- 4-H Shows are open to all enrolled 4-H club members for the current 4-H year who:
 - Are age 8 but not yet age 19 by September 1st of the previous year.
 - Have enrolled by January 1st of the current year.
 - Have attended at least four (4) club meetings during the project year prior to a show.
 - Presented a talk and/or demonstration at a club meeting during the project year.
- All exhibitors must be currently enrolled in the project for which they are exhibiting.
- 4-H members are responsible for exhibiting <u>ALL</u> of their projects and are expected to be present while their project is evaluated. If a 4-H member must be absent for a 4-H show, they should consult the 4-H club leader or County Extension office.
- **INNOVATION CLASSES** are open to all 4-H members in the project areas listed. Members choosing to exhibit in the Innovation class may be enrolled in any level of the Project they are studying. Members choosing to exhibit in the Innovation class decide the best way to show off their project mastery and knowledge for the year in that project category. Some suggestions are provided for each category, but members may choose any method they want for demonstrating project learning as long as it does not fit in any other class in that category. Only selected projects categories have an Innovation option.
- **READY4LIFE CLASSES** (Career & Entrepreneurship Exploration) are open to any 4-H member who was at least 11 by September 1, of the previous year. Members choosing to exhibit in the Ready 4 Life class may be enrolled in any level of the Project they are studying. Exhibits should show the connection between the project area and related career or business opportunities. Members may choose any method they want for demonstrating project learning. Counties are eligible to send one Ready 4 Life exhibit for each project category in addition to the total allowed for that division.
- 4-H members are required to be present during a County 4-H Project Show to be eligible for <u>State Fair</u> consideration. If you need a reasonable accommodation to participate in this program, please contact the Extension office at 939-3434. Early requests are strongly encouraged to allow sufficient time for meeting your access needs.
- Youth must bring project(s) at designated judging times to ensure proper judge is present.
- Exhibits illustrating inappropriate subject matter and/or graphics are not acceptable. Extension Staff reserves the right to remove exhibits deemed inappropriate or dangerous for youth audiences. The

content of any 4-H competitive presentation does not necessarily reflect the beliefs of the University of Illinois Extension program or the Illinois State Fair.

- Some exhibit areas may have size limitations. Read the descriptions carefully. Please choose a display size which is most appropriate for the exhibit you are bringing. Larger does not always mean better; use good judgement in creating your exhibit. If an exhibit is selected for State Fair, please note that you may need to carry your project from a distant parking lot to the exhibit area.
- NO EQUIPMENT WILL BE PROVIDED FOR ANY EXHIBITS. This includes Computers, DVD/CD players, etc.
 Exhibitors <u>MUST</u> furnish any equipment they feel is necessary to properly critique their exhibit.
 Video/Filmmaking exhibitors must follow the guidelines provided to show their project (i.e. YouTube, DVD, USB, laptop, etc.)
- All exhibits must remain in place until the time specified.
- 4-H members enrolled in livestock projects are eligible to exhibit TWO entries per class.
- 4-H members are not allowed to wear business promotional clothing when showing projects. Members are encouraged to dress in neat and clean attire.
- All exhibits must be products of the current 4-H year, excluding livestock.
- The Danish system of awards will be used for all 4-H exhibits awarding Blue, Red and White ribbons, according to merit.
- Members must also be <u>eight</u> years old as of <u>September 1 of the previous year</u> to be eligible to advance to State Fair in a general project.
- 4-H members MUST follow the project requirements as stated in this 4-H Showbook for general projects to be eligible for State Fair.

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ILLINOIS STATE FAIR GUIDELINES (Horticulture & Crops)

DISCLAIMER

In any year for which the General Assembly of the State of Illinois fails to make an appropriation sufficient to pay such premiums, premium amounts may not be accurately reflected in the Premium Book."

