- 1 All exhibits are to be assembled and set up by 4-H members and at least one member from club must be present for judging.
- 2 Club must provide all equipment and exhibit should not exceed 3' x 3' floor. Club name and category name are required on booth.
- 3 A club may exhibit in only one of the categories listed below:

Leadership Community Service Project Mastery Club Accomplishments

4-H Cloverbud Booths

All Cloverbud clubs may enter a club display that highlights Cloverbud activities done in the current year. For a Cloverbud club to have a booth at the 4-H Show, the club must register no later than June 15. Exhibits should not exceed 3' x 3' floor space and should include the club's name. 2025 4-H Premiums

Premium checks will be mailed to the 4-H member following the 4-H Show and upon receipt of funds from the Department of Agriculture.

4-H premiums will be awarded using the X factor system to 4-H youth ages 8–18 years of age. Under this system, X will be worth a specific dollar amount based upon the amount of money appropriated for 4-H premiums for the year, the number of entries and the distribution of blue, red, and white awards. The X value will then be multiplied by the factor indicated for a given show.

2025 4-H Champion Project Awards

The 2025 McLean County 4-H Show will recognize hundreds of special winners with 4-H Champion Project awards. This award program will provide many class, breed, or other special 4-H show winners with extra recognition above the traditional premium awards for 4-H members. Every effort will be made to highlight the winners with enhanced display areas at the 4-H Show.

Champion Project Awards Guidelines

- Varied tangible awards are offered throughout the 4-H classes. Only Best of Class and Reserve Best of Class projects are eligible to compete for these awards. The 4-H Livestock Division categories are noted in the show book with a bold print "4H-CS." For classes in the 4-H Exhibits Division, all 4-H classes, (unless otherwise noted), are eligible for a Best of Class award and Reserve Best of Class award ONLY IF the exhibit receives an "A" rating. Some 4-H class categories are eligible for a Best of Show award and Reserve Best of Show award. Judges' decisions determine Champion Project awards.
- 2. The U of I Extension Office will award Champion Project awards based on the total available donation funds from the McLean County Extension Service Foundation.
- 3. Sponsors are recognized by the following categories:

Emerald Sponsor (\$2,500 and up) Diamond Sponsor (\$1,000 to \$2,499) Gold Sponsor (\$500 to \$999) Silver Sponsor (\$250 to \$499) Bronze Sponsor (less than\$250)

4. Winners may collect recognition and awards in more than one category.

McLean County Fair & 4-H Show Rules and Regulations Entries and Exhibits

- Entries in all departments shown at the McLean County 4-H Show, except showmanship classes, must be registered by June 15, 2025 at <u>http://mclean4-hfair.fairentry.com</u>. Late entries will not be accepted.
- The Junior Show is a Livestock Show ONLY. The 4-H show allows youth to exhibit in Livestock classes and General Projects classes. <u>Registration for the Junior Show does</u> NOT registry with far the Malage County 4 U.Show and 4 U.Livestock Classes

NOT register youth for the McLean County 4-H Show and 4-H Livestock Classes.

- a. Youth will not be eligible for Junior Show premiums unless they register for the Junior Show at <u>www.mcleancountyfair.org</u>.
- b. Youth will not be eligible for 4-H premiums, 4-H awards, or 4-H Champion Project Awards <u>unless they register projects by May 1 on ZSuite.com and by</u> June 15 for the 4-H Show at http://mclean4-hfair.fairentry.com.
- Please see page 9 & 10 for age eligibility of 4-H and Jr. Show Livestock, and page 63 for age eligibility for 4-H Exhibits.
- 4. Each exhibit must be the current year's 4-H work (September 2024–July 2025) and made or cared for by the exhibitor. All exhibits are individual projects and are prepared by one exhibitor, unless otherwise stated.
- 5. Exhibits must be placed and ready for exhibition according to the show book. Superintendents will check in the exhibits. All exhibits are entered at owner's risk.
- Exhibitor may exhibit only one exhibit per class unless otherwise stated in the show book. <u>Member must be enrolled in appropriate 4-H curriculum by May 1 to exhibit in correlating</u> <u>class at the 4-H Show, unless otherwise noted</u>.
- 7. Unless otherwise noted, the maximum display or poster size is 24" wide x 15" deep x 36" high. Omit title boards from display boards.
- 8. No exhibits can be removed from the exhibit area before the published release time without the written permission from the 4-H Show Committee chair, their designee, and County Director. Emergency permission during the show can also be granted by direct order from the county veterinarian or the approval of a staff member from University of Illinois Extension McLean County with the concurrence of the appropriate superintendent or the 4-H Show Director overseeing the affected project. Early released projects will not be allowed to return. Failure to comply will result in that 4-H member not being permitted to show in that project area the following year and will not be eligible for premiums during the current year.
- 9. Noname signs are to be moved without permission from the superintendent.
- 10. The judge's decision is final in all classes.
- 11. Premium checks will be mailed to the 4-H member following the show and upon receipt of funds from the Department of Agriculture.
- 12. 4-Hyouth can only receive ONE premium perclass. Disclaimer: "The Department of Agriculture shall use its best efforts to secure sufficient appropriations to fund premiums. In any year for which the General Assembly of the State of Illinois fails to make an appropriation sufficient to pay such premiums, premium amounts may not be accurately reflected in this Premium Book."
- 13. A youth who enrolls in a 4-H club/group but fails to attend at least **one** 4-H activity sponsored by the club/group is <u>not eligible</u> to take part in the McLean County 4-H Show.
- 14. If you need a reasonable accommodation to participate in the McLean County 4-H Show, please contact the McLean County Director at least two weeks prior to the event at the McLean County Extension Office at 309-663-8306.

Conference Judging Rules

1. ALL PROJECT AREAS WILL BE CONFERENCE JUDGED.

- Exhibitor must be present for conference judging of project. If not able to be present, exhibitor will need to fill out an absentee form. You may get the form at the front office. Form: <u>https://extension.illinois.edu/sites/default/files/exhibit_report_form_5-2023.pdf</u>
- 3. Prior approval of accommodation is required by 4-H Educator if exhibitor is not able to conference judge.
- 4. Please be prepared to discuss the goals and objectives of the project and be able to describe the methods and processes used to produce the exhibit.

Supervision of the Grounds & Show

- 1 The general supervision of the grounds is vested in the Board of Directors of the McLean County Fair.
- 2 <u>All 4-H wristbands MUST be attached on wrist at ALL TIMES by 4-H members, leaders, and</u> <u>superintendents while on the fairgrounds</u>. Wristbands will be used for entry at the gate each day, no other forms of fair passes will be distributed. Wristbands will be distributed prior to the fair.
- 3 Exhibitors remaining on grounds at night must present their credentials to authorities on request and conduct themselves according to the rules outlined by the authority present. Any failure to comply with such request of the authorities will prohibit the exhibitor from showing. This rule will be rigidly enforced. All exhibitors staying overnight MUST comply with the Camping Rules.
- 4 The rules and guidelines of the show book will be executed by Extension staff in conjunction with the 4-H Show Committee, who will have immediate charge of the exhibitors on their arrival, direct them to their proper places, and see that none of the rules are violated with impunity.
- 5 Diligence will be used by the officers of the McLean County Fair Association Board and University of Illinois Extension to prevent injury or loss of articles on exhibition but will not be responsible should any occur.
- 6 No parking will be permitted in the building area after 8 p.m. on Tuesday. Violators are subject to towing.
- 7. No alcoholic beverages will be permitted on the fairgrounds, except in restricted areas and at designated times as determined by the McLean County Fair Board. Anyone in violation of this rule will be required to leave the fairgrounds. Non-compliance by an exhibitor, or family members, may result in the disqualification of an exhibitor's exhibit and forfeiture of all ribbons, premiums, and awards.
- 8 Unofficial golf carts/carts, dogs, bicycles, motorized scooters, E-Bikes, and roller blades are not allowed on the fairgrounds without fair manager authorization. Exhibition bicycles are allowed on their day of show and confined to the exhibition areas only.
- 9. The McLean County Fair Association and McLean County Extension Office reserves final and absolute rights to interpret these rules and regulations and to arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions, or differences in regard thereto. It further reserves the right to amend or add to these rules as in its judgment it may determine. The 4-H Show Committee may also combine, divide, or eliminate classes as seen fit.
- 10 No smoking is permitted within 15 feet of the exhibition buildings or barns.

Camping Rules and Regulations

- All 4-H and Junior Show exhibitors ("Campers") wishing to sleep overnight on the fairgrounds between the hours of midnight and 8 a.m. from Tuesday through Sunday must have a parent complete a camping application form.
- To reserve a camping space, please go to <u>https://mcleancountyfair.org/4-h/</u> and click on the 4-H camping button to register. You will be allowed to choose your space once all forms are completed, and payment is received. Camping registration is also available in person at the McLean County Farm Bureau Office.
- 3. All exhibitors camping overnight must be under the direct supervision of a parent in attendance. The Supervising Adult must be a legal guardian of one of the exhibitors in the camping unit. There must be One Adult for every 4 exhibitors.
- 4. During registration, a list all people staying in the camping unit must be submitted. Any changes to this list can be given to the staff at the Ticket Office for approval. This includes changes to the Supervising Adult or exhibitors.
- Payment is due upon arrival and check-in. Each camping unit is \$20, and only one camping unit per site is allowed. Cost includes electrical hookup, water, and access to dump.
- 6. All campers are required to wear a "camping" wristband at all times while staying on the fairgrounds. wristbands can be picked up at the Ticket Office upon arrival and check in.
- All camping units must be placed in an area designated by the McLean County Fair Staff. One vehicle will be allowed to park in the camping area at any time.
- All Campers are responsible for keeping their campsite neat and clean. All trash and waste must be disposed of in an approved manner. Dumping black/gray water directly on the ground is prohibited.
- 9. Noalcoholic beverages, narcotics, or illegal substances of any kind are permitted on the fairgrounds. Anyone in violation of this rule will be required to leave the fairgrounds. Non-compliance by an exhibitor may result in the disqualification of an exhibitor's exhibit and forfeiture of all ribbons, premiums, and awards.
- 10. No campfires of any sort are allowed.
- 11. Campers are responsible to provide all electrical cords. Extension cords used to distribute power to an RV shall be rated 15 amps minimum and must contain ground wire. Cords not meeting these requirements shall be disconnected immediately from the power supply and required to meet the standards before reconnecting.
- 12. No modifying of electrical outlets is permitted. No electrical cords shall cross any roadways.
- A curfew of 11 p.m. will be enforced to create 'quiet hours' between 11 p.m. 6 a.m. A security guard will monitor the area to enforce curfew.
- 14. <u>No dogs or pets</u> are allowed on the fairgrounds. No dogs or pets allowed in the camping area.
- 15. Anyone who violates the above rules or displays undesirable conduct, as determined by the McLean County Fair or security personnel for the McLean County Fair, will be required to leave the fairgrounds that night. The supervising parent of the released camper shall meet with the McLean County Fair manager the next business day.
- 16. Non-compliance with these rules may also result in the disqualification of an exhibitor's exhibit and forfeiture of all ribbons, premiums, and awards.

General Livestock Rules and Regulations

- 1. When livestock exhibits will be permitted on the grounds will be announced at a later date.
- All livestock exhibitors must complete YQCA. <u>YQCA is for members enrolled in dairy cattle, beef cattle, swine, sheep, and goats</u>. YQCA is a new livestock quality assurance program that is replacing PQA. All 4-H exhibitors of these animals will be required to certify in the YQCA program each year. <u>Youth must certify online by June 1</u> at <u>https://yqcaprogram.org/</u>. The estimated cost for online training is \$12. This certification is needed each year with a test out option of 1–3 years.
- 3. The online 4-H QAEC is required for all youth who enroll in the following animal science projects: horse, poultry, rabbits, dogs, cats, and small pets. Failure to complete QAEC by June 1 will result in the member's animal science project enrollment being canceled and they will be ineligible to exhibit in the McLean County 4-H Show and Illinois State Fair. The QAEC training can now be accessed in the Clover Academy section of the ZSuite Enrollment System. ZSuite can be accessed at https://4h.zsuite.org/. Families can access directions for completing the course at https://qo.illinois.edu/TakeQAEC. The QAEC training is a once in a lifetime training, if you have completed it for all the species that you will show you do not need to take it again.
- 4. All required Certificates of Veterinary Inspection (health papers) must be inspected by the Swine Superintendents during check-in.
- 5. All Livestock will be checked in by Show Committee Directors.
- 6. Registration papers or transfers must show ownership by the exhibitor. The registration papers may also include the names of immediate family members. No partnership registration papers between families will be accepted. See Horse section on page 34 for horse ownership and leasing rules. Goats, Llama, and Sheep leasing agreements must be in before June 1, 2025. The exhibitor must have written documentation providing ownership or lease of the animal being shown.
- 7. Physical Abuse Statement: The Illinois Humane Care for Animals Act prohibits physical mistreatment of animals. The use of electrical shock, manual striking of livestock, or withholding feed and water are considered direct violations of this act. The presence of any type of equipment to induce electrical shock in the exhibition area will be considered as intent to inflict electrical shock on animals under care of the person with the equipment. <u>People found mistreating livestock will be prohibited from exhibiting, dismissed from the fairgrounds and ineligible to receive 4-H premiums and Champion Project Awards.</u>
- 8. Animals that are uncontrollable or exhibiting vicious behavior will be dismissed from the show ring at the discretion of the superintendent. At the County Director and Show Director's discretion, animals may be dismissed from the fairgrounds for unsafe behavior.
- 9. Exhibitors must wear appropriate attire when exhibiting animals. A shirt with sleeves and a collar, or McLean County 4-H T-Shirt tucked in at the waist and closed-toed shoes will constitute appropriate attire. Shorts or V-Necks are not considered appropriate. Failure to conform to this rule will result in dismissal from the show ring at the discretion of the 4-H Extension Program Coordinator.
- 10. All animals must be shown in the judging ring by the owner unless otherwise authorized by the Show Director. No one will be allowed in the show ring except exhibitors exhibiting, officers, superintendent or persons designated by officers of the 4-H Show.
- 11. Each exhibitor must be on time in showing their animal. Class shows will not be delayed because of the absence of any exhibitor.
- 12. Each exhibitor will be directly responsible for keeping pens and stables clean and bedded. Feed, bedding, water pails, feed boxes, and other equipment must be furnished by the exhibitor and stored neatly. Exhibitors will also be responsible for tearing down pens and cleaning up their area after the fair.

