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ILLINOIS 4-H OUTLINES SAFETY REQUIREMENTS FOR IN-PERSON EVENTS

We're looking forward to seeing you in 2021! As Illinois 4-H staff plan for the 2021 show and event season, our top priority will continue to be the safety of all involved, combined with a commitment to creating positive youth development experiences for our 4-H members.

The opportunity for face-to-face judging for Monroe County will require that all participants, spectators, and volunteers adhere to Illinois 4-H event guidelines. We are counting on our 4-H members, their families, and our staff and volunteers to do their part to help make our upcoming events as safe as possible. By working together, we hope to return to face-to-face judging, but it only works if we are all equally committed to following essential COVID-19 mitigation strategies.

The following COVID-19 social distancing and safety practices reflect requirements of the Illinois Department of Public Health and University of Illinois event guidelines. These mitigation protocols also may be modified to reflect any requirements of the local public health department based on local conditions at the time of the event.

- 1. Face coverings are required for all youth, spectators, volunteers, and staff.
- 2. Everyone in attendance will practice social distancing during the event, including maintaining six feet of separation (both indoors and outdoors) from those who are not in their households. To allow for social distancing, building and spectator capacity may be limited based on current public health department guidelines.
- 3. Handwashing and sanitizing stations will be provided throughout the venue.
- 4. Anyone who has experienced COVID-19 symptoms within the previous seven days is asked to stay home. COVID-19 symptoms include fever, cough, loss of taste or smell, or shortness of breath.

If any of these guidelines presents a challenge for you, please contact us directly at 618-939-3434. We are happy to discuss what accommodations are possible so that we can look for ways that all youth can safely participate in this event.

As excited as we are about the chance to step back into face-to-face judging, we also recognize that this is a continually evolving situation. Illinois 4-H reserves the right to adjust or cancel events in the case of identified risk, such as changes in local COVID conditions or known instances of non-compliance with safety guidelines.

- 4-H Shows are open to all enrolled 4-H club members for the current 4-H year who:
 - Are age 8 but not yet age 19 by September 1st of the previous year.
 - Have enrolled by January 1st of the current year.
 - \circ Have attended at least four (4) club meetings during the project year prior to a show.
 - Presented a talk and/or demonstration at a club meeting during the project year.
- All exhibitors must be currently enrolled in the project for which they are exhibiting.
- 4-H members are responsible for exhibiting <u>ALL</u> of their projects and are expected to be present while their project is evaluated. If a 4-H member must be absent for a 4-H show, they should consult the 4-H club leader or County Extension office.
- **INNOVATION CLASSES** are open to all 4-H members in the project areas listed. Members choosing to exhibit in the Innovation class may be enrolled in any level of the Project they are studying. Members choosing to exhibit in the Innovation class decide the best way to show off their project mastery and knowledge for the year in that project category. Some suggestions are provided for each category, but members may choose any method they want for demonstrating project learning as long as it does not fit in any other class in that category. Only selected projects categories have an Innovation option.
- **READY4LIFE CLASSES** (Career & Entrepreneurship Exploration) are open to any 4-H member who was at least 11 by September 1, of the previous year. Members choosing to exhibit in the Ready 4 Life class may be enrolled in any level of the Project they are studying. Exhibits should show the connection between the project area and related career or business opportunities. Members may choose any method they want for demonstrating project learning. Counties are eligible to send one Ready 4 Life exhibit for each project category in addition to the total allowed for that division.
- 4-H members are required to be present during a County 4-H Project Show to be eligible for <u>State Fair</u> consideration. If you need a reasonable accommodation to participate in this program, please contact the Extension office at 939-3434. Early requests are strongly encouraged to allow sufficient time for meeting your access needs.
- Youth must bring project(s) at designated judging times to ensure proper judge is present.
- Exhibits illustrating inappropriate subject matter and/or graphics are not acceptable. Extension Staff reserves the right to remove exhibits deemed inappropriate or dangerous for youth audiences. The

content of any 4-H competitive presentation does not necessarily reflect the beliefs of the University of Illinois Extension program or the Illinois State Fair.