- Exhibitors <u>must be present at the County 4-H Show and be pre-selected for State Fair representation</u> by their county 4-H Extension program as a State Fair Exhibitor (except for livestock).
- Exhibitors must be currently enrolled as a 4-H member and have been at least 8 years old as of September 1, 2021. Parents and leaders should make provisions for the adequate care and supervision of exhibitors.
- Exhibitors must follow the <u>project requirements</u> exactly as listed in this Showbook, unless other directions are provided.
- State Fair Designated Conference Judging Exhibit Day for Monroe County is <u>SATURDAY</u>, <u>AUGUST 12</u>, <u>2023</u>. Due to the nature of the conference judging process, exhibitors must be present with the exhibit that they have made for judging on their assigned county exhibition day. Scheduling adjustments for religious reasons may be requested by contacting the Illinois State 4-H Office@ illinois4H@illinois.edu by August 1, 2023.
- Members may enter <u>ONLY ONE</u> exhibit class at the Illinois State Fair. This also applies to exhibitors who are enrolled in
 projects in two different counties. If they are identified as a state fair delegate in two counties, they will have to choose
 one individual and/or group project to exhibit.
- All exhibitors from a county will exhibit the same day. A 4-H member may also show in the junior livestock show, but
 they must be present at the required time for their general project judging. If possible, attempts will be made to
 accommodate livestock exhibitors within the judging time span, but no premium will be awarded if the exhibitor misses
 their judging time.
- The County Extension office will provide official exhibit tags for all exhibitors prior to the state fair. This entry tag should be completely filled out and securely attached to the exhibit. County exhibit tags and ribbons should be removed.
- Some exhibit areas may have size limitations. Read the descriptions carefully. Please choose a display size which is most
 appropriate for the exhibit you are bringing. Larger does not always mean better; use good judgment in creating your
 exhibit. Exhibitors will need to carry their project from the distant parking lots on the fairgrounds.

PREMIUM GUIDE

Projects are valued on a point system based on grades of Blue, Red & White. Some more difficult and time-consuming projects are given higher values. The dollar amount is then calculated using an X factor, which depends on the total premium dollars allowed by the State of Illinois.

- 1. All 4-H Horticulture, Plant & Soil Science and Crops projects will be judged from 1:30-3:00 p.m. on Sunday, July 23, 2023. 4-H members must enter their exhibit(s) at the commercial building <u>between 1:30 p.m. and 3:00 p.m.</u> and will be judged in order of arrival on this day. 4-H members MUST be present to discuss their project work with the Judge.
- 2. 4-H exhibits will be released on Saturday, July 29 for pick-up. *Horticulture/Crop projects not picked up will be discarded.*

*NOTE: MEMBERS ARE ENCOURAGED TO ENTER THEIR EXHIBITS IN JUNIOR AND OPEN CLASS WHERE POSSIBLE. (REFER TO FAIR PAPER FOR INFORMATION AND ENTRY BLANK.)

(Note: Classes that are noted by XXXXX indicate ineligibility for State Fair)

Horticulture: Vegetables, Herbs & Fruits

3 top exhibits from class # 50313, 50314, 50315, 50316, 50317 may be selected for State Fair.

All exhibits must have been grown by the exhibitor as part of their current gardening 4-H project. Exhibitors should be knowledgeable about various aspects of the produce, including but not limited to different varieties, soil testing, fertilizers used, etc. Exhibits should be prepared according to the Illinois Vegetable Garden Guide website: http://web.extension.illinois.edu/vegguide/. Waxes and oils may not be used on vegetables or fruits. Any plant infested with insects will be removed from the exhibit area and will not be eligible for champion awards.

CLASS # PROJECT

50313 Herb Container Display

(Open to youth in Vegetable Gardening A, Vegetable Gardening B, Vegetable Gardening C, and Vegetable Gardening D)

Herbs should be grown in pots (8" maximum diameter). Categories: Mint, Oregano, Rosemary, Sage, Thyme, and all other herbs. Herbs should be labeled with common and Latin names. Herbs should be in your care for a minimum of three months for state fair exhibits. Remove dead leaves from plants and check that the soil is clear of debris such as dead leaves. In addition to class Champions, Herb Category Grand and Reserve Grand Champions may be selected. When exhibiting herb plants, be sure to grow the plants in the container to be displayed to avoid transplant shock. Exhibits will be evaluated based on cleanliness, uniformity, condition, quality, and trueness to variety. Additional herb resources are located on the project resources section of the Illinois 4-H website.