- 13. Breed associations are entitled to two representatives in the show ring during the presentation of trophies.
- 14. After unloading livestock, please park trailers north of the chain link fence on the north end of the fairgrounds. Trailers not parked in designated area by 11 p.m. on Wednesday, will be subject to towing.
- 15. All exhibitors with livestock projects are required to use one of the following for bedding: shavings, sawdust, straw, or other material as approved by the show director.

4-H Livestock Show Rules and Regulations

Youth who are 8 years of age or have not reached their 19th birthday on or before September 1, 2024, may enroll in 4-H clubs. The class structure and show times will be the same for both the 4- H and Junior Show. Junior show class numbers appear in parenthesis immediately following the name of the 4-H class. Junior and 4-H Show classes will be called by Junior Show class numbers as the 4-H Shows classes are conducted (subclasses may be created to accommodate all exhibitors in a particular class). <u>4-H members are NOT automatically entered in the Junior Show; to be in the Junior Show all 4-H members must register online at www.mcleancountyfair.org,using the corresponding Junior Show class numbers. Likewise, enrolling in the Junior Show does not automatically enter a youth into the 4-H Show. Rules for the 4-H Livestock Divisions will apply as outlined in this section. All animals in 4-H classes will be awarded an A, B, or C placing, premium and may be eligible for additional awards through the Champion Project Awards program. To be eligible for these awards youth MUST register for the 4-H Show by June 15 at http://mclean4-hfair.fairentry.com.</u>

YQCA & QAEC

4-H Exhibitors <u>MUST</u> complete livestock Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (**YQCA**) and Quality Assurance and Ethics (**QAEC**) <u>by June 1</u>.

YQCA:

For members enrolled in *dairy cattle, beef cattle, swine, sheep, and goats*:

- The YQCA is a livestock quality assurance program that is replacing PQA.
- All 4-H exhibitors of these animals (shown above) will be required to certify in the YQCA program each year.
 - Youth can certify online via the website <u>https://yqcaprogram.org/</u>
 - The estimated cost for the <u>online training is \$12</u>.
 - Please know that this money goes directly to the YQCA organization.
- The YQCA program is for youth ages 8–21.
- The online version is broken into age divisions as follows: juniors 8–11, intermediate 12–14, senior 15–18, and young adults 19–21.
- This certification is needed each year with test out options of 1–3 years.
- Youth exhibiting swine at the Illinois State Fair and 4-H shows are no longer required to be PQA plus certified.

QAEC:

For members enrolled in horse, poultry, rabbits, dogs, cats, and small pets.

- The Quality Assurance and Ethics (QAEC) training is required for youth in <u>horses, rabbits</u>, poultry, dogs, and cats.
- You only need to take it once in your lifetime.
- Those who don't complete the training will be removed from the animal science project and will not be eligible to exhibit at the McLean County 4-H Show & Jr. Show. The QAEC training can be accessed year-round in the Clover Academy section of the Zsuite Enrollment System. Zsuite can be accessed at <u>https://4h.zsuite.org/</u>. Families can access directions for completing the course at <u>https://qo.illinois.edu/TakeQAEC</u>.

McLean County Fair's Junior Show Rules and Regulations

Junior Show is overseen by the McLean County Fair Association, and not 4-H Extension.

The McLean County Fair's Junior Show is open to youth who reside in McLean County or belong to a McLean County 4-H Club, and who are 8 years of age and not yet 19 years of age on or before September 1, 2024. Junior Show class numbers can be found in parenthesis immediately following the 4-H Class name. All entries must be made by the exhibitor online at www.mcleancountyfair.org. Premium checks can be picked up the day after the show at the ticket office. Enrolling in the Junior Show does not automatically enter a youth into the 4-H Show. 4-H Show entries must be made by June 15 at http://mclean4-hfair.fairentry.com. Champion Project Awards are awarded by the 4-H Show, youth will not receive these awards if they are only enrolled in the Junior Show division. McLean County Fair has the authority to interpret and make changes to these rules after publication of the show book.

- A. All goats will be checked in at the pens and verified to be in the correct breed classes at that time. Health papers and Mclean County Pride forms will be collected at time of check in.
- B. Animals that are owned must have been on exhibitor's property by June 1 of the current year. If animal is leased, then the lease agreements must be turned in before June 1 of the current year.
- C. Each exhibitor is limited to a maximum of 12 head, with no more than two entries in each class in this section.
- D. NOTE: only one entry will receive a premium per class.
- E. Bucks over the age of 6 months will not be allowed on the grounds.
- F. If any buck, regardless of age, exhibits behavior or temperament that raises safety concerns for show directors or staff, the owner may be required to remove the buck from the premises immediately.
- G. Wethers should show **no** evidence of testicular matter. Wethers will be inspected during check in and any wethers showing evidence of testicular matter will be sent home.
- H. Age of goats is determined by date of show.
- All goats must have permanent, identifying, legible tattoo, tag, or microchip. If microchips are used, exhibitor must provide their own microchip reader. Tattoo, tag or microchip number will be recorded at check-in.

- J. Health regulations as outlined in health rules (page 14) will be strictly enforced. All exhibitors are required to examine their goats, prior to arrival at stands for contagious ailments especially sore mouth, ringworm, and active abscesses. Certificates of Veterinary Inspection are required.
- K. Split classes will be posted before the show. Wether class splits will be determined by weight. Weigh-in date and time will be in the show schedule.
- L. Exhibitors must wear appropriate attire when exhibiting animals. A shirt with sleeves and a collar, or McLean County 4-H T-Shirt tucked in at the waist and closed-toed shoes will constitute appropriate attire. Shorts are not considered appropriate. Failure to conform to this rule will result in dismissal from the show ring at the discretion of the Show Director.
- M. Each exhibitor must be on time in showing their animal. Class shows will not be delayed because of the absence of any exhibitor.
- N. All Boer appearing goats will show in the Boer division.
- O. All livestock exhibitors must complete YQCA. YQCA is for members enrolled in dairy cattle, beef cattle, swine, sheep, and goats. YQCA is a livestock quality assurance program that is replacing PQA. All 4-H exhibitors of these animals will be required to certify in the YQCA program each year. Youth must certify online <u>before June 1st</u> at <u>https://yqcaprogram.org/</u>. This certification is needed each year with a test out option of 1–3 years. Please refer to pages 9–10 for more info.

Master Goat Herdsman Award

- 7. Sign up must be done by end of day Thursday, July 24.
- 8. Participants must wear proper shoes and pants on day of show.

The McLean County Fair Horse Show is not a member of USEF or AQHA; however, this show will use these organization's rulebooks as a GUIDE.

Horses will be categorized as stock and non-stock. Horses do not need to be registered to qualify as stock or non-stock. Stock horses are Quarter, Paint, or Appaloosa-type animals. Non-stock horses are Thoroughbred, Arabian, Morgan, Saddlebred, Tennessee Walkers, Warmbloods, gaited horses, and draft horses.

The Horse Director (after consultation with the county veterinarian), may excuse animals from the fairgrounds if their appearance (overall health and body condition) is not appropriate for exhibition, with additional permission from the Show Committee Chair and Extension County Director. If, after veterinarian examination it is determined that it is in the animal's best interest to not be exhibited (prior to or during the show), the Horse Director MAY allow the horse to be replaced. In addition, training methods and devices, which could be considered inhumane, should not be used during the show week.

<u>Rules</u>:

- A. For the 4-H Show, exhibitors must meet all requirements of annual enrollment by May 1, 2025. Additionally, youth must complete 4-H Show registration on <u>http://</u><u>mclean4- hfair.fairentry.com</u>. County Lease and Ownership forms need to be on file at the McLean Extension Office by June 15, 2025.
- B. NOTE: State Fair Ownership and Lease forms are due to the Extension Office by May 1, 2025.
- C. Each exhibitor is limited to one entry in each eligible class and one halter class per animal.
- D. All exhibitors are permitted to show up to 2 animals. Exhibitors are not allowed to enter more than one animal in each class. The exhibitor must have written documentation providing ownership or lease of the animal being shown.
- E. SHARE LEASING A HORSE: TWO "non-related" exhibitors can share-lease a horse. MORE THAN TWO exhibitors can share-lease a horse if they are siblings OR the lease is approved by the Horse Show Director. Only ONE ownership/lease form needs to be completed on a shared animal. Ownership/Lease forms are due on June 15.
- F. All animals must be stalled individually. (Exception: Miniatures under 38" may be stalled together.)
- G. Special stalling requests must be made to the Horse Director by June 30. 4-H Club Leaders will assist Horse Director with stall assignments within a club. Stalls may not be rearranged outside of club groupings after set-up day. Club leaders are responsible for stall assignments within their group. If a horse is scratched from the show that reserved stall space will be reassigned by the Horse Director at the end of horse check-in. Do not place any tack, bedding, or hay in stalls which are unlabeled or assigned to horses which are not brought to the show. Do NOT move cards once they are stapled. All stalls must be completely cleaned on check-out day.
- H. Exhibitors must have current original or photocopy of negative Coggins Test for each animal at check-in and be kept by the exhibitor at the grounds at all times.
- I. Each horse, pony, mule, or donkey becomes one year older on January 1, regardless of its natural birthdate.

- J. Nofoals or stallions of any age will be allowed on the grounds.
- K. If registration papers are provided, horse shows as "Pure-Bred". A purebred horse with no papers must be shown as "Grade."
- Ponies are categorized as follows: English 58" and under; Western 56" and under. (Ponies are NOT young horses.) Ponies will be measured at check-in. Ponies three years old and under will be measured each year.
- M. Donkeys and mules may be shown in pony or horse classes as qualified.
- N. Exhibitor must lead horse from barn to designated mounting area.
- **O.** The following divisions are offered: English/Dressage, Western, Showmanship, Trail, and Jumping. The following exhibitor levels are used in each division (except jumping):
- P. Exhibitors may show at different levels in each of the five divisions: English/Dressage, Western, Showmanship, Trail, and Jumping, but may NOT show at different levels WITHIN a division (Example: An exhibitor may be a Novice at Showmanship, a Horseman in English, and then could not be a novice in Dressage, as it must match the English Level). An exhibitor who shows at the Walk-Trot level (except trot only jumping, trot barrels, poles, and Texas Rollback) may not enter any other class, game, or division requiring lope, canter, or gait.
 - 1) Walk-Trot (not used in Showmanship division)
 - 2) Novice (has not won two first placings at this level)
 - 3) Horseman/Horsemaster
- Q. Exhibitors may not show in both a Western Pleasure and a Ranch Horse Pleasure class with the same animal.
- **R.** All jumping exhibitors are limited to three jumping classes, i.e., one Hunter over Fences, one Equitation over Fences, and one Hunter Hack.
- Walk-Trot and Novice exhibitors may elect to show holding the reins with two hands, regardless of the age of the horse.
- T. SEI-ASTM labeled approved helmet (inspected at check-in) with harness affixed, will be required for all riders 21 years of age and under. Boots with heels, helmets, and long pants/breeches, will be required for all exhibitors while mounted or driving at any time during the fair. (EXCEPTION: If the horse is being led during costume class, this rule will not apply.)
- **U.** Each horse may only be ridden or worked by that horse's exhibitor or owner, that exhibitor's immediate family, or an adult (over 18 yrs.) instructor or superintendent.
- V. Jump vests are acceptable during any jumping classes.
- W. Each 4-H exhibitor is responsible for keeping their area by their stall neat and clean, including the wash rack after use. No off-rack bathing of animals. Animals must be bathed in designated wash area only. Please keep the wash rack area clean!
- X. Classes may be combined or deleted at Horse Director's discretion.
- Y. All decisions of the judges are final. Questions must be directed to the superintendent in charge that day. They may decide whether to approach the judge with question. Exhibitors and parents should NOT question the judge without the superintendent or Show Director present.
- No bareback or riding double allowed at any time during the fair week. (Unless the gaming superintendent chooses a game requiring it)
- AA. Speed Game Exhibitors must be at the Horseman or Horsemaster level in the English or Western Division.

- **BB.** Speed game participants are to proceed from the warmup area to the show arena, the exhibitor must lead or ride their horse at a WALK. Escort may be used.
- CC. Walk-Trot rule applies to all classes except speed events and jumping.
- DD. All classes (except Game Divisions ex. egg & spoon, costume classes, etc.) are eligible for a Best of Class champion award. Youth must be enrolled in 4-H and registered for the McLean County 4-H Show on <u>http://mclean4-hfair.fairentry.com</u> to receive these awards. Champion Award dollar amounts for division champions are indicated by [4H-CS].
- EE. The online 4-H QAEC is required for all youth who enroll in the following animal science projects: horse, poultry, rabbits, dogs, cats, small pets, and all Animal Science poster projects. Failure to complete QAEC by June 1 will result in the member's animal science project enrollment being canceled and they will be ineligible to exhibit in the McLean County 4-H Show and Illinois State Fair. The QAEC training can now be accessed in the Clover Academy section of the ZSuite Enrollment System. ZSuite can be accessed at https://4h.zsuite.org/. Families can access directions for completing the course at https://qa.illinois.edu/TakeQAEC. The QAEC training is a once in a lifetime training, if you have completed it for all the species that you will show you do not need to take it again.

