

Prepare a display, digital presentation, or poster exhibit that demonstrates the knowledge and understanding gained through the completion of the Global Gourmet project. Your exhibit should include at least two activities to highlight what you learned from completing this project. Be ready to answer questions about how you shared the information you learned with others. Examples include talks ad demonstrations and hosting or assisting with a workshop. Be sure to bring your completed project guide for others to see and for you to share as needed during the conference judging.

Kitchen Boss (SF 50206) Kitchen Boss – Required

Prepare a display, digital presentation, or poster exhibit that demonstrates the knowledge and understanding gained through the completion of the Kitchen Boss Gourmet project. Your exhibit should include at least two activities to highlight what you learned from completing this project. Be ready to answer questions about how you shared the information you learned with others. Examples include talks and demonstrations and hosting or assisting with a workshop. Be sure to bring your completed project guide for others to see and for you to share as needed during the conference judging.

Science Fun with Dairy Foods (SF 50207) Science Fun with Dairy Foods – Required

Prepare a display, digital presentation, or poster on one of the activities you completed from the manual. Share 1) the topic you investigated; 2) process used to conduct the experiment; 3) results and observations; 4) what you learned; and 5) how you have applied this information. You must furnish any equipment you need for the exhibit. Internet service is not provided. Be ready to answer questions about how you shared this information with others. Examples include talks and demonstrations and hosting or assisting with a workshop. Although it is not required, it is a good idea to bring your project guide for others to see and for you to share as needed during the conference judging.

Science Fun with Kitchen Chemistry (SF 50209) Science Fun with Kitchen Chemistry – Required
Prepare a display, digital presentation, or poster on one of the activities you completed from the manual. Share 1) the topic you investigated; 2) process used to conduct the experiment; 3) results and observations; 4) what you learned; and 5) how you have applied this information. You must furnish any equipment you need for the exhibit. Internet service is not provided. Be ready to answer questions about how you shared this information with others. Examples include talks and demonstrations and hosting or assisting with a workshop. Although it is not required, it is a good idea to bring your project guide for others to see and for you to share as needed during the conference judging.

Prepare a display, digital presentation, or poster on one of the food science experiments from the manual that you completed. Share 1) the food science question you investigated; 2) process used to conduct the experiment; 3) results and observations; 4) what you learned; and 5) how you have applied this information. You must furnish any equipment you need for the exhibit. Internet service is not provided. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation. Electronic equipment will only be used during your judging time and will not remain on display during the exhibit period.

Foods Innovation Class (SF 50211)

Open to youth enrolled in any Foods project

Demonstrate the skills and knowledge you have gained through the project. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original recipes, results of experiments not in the foods project books, variations on recipes or experimenting with unique cooking or baking methods. Your work can be displayed by a food product, demonstrations, digital presentations, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. Your exhibit should not fit in the other exhibit options for this project. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period. If you bring a food product, the food will NOT be tasted.

4-H HEALTH

- 1. All rules (pages 9-14) apply.
- 2. Three State Fair Delegates may be selected from the following classes: 50226, 50227, 50228, 50229, 50230
- 3. One trophy may be presented to: Best of Show Health

All display boards must include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H member's exhibit. This reference list should/might include website links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. This reference list should be attached to the back of a poster or display board or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the way references are listed. Display boards should be no larger than 36" x 48".

Everyday Food and Fitness (SF 50226)

Prepare a display, digital presentation, or poster exhibit that demonstrates the knowledge and understanding gained through the completion of the Everyday Food and Fitness project. Your exhibit should include at least two activities to highlight what you learned from completing this project. You may also include live demonstrations of physical activities. Do not bring food made using the recipes but consider adding pictures of the completed recipes to your exhibit. Be ready to answer questions about how you shared the information you learned with others. Examples include talks and demonstrations and hosting or assisting with a workshop. Although not required, it is a good idea to bring your project guide for others to see and for you to share as needed during conference judging.

Sports Nutrition: Ready, Set, Go (SF 50228) Sports Nutrition: Ready, Set, Go - Required
Prepare a display, digital presentation, or poster exhibit on one of the activity chapters in the manual that you completed. The activity chapters are listed by page number in the table of contents. Your exhibit should include, at minimum, information on one physical fitness component and one food/recipe component from the activity chapter. The exhibit should include the project manual with the pages of the activity completed. You may also include live demonstrations of physical activities Do not bring food made using the recipes but consider adding pictures of the completed recipes to your exhibit. You must furnish any equipment you need for the exhibit. Internet service is not provided. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation. Electronic equipment will only be used during your judging time and will not remain on display during the exhibit period.

