


provide the research and practical education you can trust to develop skills, solve problems and build better communities.

A total of 36 youth participated in the Boone, Ogle, DeKalb **Youth (BODY) Leadership Conference**, a program developed by teens for teens. 4-H committee members learned how to plan and lead a conference for their peers. Youth participants gained an appreciation for others, improved communication skills, and learned about career readiness and social media footprints.

COMMUNITY SERVICE: Hometown Christmas is a community-service activity where 4-H members, adult volunteers, local businesses and organizations provided 102 decorated trees and gifts to area families in need. At the Mano a Mano Cinco de Mayo celebration, 4-H members provided fun family activities. Money raised during the event was donated to non-profit organizations including a scholarship fund at Kishwaukee college. These are just a few examples of how 4-H Clubs serve their communities, learn the value of volunteering, and become strong future community leaders!

### **County Officials**

The **Leadership Academy** was developed by University of Illinois Extension in partnership with **United Counties Council of Illinois** (UCCI) to provide leadership training on issues important to elected and appointed county officials. For anyone seeking to manage and lead more effectively, the Academy offers a learning network and a connection to cutting edge information.

The **curriculum** is designed for county officials who want to explore new ideas and learn practical responses to current issues, challenges and opportunities. The five instructional sessions allow participants to *learn*, *share*, and *apply* on a variety of practical and pertinent topics. The final event is the graduation ceremony and dinner held in Springfield.

#### **Local Government E-Institutes**

### **Developing Tomorrow's Leaders**

From planning and leading state-wide 4-H activities to walking the halls of the Illinois State Capitol talking to legislators, the **Illinois State 4-H Youth Leadership Team** provides an invaluable "youth voice" to our 4-H program.

The Leadership Team involves 15-22 members and recent 4-H alumni (ages 16-21) who are involved in planning and implementing the Illinois 4-H Jr. Leadership Conference; assisting behind the scenes with events such as Illini Summer Academies and Illinois State Fair; serving as the training team for the *Speaking for Illinois 4-H*; and serving on various statewide committees and boards such as the Illinois 4-H Foundation Board of Directors and the Illinois Farm Bureau Youth Education Committee. Serving from Dekalb County in 4-H Program Year 2017-18 was Justene Jennings.

# **Developing a Creative Economy**



In cooperation with the Commission for the City of Oregon, University of Illinois Community and Economic Development Educator Schallhorn presented the program, **Developing** the Creative Economy, to 22 participants from Oregon and Mt. Morris in May of 2018. A panel of three creative entrepreneurs closed the program, sharing their experiences with the group. The Commission provided a tour for Pam and shared the work they have done developing a Creative Economy since their first introduction to the program in 2016. New businesses downtown include the Village Bakery, Cork & Tap and Hazel's Chocolates. They also have created a book on the Art of Oregon and had 10 statues erected downtown.

The program offers way to startup and fund creative enterprises, which have been shown to attract young adults back to a community.

# **Agricultural Production**

In addition to engaging young people through 4-H in agricultural science topics such as livestock production, veterinary science, and food production, Extension supports our communities by partnering to offer annual Agricultural conferences and seminars.

At the **Illinois Farm Economic Summit** in DeKalb the University of Illinois Farm Docs team addressed the profitability of Illinois agriculture and how to manage current financial stressors related to production.

The annual **Northern Illinois Farm Show** featured presentations by University of Illinois Extension Educators and offered pesticide testing opportunities.

And the **Certified Livestock Manager Training** provided the manure management training livestock producers needed to meet the requirements of the state's Livestock Management Facilities Act.

4-H makes learning fun! With a wide variety of projects available, 4-H members can focus on the areas that most interest them. Local fairs and shows allow 4-H members to show their project mastery while they engage with others.



#### **ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES**

**Recycling:** First piloted in 2001 with the support of DeKalb County Solid Waste, the K-5th recycling program continues to be a popular resource for teachers, serving **4,867 students** during the 2018-19 school year. Due to a loss in tax revenue, DeKalb County Solid Waste is no longer able to sponsor this program, so a new funder is needed.

**Field Studies:** Public, private and homeschool classrooms come to the Natural Resource Education Center located at Russell Woods Forest Preserve to participate in field studies led by Extension field staff. Last year over **1,400 students** were able to see, hear and touch their science lessons!

#### **AG IN THE CLASSROOM (AITC)**

The goal of AITC is to help students, teachers, and the general public gain a greater awareness of the role of agriculture in the economy and society. During the past year, **22 schools** were visited, **979 school programs presented**, and **19,526 contacts** made.

Other Ag in the Classroom highlights include: There's a Farmer at the Football Game, Summer Ag Institutes, College Ag Day, Adopt-A-Calf, Ag Awareness, Conservation Days, and Library and Park District programming. AITC is offered in partnership with Ogle County Farm Bureau, Ogle County Soil & Water, and Carroll County partnerships.

#### CHICK EMBRYOLOGY

**Seventy-five classrooms** and over **2,250 students** experienced hands-on life science as they watched the growth and development of baby chicks hatching in their classrooms. Teachers participating in the annual teacher training program are provided all the information and resources they need to successfully hatch chicks in their classroom. Teacher surveys demonstrated improvement in student life skills related to: Critical Thinking, Accepting Differences, Teamwork, Sharing, Concern for Others, Self-Responsibility, Cooperation and Record Keeping.