50314 **Vegetable/Fruit Display:**

(Open to youth in Vegetable Gardening A, Vegetable Gardening B, Vegetable Gardening C, and Vegetable Gardening D)

- 1. This class is allowed a 2'6" x 2'6" space for each display.
- 2. This class is allowed a 2'6" x 2'6" space for display.
- 3. Display must include 6 or more different kinds of vegetables or fruits. There may not be more than 2 different varieties of any vegetable/fruit. For example, red and white potatoes would be classified as two different varieties. Acorn squash and zucchini would be classified as two different vegetables.
- 4. The number and type of vegetables/fruits used must conform to the Vegetable/Fruit Plate/Display List. *Fruit Plate list is below vegetable plate list.*
- 5. Exhibitors must provide the name and variety of all vegetables/fruits used. (i.e. Cabbage Golden Acre; Cucumber, slicing Straight Eight; Tomatoes, slicing Rocky Top; Snap Beans Contender, etc.).

50315 **Vegetable Plates:**

(Open to youth in Vegetable Gardening A, Vegetable Gardening B, Vegetable Gardening C, and Vegetable Gardening D)

- 1. Exhibit must include 2 single vegetable plates. (Exhibitor will furnish the disposable plates.)
- 2. Exhibitors must provide the name and variety of all vegetables/fruits used. (i.e. Cabbage Golden Acre; Cucumber, slicing Straight Eight; Tomatoes, slicing Rocky Top; Snap Beans Contender, etc.).
- 3. Number of vegetables on plates must conform to plate list below.
- 4. Only one variety on each plate.
- 4. An exhibitor cannot show two plates of the same type vegetable. (i.e.: Cannot exhibit red *and* white potatoes or zucchini *and* straightneck summer squash.)

50316 **Vegetable Gardening Display-Other**:

(Open to youth in Vegetable Gardening A, Vegetable Gardening B, Vegetable Gardening C, Vegetable Gardening D) Present an exhibit of the member's choice that focuses on some aspect of vegetable gardening which does not fit in the categories above. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

50317 Fruit Plates:

(Open to youth in Vegetable Gardening A, Vegetable Gardening B, Vegetable Gardening C, and Vegetable Gardening D)

- 1. Exhibit must include 2 single fruit plates. (Exhibitor will furnish the disposable plates.)
- 2. Exhibitors must provide the name and variety of all vegetables/fruits used. Number of fruits on plates must conform to plate list below.
- 3. Only one variety on each plate.
- 4. An exhibitor cannot show two plates of the same type fruit. (i.e.: Cannot exhibit Gala & Jonathan Apples, Mazzard & Gisela Cherries, etc.)

Fruit Plate List

Fruit will be judged using the same general criteria used for vegetables. Fruit will be judged for the stage of maturity normal for that season and growing location. Emphasis will be placed on how well fruit approaches market quality. When selecting fruits for exhibition, keep in mind that the judge will evaluate them on the basis of cleanliness, uniformity, condition, quality, and trueness to variety. CLASS # PROJECT

50280 Cover Crops

Exhibit an experimental or educational activity related to one experience from your project; **OR** prepare a display focusing on any activity related to the cover crops project. This could be related, but not limited, to plant growth & development, cover crop benefits, land management, sustainability, or other topics of interest to the member related to cover crops. A cover crop might include any plant that is sown in between primary production crops for the benefit of overall farm health rather than crop yield (examples: pennycress, clover, radish, annual ryegrass, etc.). The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

XXXXXX Plants & Soils 1: (Not eligible for state fair.)

Prepare a display or poster that illustrates an activity from the project manual. The display should demonstrate an understanding of environmental and internal factors that affect plant growth and the function and characteristics of soil. Include your project journal that documents activity recordkeeping requirements, answers activity questions, and details personal thoughts and ideas.

XXXXXX Plants & Soils 2: (Not eligible for state fair.)

Prepare a display or poster that illustrates an activity from the project manual. The display should demonstrate an understanding of the composition of plants, the functions of individual plant parts, plant life cycles, and the many ways plants reproduce. Include your project journal that documents activity recordkeeping, answers activity questions, and details personal thoughts and ideas.

XXXXXX Plants & Soils 3: (Not eligible for state fair.)

Prepare a display or poster that illustrates an activity from the project manual. The display should demonstrate an understanding of the relationship between soil and other cycles found in nature. Displays should also provide an example of a leadership or service-learning experience focused on environmental stewardship. Include your project journal that documents activity recordkeeping requirements, answers activity questions, and details personal thoughts and ideas.