Examples include talks and demonstrations and hosting or assisting with a workshop. Bring your project guide for others to see and for you to share as needed during conference judging.

Your Thoughts Matter — Navigating Mental Health (SF 50230) Your Thoughts Matter Guide — Required

Prepare an exhibit that demonstrates the knowledge and understanding gained through completion of the Your Thoughts

Matter Member Project Guide. Exhibit the following 1) a poster or display that highlights activities and knowledge gained as you completed any two of activities 1 — 9 included in the curriculum; AND 2) the item you created in Activity 10 - the flyer, website, video, or other promotional tool that points individuals to the resources you found. Bring your project guide for others to see and for you to share as needed during conference judging.

Health Innovation Class (SF 50227)

Demonstrate the skills and knowledge you have gained through the Health project. Your exhibit should not fit in the other exhibit options for this project. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

Model Rocketry (SF 50130)

Open to youth in Aerospace 1, Aerospace 2, Aerospace 3, and Aerospace 4

Exhibit one model rocket assembled or made by the member. The exhibit will be a static display. The model rocket should be in good flying condition. DO NOT include the rocket engine with your exhibit. The rockets will not be launched. Attach the printed directions for construction of the rocket if any were used.

Aerospace Display (SF 50131)

Open to youth in Aerospace 1, Aerospace 2, Aerospace 3, and Aerospace 4

Any exhibit related to aerospace that does not fit into class above. This may be an experimental or educational poster or display. Include an explanation of the display for public understanding. UAV projects should be entered in this class.

4-H COMPUTER SCIENCE

- 1. All rules (pages 9-14) apply.
- 2. Exhibitors will be asked to explain their entry to the judge. Use of an actual computer is acceptable but not required.
- 3. Neither the Fair Association nor the Extension Office will be held responsible for your computer's safety. No phone lines or internet connections will be available for use with your exhibit.
- 4. Any member found to be using computer software in a manner that infringes on copyright laws will be disqualified.
- 5. Three State Fair Delegates total may be chosen from the following classes: 50135, 50136, 50137, 50138, 50139.

Beginning Visual Programming (50135)

Open to youth in Computer Science Visual Based Programming

Exhibit a simple program using Scratch (or other simple visual programming language). The program should include 8 different commands including looping and getting input from the keyboard and mouse. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a poster or printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

Intermediate Visual Programming (SF 50136)

Open to youth in Computer Science Visual Based Programming

Exhibit a program using Scratch (or other simple graphic programming) that you have downloaded from the internet and modified. Compare the two programs and demonstrate the changes you made to the original program; **OR** create an animated storybook using Scratch (or other simple graphical programming language). All exhibits must include something visual, such as a poster or printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

Advanced Visual Programming (SF 50137)

Open to youth in Computer Science Visual Based Programming

Exhibit a video game you have created in Scratch (or other simple graphic programming). All exhibits must include something visual, such as a poster or printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

Website Design (SF 50138)



Project Check In: Thursday 8-11 a.m.

Judging: Saturday 9 a.m.

Open to youth in any Computer Science Project Area

Exhibit an original website that you have designed using a programming language such as HTML (cannot be made with website builder like Wix or Squarespace). Internet access will not be provided, so exhibitors must supply their own internet hotspot or the website must be hosted on the exhibitor's computer. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a poster or printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

Text-Based/Open Source Computer Science (SF 50139)

Open to youth enrolled in any Computer Science or Robotics project

Demonstrate the skills and knowledge you have gained through the Computer Science project using a text-based programing language (Python, Java, C, etc.). The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. Your exhibit should not fit in the other exhibit options for this project. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. Exhibits in this class may also demonstrate successful application of open source (publicly available) computing software and/or hardware, such as Raspberry Pi and Linux, to accomplish a task. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a poster or printed copy of a digital presentation or programing flowchart, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Exhibits in this area will be judged on the computer science programming. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period. Exhibits in this class must be able to fit on no more than a 3' x 2' space (or ground footprint).

4-H DRONES

- 1. All rules (pages 9-14) apply.
- 2. Two State Fair Delegates may be chosen from each of the following classes: 50375, 50376

Choose one of the following classes based on your interest and skill level. Each Exhibitor must complete the first 2 sections, and at least 3 Real World Missions in the Quads Away Curriculum and display a completed Mission Logbook.

UAV Display (SF 50375) Unmanned Aerial Vehicles/Systems: Drones – Required

Prepare a display related to the Drones/UAV project on the topic of your choosing. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period. Non-UAV/ Drone projects should not be entered in this class (see Aerospace Display).