- Some exhibit areas may have size limitations. Read the descriptions carefully. Please choose a display size which is most appropriate for the exhibit you are bringing. Larger does not always mean better; use good judgement in creating your exhibit. If an exhibit is selected for State Fair, please note that you may need to carry your project from a distant parking lot to the exhibit area.
- NO EQUIPMENT WILL BE PROVIDED FOR ANY EXHIBITS. This includes Computers, DVD/CD players, etc. Exhibitors <u>MUST</u> furnish any equipment they feel is necessary to properly critique their exhibit. Video/Filmmaking exhibitors must follow the guidelines provided to show their project (i.e. YouTube, DVD, USB, laptop, etc.)
- All <u>exhibits must remain in place</u> until the time specified.
- 4-H members enrolled in livestock projects are eligible to exhibit <u>TWO</u> entries per class and will be paid for each class.
- 4-H members are not allowed to wear business promotional clothing when showing projects. Members are encouraged to dress in neat and clean attire.
- All exhibits must be products of the current 4-H year, excluding livestock.
- The Danish system of awards will be used for all 4-H exhibits awarding **Blue**, **Red and White** ribbons, according to merit.
- Members must also be <u>eight years old as of September 1 of the previous year</u> to be eligible to advance to State Fair in a general project.
- 4-H members MUST follow the project requirements as stated in this 4-H Showbook for general projects to be eligible for State Fair.

ILLINOIS STATE FAIR GUIDELINES (Horticulture & Crops)

DISCLAIMER

"The Department of Agriculture shall use its best efforts to secure sufficient appropriations to fund premiums. In any year for which the General Assembly of the State of Illinois fails to make an appropriation sufficient to pay such premiums, premium amounts may not be accurately reflected in the Premium Book."

- Exhibitors <u>must be present at the County 4-H Show and be pre-selected for State Fair representation</u> by their county 4-H Extension program as a State Fair Exhibitor (except for livestock).
- Exhibitors must be currently enrolled as a 4-H member and have been at least 8 years old as of September 1, 2020. Parents and leaders should make provisions for the adequate care and supervision of exhibitors.
- Exhibitors must follow the project requirements exactly as listed in this Showbook, unless other directions are provided.
- State Fair Designated Conference Judging Exhibit Day for Monroe County is <u>SATURDAY</u>, <u>AUGUST 15</u>, <u>2021</u>. Due to the nature of the conference judging process, exhibitors must be present with the exhibit that they have made for judging on their assigned county exhibition day. Scheduling adjustments for religious reasons may be requested by contacting the Illinois State 4-H Office@ illinois4H@illinois.edu by August 1, 2021.
- Members may enter <u>ONLY ONE</u> exhibit class at the Illinois State Fair. This also applies to exhibitors who are enrolled in projects in two different counties. If they are identified as a state fair delegate in two counties, they will have to choose one individual and/or group project to exhibit.
- All exhibitors from a county will exhibit the same day. A 4-H member may also show in the junior livestock show, but they must be present at the required time for their general project judging. If possible, attempts will be made to accommodate livestock exhibitors within the judging time span, but no premium will be awarded if the exhibitor misses their judging time.
- The County Extension office will provide official exhibit tags for all exhibitors prior to the state fair. This entry tag should be completely filled out and securely attached to the exhibit. County exhibit tags and ribbons should be removed.
- Some exhibit areas may have size limitations. Read the descriptions carefully. Please choose a display size which is most appropriate for the exhibit you are bringing. Larger does not always mean better; use good judgment in creating your exhibit. Exhibitors will need to carry their project from the distant parking lots on the fairgrounds.

PREMIUM GUIDE

Projects are valued on a point system based on grades of Blue, Red & White. Some more difficult and timeconsuming projects are given higher values. The dollar amount is then calculated using an X factor, which depends on the total premium dollars allowed by the State of Illinois.

Horticulture: Vegetable Gardening

3 top exhibits from class # 50314, 50315, 50316 and 1 entry for # 50318 may be selected for State Fair.

All exhibits must have been grown by the exhibitor as part of their current gardening 4-H project. Exhibitors should be knowledgeable about various aspects of the produce, including but not limited to different varieties, soil testing, fertilizers used, etc. Exhibits should be prepared according to the Illinois Vegetable Garden Guide website: <u>http://web.extension.illinois.edu/vegguide/</u>. Waxes and oils may not be used on vegetables or fruits. Any plant infested with insects will be removed from the exhibit area and will not be eligible for champion awards.

