At Illinois Extension, we remain committed to strengthening our communities by providing practical, research-based education that meets local needs. This past semester, our educators and staff worked alongside farmers, families, youth, and community partners to deliver programs that support economic resilience, healthy communities, environmental stewardship, and lifelong learning across Bond, Clinton, Jefferson, Marion and Washington Counties.

Agriculture and specialty crop producers continue to face significant challenges, including weather conditions, rising production costs, and pest and disease pressure, and Extension remains a trusted source of timely agricultural and natural resources education. Extension provided timely education for commercial fruit and vegetable growers, beef producers, and landowners through workshops and training events, equipping them with science-based strategies to strengthen profitability, sustainability, and long-term success.

Extension educators also focused on strengthening families and communities through financial wellness and consumer education initiatives. Interactive programs such as Welcome to the Real World gave students valuable experience managing everyday financial decisions, while the launch of the new Gardening on a Budget interactive website expanded access to tools that help families learn more about the costs of growing healthy food while managing rising costs.

Our 4-H youth development programs created hands-on learning experiences that encouraged leadership, creativity, confidence, and career exploration. Young people across the unit participated in STEM programming, public speaking and theatre arts workshops, conservation education, aerospace activities, livestock skillathons, photography workshops, fishing education, and classroom outreach programs. Through these experiences, youth strengthened communication, problem-solving, teamwork, and critical thinking skills while building connections to their communities and discovering new interests and career pathways.

The success of these programs would not be possible without the support of our volunteers, community partners, stakeholders, and donors. Your continued investment in Illinois Extension and 4-H programming strengthens local communities and expands opportunities for the people we serve each day.

Helping Hunters and Partners Give Back

Fred's Meat and Processing, United Way of South Central Illinois, and Illinois Extension partnered again for the 2026 Deer Donation Program to unite community partners and hunters across the area to give back to local communities by donating their deer harvest for processing and distribution to qualifying local pantries. The amount of venison nearly quadrupled this year, allowing seven food pantries and community organizations across Bond, Clinton, Jefferson, Marion, and Washington counties to benefit from the donation program.

Welcome to the Real World

Preparing Students for Real-World Financial Decisions

Illinois Extension continued its partnership with the Kaskaskia Special Education District #801 to deliver the Welcome to the Real World simulation to eighth-grade students. Led by Extension Educator Jamie Mahlandt and staff, the program provided hands-on experiences in real-life financial decision-making.

During the simulation, students selected an entry-level career and moved through stations that reflected real adult expenses including housing, transportation, utilities, insurance, food, clothing, and unexpected costs. Guided by Extension staff, students learned essential life skills, including tracking expenses, opening bank accounts, using debit cards and writing checks.

Many participants expressed surprise at the true cost of living and the complexity of managing finances. The interactive format increased student engagement and helped build understanding and confidence, particularly when adapted with simplified content, increased visual supports, and extended decision-making time to meet diverse learning needs.

As a result, students gained practical financial skills and the confidence to apply them in real-world situations. Following another successful year, planning is underway to continue this program.

Gardening on a Budget

Empowering Participants to Produce Fresh Food While Managing Costs

Illinois Extension educators Jamie Mahlandt and Chris Lueking recognized gardening as a practical way to improve health, increase access to fresh food, and manage rising food costs. To support this need, they developed the Gardening on a Budget program, which has been enhanced with the launch of a new interactive website.

The website serves as a central hub for participants, offering tools to build personalized garden budgets, exploring the start-up costs of a home garden, and planning garden beds. Paired with webinar and in-person workshops, the platform helps users set SMART goals and make informed, cost-effective gardening decisions, expanding access to research-based resources for local communities.

Grocery Planning

Helping Families Make Every Food Dollar Count

In April, Illinois Extension Financial Wellbeing Educator Jamie Mahlandt and Youth Development Educator Kara Boozer partnered with the Centralia Community Benevolent Association and Park Avenue Food Pantries to deliver Grocery Planning Educational Kits to local families. These kits include a workbook that guides users in setting realistic food budgets, planning weekly meals, and using simple tracking tools to understand their spending habits better. Many are discovering ways to stretch resources further by choosing cost-effective meals, helping them save money, waste less, and make more confident food choices.

Theater Arts and Public Speaking

Helping Youth Find Their Voice Through 4-H

4-H hosted the 2026 Theatre Arts and Public Speaking workshops to help youth strengthen communication skills and express themselves creatively. Through interactive games, drama activities, and team challenges, participants practiced storytelling, acting, improvisation, and effective presentation techniques in a supportive environment. These workshops help youth step outside their comfort zone, overcome fear of public speaking, and gain confidence in their voice.