<u>UAV Unmanned Aerial Systems</u> (SF 50376) Unmanned Aerial Vehicles/Systems: Drones – Required Exhibit one Unmanned Aerial Vehicle and associated system assembled or made by the member. UAV or Drone exhibits in this class must be either originally designed or built from a kit of reconfigurable parts and components. These displays are limited to multicopters (tri, quad, hex, and octocopters), as well as FPV airplanes and flying wings with wingspans up to 36". A detailed build log with pictures, as well as a Mission Logbook must be included. The UAV MUST have a Flight Controller and utilize a camera/video transmission system. The exhibit will be a static display. The Drone should be in good flying condition with batteries fully charged, and all UAS components (including Video System) ready to demonstrate. DO NOT display your UAV with the propellers on, but rather on the table to the side of your UAV. The Drone will not be flown. Attach the printed directions/instructions of the UAV if any were used.

4-H ELECTRICITY

- 1. All rules (pages 9-14) apply.
- 2. Three State Fair Delegates total may be chosen from the following classes: 50177, 50178, 50179, 50180
- 3. One trophy may be presented to: Best of Show Electricity



Project Check In: Thursday 8-11 a.m. Judging: Saturday 9 a.m.

It is strongly suggested members use recommended construction details including proper color coding, provided by the (EEC) Energy Education Council.

Electricity 1 (SF 50177)

(May only be battery-powered projects using battery components and wiring). Exhibit a momentary switch, simple switch, basic circuit, electromagnet, galvanometer OR an electric motor. All projects must include a report explaining how the project was constructed and the principles demonstrated. Recommendations can be found on the website. Projects using paper clips, cardboard, thumbtacks, and brads are not eligible for state fair exhibits in electricity. Members wishing to exhibit these types of projects should consider exhibiting in Junk Drawer Robotics 1 or 2.

Electricity 2 (SF 50178)

(May only be battery-powered projects using battery components and wiring). Exhibit a circuit board demonstrating parallel and series switches, including a circuit diagram; 3-way or 4-way switch circuit using DC/battery; OR a basic electrical device (examples: rocket launcher, burglar alarm, etc.). All projects must include a report explaining how the project was constructed and the principles demonstrated. Recommendations can be found on the website. Projects using paper clips, cardboard, thumbtacks, and brads are not eligible for state fair exhibits in electricity. Members wishing to exhibit these types of projects should consider exhibiting in Junk Drawer Robotics 1 or 2.

Electricity 3 (SF 50179)

Exhibit a 120V lighting fixture or other appliance that uses a switch; OR two electrical household circuits using 120V materials to comply with National Electrical Code, one with a simple on/off switch to control bulb, and one using 3-way switches to control light from two locations; OR other project which demonstrates principles in the Wired for Power book. All electricity projects must include a report, explaining how the project was constructed, and principles for its operation.

Electricity 4 (SF 50180)

Exhibit any electronic or solid-state appliance. Exhibitor must be able to explain how the project was constructed, how it is to be used and how it works. When project is being constructed, general safety and workmanship should be considered.

4-H ESPORTS

- 1. All rules (pages 9-14) apply.
- 2. All exhibitors must complete all activities in the Illinois 4-H eSports Curriculum.
- 3. Three State Fair Delegates may be chosen from the following class(es): 50378



eSports (SF 50378) Illinois 4-H eSports Curriculum – Required

Compete in at least 1 ranked tournament online or in person (either as a team or solo), and fully document your progress throughout. Any game with a documentable bracket system, and at least 3 rounds counts. Be sure to include a description of the tournament, your match information, your win-loss record, and description of the game and platform being used to play the game (Ram requirements/capabilities of your machine, video card specs., etc.). Prepare a PowerPoint presentation describing your journey through eSports (including your 1 mandatory tournament), what you have learned about gaming/eSports, and why you think more youth should be involved. Also include a detailed description of your most important win, explaining your strategy in that victory. Be sure to include screenshots and video, if possible. Load your presentation to a USB drive. Must include a visual presentation.

4-H MAKER

- 1. All rules (pages 9-14) apply.
- 2. Three State Fair Delegates may be chosen from the following class(es): 50400

Maker: Open to youth in all projects. (SF 50400) go.illinois.edu/DIYMakeBuild – Required Exhibits in this category are designed to be multi-disciplinary in nature, innovative, and must not fit into any other exhibit category. To qualify for this category, your project MUST abide by the following guidelines:

Exhibitors must complete at least two activities in the DIY Make & Build Curriculum and answer all the questions at
the end of each lesson. You must display your answers to these questions, as well as your Maker Log from the DIY
Make and Build curriculum.