CLASS # PROJECT

50170 Soybeans:

Exhibit five fresh plants (include root system that is washed) that are representative of member's 4-H project field; **OR** exhibit an experimental or educational project related to one experience from your project. Include explanation of the project in a report for public understanding. Include the member's crop records with the exhibit, such as the 4-H Crop record found online @ https://go.illinois.edu/CropRecordBook or an FFA crops record or similar information.

50171 **Corn**:

Exhibit two fresh plants of field corn (include root system that is washed), that is representative of member's 4-H project field; **OR** exhibit an experimental or educational project related to one experience from your project. Include explanation of the project in a report for public understanding. *Sweet corn should be exhibited in Vegetable Gardening*. Include the member's crop records with the exhibit, such as the 4-H Crop record found online @ https://go.illinois.edu/CropRecordBook, an FFA crops record or similar information.

50172 **Small Grains**:

Exhibit one gallon of the current year's crop of oats, wheat, rye, or barley that is representative of the member's 4-H project field; **OR** exhibit an experimental or educational project related to one experience from your project. Include explanation of the project in a report for public understanding. Include the member's crop records with the exhibit, such as the 4-H Crop record found online @ https://go.illinois.edu/CropRecordBook an FFA crops record or similar information.

50173 Crops Innovation Class: (Open to youth who are enrolled in any crops project.)

Demonstrate the skills and knowledge you have gained through the Crops project. This could be related to, but not limited to crop production, crop utilization or topics of interest to the member related to agronomy. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. Your exhibit should not fit in the other exhibit options for this project. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

READY4LIFE CAREER & ENTREPRENEURSHIP EXPLORATION

CLASS # PROJECT

50366A Ready4Life Exploration (Career)

Open to 11- to 18-year-olds.

Exhibits in this category must include the following: a) a physical representation of the career such as a model, prototype or display/portfolio that includes images of accomplished work; b) verbal or written explanations that demonstrate knowledge of the related career or business fields, potential careers, and the appropriate requirements for achievement in those fields. The judging criteria for this class values thoroughness of career exploration and pursuit above the workmanship of the physical specimen on display.

50366B Ready4Life Exploration (Entrepreneurship)

Open to 11- to 18-year-olds.

Exhibits in this category must include the following: a) a physical representation of the business product such as a model, prototype or display/portfolio that includes images of accomplished work; b) verbal or written explanations that demonstrate knowledge of the related business fields, potential business opportunities, and the appropriate requirements for achievement in those fields. The judging criteria for this class values thoroughness of the business exploration and pursuit above the workmanship of the physical specimen on display.

LIVESTOCK SHOW RULES

- 1. Only current 4-H members who are 8 years of age and not yet 19 years of age on or before September 1 of the previous year of the Fair may exhibit as a 4-H member.
- 2. Members must attend four 4-H meetings (or four FFA meetings if not in a 4-H Club) prior to the Fair.
- 3. 4-H members must present a talk or demonstration during the 4-H year.
- 4. All 4-H livestock exhibitors enrolled in Dairy Cattle, Beef Cattle, Swine, Sheep and/or Goats MUST complete the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals Training by May 1 of *each* 4-H year. All 4-H livestock exhibitors enrolled in Rabbits or Poultry for the *first time* MUST complete the online Quality Assurance and Ethic training by May 1.
- 5. Youth must be enrolled in the project they are exhibiting/selling if in a 4-H club.
- 6. 4-H members must have 4-H Livestock Records up-to-date and show their in-progress records to their 4-H Club Leader by their May, June or July club meeting; prior to the Fair. Records should be completed by September 15 and turned into the Monroe Co. Extension office. *Members must complete a livestock record book in 2023 in order to be eligible to sell in 2024, with the exception of new members.
- 7. 4-H members are eligible to exhibit 2 entries per class number. It is important to indicate each entry on the livestock entry form.
- 8. ALL cattle, hogs, sheep, poultry, rabbits, goats and horses show in the agriculture department are subject to the same health regulations as stated for Open Classes in the Monroe County Fair Paper. Health papers should be provided to your Superintendent upon arrival.
- 9. All 4-H members must follow the health guidelines of the Illinois Department of Agriculture Bureau of Animal Health and Welfare when exhibiting any livestock at county and state fairs in Illinois. Those guidelines are updated annually. The guidelines can be found online @ https://go.illinois.edu/LivestockHealthRequirements.
- 10. Exhibitors should refer to the Monroe County Fair Paper for livestock information about the dates and times of entry and removal of livestock from the fairgrounds.
- 11. If a 4-H or Junior exhibitor has 2 entries in any class, they are responsible for recruiting the help of another 4-H or Junior age exhibitor.
- 12. Only the judge, competing 4-H members and 4-H superintendents are permitted in the show ring during livestock show days.