CLASS # PROJECT

50313

Herb Display

(Open to youth in Vegetable Gardening A, Vegetable Gardening B, Vegetable Gardening C, and Vegetable Gardening D)

Herbs should be grown in pots (8" maximum diameter). Categories: Mint, Oregano, Rosemary, Sage, Thyme, and all other herbs. Herbs should be labeled with common and Latin names. Herbs should be in your care for a minimum of three months for state fair exhibits. Remove dead leaves from plants and check that the soil is clear of debris such as dead leaves. In addition to class Champions, Herb Category Grand and Reserve Grand Champions may be selected. When exhibiting herb plants, be sure to grow the plants in the container to be displayed to avoid transplant shock. Exhibits will be evaluated based on cleanliness, uniformity, condition, quality, and trueness to variety. Additional herb resources are located on the project resources section of the Illinois 4-H website.

50314 Vegetable Display (Open to youth in Vegetable Gardening A, Vegetable Gardening B, Vegetable Gardening C, and Vegetable Gardening D)

1. This class is allowed a 2'6" x 2'6" space for display.

2. Basket must include 6 or more different kinds of vegetables. There may not be more than 2 different varieties of any vegetable. For example, red and white potatoes would be classified as two different varieties. Acorn squash and zucchini would be classified as two different vegetables.

3. The number and type of vegetables used must conform to the Vegetable Plate/Basket List.

4. Exhibitors must provide the name and variety of all vegetables used (i.e. Cabbage – Golden Acre; Cucumber, slicing – Straight Eight; Tomatoes, slicing – Rocky Top; Snap Beans – Contender, etc.).

50315 Vegetable Plate (Open to youth in Vegetable Gardening A, Vegetable Gardening B, Vegetable Gardening C, and Vegetable Gardening D)

1. Exhibit must include 2 single vegetable plates. (Exhibitor will furnish the disposable plates.)

- 2. Number of vegetables on plates must conform to plate list below.
- 3. Only one variety on each plate.

4. An exhibitor cannot show two plates of the same type vegetable. (i.e.: Cannot exhibit red *and* white potatoes or zucchini *and* straightneck summer squash.)

VEGETABLE PLATE/DISPLAY LIST

When selecting vegetables for exhibition, keep in mind that the judge will evaluate them on the basis of cleanliness, uniformity, condition, quality, and trueness to variety. (Lists are provided by UI Extension Horticulturists; Items are listed according to the correct definition of vegetables)

50316 Vegetable Gardening Display: (Open to youth in Vegetable Gardening A, Vegetable Gardening B, Vegetable Gardening C, Vegetable Gardening D) Present an exhibit of the member's choice that focuses on some aspect of vegetable gardening which does not fit in the categories above. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

50318 Vegetable Gardening Ready4Life Challenge: (Open to 11-18-year-olds enrolled in any Vegetable Gardening project)

Exhibits in this category must include the following: a) a physical representation of the career or business product such as a model, prototype or display/portfolio that includes images of accomplished work; b) verbal or written explanations that demonstrate knowledge of the related career or business fields, potential careers, and the appropriate requirements for achievement in those fields. The judging criteria for this class values thoroughness of career and/or business exploration and pursuit above the workmanship of the physical specimen on display.

*This project is eligible for the Maker class. See page 11 for more info.

Plant & Soil Science

Not eligible for state fair.

CLASS #PROJECTXXXXXXPlants & Soils 1: (Not eligible for state fair.)Prepare a display or poster that illustrates an activity from the project manual. The
display should demonstrate an understanding of environmental and internal factors that
affect plant growth and the function and characteristics of soil. Include your project
journal that documents activity recordkeeping requirements, answers activity questions,
and details personal thoughts and ideas.

Plants & Soils 2: (Not eligible for state fair.) Prepare a display or poster that illustrates an activity from the project manual. The display should demonstrate an understanding of the composition of plants, the functions of individual plant parts, plant life cycles, and the many ways plants reproduce. Include your project journal that documents activity recordkeeping, answers activity questions, and details personal thoughts and ideas.

Plants & Soils 3: (Not eligible for state fair.)
 Prepare a display or poster that illustrates an activity from the project manual. The display should demonstrate an understanding of the relationship between soil and other cycles found in nature. Displays should also provide an example of a leadership or service-learning experience focused on environmental stewardship. Include your project journal that documents activity recordkeeping requirements, answers activity questions, and details personal thoughts and ideas.

CLASS # PROJECT

50170 **Soybeans**:

Exhibit five fresh plants (include root system that is washed) that are representative of member's 4-H project field; **OR** exhibit an experimental or educational project related to one experience from your project. Include explanation of the project in a report for public understanding. Include the member's crop records with the exhibit, such as the 4-H Crop record found online @ https://4h.extension.illinois.edu/sites/4h.extension.illinois.edu/files/projects/documents/system/crops-and-soils-record-form-2016.pdf, an FFA crops record or similar information.