- Exhibits must be an object or device that has an intended purpose and uses technology in either a mechanical way, digital (computer) way, or combination of the two. Your device or object **cannot** be one of the included activities in the DIY Make and Build Curriculum.
- The device must be something that can be used in everyday life by multiple people (a target audience), and MUST be manufactured/built by the exhibitor (If not fully manufactured by the exhibitor, the device MUST be modified structurally or be reprogramed to perform a different function other than what it was designed to do).
- Exhibits MUST be able to interact with the outside world. (e.g. an on off switch, input sensors, feedback, etc.)
- Exhibits MUST include a detailed build log with instructions on how to make or build the exhibit, AND contain either a 3D rendering or detailed and labeled sketches of the device/product.
- All parts and software used in the design/build MUST be listed in a detailed Bill of Materials including cost per item and total cost. Total time spent on the build must be documented in your build log.

In addition, exhibitors are HIGHLY encouraged to use tools such as 3-D printers, laser cutters, routers and/or other hand/power tools to help in the manufacturing process (NOTE: Simply 3-D printing or laser cutting an object without the other specifications does not qualify as a Maker Project). It is also HIGHLY encouraged that exhibits use Open Source software and/or hardware in the build.

4-H ROBOTICS

- 1. All rules (pages 9-14) apply.
- 2. Three State Fair Delegates total may be chosen from the following classes: 50285, 50286, 50287, 50288, 50289, 50292.

NOTE: If applicable for their class and display, exhibitors must bring their own computers for demonstration purposes; computers will not be provided. Internet access will not be available.

- Exhibits in classes 50285 or 50286 are designed to be used with LEGO Mindstorms (NXT, EV3, Lego Inventor, Lego Spike Prime).
- Any other programmable robot kit such as Arduino or Raspberry Pi, should be exhibited in Robotics Innovation/Open Source Class (50292).
- Members should bring their robot to the state fair.

Robotics

Robotics 1 (SF 50285) Robotics 1 with EV3 or go.illinois.edu/RoboticsActivities1 – Required
Exhibitors will design, build and program a robot that uses at least one sensor to autonomously follow a path, respond to and/or avoid obstacles. The robot must be autonomous and cannot be controlled remotely. Exhibitors in this class must use at least one sensor in their robot design. Exhibiting youth must complete and display a build log which contains a diagram (drawing or 3D rendering) of their robot with each of the key components labeled, an explanation of why they made the design/programming decisions they made, and a short journal sharing what they learned about the engineering design process and programming throughout their work in the project (as well as while preparing the exhibit). In addition, each youth must bring their program code (on laptop or on paper), and their robot to demonstrate. The robot and obstacles must be able to fit on a 4' x 8' robotics table when being judged, and a 2' x 2' area when being displayed.

Robotics 2 (SF 50286) **EV3 N More or qo.illinois.edu/RoboticsActivities2 — Required **Exhibitors will design, build and program a robot that uses sensors and programming to complete two of the selected challenges from the 2025 4-H State Robotics Challenge. The robot must be autonomous and cannot be controlled remotely. Eligible challenges will be marked in the Challenge Documents and on the Illinois 4-H Robotics website (https://4h.extension.illinois.edu/ways-participate/projects/robotics). Exhibiting youth must complete and display a build log which contains a diagram (drawing or 3D rendering) of their robot with each of the key components labeled, an explanation of why they made the design/programming decisions they made, and a short journal sharing what they learned about the engineering design process and programming throughout their work on the project (as well as while preparing

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the exhibit). In addition, each youth must bring their program code (on laptop or on paper), and their robot to demonstrate. The robot and obstacles must be able to fit on a 4' x 8' robotics table when being judged, and a 2' x 2' area when being displayed.