Sheep Rules

General Sheep Rules:

- A. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to comply with the general health and eligibility rules. Special emphasis will be placed on sore mouth, club lamb fungus, and foot rot. Any sheep, in the opinion of the superintendent, that exhibits these ailments, detected at any time before final placing in the show, will be barred from show and dismissed from the fairgrounds. Exhibitors may have a veterinarian view, at their own expense, any animal for a binding decision on any feared ailment. However, an exhibitor may not delay a show pending a veterinarian inspection. Any exhibitor who fails to have any suspected ailment examined by a veterinarian by show time, waives any right to object to the superintendent's decision at a later time. A county veterinarian will be available during check-in and weigh-in.
- **B.** Exhibitors are allowed to show up to four lambs in the market lamb division, six sheep in the wether-dam division, and 12 sheep (no more than six may be of the same breed) in the breeding sheep division.
- C. If a class has too many exhibitors, it may need to be split. Split classes will be posted before the show.
- D. Exhibitors may participate in both the market lamb and breeding sheep showmanship contests if they exhibited sheep in those respective divisions. Previous first place winners must move up to the next age group; however, prior winners of the 14 and over age group may show in that class again. Entry may be made when making all other show entries or when checking into the ring. All classes will show prior to champion selection. Winners of the age 14 and over age group in both divisions will be nominated for the Showmanship Classic. Additional participants will be selected from the oldest birthdate of the second-place individual from market lamb or breeding sheep showmanship.

- E. All livestock exhibitors showing dairy cattle, beef cattle, swine, sheep, and goats must complete YQCA. Youth must certify online by June 1st. <u>https://yqcaprogram.org/</u>. This certification is needed each year with a test out option of 1-3 years. Please refer to pages 9-10 for more information.
- F. If animal is leased, then the lease agreements must be turned in before June 1st of the current year.

Master Shepherd Award

Rules:

- A. All sheep exhibitors are automatically entered in the Master Shepherd contest.
- B. The judging will be based on the following:
 - 1 This contest has been originated to award the shepherd who is both knowledgeable about their sheep project and displays the sportsmanship and attitude of a true champion. Contestants will be evaluated on the following criteria:
 - a. 35% on an informal interview concerning knowledge of sheep project, approved health practices, and lessons learned from project.
 - b. 25% on time spent in sheep barn.
 - c. 25% for participation in all sheep activities.
 - d. 15% on show-ring presence, assistance to other exhibitors, and assistance to show personnel.
 - e. All contestants assisting with fair set-up will receive a 10% bonus in competition points.
- C. Interviews will be conducted at 1 p.m. on date assigned by a panel of three judges, in the Sheep Barn.
- D. A senior and junior division master shepherd will be selected. Division will be by age.

Shearing and Trimming Contest

The shearing and trimming contest is to prepare an animal to show during the 60 minutes provided. Participants are to bring their own sheep and it is to be washed prior to the contest. Wool breeds that do not ordinarily exhibit washed, need only to be cleaned to the extent that the exhibitor would prepare for show. Participants may either shear a lamb for market exhibition or may trim a sheep for breeding exhibition, but not both.

- N. Each exhibitor may show only two entries in each single class and one pair of lambs per breed. Note: only one entry will receive a premium per class.
- **O.** Show order will be posted on activity board in sheep barn.

- **6** The object of leadline is to present a class of well-groomed sheep led by 4-H members clad in fashionable and becoming wool garments.
- 7. Leadline garments must be wool or a blend of not less than 50 percent wool. Garment can be purchased or made. If the garment contains less than 50 percent wool, the score for that section will not be included in the total points. Contestants will be penalized for not meeting the requirements. Decorations on sheep are encouraged.
- 8 Leadline placing based on the garment, showmanship, and poise. A general knowledge question about sheep and/or wool will be asked.
- 9. Costume class is open to any 4-H member and not limited to sheep exhibitors. The costume class will be judged on attractiveness, originality, theme, and manner in which sheep and sheep products are used in the theme. A live sheep must be part of the presentation. Theme should promote wool and lambs.

Gilt Show Market Barrow Show

Rules:

A. Each exhibitor is limited to four single barrows and four single gilts. These can be shown as two gilt pairs and two barrow pairs of any breed or crossbred for a maximum of four barrows and four gilts. Barrows must be farrowed on or after January 1, 2025. Gilts must be farrowed on or after January 1, 2025. Pair animals cannot be shown in a pair unless shown as a single and must be the same breed. Families cannot pair pigs to show for pairs.

B. Registration papers will be checked for purebred gilts during check-in. All barrows and crossbred gilts will be divided into weight classes based on the exhibitors declared weight for each animal. Divisions will be determined after all swine are checked in and will be posted the evening prior to the show.

C. Each member will be responsible for checking in their swine and should have all required health papers/registration papers to present when checking in their swine.

D. Gilts cannot be shown in the market barrow classes.

E. Each Exhibitor must show their own animals.

F. All swine must be ear notched with a completely healed ear. Ear notches must be listed by veterinarian on CVI (Health Papers). Notches of purebred barrows and gilts must conform to the requirements of the breed associations. Ear notches MUST match the entries that were made on fairentry.com. Each exhibitor is limited to 20 barrows and 20 gilts for nominations.

G. All animals must be owned by June 1, 2025. All purebred swine must have individual

registration papers and must be presented to certify breed. All registration papers must bear the ear mark of each pig. These marks must be the same as those on the pig and on the fair entry nomination form.

H. All first-place winners will show for breed champion. Breed champions will show for Grand Champion through a Top 5 selection.

I. Exhibits must conform to Exhibition Livestock Health Requirements.

K. If you have multiple pigs showing in the same breed, there should be multiple entries listed

for each class. Classes split into multiple sub-classes will be posted before the show.

L. Youth are only eligible for Jr. Show Premiums if they register, in advance, for the McLean County Fair Junior Show. Likewise, youth are only eligible for 4-H awards if they are active members of the McLean County 4-H and have signed up to exhibit swine at the McLean County 4-H Show on fairentry.com. For more information about the Junior Show and 4-H Livestock Show Rules and Regulations please see the beginning of the show book.

M. All Exhibitors are expected to help with set up day on the Saturday before beginning at 8 am. N. Each youth will be asked to pay a \$5.00 fee per entry to cover tear down costs (from Farm Bureau)

O. All livestock exhibitors must complete YQCA. YQCA is for members enrolled in dairy

cattle, beef cattle, swine, sheep, and goats. All 4-H exhibitors of these animals will be required to certify in the YQCA program each year. Youth must certify online by June 1. https:// yqcaprogram.org/. This certification is needed each year with a test out option of 1–3 years.

2025 State Fair Requirements

- 1. To be eligible for nomination as a delegate, projects must have an "A" rating and be present for judging at the McLean County 4-H Show.
- County 4-H members are allowed one Illinois State Fair exhibit due to the limited entries allowed per county. All 4-H members nominated as a delegate in more than one project will select one project to exhibit at the Illinois State Fair.
- Exhibitors MUST notify the Extension office that they will be taking their project to State Fair by 4:30 p.m. on Friday and attend a State Fair Q & A Session. Sessions will be announced at a later date to be aware of eligibility requirements.
- 4. All projects that are selected at the county level must be the one exhibited at the State Fair, adjusted for state fair requirements. Modifications can be made to the original county exhibit to 1) meet state fair requirements, and 2) to incorporate suggested improvements made by a local judge.
- 5. All 4-Hmembersselected for State Fair exhibition will participate in conference judging and/or action-oriented presentations. The exhibitor will be responsible to transport their own exhibit to and from the Illinois State Fair on the appropriate judging day. McLean County's projects will be judged at the state fair on Sunday, August 10.
- 6. If a 4-H member selected as a state fair delegate knows that they are not able to participate at the state fair, it is important to contact the Extension staff at the 4-H Fair office ASAP and no later than 4:30 p.m. on Friday, so alternates can be contacted.
- State fair eligible projects are noted by a class number following the class name. (Ex. Animal Science – (50135) and those not eligible for state fair are clearly marked as a McLean County Project.

Copyright Rules

- 1. When an author, musician, designer, or artist creates something, it is immediately protected by copyright or trademark laws and other people cannot use it or create something similar. Original works such as stories, music, pictures, plays, dances, sculpture, movies, and architecture are protected. 4-H members should use caution when working on a speech, display, or exhibit so you do not use something that does not belong to you.
- 2. 4-H members can't draw or copy someone else's design, logo, words, or music without the permission of the original owner. That means, you can't draw a logo (such as Ford or John Deere) and use it on your exhibit. You can't create Mickey Mouse ears on your cake. You can't draw a Disney princess. You can't put SpongeBob image on your natural resource project exhibit board.
 - a <u>Exception</u>: If you do purchase an item that is already made, that is okay to include. For example: If you buy a package of Mickey Mouse stickers and use those in your scrapbook, that is okay because the company who produced those stickers already signed a licensing agreement with Disney to reproduce those images.
- 3. Think of it like this. You would not take your neighbor's bike and ride it around to make your life easier without getting permission first. That would be stealing. When you take words, art, graphics, or photographs that are not yours but use them like they are, that's stealing, too. Copying them from the internet is the same as stealing them unless you are using a site specifically created for free use of images.
- 4. All projects that use copyrighted materials are ineligible for premiums.

For more information on what is allowed, contact your local 4-H staff to ensure we are all respecting the rights of others.

CLOVER USAGE:

- Copyright Reminder: It is illegal for youth to use an image or brand that someone else owns as part of their 4-H project exhibit without the permission of the copyright/trademark holder.
- Copyrighted or trademarked designs are not acceptable; this includes team logos, school logos, and/or characters from television, movies such as Disney characters, Iron Man etc.
- More details in the new "Copyright Guidelines Tipsheet: go.illinois.edu/II4HCopyrightGuidelines.
- 8. Use of the 4-H Name and Emblem: Chartered 4-H Clubs and enrolled 4-H members are authorized to use the 4-H Name and Emblem. This includes permission for an enrolled 4-H member to use the 4-H name and emblem in exhibits you create for personal use as part of 4-H sponsored events. This includes 4-H decorated cookies, a 4-H Clover printed out for use in a scrapbook, etc.
- 9. Please note: Any use of the 4-H name and emblem on items intended as gifts or for sale require prior permission using this <u>UNIVERSITY AGREEMENT</u>. This should be signed by the County Director. Any uses of the 4-H name and emblem for sale or promotion online, and/or in statewide events should be signed by the Illinois 4-H Director (illinois4H@illinois.edu).
- **10.** Use of the green clover shaped image is not protected. The 4-H Emblem is distinguished by the four H's that signify Head, Heart, Hands, and Health. No creative rendering, changing in color or shape of the official 4-H emblem is allowed.

McLean County Rules:

1. Judging and Conference Attendance

All 4-H exhibitors are required to attend their scheduled conference judging session.

2. Fair Focus

This fair is designed to highlight the achievements and efforts of the 4-H exhibitors. All activities, events, and decisions should reflect the commitment and hard work of the youth participants.

3. Appropriate Attire

Proper and appropriate attire is expected for all 4-Hers and their families while attending the McLean County 4-H Fair. Failure to comply with the dress code may result in dismissal from the event.

4. Behavior Expectations

Yelling, foul language, or any form of disrespectful behavior toward staff, volunteers, or other 4-H families will not be tolerated. Violation of this rule may result in immediate dismissal from the 4-H Fair.

5. Finalized Ratings

Once judging is complete, all ratings are considered final and may not be appealed.

6. Judging Sheets Confidentiality

Judging sheets are to be placed in an enclosed envelope. Only the 4-H exhibitor and their immediate family are permitted to open the envelope containing their individual project's judging results. Failure to comply with this rule will result in dismissal from the 4-H Show.

These rules are designed to ensure fairness, respect, and integrity for all participants. Thank you for your cooperation and dedication to making the McLean County 4-H Fair a successful and enjoyable experience for everyone involved.

State Fair Eligible Classes:

Model Rocketry (50130)

(Open to youth in Aerospace 1, Aerospace 2, Aerospace 3, and Aerospace 4)

- A. Exhibit one flyable model rocket that may be a kit or scratch built. Engine must not be installed UNLESS: It is already spent (used) AND is required to hold the stages of a multi-stage rocket together. Kits should have balsa, plywood, or cardstock fins. Plastic fins allowed only IF:
 - 1. Made of clear plastic to maintain appearance on scale model kits OR
 - 2. 3D printed or cut from stock for a scratch-built project.
- B. Provide printed directions for construction of the rocket with your project (kit or scratch built) in an envelope with your name on it.
- C. The judge will hold a postjudging critique session immediately after the judging.

Sub-Classes:

Model Rocketry, Class 1: Ages 8–9 Model Rocketry, Class 2: Ages 10–11 Model Rocketry, Class 3: Ages 12–14 Model Rocketry, Class 4: Ages 15+

There is a rocket launch open to all 4-H members on Saturday at 1 p.m., weather permitting. You may launch your display rocket or a different one. More information will be available at check-in.