50171 **Corn**:

Exhibit two fresh plants of field corn (include root system that is washed), that is representative of member's 4-H project field; **OR** exhibit an experimental or educational project related to one experience from your project. Include explanation of the project in a report for public understanding. *Sweet corn should be exhibited in Vegetable Gardening*.

Include the member's crop records with the exhibit, such as the 4-H Crop record found online @

50172 Small Grains:

Exhibit one gallon of the current year's crop of oats, wheat, rye, or barley that is representative of the member's 4-H project field; OR exhibit an experimental or educational project related to one experience from your project. Include explanation of the project in a report for public understanding. LIVESTOCK SHOW RULES

- All 4-H livestock exhibitors enrolled in Dairy Cattle, Beef Cattle, Swine, Sheep and/or Goats MUST complete the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals Training by May 1 of each 4-H year, and all 4-H livestock exhibitors enrolled in Rabbits or Poultry for the first time MUST complete the online Quality Assurance and Ethic training by May 1.
- 2. Exhibitors must recruit and invite potential buyers of their livestock prior to the livestock auction.
- 3. Exhibitors should refer to the Monroe County Fair Paper for livestock information about the dates and times of entry and removal of livestock from the fairgrounds.
- 4. Only the judge, competing 4-H members and 4-H superintendents are permitted in the show ring during livestock show days.
- 5. ALL cattle, hogs, sheep, poultry, rabbits, goats and horses show in the agriculture department are subject to the same health regulations as stated for Open Classes in the Monroe County Fair Paper.
- 6. All 4-H members must follow the health guidelines of the Illinois Department of Agriculture Bureau of Animal Health and Welfare when exhibiting any livestock at county and state fairs in Illinois. Those guidelines are updated annually. The 2021 guidelines can be found online @ https://go.illinois.edu/LivestockHealthRequirements.
- 7. All 4-H members must abide by the general rules established by the Monroe Co. Fair Assoc. during the Monroe Co. Fair.
- 8. 4-H members should have 4-H Livestock Records up-to-date and show their records to their Leader by their <u>June club meeting</u>. Records should be completed by September 15 and turned into the Monroe Co. Extension office.
- 9. 4-H members are eligible to exhibit 2 entries per class number. It is important to indicate each entry on the livestock entry form. Youth will be paid for both entries.
- 10. If a 4-H or Junior exhibitor has 2 entries in any class, they are responsible for recruiting the help of another 4-H or Junior age exhibitor.
- 11. 4-H and FFA exhibitors are encouraged to display a sign with their name and 4-H Club and/or FFA Chapter to be placed near their animal.
- 12. Youth must be enrolled in the project they are exhibiting/selling if in a 4-H club.

YOUTH LIVESTOCK AUCTION RULES

The Youth Livestock Auction is sponsored by the Monroe County Extension & 4-H Education Foundation. The Foundation sets forth the following guidelines for selling livestock at the youth auction:

- 1. Only current 4-H or FFA members who are 8 years of age and not yet 19 years of age on or before September 1 of the previous year of the fair may sell at the youth livestock auction.
- 2. Youth must be a Monroe County resident and/or reside within the Waterloo, Columbia, Valmeyer or Red Bud school districts.
- 3. Youth must attend four 4-H meetings or four FFA meetings if not in a 4-H Club.
- 4. 4-H members must present a talk or demonstration during the project year.
- 5. Youth must be enrolled in the project they are exhibiting/selling if in a 4-H club and maintain records.
- 6. Animals receiving a blue or red 4-H ribbon are eligible to sell. Those receiving a white ribbon and/or not meeting the weight or rate-of-gain requirements are not eligible to sell.
- 7. Youth exhibiting/selling beef, dairy, swine, sheep and/or goats must complete the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) training (<u>http://yqca.org/</u>).
- 8. Youth exhibiting/selling poultry and/or rabbits must take the Quality Assurances & Ethics training once (https://web.extension.illinois.edu/qaec/).
- *9.* Exhibitors may <u>only sell ONE specie</u> at the Youth Livestock Auction: poultry, rabbits, beef, goats, sheep or swine.
- *10.* Participants should declare the specie they plan to sell at the Livestock Entry Day prior to the Monroe County Fair.
- 11. If a 4-H or FFA member receives Grand Champion and/or Reserve Champion in any specie area, they will have the opportunity to sell the Grand and Reserve Champion regardless of the number of other species they plan to sell.
- 12. Auction participants are responsible for helping to recruit potential buyers to the auction. Personal visits are very important contacts.