Robotics 3 (SF 50292) go.illinois.edu/4HRoboticsProjectPage

Open to youth enrolled in Robotics 3, but may also include youth in Robotics 1 or 2 if the exhibit meets the guidelines. Exhibit an original robot, either homemade or a kit that does not fall under Robotics 1 or 2 that can complete a task using MULTIPLE sensors. The robot must be autonomous, Text Based (Python, C etc.) and cannot be controlled remotely. If a robot kit is used, then some parts of the robot must be built using other components such as wood, plastic or metal. The robot can include any type of motors, pneumatics or sensors. This class can also be used for LEGO Mindstorms/Spike Prime, etc. or Vex kits where the exhibit does not fall under Robotics 1 or 2 exhibit options. Autonomous control of the robot may also be achieved using an "open source" platform such as Arduino or Raspberry Pi and can be programed using a coding language that is publicly available. Exhibitors in the class must complete and display a build log which contains a diagram (drawing or 3D rendering) of their robot with each of the key components labeled, an explanation of why they made the design/programming decisions they made, and a short journal sharing what they learned about the engineering design process and programming throughout their work in the project (as well as while preparing the exhibit). In addition, each youth must bring their program code (on laptop or on paper), and their robot to demonstrate. Exhibits in this class must be able to fit on no more than a 6' x 2' table (or ground footprint), and must be fully assembled 15 minutes prior to the judging start time. No Exceptions.

Junk Drawer Robotics

All exhibits should be original designs made with everyday objects and materials. Exhibits with purchased kits will not be accepted. Exhibitors are also required to bring their Junk Drawer Robotics Youth Robotics Notebook with the sections completed for the project they are exhibiting, including the sections leading up to the activity they are exhibiting. For example, if a youth is bringing Activity E from Junk Drawer Level 1, they should have robotics notebook sections A-E completed. For Innovation Class, all sections should be completed for your level.

Junk Drawer Robotics 3 (SF 50289) Junk Drawer Level 3: Mechatronics & Youth Notebook – Required Exhibit any item from the "To Make" activity from the Junk Drawer Robotics Level 3 Book. Be sure all robotics notebook sections within the module being exhibited are filled in.

Junk Drawer Innovation Class (SF 50290) Youth Notebook – Required (See Level Above)



Welding: Arcs & Sparks (SF 50353) Arcs and Sparks – Required

Exhibit one arc weldment/item demonstrating the skill level of the exhibitor. Members new to the project should consider selecting a weldment from the suggested Weldment List found on page 43 of Arcs and Sparks (4-H 573 - Shielded Metal Arc Welding).

This class is for industrial welding only. (Members that wish to use welding to create objects with an artistic appeal should consider enrolling in the 4-H Visual Arts project and consider entering those types of exhibits in the Visual Arts – Metal class.) Exhibits must be portable and cannot be exhibited on a trailer.

4-H WOODWORKING

Units 1, 2, and 3 in Woodworking have very specific restrictions on the tools used in building an item to display. This is done for reasons of safety and to provide a fair comparison among projects in a level. Articles made with tools other than those listed in a level will not be eligible for class awards in that level.

Woodworking 1 (SF 50357)

Exhibit an item made of wood. The project should be made of not more than 5 cut pieces. The pieces should be cut by the exhibitor with a hand saw. Edges should be smoothed with a rasp. The pieces should be joined in butt joints. Wood glue and nails should be used to make the joints. The exhibit should be sanded and painted with a latex-based paint. Potential projects include: a picture frame, a napkin/letter holder, a flower box, or a box (without a lid). Should not include more advanced joints.

Allowed tools in this level: hand tools only, including a hand miter box.

Woodworking 2 (SF 50358)

Exhibit an item made of wood. The project should be made of not more than 10 cut pieces. The wood chosen should be appropriate for end use of the item. The project must incorporate angled cuts, preferably some miter joints. The project should be sanded and finished with a finish appropriate for its end use. Nails and/or screws may be used. The exhibitor should write up a bill of materials for the project.

Allowed tools in this level: hand tools, power hand drill, miter box (non-powered), oscillating (pad) sander and jigsaw.

Woodworking 3 (SF 50359)

Exhibit an item made of hardwood or plywood with a hardwood veneer. The exhibitor should write up a bill of materials for the project. The project should be stained. A varnish, polyurethane, or other sealant should be applied as appropriate for the end use. The project must incorporate one or more of the following features:

- a) Hinge and/or Hasp
- b) Dowel Joint, Dado Joint, Rabbet Joint, Tongue & Groove Joint, or Spline Joint
- c) Laminating
- d) Interlocking, Jigsaw Cut Pieces

The finish should be appropriate for the end use. The project should include a bill of materials. The project must incorporate one or more of the following features:

- a) Routed Edge
- b) Dovetail Joint
- c) Mortise and Tenon Joint
- d) Veneer
- e) Overlays or Inlays

Allowed tools in this level: all those mentioned in levels 1- 3, plus circular saw, radial arm saw, planer, wood lathe, chop saw, and other power tools needed to complete advanced projects.