- 13. 4-H and FFA exhibitors are encouraged to display a sign with their name and 4-H Club and/or FFA Chapter to be placed near their animal.
- 14. Exhibitors are encouraged to dress in neat and clean attire. Members should not wear business promotional clothing when exhibiting projects.
- 15. All 4-H members must abide by the general rules established by the Monroe Co. Fair Assoc. during the Monroe Co. Fair.

*NOTE: HEALTH PAPERS MUST BE PROVIDED TO SUPERINTENDENT UPON ARRIVAL (NO LATER THAN MONDAY AT 6PM).

LIVESTOCK AUCTION RULES

The Youth Livestock Auction is sponsored by the Monroe County Extension & 4-H Education Foundation. The Foundation's Livestock Auction Committee sets forth the following guidelines for selling livestock at the youth auction:

- 1. Only current 4-H or FFA members who are 8 years of age and not yet 19 years of age on or before September 1 of the previous year of the Fair may sell at the youth livestock auction.
- 2. Youth must be a Monroe County resident and/or reside within the Waterloo, Columbia, Valmeyer or Red Bud school districts.
- 3. Youth must be a member of a Monroe County 4-H club and/or an FFA chapter in the Waterloo, Columbia, Valmeyer or Red Bud school districts.
- 4. All 4-H livestock exhibitors enrolled in Dairy Cattle, Beef Cattle, Swine, Sheep and/or Goats MUST complete the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals Training by May 1 of each 4-H year. All 4-H livestock exhibitors enrolled in Rabbits or Poultry for the first time MUST complete the online Quality Assurance and Ethic training by May 1.
- 5. 4-H members must attend four 4-H meetings prior to the Fair.
- 6. 4-H members must present a talk or demonstration during the 4-H year.
- 7. Youth must be enrolled in the project they are exhibiting/selling if in a 4-H club.
- 8. 4-H members must have 4-H Livestock Records up-to-date and show their <u>in-progress</u> records to their 4-H Club Leader by their <u>May, June or July club meeting</u>; prior to the Fair. Records must be <u>completed by September 15</u> and turned into the Monroe Co. Extension office. *Members must complete a livestock record book in 2023 in order to be eligible to sell in 2024, with the exception of new members.
- Animals receiving a blue or red 4-H ribbon are eligible to sell. Those receiving a white ribbon and/or not meeting the weight or rate-of-gain requirements are not eligible to sell.
- 10. Exhibitors may sell two livestock projects: Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goat, Rabbit, Poultry, and/or Dairy Cattle Basket (basket=products or certificates with a minimum value of \$50.) *Dairy Goat baskets will sell with goats
- 11. Participants should declare the specie they plan to sell at the Livestock Entry Day prior to the Monroe County Fair. Any changes should be provided to the U of I Extension office prior to 8am, Thursday of Fair week.

- 12. If a 4-H or FFA member receives Grand Champion and/or Reserve Champion in any specie area, they will have the opportunity to sell the Grand and Reserve Champion regardless of the number of other species they plan to sell, as long as all of the additional sale requirements are met.
- 13. Auction participants are responsible for helping to recruit potential buyers to the auction. Personal visits are very important contacts. Exhibitors should recruit and invite potential buyers of their livestock prior to the livestock auction via letters or personal visits.
- 14. Youth are encouraged to dress in neat and clean attire when selling their animal. Members should not wear business promotional clothing during the auction.
- 15. The exhibitor's immediate family is discouraged from bidding on their child's animal.
- 16. Terms of sale are CASH only. Settlement to be made before the animal is moved from the Fairgrounds.
- 17. Seller is responsible for the animal until delivered to buyer's destination and until the buyer's check has been successfully processed by the bank.
- 18. The exhibitor is responsible for the delivery of the animal to the processor.
- 19. The exhibitor is responsible if the carcass is rejected by the health inspector.
- 20. The exhibitor is responsible to making necessary arrangements and/or agreements with the buyer if the exhibitor wishes to exhibit the animal at other fairs.
- 21. If there is a cost of a thank you advertisement photo, it will be deducted from the check the exhibitor receives on the sale of their animal.
- 22. The exhibitor will receive their animal sale check after the buyer's check has been successfully processed by the bank.