While the experience supports preparation for the Public Speaking Contest, its broader impact is the development of lifelong skills in communication, critical

thinking, and leadership. Participants can apply these new skills and gain increased confidence in presenting their 4-H projects, in school settings, and in everyday life, supporting their growth as effective communicators.



As a growing 4-H team within our local Extension unit, staff members participated in a 12-week professional development series designed to build a shared understanding of the 4-H program and its role in serving local youth.

Throughout the series, 4-H team members explored topics such as positive youth development, risk management, volunteer engagement, strategic communication, program planning, and creating meaningful learning experiences for youth. The training provided opportunities to learn from one another, deepen knowledge of 4-H, and strengthen collaboration across the team.

By developing a common foundation of understanding, our staff is better equipped to provide consistent, high-quality educational programming and support for youth, families, volunteers, and community partners. Investing in staff development strengthens the quality and reach of 4-H programming. This training laid the groundwork for continued growth and impact in local communities.

Growing STEM Opportunities Across Communities

Building STEM Skills Brick by Brick

Across the unit, Illinois Extension staff expanded access to engaging, hands-on STEM learning through after-school LEGO building and LEGO robotics programs. Youth participated in activities designed to strengthen creativity, critical thinking, problem-solving, communication, and teamwork. Participants tested designs, collaborated with peers, and explored solutions in a supportive, experiential learning environment. Teachers report strong enthusiasm among participants, noting that opportunities for “free build” allow youth to explore their own ideas, express creativity, and work collaboratively. Illinois Extension staff plan to expand the number of LEGO clubs to increase access to this creative, hands-on STEM programming in local communities.

Bond County Livestock Photography

Through the Lens of 4-H

Youth who participated in the spring Livestock Photography Workshop gained practical skills to better showcase their livestock projects and tell their 4-H stories through photography. Led by a Bond County 4-H alum and local fair photographer, participants learned safe animal handling, lighting and composition techniques, and how to capture quality photos using smartphones.



The workshop also gave youth the opportunity to practice creative thinking and build confidence in sharing their experiences with others. Through hands-on learning, participants developed valuable communication, technology, and storytelling skills that extend far beyond the show ring.



Little Roots Programming

Growing More Than a Garden in Bond County

A new partnership between Bond County 4-H, the Bond County Food Pantry, and local Master Gardeners is growing more than vegetables this summer. It is helping youth learn more about gardening while teaching them the importance of giving back.

This program has just begun but will continue into the summer months as youth continue to care for two raised garden beds built by Master Gardener Karen Weidman. All produce grown by the Little Roots members will be donated to the Bond County Food Pantry, providing fresh, locally grown vegetables to community members in need.

New Partnership Provides More Youth Programming

A new partnership between Bond County 4-H and the Bond County Humane Society is helping youth to build knowledge, confidence, and compassion through the Cat 101 program. Participants will explore what it takes to prepare a cat for a 4-H show, including grooming, bathing, nutrition, health care, and understanding how cats are judged. Beyond learning technical skills, youth help socialize and care for cats waiting for their forever homes, learning how positive interaction and proper care can improve an animal's well-being and adoption success. Through these experiences, members develop a sense of responsibility, empathy, and a stronger connection to their community.

Youth in 4-H are 40% more likely to pursue a college degree and 2 times more likely to obtain vocational training. To help our local youth in Clinton County, we hosted the Farm to Future Workshop Series this year. The workshop was designed to allow youth to explore local agriculture and possible career paths in the field. During the series, youth visited three different Clinton County Agriculture Businesses to sample what a day in the “field” is like. Launching Interest in STEM

Washington County 4-H Youth Explore Aerospace and STEM

Washington County 4-H members had a chance to soar at the Aerospace Workshop. The workshop focused on rocket design, construction, and a successful launch. Youth were instructed in the science of flight, space, and physics. The aerospace project sparks the youth's interest in STEM. As career paths are constantly changing and new challenges arise, youth are learning hands-on skills to reach for the stars and consider careers in space, technology, and engineering. 4-H is working to continue to offer unique STEM experiences for local youth. 38% of 4-H members enrolled in STEM projects say the 4-H program influenced their interest in STEM.