P0100 Model Rocketry

Exhibit one model rocket assembled by the exhibitor. The exhibit will be a static display. The model rocket should be in good flying condition. **DO NOT** include the rocket engine with your exhibit. The rockets will not be launched. Exhibitor *should* bring the printed directions for construction of the rocket.

P0102 Aerospace Display

Any exhibit related to aerospace that does not fit into above class. This may be an experimental or educational poster or display. Include an explanation of the display for public understanding. UAV projects should be entered in this class.

P0300 Electricity I

(Only direct current-battery-wiring and components may be used) Projects using paper clips, cardboard, thumbtacks, and brads are not to be exhibited. Exhibit a momentary switch, simple switch or basic circuit OR an electromagnet OR a galvanometer OR an electric motor. All projects must include a report explaining how the project was constructed and the principles demonstrated.

P0301 Electricity II

(Only direct current-battery-wiring and components may be used) Exhibit a circuit board, demonstrating parallel and series switches, including a circuit diagram OR 3-way OR 4-way switch circuit using DC/battery OR basic electrical device. All projects must include a written report, explaining how the project was constructed and the principles demonstrated.

JP0302 Electricity III

Exhibit a 120V lighting fixture or other appliance which used a switch; **OR** two electrical household circuits using 120V materials to comply with National Electrical Code, one with a simple on/off switch to control bulb, and one using 3-way switches to control light from two locations. All projects must include a written report, explaining how the project was constructed and principles for its operation.

SECTION P50—Small Engines

P0500 Display

Exhibit a display identifying different engine or lawn and garden equipment parts or a display showing the function of the various engine or lawn and garden equipment parts or a display identifying and explaining the function(s) of different specialty tools needed for small engine work.

P0501 Maintenance

Exhibit a display that illustrates either routine maintenance procedures or diagnosing and troubleshooting specific problems with an engine.

P0502 Small Engine Makeover

Exhibit a small engine or piece of equipment that you have overhauled. If exhibit has gas in it, it must be displayed outdoors for fire safety purposes.

P0600 Beginning Tractor Care

Exhibit a display or poster that illustrates one of the following: tractor safety, care and maintenance, or a tractor as a valuable farm machine or another topic associated with tractors.

P0601 Intermediate Tractor Care

Exhibit a display or poster that illustrates one of the following: cause and prevention of rollovers, diagram of how an air cleaner works, diagram & identify an engine cooling system, or regulations for battery & oil disposal or another topic associated with tractors.

P0602 Advanced Tractor Care—I

Exhibit a display or poster that illustrates one of the following: wagon and bin hazards, diagram and identify open and closed hydraulic systems, mower types and safety features, conveyor types and safety features, or another topic associated with tractors.

P0603 Advanced Tractor Care—II

Exhibit a display or poster that illustrates one of the following: method of winterizing a tractor, chemical uses and required safety equipment, parts and process of internal combustion engine, procedure for cleaning and flushing tractor radiator, or another activity.

P0700 Woodworking I

Exhibit an item made of wood. The project should be made of not more than 5 cut pieces. The pieces should be cut by the exhibitor with a hand saw. Edges should be smoothed with a rasp. The pieces should be joined in butt joints. Wood glue and nails should be used to make the joints. The exhibit should be sanded and painted with a latex-based paint. Potential projects include: a picture frame, a napkin/letter holder, a flower box, or a box (without a lid).

P0701 Woodworking II

Exhibit an item made of wood. The project should be made of not more than 10 cut pieces. The wood chosen should be appropriate for end use of the item. The project must incorporate angled cuts, preferably some miter joints. The project should be sanded and finished with a finish appropriate for its end use. Nails and/or screws may be used. The exhibitor should write up a bill of materials for the project.

P0702 Woodworking III

Exhibit an item made of hardwood or plywood with a hardwood veneer. The exhibitor should write up a bill of materials for the project. The project should be stained. A varnish, polyurethane, or other sealant should be applied as appropriate for the end use. The project must incorporate one or more of the following features:

- a) Hinge and/or Hasp
- b) Dowel Joint, Dado Joint, Rabbet Joint, Tongue & Groove Joint, or Spline Joint
- c) Laminating
- d) Interlocking, Jigsaw Cut Piece

P0703 Woodworking IV

Exhibit an item made of wood. A table saw should be used in the construction of the project. The exhibit should include the push stick that was used while operating the table saw. The finish should be appropriate for the end use. The project should include a bill of materials. The project must incorporate one or more of the following features:

- a) Routed Edge
- b) Dovetail Joint
- c) Mortise and Tenon Joint
- d) Veneer
- e) Overlays or Inlays

SECTION P80—Computer Science

P0801 Intermediate Computer Programming

Exhibit a program using Scratch (or other simple graphic programming) that you have downloaded from the internet and modified. Compare the two programs and demonstrate the changes you made to the original program; OR create an animated storybook using Scratch (or other simple graphical programming language). All exhibits must include something visual, such as a poster or printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

CLASSES

M0100 Paper

Any item made of paper. Examples: origami, greeting cards, paper cut designs, paper mache, handmade paper, paper collage, paper models of architecture, quilling, etc. Paper twist articles made from directions in craft books and stores are not original and do not belong here.