Aerospace Display (50131) (Open to youth in Aerospace 1, Aerospace 2, Aerospace 3, and Aerospace 4)

- A. Any exhibit related to aerospace that does not fit into any other class.
- B. The exhibit may include, but is not limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you have learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period. If the exhibit is a poster or display it must follow size restrictions on page 6.
- C. Include an explanation of the exhibit for public understanding with explanation mounted directly on the exhibit.
- D. Conference judging will be scheduled at check-in.

Sub-Classes:

Aerospace Display, Class 1: Ages 8–11 Aerospace Display, Class 2: Ages 12–14 Aerospace Display, Class 3: Ages 15+

McLean County Projects Only:

Kites (Not State Fair Eligible)

- A. A member may enter either or both classes in their age category for a total of two kites.
- B. Exhibit should be a handmade kite, not a kit, in good flying condition.
- C. The exhibit will be a static display.
- D. Conference judging will be scheduled at check-in.

Detailed instructions on how to build the kite for the Diamond, Nagasaki Hata Fighter, and Brouhaha Box kites are in your project book. Members are encouraged to use creativity with the colors and materials used to create the sail and tail if applicable.

- A. Exhibit one balsa wood model airplane in good flying condition.
- B. Airplanes should be the balsa and fabric type (tissue, polyester) and maybe either a kit or scratch built.
- C. Exhibit will be a static display and will not be flown.
- D. Conference judging will be scheduled at check-in. Members should bring the printed directions for construction of the plane, if applicable.
- E. Suggested projects range from beginner balsa and tissue models to advanced R/C models.

State Fair Eligible Classes:

Prepare a display focusing on any activity related to an animal project. Demonstrate the skills and knowledge you have gained through the animal project you studied. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period. Live animals are not permitted as exhibits in this area. For safety reasons, exhibits cannot include glass, syringes with needles, or any other sharp objects.

Animal Science 1 (50133a) For youth enrolled in this project 1–2 years.

Animal Science 2 (50133b) For youth enrolled in this project 3 or more years.

Babysitting

Check-in from 5:30–7 p.m. on Tuesday, July 22. Judged at 8:30 a.m. Wednesday, July 23. Member will be present for judging.

State Fair Eligible Classes:

Babysitting Display (50141a)

Prepare a display that demonstrates the skills and knowledge you have gained studying babysitting. Topics might include, but are not limited to, selecting age-appropriate toys and activities, explaining child behavior, or recognizing child safety concerns. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters that you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period. For safety reasons, exhibits cannot include glass, syringes with needles or any other sharp objects.

Babysitting Video Tutorial (50141b)

Create a short (1–5 minute) tutorial video intended for internet publishing that teaches the general public about a topic you learned about in your project learning. Topics for the tutorial video might include, but are not limited to, preparing healthy snacks for kids, looking for hazards in the home, things to avoid when selecting toys for kids, age-appropriate games or activities to use when babysitting, how to change a diaper, basic child first aid, etc.

As part of the video, youth must cite the sources of the information they present (either vocally or on screen as text). Videos should not include video or photo content not recorded by the 4-H'er. Videos should not promote any products and should follow all copyright guidelines. Videos in this category will be judged on the quality and accuracy of the information shared, as well as clarity of presentation, and how engaging they are to a general audience (not on filmmaking techniques).

Youth should have a signed model release for anyone appearing in the video besides themselves, and those should be brought to judging. Forms are available at <u>go.illinois.edu/modelrelease</u>.

You must furnish any equipment you need to show your video to the judge (laptop, tablet, etc.). Internet service is not guaranteed, so please have a hard copy of the video downloaded to your device to play. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period. All Exhibitors should also bring a copy of their video to be judged on a USB flash drive and saved in .MP4 format as a backup. In order for something to be on display at your local fair or show, fill out the video information sheet and bring it with you to judging: go.illinois.edu/4HBabysittingVideo. Note: While exhibitors are encouraged to post their video on www.YouTube.com in advance of the fair, they are not required to do so. If they choose to upload to YouTube they may choose whether to make the video "public" (the video is searchable on the site), or "public, unlisted" (someone must have the link to view it). This will allow fairgoers to view the exhibits on display. Youth ages 13 to 17 should only be posting content to the internet with parental permission. Youth under 13 would need their parents to post the video for them.

Bicycle Safety Rodeo (Not State Fair Eligible)

Member will be present for judging.

Rules:

- 1. Bicycles must be owned by the participants. Helmets and safe clothing/closed-toe shoes are required while participating.
- Placing for each class will be determined by scores on riding events, bicycle inspection (a bell or horn is required by the Illinois Bicycle Rules of the Road), and a written test taken from the appropriate project manual. (If you did not receive a copy of the Illinois Bicycle Rules of the Road with your project manual, ask for one at the Extension office.)
- 3. Bicycles will remain on the grounds only for the duration of the bicycle rodeo. Bicycles are not permitted on the grounds at any other time.
- Classes: Bicycle I, Ages 8–12 (NotState Fair Eligible)

Bicycle II, Ages 13 + (Not State Fair Eligible)

Cats (Not State Fair Eligible)

Rules:

- The online 4-H Quality Assurance and Ethics Certification is required for all youth enrolled in cats. Failure to complete QAEC by June 1st will result in the member being ineligible to exhibit in the McLean County 4-H Show. This is a one-time training, once a 4-H member has completed it for any species (ex. horses, swine, dogs, poultry, etc.) they do not need to complete it again. The QAEC training can now be accessed in the Clover Academy section of the ZSuite Enrollment System. ZSuite can be accessed at https://4h.zsuite.org/. Families can access directions for completing the course at https://go.illinois.edu/TakeQAEC.
- 2. Owners must show current certificate of rabies vaccination on day of show. Unhealthy cats are not allowed to show.
- 3. Limited to one cat or kitten.
- 4. Exhibitor must be in control and care for cat for duration of show.
- 5. Registered and Domestic cats/kittens will show in the same class.
- 6. To enroll in a cat sub-class the animal must be 8 months of age or older. To enroll in the kitten sub-class the animal must be 4 to 7 months old.
- 7. Judging may run ahead of show book schedule below.

Civic Engagement 2 (50146) Citizenship: Level 2 – My Neighborhood – Required Exhibit a display illustrating one of the following options: 1) your neighborhood; 2) how you were a good neighbor or led a service project for your community; OR 3) a Citizenship Challenge that you helped organize and lead (see the project book for details).

Civic Engagement 3 (50147) Citizenship: Level 3 – My Community and Me – Required Exhibit a display illustrating one of the activities that you completed within your project as it relates to one of the following categories in the manual: 1) Government; 2) Business and Industry; 3) Transportation, Communication & Utilities; 4) Culture & Heritage; 5) Natural Resources & Environment; 6) Education; 7) Organizations within your community; 8) Tourism; OR 9) Support Systems within your community.

Civic Engagement Group Exhibit (50148):

Open to clubs and groups whose members are enrolled in any Civic Engagement project Exhibit a display illustrating how your group led a service project in your community. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period. The display must be accompanied by no more than 10 4-H members at the time of the judge's critique. Group members should make a 5 to 10-minute presentation to the judge. All group members present for the judge's critique should be able to discuss the project and answer questions. Only group members present for judging who participate in the actual critique and presentation are eligible for ribbons and premiums.



Clothing & Textiles

Member will be present for judging.

Director.....Jeanne Parks Rules:

- 1. Failure to meet requirements will result in lowering of placing by one grade.
- Member will be present for judging and should bring pattern and instructions and all accessories worn with garment at the time of judging. Garments will be judged on the hanger first, then on the exhibitor with all accessories. Except in Shopping in Style classes when garment(s) and all accessories will be judged ON exhibitor.
- 3. Members may enter one sewn clothing project, AND one sewn non-clothing project, AND one non-sewn project within their level. You may repeat any division any number of years.
- It is recommended that exhibitors complete STEAM levels in sequence, as each level introduces different sewing techniques that build on each other.
- 5. Exhibitors may have instruction and guidance when constructing exhibits, but exhibitor must do the actual work themselves.

State Fair Eligible Classes:

Costume Design & Clothing Embellishment

All exhibits entered in the Costume Design & Clothing Embellishment projects will be judged based on their creativity, planning, and execution. Exhibitors bringing garments should not wear their garments when they arrive for judging. The garment will be reviewed by the judges for construction first. Exhibitors will be asked to change into the garment as the second step of the judging process. If the garment was created for another individual, that person can come to judging to model the outfit, or photos of that person in the outfit can be supplied. (Only the exhibitor who made the garment is eligible for ribbon and premium.) If a pattern was used to make the item, the pattern instructions, either written or electronic, are to be included with the exhibit. Exhibit tags should be attached to the garment (preferably with a safety pin and string), not to the hanger. Garments may be worn before exhibiting but should be in good, clean condition. Both projects require youth to complete a project workbook and bring it to judging.

All clothing projects in these categories should follow copyright guidelines. See project resource guides for additional details.

Costume design members wishing to be judged primarily on the sewing construction techniques and fit of their costume should consider entering the Sewing projects instead of costume design. The level to be entered will depend on the sewing techniques used.

Costume Design

Check-in from 5:30-7 p.m. on Tuesday, July 22. Judged at 12:30 p.m. Wednesday, July 23

Costume Design Workbook – Required

Exhibit one costume, created by the member. The costume may contain multiple items. The costume may include supporting accessory pieces (shoes, jewelry, hats, etc.) that complete the look. Accessory items will not remain on display. If the member created any prop weapons as part of their costume (e.g. swords, firearms, bows, etc.) they may not bring them to judging. Those props can be included in the photographs of the completed look in the Illinois 4-H Costume Design Workbook. Bring a completed copy of the Costume Design Workbook (go.illinois.edu/4HCostumeWorkbook) to show your project journey. Youth should enter the class that aligns with their experience with costume design in any form (including outside of 4-H).

Costume Design Beginner (50157a) – For members with 2 or less years of experience in costume design (including this year)

Costume Design Advanced (50157b)– For members with 3 or more years of experience in costume design (including this year)

Clothing Embellishment

Check-in from 5:30-7 p.m. on Tuesday, July 22. Judged at 12:30 p.m. Wednesday, July 23

Clothing Embellishment Workbook – Required

Exhibit one look or outfit, consisting of no more than three coordinated pieces that have been embellished with 1 or more clothing embellishment techniques. Bring a completed copy of the Clothing Embellishment workbook (<u>go.illinois.edu/4HEmbellishmentWorkbook</u>) to show your project journey. No accessory items (such as shoes, jewelry, hats, etc.) should be brought to judging (they can instead be used in the final look photos in the project workbook). Youth should enter the class that aligns with the technique(s) used in their outfit).

Classes:

Clothing Embellishment Applied (50158a)

Decoration is attached by gluing, fusing, or painting. Examples: jewels, puff paints, appliqués, tie dye.

Clothing Embellishment Stitched (50158b)

Decoration is hand or machine-stitched. Examples: machine or hand sewing, such as adding a collar or skirt, appliqué, satin stitch, embroidery, quilting, beading, knitting or crochet (4-H'er does not need to create the knit or crochet piece themselves, it could be purchased or made by others but attached by the 4-H'er).

Clothing Embellishment Combination (50158c)

Decoration includes any combination of both applied and stitched techniques across the outfit.

Sewing1 – FUNdamentals

STEAM Clothing 1: FUNdamentals – Required

Check-in from 5:30-7 p.m. on Tuesday, July 22. Judged at 12:30 p.m. Wednesday, July 23.

For Sewing 1, members may enter one sewn project, one sewn non-clothing project, and one non-sewn project within their level.

Non-Sewn Exhibits (50151a) Exhibit one of the following:

<u>Clothing Portfolio</u> – Complete at least three different samples/activities from Chapter 2 and/or Chapter 3 of the project manual. Examples of samples you might include How Two Magically Become One, pages 85-86; No Fear of Fray, pages 93-95; Two Sides of the Moon, pages 97-99; On the Flip Side, pages 101-104; Basic Hand Sewing Skills, pages 106-108. The Portfolio should be placed in an 8 ½" x 11", 3 ring binder. Include an appropriate cover, dividers, and table of contents. Note: Additional pages can be added each year but must be dated with the year. See pages 9–10 of the project manual for portfolio formatting. <u>Fabric Textile Scrapbook</u> – Must include at least 5 different textile samples. Use Textile Information Cards template on page 41 in the project manual to identify fabric swatches. Completed textile cards should be placed in an 8 ½" x 11", 3-ring binder. Include an appropriate cover. See project manual, pages 42–74, for fabric options and fabric science experiments.

What's the Difference – What's the Price Point – Exhibit may include a notebook, poster, small display sharing a project comparison and price point. See activity, pages 118–120. Exhibit should include PHOTOS; NO actual PILLOWS.

Sewn Non-Clothing Exhibits (50151b) Exhibit one of the following:

- Pillowcase
- Simple Pillow—no larger than 18" x 18"
- Bag/Purse—no zippers or buttonholes
- Other non-clothing item using skills learned in project manual

Sewn Clothing Exhibits (50151c) Exhibit one of the following:

- Simple top
- Simple pants, shorts, or skirt—no zipper or buttonholes
- Simple Dress—no zipper or buttonholes
- Other—other wearable item using skills learned in project manual (apron, vest, etc.)

Beginning Sewing Exhibits—exhibits in Sewing 1 must be made from medium weight woven fabrics that will sew and press smoothly, flannel/fleece is acceptable. Solid color fabrics or those having an overall print are acceptable. We strongly advise youth do not select fabrics with plaid or stripe patterns as judges will expect stripes to match at seams, which is a more advanced-level skill. NO NAPPED or JERSEY KNIT fabric. Patterns should be simple WITHOUT DARTS, SET-IN SLEEVES, and COLLARS. Raglan and loose flowing sleeves are acceptable.