- 13. The exhibitor's immediate family is NOT eligible to buy back their animal.
- *14.* Terms of sale are CASH only. Settlement to be made before the animal is moved from the Fairgrounds.
- *15.* Seller is responsible for the animal until delivered to buyer's destination and until the buyer's check has been successfully processed by the bank.
- 16. The exhibitor is responsible for the delivery of the animal to the processor.
- 17. The exhibitor is responsible if the carcass is rejected by the health inspector.
- 18. The exhibitor is responsible to making necessary arrangements and/or agreements with the buyer if the exhibitor wishes to exhibit the animal at other fairs.
- *19.* If there is a cost of a thank you advertisement photo, it will be deducted from the check the exhibitor receives on the sale of their animal.
- *20.* The exhibitor will receive their animal sale check after the buyer's check has been successfully processed by the bank.

- 1. Entry is restricted to **ONE** premium number only. Competitor must have at least one animal entered in the junior show corresponding to the premium number entered within this division.

 - The superintendents will weigh each rabbit in the meat pen-beginning at 11:00 AM the morning of the show. After weighing, the judge will evaluate and place the meat pens for the Open, Junior and 4-H ratings. Exhibitor may choose to sell a Single Fryer
- 3. Exhibitors can sell either a Meat Pen or a Single Fryer (<u>1 rabbit between 3-5 lbs</u>.), which CANNOT be one of the meat pen rabbits. Decision must be made immediately following the judging.
- 4. *Recommended:* Meat Pen rabbits should be meat pen breed (California, New Zealand or other large, bonded breed).
- 5. The Meat Pens and Single Fryers will be sold in order of a lottery system.
- 6. The seller and buyer will work out the handling and processing.

RULES FOR THE MONROE COUNTY 4-H & FFA <u>STEER MARKET ANIMAL SALE</u>

- 1. Steers <u>must weigh</u> at least 900 pounds and not greater than 1450 pounds and meet predetermined rate of gain based on breed at the *final weigh-in*.
- 2. Steers will be sold in order of a lottery system, with numbers chosen the day of final weigh-in.
- 3. Steers MUST be clean and controllable at the final weigh-in. Steers deemed insufficiently halter broken will be ineligible for show and sale.
- 4. At the final weigh-in, the ear tag must be attached and one of the ear tattoos must be legible. *The consequence is the disqualification of the steer.*
- 5. The exhibitor will designate one steer for sale at the final weigh-in.
- 6. Steers may be subject to drug testing (i.e. tranquilizers, hormones, antibiotics, etc.).
- 7. Seller is responsible to deliver animal to processor; seller is responsible if carcass is rejected by inspector.
- 8. All steers delivered to a participating processor are eligible to participate in carcass evaluation.

ANNEX DIRECTIONS

<u>From the north:</u> Travel south on Rt. 3, into Waterloo (about 10 miles). Make two 4-way stops; continue traveling south... this is Route 3. Travel approximately ½ mile and the County Annex Building (one story brick building) is on the right side of the highway. There is a sign indicating the building. It houses, University of Illinois Extension, County Ambulance and Monroe County Highway Department. There is a large parking lot in front of the building.

<u>From the south:</u> Travel north on Rt. 3, make two 4-way stops continuing traveling north, at the second 4-way stop (Rt. 3 & 156), travel approximately ¼ mile, just past the bus garage and the dentist office, turn left onto Illinois Avenue. The County Annex Building is the one-story brick building facing the highway. There is a sign indicating the building. It houses, University of Illinois Extension, County Ambulance and Monroe County Highway Department. There is a large parking lot in front of the building.

FAIRGROUNDS DIRECTIONS

To travel either from the north or south to the Monroe County Fairgrounds, take Rt. 3, to the (Rt. 3 & Rt.156) 4-way stop. (Fast Stop is on the north corner and Nice Twice is on the south corner) turn west onto Rt. 156. Travel west on Rt. 156 approximately ½ mile. The Fairgrounds is on the right side of the highway.

4-H exhibits for projects in horticulture & crops are in the Commercial Building on the west end of the fairground. The 4-H livestock is in the appropriate specie barns on the north side of the fairgrounds.