M0101 Fiber

Any item made of fiber. Examples: quilts, fabric collage, soft sculpture, stitchery, weaving, embroidery, cross stitch, wearable art, hooking, braiding, duct tape artistry, string art and baskets. Original cross stitch, knitted or crocheted items belong here. Non-original items or machine sewn items are not appropriate entries for this class.

M0102 Clay

Any item made of clay. May be fired or unfired, hand formed or thrown on a wheel. Self-hardening clays, fire/oven-cured and cornstarch clay are acceptable.

M0103 Wood

Any art item made of wood (carving, sculpture, collage, wood burning, etc.) Utilitarian wood items (e.g. outdoor or indoor furniture or shelves) should not be in visual arts. Projects should include an artistic element. Wood items partially or totally created through the use of laser cutting programs/devices should be entered in Computer-Generated Art.

M0104 Chalk/Carbon/Pigment

Any original artwork done with pencils, chalk, pens, ink, paint, charcoal, dyes, etc. on canvas, paper or glass. This would include sketching, drawing, cartooning, original non-computer-generated graphics, printing, etc.

M0107 Glass/ Plastic

Any item made of glass or plastic. Stepping stones and wall hangings should be placed here. INTERLOCKING CREATIONS ARE NOT ALLOWED (i.e. Connects or Legos).

M0108 Metal

Any item made of metal. Examples: sculpture, tin punch, engraved metal, jewelry. Items intended for industrial use are not considered part of visual arts. Metal items partially or totally created using laser cutting programs/ devices should be entered in Computer-Generated Art.

M0109 Nature

Any item made of natural material, such as wreaths, cornhusk dolls, etc. Items should be made of NATURAL material (which may be purchased) but securing elements such as glue and wire may be used in the interconstruction if they do not detract from the overall "natural" appearance. Items may be displayed under glass for protection. Candles and baskets should be entered in Heritage Arts.

M0111 Three-Dimensional Design/Mixed Media

Art pieces in this class must be comprised of at least three different media. No one medium can make up more than 40% of a piece. The piece should be free-standing or prepared to be hung and that is observable on at least three different sides. Originality and design are important concepts. Craft preformed or assembled projects are not acceptable.

M0112 Computer Generated Art

Any artwork that was created on the computer using pixels and any software package. Exhibit may not include scanned work, clip art, downloaded images, imported image, or photographs. Plastic exhibits with an artistic focus created using a 3-D printer should be entered in this class.

M0113 Heritage Arts

A traditional art learned from another person or from a pattern (no kits). Non-original cross-stitched, knitted and crocheted items fit in this class. ALL ORIGINAL cross-stitched, knitted and crocheted items should be exhibited in Fiber Arts; (machine knitted items ARE NOT acceptable for this class.) Examples: needlepoint, counted cross stitch, crewel, embroidery, cut work, hardanger embroidery (embroidery openwork), macrame, candles, pysanki (decorated eggs), leather, quilts, baskets (made using a traditional pattern), traditional handmade dolls with handmade costumes, soaps made using nature dyes also can be made using handmade molds or broken into chunks for display.

M0114 Scrapbooking

Exhibit one album or notebook (8 1/2" x 11" or 12" x 12") with front and back cover. Must have minimum of 4 pages, front and back, exhibited in page protectors. Use of embellishments is encouraged. Tell a story with photos, journaling or a combination of both.

M0119 Leather

Exhibit one of the following options using leather:

- Leather Stamping: Exhibit should utilize one or more stamping techniques —exhibit examples include items such
 as belt; coasters; bookmark; key chain; wrist bracelet.
- Leather Carving or Tooling: Exhibit should use simple swivel knife tooling techniques or may incorporate several swivel knife-tooling designs or patterns —exhibit examples include items such as belt; pictorial carving; key case.
- Leather Lacing: Exhibit to include stamping and/or carving techniques incorporated with lacing techniques exhibit examples include items such as wallets; purses; etc.
- Leather Stitching: Exhibit may include stamping; carving and/or lacing techniques and should be a leather item
 or article of apparel, which incorporates hand-sewing techniques and/or machine stitching techniques. Handsewing and/or machine stitching must be the work of the exhibitor.