- 5. The winner will advance to the Illinois State Fair Master Showmanship Contest on Friday, August 11, 2023 at 7:00 p.m. at the State Fairgrounds in Springfield. The winner must be available to attend this contest and *own or borrow* the said animals listed above that are already being exhibited at the state fair.
- 6. The winner will receive a custom belt buckle sponsored by O/B Angus in addition to a t-shirt that is required to be worn during the State Fair contest.
- 7. Participants are eligible to win the Master Showmanship Contest only once in their 4-H career.
- 8. Participants must fill out an entry form and turn in by Monroe County Livestock Entry Night on June 28, 2023.
- 9. This contest will adhere to all guidelines set forth by the Monroe County Fair and must meet the Illinois Exhibition Animal Health Requirements.

 - The superintendents will weigh each rabbit in the meat pen-beginning at 11:00 a.m. the morning of the show. After weighing, the judge will evaluate and place the meat pens for the Open, Junior and 4-H ratings. Exhibitor may choose to sell a Single Fryer
- 3. Exhibitors can sell either a Meat Pen or a Single Fryer (<u>1 rabbit between 3-5 lbs.</u>), which CANNOT be one of the meat pen rabbits. Decision must be made immediately following the judging.

- 1. Lambs must meet a minimum Average Daily Gain of .50 lbs/day.
- 2. Only wether lambs or ewe lambs will be allowed to be sold in the lamb sale.
- 3. The exhibitor will designate one lamb for sale at the final weigh-in.
- 4. Lambs will be sold in order of a lottery system with numbers chosen the day of weigh-in.
- 5. Seller is responsible to deliver animal to processor; seller is responsible if carcass is rejected by inspector.
- 6. All lambs delivered to a participating processor are eligible to participate in carcass evaluation.

RULES FOR THE MONROE COUNTY 4-H & FFA SWINE MARKET ANIMAL SALE

- 1. Swine must weigh between 230-290lbs and be paint branded.
- 2. Only one weighing will be done and that weight will be used for rule weight.
- 3. Swine will be sold in order of a lottery system, with numbers chosen after the show.
- 4. The highest placing animal must be sold if the exhibitor has 2 entries.

RULES FOR THE MONROE COUNTY 4-H & FFA GOAT MARKET ANIMAL SALE

- 1. Market animal must consist of either a wether or market female of either meat or dairy type goat.
- 2. Goats will be sold by the head.
- 3. Goats will be sold in order of a lottery system, with numbers chosen the day of weigh-in.
- 4. Dairy goats must be debudded; however, horns are acceptable for meat goats.
- 5. Seller is responsible to deliver animal to processor; seller is responsible if carcass is rejected by inspector.
- 6. 4-H/FFA dairy goat exhibitors are eligible to sell a Dairy Goat Basket containing products or certificates with a minimum value of \$50. Members must exhibit at least two dairy goats.

RULES FOR THE MONROE COUNTY 4-H & FFA STEER MARKET ANIMAL SALE

- 1. Steers <u>must weigh</u> at least 900 pounds and not greater than 1450 pounds and meet predetermined rate of gain based on breed at the *final weigh-in*.
- 2. Steers will be sold in order of a lottery system, with numbers chosen the day of final weigh-in.
- 3. Steers MUST be clean and controllable at the final weigh-in. Steers deemed insufficiently halter broken will be ineligible for show and sale.
- 4. At the final weigh-in, the ear tag must be attached and one of the ear tattoos must be legible. *The consequence is the disqualification of the steer.*
- 5. The exhibitor will designate one steer for sale at the final weigh-in.
- 6. Steers may be subject to drug testing (i.e. tranquilizers, hormones, antibiotics, etc.).
- 7. Seller is responsible to deliver animal to processor; seller is responsible if carcass is rejected by inspector.
- 8. All steers delivered to a participating processor are eligible to participate in carcass evaluation.

RULES FOR THE MONROE COUNTY 4-H & FFA DAIRY SALE

1. 4-H dairy exhibitors are eligible to sell a Dairy Cattle Basket containing products or certificates with a minimum value of \$50. Members must exhibit at least two dairy cows.