*Bring on a hanger, in a clear garment bag.

Sewing 2 - Simply Sewing

STEAM Clothing 2: Simply Sewing – Required

Check-in from 5:30-7 p.m. on Tuesday, July 22. Judged at 12:30 p.m. Wednesday, July 23.

For Sewing 2, members may enter one sewn clothing project, one sewn non-clothing project, and one non-sewn project within their level.

Non-Sewn Exhibits (50152a) Exhibit one of the following:

- <u>Clothing Portfolio</u> Complete at least four different samples/activities from Chapters 2, 3 AND/OR 4 of the project manual. The Portfolio should be placed in an 8 ½" x 11", 3 ring binder. Include an appropriate cover, dividers, and table of contents. Note: This can be a continuation of a Portfolio created in Sewing 1. Additional pages can be added each year but must be dated with the year created. See project manual, pages 9–11, for portfolio formatting.
- <u>Expanded Textile Science Scrapbook</u> Must include at least 10 different textile samples. Use Textile Information Cards template on page 39 in the project manual to identify fabric swatches. Completed textile cards should be placed in an 8 ½" x 11", 3 ring binder. Include an appropriate cover. See project manual, pages 40–82, for fabric science experiments.
- <u>Design Basics</u> Understanding Design Principles Exhibit should include a learning experience that demonstrates the design principles and elements involved when selecting fabric for clothing and accessories. See project manual, pages 17–20, for design suggestions.

<u>Entrepreneurial Sewing</u> – Exhibit should highlight items you made for sale online. Create an
exhibit that displays products you made and posted online. Refer to the project manual, pages
161–167, for information on how to analyze the cost of similar purchased items to determine
pricing of your products. The exhibit may be a notebook, poster or small display.

- F. Gallon classes must place name of exhibitor on the bottom of the jar on the inside.
- G Must be competing in corresponding gallon classes to enter live plants (except for first year exhibitors).

Exhibitors must include the following information in their crop records:

- 1. Planting date
- 2. Population of the area the plant was taken from
- 3. Row spacing
- 4. Relative maturity of the variety
- 5. Best feature of your plant/Worst feature of your plant

Note: The use of $4" \times 6"$ cards is no longer required. All information must be documented directly in the crop records.

This class will be judged on the following criteria:

- 1. Uniformity-the individual plants should be "mirror" image
- 2. Health
- 3. Yield Potential

Exhibit one gallon of the current year's crop of oats, wheat, rye, or barley that is representative of the member's 4-H project field; **OR** exhibit an experimental or educational project related to one experience from your project. Include explanation of the project in a report for public understanding. Include the member's crop records with the exhibit, such as the 4-H crop record found online at <u>4-H.illinois.edu</u>, an FFA crops record, or similar information.

Crops Innovation Class (50173) Open to youth enrolled in any Crops project

Demonstrate the skills and knowledge you have gained through the Crops project. This could be related to, but not limited to crop production, crop utilization or topics of interest to the member related to agronomy. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. Your exhibit should not fit in the other exhibit options for this project. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

McLean County Projects Only:

Department Dogs Rules: (The following rules apply to all dog classes)

- A. All McLean County Fair & 4-H Show Rules and Regulations and General Livestock Rules and Regulations apply to all dog classes.
- B. Dogs must be under the supervision of the exhibitor at all times, either on leash (max. 6 foot long) or crated and must not be taken near livestock buildings.
- C. <u>Dogs must have CURRENT CERTIFICATE OF RABIES VACCINATION on day of show.</u> <u>Certificate MUST include positive identification of the dog to be shown.</u>
- D. Dogs must have proof of certification in AKC Canine Good Citizen on day of show to count as 5 tricks for the tricks classes and/or to participate in obedience classes if they are new to obedience.
- E. Dogs showing in agility mustbe one year of age or older. For all other classes, dogs must be six months of age or older.
- F. Dogs must be cared for, trained by, and belong to the exhibitor or to a member of their immediate family. The dog may be leased, if trained by and cared for by the leasing exhibitor for the length of the project. A signed lease agreement form must be on file with the local Extension office by June 1 of the current year. Note: No leased dogs may be used in Conformation classes.
- G. Female dogs in season or lactating are ineligible to compete.
- H. The online 4-H Quality Assurance and Ethics Certification is required for all youth enrolled in dogs. Failure to complete QAEC by June 1 will result in the member being ineligible to exhibit in the McLean County and Illinois State Fair. This is a one-time training. Once a 4-H member has completed it for any species (ex. horses, swine, dogs, poultry, etc.) they do not need to complete it again. - I. Dogs will remain on the grounds during the dog show and be sent home afterward.
- J. Waste management: Anyone not cleaning up after their dog will be excused from the show. Cleaning supplies and disposal containers are available at various locations around the showgrounds.
- K. Check-in will begin at 8 a.m. for agility. Check-in for all other classes will begin at 9 a.m. Please check-in a minimum of 30 minutes prior to the start of your class. Class start times are approximate; classes may start early if all participants are present or may be running behind due to unforeseen circumstances; listen for announcements on the day of the show. What's happening in each ring will be posted, so that you can be prepared for your class.

- L. A dog that shows viciousness toward its handler, judge, people or other dogs (growling or biting) may be released from competition for the remainder of the day at the discretion of the superintendents or Show Director. Dogs exhibiting this behavior in the ring will be released from the ring by the judge with a "C" rating. General Livestock Rules and Regulations apply.
- M. Exhibitors should wear proper show attire for the classes they are exhibiting in. General Livestock Rules and Regulations and regulations for attire apply for all classes unless exceptions are listed.
- N. All participants must use appropriate show equipment as indicated for each class. Acceptable leashes are a maximum of 6 ft. (can be shorter in advanced classes) of leather, nylon, or canvas. No prong or electronic collars will be allowed on the grounds. No tags on collars used in the show ring. Acceptable collars are martingales or flat buckles. Retractable, stretchable, or chain leashes, along with harness or other training aids such as gentle leader are not acceptable show equipment.
- O. No treats, training aids, or toys are permitted in the ring, except for Conformation, Showmanship, Costume, Tricks Novice and Tricks Intermediate Classes.
- P. Dog's may be called back into the ring for a runoff to break a tied score.
- Q. Mandatory Good Canine Citizen Certification Test.

Dog Agility

Agility Rules in addition to the Department Dog Rules

- R. Exhibitors must use proper show equipment. Only quick-clip or buckle collars without tags will be allowed for Agility. Leashes may be used for beginners and tab leashes may be used for all other classes. Superintendents will inspect all equipment prior to beginning the show and may modify the requirements to the extent necessary to eliminate any piece of unsafe equipment.
- S. In addition to the General Livestock Rules and Regulations, athletic shoes will be required for safety. Shorts and skirts that are not shorter than 2" above the knee are permitted for agility.
- T. Exhibitors are limited to a maximum of three dogs.
- U. Dogs must have CURRENT CERTIFICATE OF RABIES VACCINATION on day of show.
- V. The course will consist of American Kennel Club (AKC) and United Kennel Club (UKC) approved obstacles. A list of obstacles may be viewed at www.akc.org/sports/agility and <u>https://www.ukcdogs.com/agility-forms-rules</u>. All equipment is sized appropriately for space and safety. Course maps are provided at check-in, walk-throughs and judge's instructions will be prior to the start of competition. The classes will be divided by height of dog and experience level of dog/handler team. The exhibitor must discuss any exceptions (height, weight, senior dog (7+years), medical (bring note from vet)) with a superintendent at check-in. The superintendent will measure the dogs and will have the ability to adjust entries for the proper dog size, experience level or exceptions.
- W. There will be two height divisions. Small dogs—dog measuring 16" tall or under at the shoulder. (Dogs jump 4" or 8") Large dogs—dogs measuring over 16" tall at the shoulder. (Dogs jump 12" or 16").
- X. Experience levels are defined as followed:

Beginner - Dog is new to agility. Beginners will run the course on a full 6' leash.

Intermediate — Dog has some experience with agility but needs experience with running course off-leash. Course is run off-leash, but with a tab lead. Excessive use of tab will be penalized.

Advanced — Dog is experienced in agility. Course is run off-leash without touching the dog. Tab lead may be on dog's collar during run, but any use or contact with dog will be penalized. Dogs may run without a collar.

Y. Exhibitors will be judged using various criteria including, time for the run and proper execution of each obstacle on the course. Performance faults include actual negotiation of obstacles and ability to stay on course. Three attempts will be allowed to complete each obstacle. Each obstacle is worth 15 points. Each failed attempt or fault will be a 5-point deduction. Disqualifications include eliminating on the course, aggressive behavior, or being out of ring.

AKC Canine Good Citizen (CGC)

AKC CGC Rules in addition to the Department Dog Rules:

- B. Class can be completed prior to the fair. Contact the Extension office for details.
- C. Dogs must have CURRENT CERTIFICATE OF RABIES VACCINATION on day of the show.

Canine Good Citizen (CGC)*: To pass, the dog must complete a series of 10 skills that teach good manners to the dogs and responsible dog ownership to their owners. Those skills are the following: accepts a friendly stranger, sits politely for petting, appearance and grooming, out for a walk, walking through a crowd, sit, down, and stay in place, coming when called, Reaction to another dog, reaction to distractions and supervised separation.

Obedience

Dog Obedience Rules in addition to the Department Dog Rules:

- A. Exhibitors are limited to two entries in obedience classes (must be two different dogs).
 - All beginning level classes will use on leash heeling exercises (Beginner Novice 1 and 2).
 - All intermediate level classes will use on and off lead heeling exercises. (Preferred—Novice & Novice)
 - All advanced classes will use novice off lead heeling exercises.
- B. A run-off will be held in case of a tie for total score.
- C. In most classes, commands/signals given by handler will be <u>either</u> voice or hand, but not both.
- D. Dogs must have CURRENT CERTIFICATE OF RABIES VACCINATION on day of the show.
- E. Dogs must have proof of AKC Canine Good Citizen Certificate on day of show, if new to obedience.

Classes:

An exhibitor can compete multiple years in classes marked with an asterisk(*), <u>if they did not</u> receive a qualifying score in the prior year for that class.

- Beginner Novice 1 (50401): (For inexperienced handlers and inexperienced dogs) Heel on leash with posted signs, Figure 8 on leash, Sit for exam on leash, Sit-Stay (walk around ring), and Recall off leash front only/no finish.
- Beginner Novice 2 (50402)*: (For experienced handlers and inexperienced dogs OR experienced dogs and inexperienced handlers OR didn't receive a qualifying score in Beginner Novice 1 or 2) Heel on leash with posted signs, Figure 8 on leash, Sit for exam on leash, Sit-Stay (walk around ring), Recall off leash front only/no finish.
- Preferred—Novice (50403)*: Heel on leash and Figure 8. Off lead: Stand for examination, Heel free, recall with finish, Sit or Down-Stay (walk around ring), Sit-Stay-Get your leash.

Novice (50404)*: Heel on leash and Figure 8 on leash. Off lead: Stand for examination, heel free, recall, Sit-Stay-Get your leash, Group Exercise – Sit & down Stay (On Leash) Graduate Novice (50405)*: Heel Free and Figure 8 off leash, Drop on Recall, Dumbbell Recall, Dumbbell Recall over high jump, Recall over broad jump, Stay-Get your leash (Sit, Down)

Advanced level of training*: Preferred Open, Open, Graduate Open, Preferred Utility or Utility as needed. Contact the Show Director for information on these classes.

Rally Obedience

Rally Obedience Rules in addition to the Department Dog Rules:

- A. Dogs must have CURRENT CERTIFICATE OF RABIES VACCINATION on day of show.
- B. Dogs may compete in each class for multiple years but must advance after receiving 3 qualifying scores.
- C. The event will be timed. In the event of a tie score, the fastest time will break the tie.
- D. Unless otherwise noted, handler may speak to the dog, pat their leg, or clap their hands to encourage.
- E. Exhibitors are limited to two entries in Rally Obedience classes (must be two different dogs).

- **Rally Novice**: 10–15 signs are used (not including start and finish). 3–7 of the signs must be "stationary" signs. Performed on leash.
- **Rally Intermediate**: 12–17 signs are used (not including start and finish). 3–7 of the signs must be "stationary" signs. At least 3 "advanced" signs. Performed on leash.
- Rally Advanced: 12–17 signs are used (not including start and finish). 3–7 of the signs must be "stationary" signs. At least 3 "advanced" signs. Dog must jump once. Performed Off-leash.
- **Rally Excellent**: 15–20 signs are used (not including start, finish, or call marker). Dog must jump twice. 2 or more of the signs must be "advanced" signs. 3 or more of the signs must be "excellent" signs. Must include a "Sit Stay" sign. Performed off leash. Cannot pat leg or clap hands for encouragement.

Conformation

Conformation Rules in addition to the Department Dog Rules

- D. Exhibitors are limited to one entry in Conformation classes. Dogs must have CURRENT CERTIFICATE OF RABIES VACCINATION on day of show.
- E. For Registered dog class—only original registration papers (no copies) must be shown to the superintendent at check-in. If the exhibitor's name or a name of their family member does not appear on the papers, the dog will be ineligible and will be moved to the non-registered class. All registration papers must show ownership by June 1 of the current year.
- F. In addition to the Livestock Rules and Regulations, skirts that are not shorter than 2" above the knee are permitted for conformation. The exhibitor should be suitably dressed for the occasion, wearing clothing that will not hinder or detract from the presentation of the dog.
- G. Dogs will be judged on the breed structure, coat, teeth, gait, and other breed specific criteria.