### **CAREER DEVELOPMENT**

**4-H Health Jam** brings health careers alive for youth in a 9-week program that introduces youth to a variety of health profession careers and teaches them how their bodies function and stay healthy. Teams of health professionals come together to share their professions, showcase hospitals, and engage participants in hands-on activities. Participants also "Walk Across Illinois," encouraging them to make physical activity part of their daily lives. **Science Siesta** is an overnight program held at the Discovery Center twice in the spring, open to 100 youth per event. It offers boys and girls in 4th-6th grades an opportunity to explore science and meet real scientists. Special science activities that have been offered include Rainforest Ecology, Space Geology, and Technology.





#### **DIABETES SUPPORT**

Successful diabetes self-management requires on-going education and support. **Support groups** provide an avenue for individuals to meet and learn from others who are dealing with the same challenges. As a registered dietitian and certified diabetes educator, Marilyn Csernus provides education on topics from the American Association of Diabetes Educators Self-Care Behaviors. At each meeting, a diabetes friendly recipe is served and participants receive a copy of the recipe to try at home. Rochelle Community Hospital partners with Extension to provide **Prediabetes & Diabetes Prevention** classes. These classes provide individuals at risk for type 2 diabetes with the skills and knowledge to help delay or prevent the disease.

#### STUDENT NUTRITION

Organ Wise Guys, a curriculum with characters representing human organs, is a popular way elementary students learn to stay healthy and strong. Illinois Jr. Chef is a week long summer cooking class for kids ages 8-13 where students learn the fundamentals of cooking and prepare two healthy dishes each day. And CATCH/Spark and Color Me Heathy programs promote healthy eating and encourage physical activity in after-school and pre-school settings. All programs are offered free-of-charge to income qualified schools and made possible through a USDA grant delivered by University of Illinois Extension SNAP-Ed staff educating 2,591 local youth.





#### **FOOD SAFETY**


Illinois ranks among the worst states for foodborne illness outbreaks. The eight-hour Certified Food Protection Manager Course (CFPMC) certification and exam serves as a means of assuring that qualified food safety professionals are working in our local communities keeping our food safe. The certification is also a benefit for workforce development as it is required for many food service jobs. Extension provided 100 local workers the opportunity to receive their CFPMC certification during 2018, and documented a 96% certification pass rate.

#### POVERTY SIMULATION

The **Poverty Simulation Program** addresses the challenges of living with limited resources and an abundance of stress. This role-playing activity is a powerful tool to convey real world obstacles to securing food, shelter, transportation, employment and other resources while maintaining a stable family life.

#### **DAY CAMPS**

University of Illinois Extension's **Natural Resource Education Center (NREC)**, in partnership with DeKalb County Forest Preserve District, offers nature-based camps for ages 7 to 11 at the Russell Woods Forest Preserve. Camps include: Naturalist Adventure, Incredible Insect, Birds of Prey, Endangered Species, and Rockin' in the River.

Thanks for a great Rockin' in the River camp! We had a family canoe ride on the Kish yesterday, and my son had lots to say! He explained what macroinvertebrates are, found a couple crayfish and a crayfish exoskeleton, pointed out lots of mussels, and told us about algae blooms and runoff and about invasive v. non-invasive mussel species. He had a great time at camp and learned so much! Thank you!!

#### **RESIDENT CAMP**

At 4-H Camp, youth have new experiences while in a safe environment where they can develop skills like crate stacking or archery. With the great outdoors as a background, staff and 4-H Camp counselors have designed activities to teach life lessons, use creative problem solving and teamwork to achieve common goals. The cabin atmosphere shows campers how to live cooperatively by sharing chores and respecting each other's differences. **4-H Camp is open to all youth**, **ages 8-14**. Campers do not have to be a 4-H member to attend, but they should be interested in and excited about having a week of outdoor fun, away from television and technology, where they can make new friends and try new things.





#### **WILDLIFE & NATURAL SPACES**

University of Illinois Extension responded to community concerns about coyotes by locally developing a **Coyote** program designed to increase public awareness and encourage informed decision-making on how best to share our neighborhoods with these long-time residents.

**Wee Naturalist** is a nature program for children ages 5-6 and their parent or guardian. Each month features a different theme that includes a lesson, a related story, a craft and a hike. And **Your Natural Space** is a series of monthly discussions with adults about outdoor spaces.

#### FAMILY FRIENDLY OUTDOOR EVENTS

University of Illinois Extension and partners collaborate each year to offer families the opportunity to get outside, have fun, and explore the beautiful outdoors. County-based **Farm Strolls** provide an opportunity for families to take self-guided tours of diversified local farms, introducing participants to local foods and the farmers who produce them.

During **Winter Fest**, Extension staff and volunteers offer a variety of educational and recreational activities for the whole family. "The horse drawn wagon rides through the Forest Preserve are our big attraction. This is a festival about the season of winter so it doesn't matter if we have snow," said Extension Educator Peggy Doty.