Skillathon: Where Knowledge Meets the Show Ring

Learning Livestock Inside and Out

Local 4-H members had the opportunity to put their animal science knowledge to the test at the Livestock Skillathon. This event teaches skills to help 4-H members who are raising livestock projects. The skillathon emphasizes how animal science projects are related to animal husbandry and the food industry as they learn to care for their animals, which will be shown at the fair and sold for consumption.

Bringing Expertise to the Field: Pasture Management Workshop

Better Pastures, Stronger Operations

Many beef producers face pasture challenges tied to forage availability and changing weather conditions. In response, Illinois Extension launched a spring Pasture Management Workshop, bringing university expertise directly to local beef farmers.

The Marion County Illinois Extension Office invited state specialists in beef cattle and commercial agriculture to share research-based strategies to help improve pasture health and increase forage productivity, including the use of cover crops. The workshop combined practical instruction with a question-and-answer session, allowing producers to address operation-specific concerns and to leave with relevant information and solutions to strengthen their operations.

Illinois Extension is committed to providing support to local farmers that strengthens local beef operations and promotes long-term agricultural profitability and sustainability.

Supporting Pond Management

Illinois Extension Responds to Rising Demand

Illinois Extension continues to be a trusted local resource for pond management questions. Extension offices have seen a threefold increase in phone calls and walk-in requests from community members seeking information on pond management.

To address this need, Illinois Extension hosted two in-person Farm Pond Management workshops in Jefferson and Clinton counties. Illinois Extension Educator Chris Lueking delivered practical, research-based education on setting pond management goals, managing excessive aquatic plant and

algae growth, addressing wildlife issues, improving safety, and planning for drought conditions. These workshops equipped landowners with the information they needed to take actionable steps to manage their ponds and avoid making costly mistakes with improper treatment.

Strengthening Soil Knowledge Across the Community

Local Partnership Expands Testing and Expert Insight

A new partnership between Clinton County Farm Bureau and Illinois Extension is helping residents better understand and improve their soil through enhanced soil-testing interpretation services, helping save time and money by recommending only necessary amendments.

The Clinton County Farm Bureau provides soil testing kits and laboratory analysis to measure key soil nutrients and soil health indicators. Through this collaboration, Illinois Extension Educator Chris Lueking provides in-depth interpretation and management guidance to help residents make informed decisions that improve productivity and sustainability.

To date, Farm Bureau members have submitted seven soil samples from pastures, flower gardens, and row crop fields.



Fruit and Vegetable School

Connecting Growers with the Latest Research, Tools, and Industry Expertise

Commercial fruit and vegetable growers face ongoing uncertainty from pests, disease pressure, drought, excess rainfall and other production challenges. Illinois Extension supports small farms and local food producers by delivering practical, research-based solutions from Illinois Extension state specialists and industry experts.

At the Southern Illinois Fruit and Vegetable School, growers received the most up-to-date research on insect and disease management, weather-related challenges, and emerging production trends. On-site vendors were available to share information on new technologies, tools, and products tailored to local production needs.

Illinois Extension remains committed to delivering the most current, scientific, and research-based information to help local growers navigate challenges, adopt innovative practices, and make informed decisions that strengthen their operations, increase production, and improve profitability.

Certified Livestock Management Training

Helping Producers Meet Requirements and Improve Operational Practices

Illinois Extension continues its support of local livestock operations by delivering Certified Livestock Manager Training at the Clinton County Extension office during the 2026 training series. Participants learned about livestock waste management, nutrient utilization in manure, and regulatory compliance, helping operations minimize environmental risks and meet requirements of the Illinois Livestock Management Facilities Act.

Pesticide Training

Partnering to Provide Effective Pesticide Training

Pesticides play a critical role in Illinois agriculture, supporting crop health and increasing productivity. The Illinois Department of Agriculture and Illinois Extension partnered to provide the required pesticide training in Mt. Vernon. Illinois Extension Educator Chris Lueking delivered hands-on pesticide training at multiple events in Mt. Vernon for professionals from the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (DNR), Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT), agribusinesses, and private applicators.

Chris Lueking instructed participants on Integrated Pest Management (IPM) principles to help applicators focus on pest prevention and using pesticides only when needed, and the proper use of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) to improve worker safety. This training concluded with the Illinois Department of Agriculture administering a test to participants. Illinois Extension continues to partner with other organizations to ensure local communities have a well-trained agricultural workforce.

Extension Everywhere

Illinois Extension provides relevant and research-based programming to address personal and community challenges, but understands that time and distance may be a barrier to attending in-person workshops and programming.