Tricks

Tricks Rules in addition to the Department Dog Rules

- H. This project will **NOT** have best of class or reserve best of class presented. This project is about the individuals and their work with their dog.
- I. Dogs must have CURRENT CERTIFICATE OF RABIES VACCINATION on day of show.
- Dogs must have proof of AKC Canine Good Citizen certification on day of show, if using as 5 tricks for Novice.
- K. If you want your AKC title for these trick project the Judges will be able to submit or assist with submitting the proper forms after you complete 10 tricks per the AKC rules.

AKC may charge a fee for the titles, and the participant is responsible for paying the fee. Checklist for each class level for tricks is located at https://www.akc.org/sports/trick-dog/resources/trick-dog-applications.

L. Tricks cannot be repeated at higher levels see AKC rules for additional details.

Showmanship

Showmanship Rules in addition to the Department Dog Rules:

- M. Exhibitors are limited to one entry in showmanship.
- N. Dogs must have CURRENT CERTIFICATE OF RABIES VACCINATION on day of show.
- O. In addition to the Livestock Rules and Regulations, shorts or skirts that are not shorter than 2" above the knee are permitted for showmanship. The exhibitor should be suitably dressed for the occasion, wearing clothing that will not hinder or detract from the presentation of the dog.
- P. Showmanship exhibitors are judged on handling skill, knowledge of breed standards of their dog, dog show terminology, and elementary dog anatomy. Each participant will present their dog individually for examination, allowing the judge to observe the rapport between the exhibitor and the dog while being set up on either the ground or the table. The judge may ask questions to test the exhibitor's knowledge.
- Q. Dogs will be judged on cleanliness, general health, and grooming.
- R. Purebred and non-purebred dogs are eligible for this class. The breed of dog has no bearing on judging or placement.

- 5 A "judge" will interact with participants, asking general questions such as, "What is your dog's name?", "What breed is this dog?", or "What does your dog like to eat?"
- 6 Participants may have their pictures taken with their dog following the show.
- 7. Sign-up must be completed by 12 p.m. day of event.
- 8 Participants must wear proper shoes and clothing on the day of the show.

All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period. Non-UAV/ Drone projects should not be entered in this class (see Aerospace Display).

UAV Unmanned Aerial Systems (50376) Unmanned Aerial Vehicles/Systems: Drones – Required Exhibit one unmanned aerial vehicle and associated system assembled or made by the member. UAV or drone exhibits in this class must be either originally designed or built from a kit of reconfigurable parts and components. These displays are limited to multicopters (tri, quad, hex, and octocopters), as well as FPV airplanes and flying wings with wingspans up to 36". A detailed build log with pictures, as well as a mission logbook must be included. The UAV MUST have a flight controller and utilize a camera/video transmission system. The exhibit will be a static display. The drone should be in good flying condition with batteries fully charged, and all UAS components (including video system) ready to demonstrate. DO NOT display your UAV with the propellers on, but rather on the table to the side of your UAV. The drone will not be flown. Attach the printed directions/instructions of the UAV if any were used.

Electricity 1 (50177)

(May only be battery-powered projects using battery components and wiring). Exhibit a momentary switch, simple switch, basic circuit, electromagnet, galvanometer, **OR** an electric motor. All projects must include a report explaining how the project was constructed, and the principles demonstrated. Projects using paper clips, cardboard, thumbtacks, and brads are not eligible for state fair exhibits in electricity. Members wishing to exhibit these types of projects should consider exhibiting in Junk Drawer Robotics 1 or 2.

Electricity 2 (50178)

(May only be battery-powered projects using battery components and wiring). Exhibit a circuit board demonstrating parallel and series switches, including a circuit diagram; 3-way or 4-way switch circuit using DC/battery; **OR** a basic electrical device (examples: rocket launcher, burglar alarm, etc.). All projects must include a report explaining how the project was constructed and the principles demonstrated. Projects using paper clips, cardboard, thumbtacks, and brads are not eligible for state fair exhibits in electricity. Members wishing to exhibit these types of projects should consider exhibiting in Junk Drawer Robotics 1 or 2.

Electricity 3 (50179)

Exhibit a 120V lighting fixture or other appliance that uses a switch; **OR** two electrical household circuits using 120V materials to comply with National Electrical Code, one with a simple on/off switch to control bulb, and one using 3-way switches to control light from two locations; **OR** other project which demonstrates principles in the Wired for Power book. All electricity projects must include a report, explaining how the project was constructed, and principles for its operation.

Electricity 4 (50180)

Exhibit any electronic or solid-state appliance. Exhibitor must be able to explain how the project was constructed, how it is to be used and how it works. When a project is being constructed, general safety and workmanship should be considered. All Electricity 4 projects must include a report explaining how the project was constructed, and principles for its operation.

McLean County Projects Only:

Advanced Electricity Sub-Classes:

- Heating Equipment: Exhibit open to any type of heating equipment utilizing a heating element or heat lamp. Such projects include incubators, baseboard heaters, cooking equipment, etc.
- Alternative Energy Devices or Models: Exhibit may be a model or poster board demonstrating or showing an alternative energy source such as wind power, solar panel devices, solar power, waterpower, nuclear power, or any other type of alternative power producing source.

Any Device: Open to any electrical exhibit that does not fit into any of the above classes.

Entomology 3 (50185) Teaming With Insects 3 – Required

Exhibit 60 or more species representing twelve or more orders. Collection must be accurately labeled. Exhibitors must also include the Entomology 3 project manual, *Teaming With Insects 3,* with at least one completed activity for each year enrolled.

Entomology Display (50186)

Open to youth enrolled in Entomology 1, 2, or 3

Exhibit any activity or display related to Entomology that does not fit into Entomology Classes 1, 2, or 3 above. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

- E Chunk honey should go in a wide-mouth jar, preferably one specially made for chunk honey (see beekeeping catalogs). Be careful to distinguish "chunk honey" (comb in jar) from "cut comb" (comb only in box).
- F. Honey exhibited (including chunk, cutcomb, and comb) must be collected since the previous year show.

- 3. Cut-Comb Honey: Three (3) 1 lb. boxes (boxes are usually 4 1/2" x 4 1/2").

- 2 All food preservation exhibits must be labeled, labels must be affixed to side of jar or lid with: 1) The name of the food; 2) The name of the 4-H member; 3) The date preserved; 4) Appropriate method(s) of food preservation (For canned projects: boiling water bath or pressure canner; for drying project: Specify equipment used (food dehydrator, oven, etc.). No freezer food exhibits will be allowed, displays only.
- 3 All preserved products should be prepared and processed according to the current USDA/Extension information. USDA information on preserving food, including recipes, can be found at: www.homefoodpreservation.com or https://extension.illinois.edu/foodpreservation/food-preservation. Note: that exhibits will not be judged on taste.
- 4 All food preservation exhibits must be accompanied with the recipe(s), typed or written, with the source of the recipe(s) listed. Required Recipes and Sources for Food Preservation Exhibits—all food preservation recipes must be froman approved source. Those sources are: PUT IT UP! Food Preservation for Youth manuals, U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), National Center for Home Food Preservation, or Ball®/Kerr® Canning (recipes after 1985), and Mrs. Wages. Do not bring recipes from magazine or newspaper clippings, Pinterest® (unless from a source listed above), recipe from family member or friend without a source, Cookbooks (Excluding the Ball®, Kerr®, Put It Up! and 4-H Home Food Preservation books).
- 5 **Canning Equipment Requirements**: All canned products must be canned in clear, standard jars in good condition (no chips or cracks). Jars must be sealed using two-piece canning lids (flat lid and band). Must use a new, unused flat lid. Bands must not be rusty or severely worn.

Fruits/Vegetables (50208a): The exhibit should include two different canned foods in appropriate jars for the products. Food may be fruit, vegetable, or tomato product (i.e. salsa, juice, etc.).

Freezing (50208b): Prepare a nutrition display that illustrates a freezing principle. There is NOT a food exhibit option for this preservation method.

Drying (50208c): Exhibit two (2) different dried foods packed in plastic food storage bags. Choose from fruit, vegetable, fruit leather, or meat jerky.

Pickles and Relishes (50208d): Exhibit two (2) pint jars of different recipes of pickles and/or relishes made from produce.

Jams, Jellies, and Preserves (50208e): Exhibit two (2) half-pint jars of two different jams, jellies, and/or preserves.

Preservation Combination (50208f): Exhibit two (2) different preserved food products from two different categories above, excluding Freezing, in appropriate jars/packaging (Drying). For example, exhibit 1 jar of tomatoes (Fruits/Vegetables) and 1 half-pint of jelly (Jams, Jellies, and Preserves).

Youth interested in exhibiting a food item from the project book not listed above, making changes to the provided recipes, or exhibiting a display related to information in the project manual should investigate the Foods Innovation class.

McLean County Projects Only:

Canning (Not State Fair Eligible): Exhibit two (2) different canned food products in appropriate jars. Food examples may be fruit, vegetable, tomato product (i.e. salsa, juice, etc.), meat products, etc. Due to not being state fair eligible project meat products are acceptable. - **C** The size and number of exhibit cases should relate appropriately to the number of specimens displayed for a specific class.
- D. Exhibitor must attach the appropriate project manual for the class exhibited to one of the cases with at least one completed activity for each year enrolled.
- E Label collection and note where found. Please see project books for suggestions as to labeling exhibit materials.

State Fair Eligible Classes:

Specimens are not limited to Illinois locations. All levels of Geology use the same manual, *Geology—Introduction to the Study of the Earth*. **Do not identify your specimens any further than phylum and class.** There is one exception to this for fossils that are identified to phylum OR class. Class should only be used for fossils of mollusks, back-boned animals, and arthropods.

Pebble Pups 1 (50218)

Display 8 to 19 rocks and mineral specimens with three minerals in the collection. Collection may include duplications that show variations. Label collection and note where found.

Display no more than 50 specimens that have been selected to illustrate a specific theme of the exhibitor's choosing. Be creative. Sample categories could include (but are not limited to): industrial minerals and their uses; a specific rock group and the variety that occurs in that group, including some minerals that occur in that environment; select fossils traced through the geologic ages; minerals and their crystal habits; rocks and minerals used in the lapidary arts.

Herbs should be grown in pots (8" maximum diameter). Categories: Mint, Oregano, Rosemary, Sage, Thyme, and all other herbs. Herbs should be labeled with common and Latin names. Herbs should be in your care for a minimum of three months for state fair exhibits. Remove dead leaves from plants and check that the soil is clear of debris such as dead leaves. When exhibiting herb plants, be sure to grow the plants in the container to be displayed to avoid transplant shock. Exhibits will be evaluated based on cleanliness, uniformity, condition, quality, and trueness to variety. Additional herb resources are located on the project resources section of the Illinois 4-H website.

- Display must include 4 or more different kinds of herbs. There may not be more than 2 different varieties of any herb. For example, peppermint and chocolate mint would be classified as two different herb varieties.
- In instances where containers display more than one variety of herb, special care should be taken that each distinct variety is accessible and clearly visible to the judges to ensure full points for cleanliness.

Exhibits in this category are designed to be multi-disciplinary in nature, innovative, and must not fit into any other exhibit category. To qualify for this category, your project MUST abide by the following guidelines:

- Exhibitors must complete at least two activities in the DIY Make & Build Curriculum and answer all the questions at the end of each lesson. You must display your answers to these questions, as well as your Maker Log from the DIY Make and Build curriculum.
- Exhibits must be an object or device that has an intended purpose and uses technology in either a mechanical way, digital (computer) way, or combination of the two. Your device or object cannot be one of the included activities in the DIY Make and Build Curriculum.
- The device must be something that can be used in everyday life by multiple people (a target audience) and MUST be manufactured/built by the exhibitor (If not fully manufactured by the exhibitor, the device MUST be modified structurally or be reprogramed to perform a different function other than what it was designed to do).
- Exhibits MUST be able to interact with the outside world. (e.g. an on off switch, input sensors, feedback, etc.)
- Exhibits MUST include a detailed build log with instructions on how to make or build the exhibit AND contain either a 3D rendering or detailed and labeled sketches of the device/product.
- All parts and software used in the design/build MUST be listed in a detailed Bill of Materials including cost per item and total cost. Total time spent on the build must be documented in your build log.

In addition, exhibitors are HIGHLY encouraged to use tools such as 3-D printers, laser cutters, routers and/or other hand/power tools to help in the manufacturing process (NOTE: Simply 3-D printing or laser cutting an object without the other specifications does not qualify as a Maker Project). 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Photography

Rules:

- 1. Exhibitors may enter only in Photography 1, 2, or 3. This is a progressive chain.

- 4. Photos may be taken with a camera, an electronic tablet (i.e. iPad), or a cell phone.
- 5. ALL photos (including Photo Editing exhibits) must be accompanied by details of the camera settings that include:

 - Exposure time (shutter speed)
 - ISO (film/sensor sensitivity)
 - Lighting used (flash, artificial, sunlight, other)
 - Lens Filters (Ultra-Violet, Polarized, etc.) if used.

The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

Plants & Soils 1 (50281a) It's More Than Just Dirt – Required

Prepare a 36" X 48" display or a poster no larger than 36" x 48" and 15" deep that illustrates an activity from the project manual. The display should demonstrate an understanding of environmental and internal factors that affect plant growth and the function and characteristics of soil. Include your project journal that documents activity recordkeeping requirements, answers activity questions, and details personal thoughts and ideas in response to each activity.