M0120 Quilting - You Can Quilt

Exhibit one of the following quilting options. All exhibits should include a card which identifies the quilt as an original design created by the exhibitor or as a pattern created by someone else. Item may be quilted using any method – tie, hand, or machine quilted. All work must be completed by the 4-H member. Exhibit one of the following:

- A Mini Quilt for a doll; OR a Quilt sized for an infant (maximum size of 48"x48"); OR
- A Quilted Table Runner (width ranging from 15-18"; length ranging from 24-48")

M0121 Quilting - Quilting the Best Better

Exhibit one of the following quilting options. All exhibits should include a card which identifies if the quilt as an original design created by the exhibitor or as a pattern created by someone else. Item may be quilted using any method – tie, hand, or machine quilted. All work must be completed by the exhibitor. Exhibit one of the following:

- Lap Quilt (width ranging from 48-60"; length ranging from 60-72"); OR
- Large Quilted Wall Hanging (may be rectangular or square, sized larger than 48" x 48"). Hanging should include tabs or a pocket on the back in order for it to be hung; OR
- Quilt that fits any size bed (Twin, Double, Queen or King)

M0115 Food/Cake Decorating Beginning

Exhibit one of the following: 1. Exhibit four decorated cookies, using a minimum of four different techniques. Exhibit may use cookies OR cookie forms. 2. Exhibit four decorated cupcakes, using a minimum of four different techniques. Exhibit may use cupcakes OR cupcake forms. 3. Exhibit a single layer decorated cake, using a minimum of four different techniques. Exhibit may use cake OR cake form.

M0116 Food/Cake Decorating Intermediate

Exhibit one of the following: 1. Exhibit four decorated cookies, using a minimum of five Level 2 techniques. Exhibit may use cookies OR cookie forms. 2. Level 1: Exhibit a farm scene display 24 x 36 inches in size.

Exhibit shall involve fieldwork only (i.e. toy plows, planting, disc). Roads, lanes, trees, and fencerows may be used to set off (border) fields. Livestock and/or buildings are not permitted at this level.

Level 2: Exhibit a farm scene display 24 x 48 inches in size.

Exhibit can include livestock. Roads, lanes, trees, fencerows and backdrops may be used to border fields. Buildings are not permitted at this level.

Level 3: Exhibit a farm scene OR agricultural scene not to exceed 48 x 48 inches in size.

Exhibit is open to any type of farm (i.e. farmstead buildings, grain handling equipment, fieldwork or harvesting) OR agricultural scene. An agricultural scene shall be an agricultural setting of places, businesses, events, etc. except for farmsteads or farm tillage (i.e. livestock auctions, equipment dealerships, agricultural education events, field days, etc.).

- 15. Any pullers with alcoholic beverages will be disqualified, will forfeit entry fees and premiums, and be removed from the grounds. Any spectators with alcoholic beverages will be asked to leave the grounds.
- 16. Motorized vehicles (ATVs, UTVs, golf carts, etc.) must stay in the pit area. These vehicles are NOT allowed across the track into the general fairgrounds.

Street Stock Rules on next page

Street Stock Rules:

- 1. Gas Trucks 6800#, Diesel Truck 8000# with driver on.
- 2. Truck must be street legal and have current registration and insurance.
- 3. Seat belts are required and must be worn at all times. **NO RIDERS!**
- 4. Drivers must be at least 16-years old. Anyone under 18 must have written parental/guardian consent.
- 5. Truck must have stock block and heads.
- 6. Must have stock fuel system (single 4-barrel carburetor or stock fuel injection).
- 7. Diesel trucks limited to one 2.6 turbo, stock appearing or a factory twin turbo set-up.
- 8. Must have closed exhaust system, headers allowed.
- 9. NO alcohol fuels.
- 10. NO nitrous oxide, propane or methanol injection.
- 11. Must have stock type suspension, NO blocked axles. Traction bars and travel limiters are allowed.
- 12. Highest point of hitch CANNOT exceed 26". Reese style hitches only.
- 13. Must have DOT approved tires. NO cuts or duals. 33 x 12.5 max.
- 14. No front-end weight brackets or hanging front weights. All weights must be secured in bed of truck.
- 15. NO trailering trucks into the pits. ALL vehicles pulling must drive in under their own power.