Plants & Soils 2 (50281b) Stems and Stamens – Required

Prepare a 36" X 48" display or a poster no larger than 36" x 48" and 15" deep that illustrates an activity from the project manual. The display should demonstrate an understanding of the composition of plants, the functions of individual plant parts, plant life cycles, and the many ways plants reproduce. Include your project journal that documents activity recordkeeping requirements, answers activity questions, and details personal thoughts and ideas in response to each activity.

Plants & Soils 3 (50281c) Sprouting Out and Growing UP – Required

Prepare a 36" x 48" display or a poster no larger than 36" x 48" and 15" deep that illustrates an activity from the project manual. The display should demonstrate an understanding of the relationship between soil and other cycles found in nature. Displays should also provide an example of a leadership or service-learning experience focused on environmental stewardship. Include your project journal that documents activity recordkeeping requirements, answers activity questions, and details personal thoughts and ideas in response to each activity.

Read-A-Book, Ages 13–15: An original book jacket with an original summary of characters and plot. A book jacket includes flaps, a spine, and a front and back cover. Open to 11 to 18-year-olds.

Exhibits in this category must include the following: a) a physical representation of the business product such as a model, prototype or display/portfolio that includes images of accomplished work; b) verbal or written explanations that demonstrate knowledge of the related business fields, potential business opportunities, and the appropriate requirements for achievement in those fields. The judging criteria for this class values thoroughness of the business exploration and pursuit above the workmanship of the physical specime on display.

Robotics

In addition, each youth must bring their program code (on laptop or on paper), and their robot to demonstrate. The robot and obstacles must be able to fit on a 4' x 8' robotics table when being

Robotics 3 (50292) <u>go.illinois.edu/4HRoboticsProjectPage</u>

Exhibitors must complete and display a build log which contains a diagram (drawing or 3D rendering) of their robot with each of the key components labeled, an explanation of why they made the design/programming decisions they made, and a short journal sharing what they learned about the engineering design process and programming throughout their work in the project (as well as while preparing the exhibit). In addition, each youth must bring their program code (on laptop or on paper), and their robot to demonstrate. Exhibits in this class must be able to fit on no more than a 6' x 2' table (or ground footprint) and must be fully assembled 15 minutes prior to the judging start time. No Exceptions.

Service-Learning Group Exhibit (50149)

Open to groups whose members are enrolled in any SERVICE-LEARNING project.

Due to space limitations, exhibits are limited to 36" x 48" and 15" deep. Group members should be enrolled in Service Learning – Agents of Change (Level 1) and/or Raise Your Voice (Level 2). Register community project at go.illinois.edu/4HCommunityProjectRegistration, additional resources located on site.

Exhibit should be educational in nature and should inform others of steps taken to engage group members in **1**) identifying a local need, conducting a local needs assessment to find a need that is already visible in the community; **2**) determine types of activities group members can/want to do; **3**) List all of the activities, projects, or needs identified to review with group members; **4**) create a plan and timeline for completing the service project (including-project goals, tasks involved, time commitment, permission needed from community stakeholders, a budget, a source for securing those funds, insurance needs, equipment and supplies, publicity, potential partners if additional help is needed, a risk management plan, and a process for evaluating the project; **5**) prepare for group members to engage in the service project which may include instruction on completing specific tasks and/or educating members on how the project will benefit the community; **6**) complete the project; **7**) documentation of service experience with photos, videos; or written reports; **8**) once project is completed, reflect on success and/or challenges encountered during execution of the service project; consider what you might do differently in future service projects.

Create a display which will educate the public regarding the impact of the service project for

both the community and the group members. The display must be accompanied by at least 3 but no more than 10 4-H members at the time of the judge's critique. Group members should make a 5–10-minute presentation for the judge. Group members should create a display which showcases the service project and the steps needed to complete it. Only group members present for the judging and who participate in the critique and presentation are eligible for ribbons and premiums.

Shooting Sports Poster/Display

Rules:

- A. See the Rules & Regulations section, page 6, for general requirements for Entries and Exhibits. Failure to meet requirements will result in lowering of placing by one grade.
- B. Participants must be a member of an approved 4-H Shooting Sports Club to exhibit.
- **C.** All exhibits should be posters or stand-alone items suitable for display to the general public.
- D. Stand-alone items have the intent to enhance the discipline such as a quiver, gun case, gun sling, locking cabinet, gun or target stand, sporting clays equipment wagon, etc.
- E. Exhibits deemed to be inappropriate by a superintendent will not be displayed.

NOTE: Shooting Sports Displays have the following prohibitions:

- No live ammunition.
- No knives or arrow tips (including field points, hunting broadheads, etc.).
- No functional or non-functional bows, firearms or firearm parts that could be reassembled are allowed.
- No humanoid shaped targets or reference to paintball, laser tag, air-soft, or pointing of any type of firearm or bow toward another person is allowed.
- No display involving primarily tactical design firearms (i.e. AR platform or military type firearms).
- No reference or use of the word "weapon" should be used in a display.
- Make sure there are no safety violations in your display. (Example: no earplugs or safety glasses in a picture of a person shooting a firearm.)

State Fair Eligible Classes:

Shooting Sports: Archery Display (50380)

Exhibit a poster or stand-alone display depicting safe archery handling, range safety, the parts of the bow, tracking the target, target sighting, or another topic you have learned through the 4-H Shooting Sports program.

Shooting Sports: Rifle Display (50381)

Exhibit a poster or stand-alone display depicting safe firearm handling, range safety, the parts of the rifle, tracking the target, target sighting, or another topic you have learned through the 4-H Shooting Sports program.

Shooting Sports: Shotgun Display (50382)

Place ribbons will be awarded in lieu of Best of Class and Reserve Best of Class ribbons. The number of place ribbons awarded will be based on the number of participants in each class.
- F. Match dates, times, and locations are subject to change. The McLean County Extension Office will notify registered participants of any change.

State Fair Eligible Classes:

Small Engines 1–3 (50294)

Director...

Small Engine displays must be no larger than 4' x 4' display board. Exhibits must be portable. No complete engines, lawn tractors, tillers, chainsaws, etc. are permitted for display. No electrical power is available for displays/exhibits.

Exhibit a display, selecting one of the following items:

- Ignition/Electrical System: Identify the parts of the Ignition System and explain how magnetic energy is produced through the ignition system to ignite the spark plug, OR
- **Compression System**: Explain how heat energy is produced, and engine power is measured by an engine and/or converted into mechanical energy through transmissions, **OR**
- Heat Transfer: Explain how heat is transferred through the cooling and lubrication system of an air cooled or water-cooled engine, **OR**
- Filter Maintenance: Explain the proper maintenance and cleaning of the air, fuel and oil filters of an engine, OR
- What does a serial number reveal? Explain the various information that can be learned from the serial number or identification number stamped on the shroud of a Briggs & Stratton engine, OR
- Tools to do the job: Identify and explain the function(s) of different specialty tools needed for small engine work, OR
- **Experimentation**: Explain through illustration an experiment you conducted from the project manual showing the results of your work.

McLean County Projects Only:

Introduction to Small Engines (Not State Fair Eligible): Exhibit one of the following.

- Exhibit a display no larger than 4' x 4', identifying different engine or lawn and garden equipment parts, OR
- Exhibit a display no larger than 4' x 4' showing the function of the various engine or lawn and garden equipment parts.
- The exhibitor should be prepared to discuss their project during conference judging.

Small Engine Maintenance (Not State Fair Eligible):

State Fair Eligible Classes:

Director

Prepare a display focusing on any activity related to the veterinary science project. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period. Live animals are not permitted as exhibits in this area. For safety reasons, exhibits cannot include glass, syringes with needles or any other sharp objects. Exhibits may include activities from Veterinary Science projects OR from any other Animal project area.

Veterinary Science 1 (50320a) For youth enrolled in this project 1-2 years.

Veterinary Science 2 (50320b) For youth enrolled in this project 3 or more years.

Video/Filmmaking

Check-in on Tuesday, July 22, from 5:30–7 p.m. Member will be present for judging.

Failure to meet requirements will result in lowering of placing by one grade.

Rules:

- All Exhibitors must bring their video to be judged on a USB flash drive and saved in.
- MP4 format at the State Fair.
- Wireless Internet access is not necessarily available.
- Exhibitors are encouraged to post their video on YouTube.com in advance of State Fair.
- Exhibitors may choose whether to make the video "public, unlisted" (someone must have the link to view it), or "private" (only people you choose may view it). This will allow fairgoers to view the exhibits on display.

Animated Video Individual ((50325a) Group (50324b))

Video in this class should represent creative animation of original artwork created by the exhibitor and may include stop motion techniques. Media might include images created with graphics software or hand-drawn images.

Documentary Individual ((50326a) Group (50326b))

Video in this class should represent a research-based investigation into a topic of choice. Video credits should list research sources and may include paper or electronically published materials, as well as interviews with experts or constituents related to the topic of investigation.

Short Story or Short Narrative Individual ((50327a) Group (50327b))

Prepare a short video that tells a story. The video should demonstrate skills in making and editing video.

Video Innovation Class Individual ((50328a) Group (50328b)) Open to youth enrolled in Video

Demonstrate the skills and knowledge you have gained through the Video project. **Your exhibit should not fit in the other exhibit options for this project.** The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

Check-in on Tuesday, July 22, from 5:30–7 p.m. unless noted otherwise. Member will be present for judging.

<u>General Rules – All Visual Arts Projects:</u>

Exhibitors must be enrolled in the Visual Arts project on ZSuite and Fairentry.com in the category that they are exhibiting. Exhibitors are encouraged to date the project when it is made. All visual arts exhibits are evaluated using a visual arts rubric that takes into account correct use of design elements, craftsmanship, and creativity.

- 1 Each member may enter only one exhibit in each visual arts class.
- 2 All exhibits are individual projects. One exhibitor prepares all items.
- 3 All items must be prepared for exhibit. Items that are intended to be hung must be prepared for hanging. The hanging device must be sturdy enough to support the weight of the object. Framed items not intended to be hung should be noted as such on card and a photo of the artwork being displayed should be included.
- Articles exhibited must be an original design created by the exhibitor (except in Heritage Arts, 4 which may follow a pattern, AND Fiber-Non-Original Ages 8-10 ONLY). Copyrighted or trademarked designs are not acceptable; this includes team, school logos and/or characters from movies such as Mickey Mouse, Iron Man, etc. Kits and preformed molds are not considered original and are not acceptable in any Visual Arts Class. Combining parts of different patterns (pictures, photographs, images from the internet or a magazine) with the member's own ideas can result in an original design, but simply changing the color, pattern and/or size of a pattern does NOT make the design original. This also applies for ideas found on a site such as Pinterest. If you see something on Pinterest that you like, you can use that idea as your inspiration, however, create something which is fundamentally different. IT MUST NOT BE AN EXACT REPLICA OF something the judge can search for and find on Pinterest. The exhibit may combine parts of different patterns and/or ideas with the concepts of the member, however changing the color or changing the size of the item or pattern used does NOT make it original. If you create an exact replica of what you see somewhere else, it is not your original design. If a photo, sketch, or other idea source was used, submit it with your entry, firmly attached to your exhibit. Be prepared to explain how and where you got the idea for this project. The use of copyrighted material is prohibited. Copyrighted projects will NOT receive premiums.
- 5 Use of the 4-H Clover: Chartered 4-H clubs and enrolled 4-H members are authorized to use the 4-H Name and Emblem. This includes permission for an enrolled 4-H member to use the 4-H name and emblem in exhibits created for personal use and as part of 4-H sponsored events. This includes 4-H decorated cookies, a 4-H clover printed for use in a scrapbook or included as part of any other 4-H exhibit. Use of the green clover shaped image is not protected. The 4-H "emblem" is distinguished by the four H's that signify Head, Heart, Hands and Health. No creative rendering, changes in color or shape of the official 4-H emblem is allowed.
- 6 Quilts entered in Visual Arts should ONLY be entered in the Quilting Project area in either Level 1 You Can Quilt (SF 50331a) OR Level 2 Quilting the Best Better (50331b). All work on the quilt MUST be completed by the 4-H member. You cannot exhibit a quilt that was quilted by someone else.
- 7. Unless otherwise noted, due to space limitations, projects should be no larger than 48" x 48".

State Fair Eligible Classes:

Chalk/Carbon/Pigment

Visual Arts Chalk/Carbon/Pigment: Division A, B, or C

Enter the division based on the type of material on which the art was created.

Chalk/Carbon/Pigment: Division A: Canvas (50336a)

Any original artwork created with pencils, chalk, pens, ink, paint, charcoal, dyes, etc. on canvas. This would include all painting, sketching, drawing, cartooning, original non-computer-generated graphics, printing, etc. Drawings and paintings should be matted or framed under glass. (Exceptions: Oil and acrylic paintings do not require glass and are not required to be matted.) Watercolor, chalk, pen & ink, etc. do require some protective covering. Gallery frames are acceptable. Canvas paintings that continue "over the edges" are acceptable without frames; however, the piece must still be prepared for hanging. Matted pieces without frames are acceptable, however the piece must be prepared for hanging OR it must include a photo of the artwork being displayed in a non-hanging manner. There is no specific requirement for the type of mat used.

Chalk/Carbon/Pigment: Division B: Paper (50336b)

Any original artwork done with pencils, chalk, pens, ink, paint, charcoal, dyes, etc., on paper. This would include all painting, sketching, drawing, cartooning, original non-computer-generated graphics, printing, etc. Drawings and paintings should be matted or framed under glass. (Exceptions: Oil and acrylic paintings do not require glass and are not required to be matted.) Watercolor, chalk, pen & ink, etc. do require some protective covering. Gallery frames are acceptable. Matted pieces without frames are acceptable, however the piece must be prepared for hanging, OR it must include a photo of the artwork being displayed in a non-hanging manner. There is no specific requirement for the type of mat used.

Chalk/Carbon/Pigment: Division C: Glass, Wood, Metal, Textiles (50336c)

Any original artwork done with pencils, chalk, pens, ink, paint, charcoal, dyes, etc., on glass, wood, metal, and textiles. This would include all painting, sketching, drawing, cartooning, original non-computer-generated graphics, printing, etc. Painted and/or glazed pre-formed ceramics and painted porcelain dolls are not eligible for the State Fair exhibit. Drawings and paintings should be matted or framed under glass. (Exceptions: Oil and acrylic paintings do not require glass and are not required to be matted.) Watercolor, chalk, pen & ink, etc. do require some protective covering. Gallery frames are acceptable. Matted pieces without frames are acceptable, however the piece must be prepared for hanging, OR it must include a photo of the artwork being displayed in a non-hanging manner. There is no specific requirement for the type of mat used.

Sub-Classes for Division A, B and C: Cartooning Drawing which puts a comic (funny, amusing) interpretation on current events or people OR drawings which are an original comic strip. Single Drawing Comic Book (must be 4–10 pages) Painting: Acrylic/Oil Photo/picture/illustration, if used for reference, should be attached to the back of it. Ages 8–12 Ages 13+ **Painting: Watercolors** Photo/picture/illustration, if used for reference, attached to back of it. Glass, acrylic, or some other protective covering (not plastic wrap) must cover any watercolor selected to go to the state fair. Ages 8-12 Ages 13+ Sketching Photo/picture/illustration, if used for reference, attached to back of it. Glass, acrylic, or some other protective covering (not plastic wrap) must cover any sketch selected to go to state fair. Ages 8–10 Ages 14-16 Ages 11–13 Ages 17+ Other carbon/chalk/pigment Item that does not fit into the classes listed above or uses more than one medium. Photo/picture/illustration, if used for reference, attached to back of it. Ages 8–12 Ages 13+ Clay Visual Arts Clay (50337) Any original item made of clay—may be fired or unfired, hand formed or thrown on a wheel. Self-hardening clays are fine. Fire/oven-cured and cornstarch clay could be accepted. Items can include, but are not limited to, clay statues, bowls, jewelry, etc. Pre-formed ceramics are not

Sub-Classes:

eligible for State Fair exhibit.

Hand formed or wheel-thrown clay: kiln-fired, oven cured, or self-hardening. Ages 8–12 Ages 13+ Synthetic modeling material: oven-baked or self-hardening modeling material. Ages 8–12 Ages 13+

Computer-Generated Art

Visual Arts Computer-Generated Art (50338)

Any original art created in any software package. Exhibit may not include scanned work, clip art, downloaded images from the internet, any imported image, or photographs. All pixels must be original. Photo mosaics are NOT allowed. Exhibitors in this class (like all other classes in this subsection) must be enrolled in Visual Arts; computer project enrollment is not required. <u>NOTE:</u> Wood and metal exhibits created through the use of laser cutting programs/devices should be entered in this class. Plastic exhibits with an artistic focus created using a 3-D printer should be entered in this class. If the art created is designed to hang, then the entry should have some protective covering, such as a glass frame, and prepared for hanging. If the art is something that has been created with a laser cutting program/device and is NOT designed to hang, it does not require protective covering nor does it need to be prepared to hang.

Visual Arts Computer: Generated Art Graphic Design (50370)

Any original art created in any software package that displays visual information, such as an advertisement, publication, website, or any other type of visual communication by effectively combining text and graphics. If using clip art, downloaded images, imported images, or photographs, they must be either royalty-free or owned by the exhibitor.

Fiber

Visual Arts Fiber (50339)

Any original item made of fiber. Examples include but are not limited to fabric collage, soft sculpture, stitchery, weaving, embroidery, cross-stitch, wearable art, hooking, braiding, duct tape artistry, string art, and baskets. **Original** cross-stitched, knitted, or crocheted items belong in this Fiber class. **Non-original cross-stitched, knitted, or crocheted items should be entered in Heritage Arts. Machine knitted items are not appropriate for this project area.**

Sub-Classes:

Latch hook

Stitchery – hand: This includes original cross-stitch, crewel, embroidery, and any other hand- stitched projects. Hand stitched items made from patterns should be entered in Miscellaneous Heritage Arts.

Stitchery - machine

String art: Exhibit may not be larger than 30" x 30".

Weaving

Fleece – non-clothing

Duct Tape artistry

Wearable Art Division I: One item (hat, shoes, bag, shirt, etc.) that is creatively decorated. Possible methods of decorating include painting, tie-dying, gluing, or sewing on embellishments to the wearable item.

Wearable Art Division II: One or more garments (shirt, pants, skirt, etc.) and one or more accessories (hat, shoes, bag, etc.) that is creatively decorated. Possible methods of decorating include painting, tie-dying, gluing, or sewing on embellishments to the wearable items.

Visual Arts Fiber Non-Original AGES 8-10 ONLY (50350)

Any non-original item made of fiber. Examples include but are not limited to fabric collage, soft sculpture, stitchery, weaving, embroidery, cross-stitch, crocheting, knitting, weaving, hooking, and felting. Exhibitors may use a pattern and/or an idea generated from another source.

Glass & Plastic

Visual Arts Glass & Plastic (50340a, 50340b, 50340c)

Any original item made of glass or plastic.

- 50340a–Glass: Possible items to exhibit include stained glass, etched glass (original design), mosaics made of glass, glass beading.
- 50340b–Plastic: Possible items to exhibit include plastic jewelry (friendly plastic), recycled plastic art, plastic that can be molded into 3D shapes.
- 50340c-Plastic Block Art: Any original item made entirely of plastic building blocks. This must be
 an original design created by the exhibitor. Structures are NOT eligible in the Visual Arts Plastic
 Block Art exhibit area. The exhibit will be judged using a Visual Arts rubric. The exhibit must be
 attached to a board or frame for display and prepared to be hung or presented as 3-dimensional
 piece of table art and NOT a structure (unacceptable items would include buildings,
 rollercoasters, etc.).

Interlocking building block creations (i.e. LEGOS) are ONLY suitable for 50340C exhibit option of the Visual Arts Glass & Plastic class. Steppingstones can be entered as a Visual Arts exhibit in Glass & Plastic; however, they must have an intentional design created using glass and/or plastic and the exhibitor must be prepared to discuss the design elements associated with their exhibit. Due to space limitations, any single exhibit in the Glass & Plastic project should NOT exceed 48" x 48". Legos may be used for this project, but the design must be the exhibitor's original creation and not based on a pre-made design or instructions. For example, they could create a model of their own dog.

Heritage Arts

Visual Arts Heritage Arts (50341): Exhibit an item of *traditional* art learned from another person or from a pattern (NO KITS may be entered in this class). Non-original cross-stitched, knitted, and crocheted items by pattern fit in this class. ALL ORIGINAL cross-stitched, knitted, and crocheted items should be exhibited in Fiber Arts; (machine knitted items ARE NOT acceptable for this class.) Other possibilities include needlepoint, counted cross-stitch, crewel, embroidery, cut work, hardanger embroidery (embroidery openwork), macramé, candles, blacksmithing, pysanki (decorated eggs), baskets (made using a traditional pattern), traditional handmade dolls with handmade costumes, soaps made using nature dyes and/or candles.

Exhibitors in Heritage Arts MUST also bring 1) the pattern or a copy of the pattern they used to create their traditional art and 2) be prepared to explain the traditional origins of their art choice.

Sub-Classes:

Basketry, reed

Macramé

Needlepoint

Candle making, molded: From a mold or hand molded-remove from the mold.

Candle making, container: Candle remains in container, jar, glass, etc.

Miscellaneous Heritage Arts: Possibilities include but are not limited to hand stitched items from a pattern, pysanka (decorated eggs), and tatting.

For the following sub-classes please exhibit one completed article.

Crocheting and Knitting, Ages 8–12: Must use knitting needles for knitting. No looms.

Crocheting and Knitting, Ages 13+: Must use knitting needles for knitting. No looms.

Note: Members who create a knitted garment such as a sweater, vest, skirt, dress, etc. may register to participate in the Style Revue on Saturday.

Leather

Visual Arts Leather (50321)

Exhibit one of the following options using leather:

Leather Stamping: Exhibit should utilize one or more stamping techniques. Exhibit examples include items such as belt, coasters, bookmark, key chain, wrist bracelet.

Leather Carving or Tooling: Exhibit should use simple swivel knife tooling techniques or may incorporate several swivel knife-tooling designs or patterns. Exhibit examples include items such as belt, pictorial carving, key case.

Leather Lacing: Exhibit to include stamping and/or carving techniques incorporated with lacing techniques. Exhibit examples include items such as wallets, purses, etc.

Leather Stitching: Exhibit may include stamping, carving and/or lacing techniques and should be a leather item or article of apparel, which incorporates hand-sewing and/or machine stitching techniques. Hand-sewing and/or machine stitching must be the work of the exhibitor.

Metal

Visual Arts Metal (50342)

Any original item made of metal such as sculpture, tin punch, engraved metal, and jewelry. Items intended for industrial use (such as tools and/or shop items) are not considered part of this Visual Arts project and are not eligible for entry. Metal items that have been partially or totally created through the use of laser cutting programs/devices should be entered in Computer-Generated Art.

Nature

Visual Arts Nature (50343)

Any original item made of natural material such as wreaths, cornhusk dolls, etc. Items should be made of natural materials (which may be purchased) but securing elements such as glue and wire may be used in the inner construction, as long as they do not detract from the overall "natural" appearance. Engineered wood may be utilized as part of the exhibit to adhere natural materials, not as an element of the design. Articles such as dried pressed flowers may be displayed under glass if viewed as necessary for protection/preservation of the natural materials. Candles are not suitable as entries and instead should be entered in Heritage Arts. All baskets should be entered in Heritage Arts.

Paper

Visual Arts Paper (50344a & 50344b)

Any original item made of paper. Exhibitors should create an exhibit that aligns with one of the following categories:

Visual Arts Paper (50344a)

Two-Dimensional Paper Art: Exhibits should be a 2-dimensional image. Paper art which falls into the 2-dimensional category includes: greeting cards, paper-cut designs, hand-made paper, paper collage, quilling.

Sub-Classes:

Ages 8–12

Ages 13+

Visual Arts Paper (50344b)

Three-Dimensional Paper Art: Exhibits should be a 3-dimensional image. Exhibits in the 3dimensional category must have multiple layers and/or levels. This is defined as more than 3 layers so the image truly has dimensions that can be viewed from at least three sides; or is at least ½" tall. Paper art which falls into the 3-dimensional category includes but is not limited to: origami, paper mache, paper models of architecture, paper-cut designs, quilling.

Sub-Classes:

Ages 8–12 Ages 13+

PLEASE NOTE THE FOLLOWING:

Paper-cut designs and quilling have the potential, depending on the design, to align with either of the categories. The key design element is whether the design is 2-dimentional or 3-dimentional.

Paper twist articles made from a kit or directions in a craft book or store ARE NOT original and not appropriate in the Visual Arts Paper exhibit area. Scrapbooks are also not eligible in Visual Arts Paper but should be exhibited in Visual Arts Scrapbooking.

If creating origami, folded pieces should either be used to create a bigger project such as a mobile or wreath, or multiple pieces of origami should be displayed. Exceptions would be if exhibitor created their own folding pattern.

Quilting

Visual Arts Quilting – You Can Quilt (Level 1) (50331a)

Exhibit one of the following quilting options. All exhibits should include a card which 1) Identifies the item as an original design created by the exhibitor, as a pattern created by someone else, OR as a pattern that has been adapted by the exhibitor. AND 2) Identifies the type of batting used. The item may be quilted using any method—tie, hand, or machine quilted. **All work must be completed by the 4-H member**. Exhibit one of the following:

- A Doll Quilt (maximum size of 24" x 30") OR
- A Baby Quilt (maximum size of 48"x 48") OR
- A Quilted Table Runner (maximum size of 18" x 36") OR
- A small Wall Hanging (square or rectangular (maximum size of 36" x 36"). Hanging should include tabs or a pocket on the back for it to be hung.

Visual Arts Quilting – Quilting the Best Better (Level 2) (50331b)

Exhibit one of the following quilting options. All exhibits should include a card which 1) Identifies the item as an original design created by the exhibitor as a pattern created by someone else OR as a pattern that has been adapted by the exhibitor; 2) Identifies the type of batting used AND 3) Provides details on any special techniques that were used (applique, embroidery, free-motion quilting, etc.). The item may be quilted using any method—tie, hand, or machine quilted. **All work must be completed by the 4-H member**. Exhibit one of the following:

- A Lap Quilt (width ranging from 42" 58" length ranging from 56" 70") OR
- A Large Quilted Wall Hanging (can be rectangular or square, sized larger than 36" x 36"). Hanging should include tabs or a pocket on the back for it to be hung OR
- A Quilt that fits any size bed (Twin, Double, Queen or King).

Scrapbooking

Visual Arts Scrapbooking, Beginning (50345)

Exhibit one album or notebook, either 8 ½" x 11" or 12" x 12", with a front and back cover. The album/notebook must have a minimum of 4 pages (front and back, making it 8 sides), exhibited in page protectors. **NOTE: the front and back album covers are NOT part of the "page" count.** "Embellishments" are defined as the decorations or special details and features that add to a page and make it more visually appealing. Embellishments may include, but are not limited to, ribbon, clips, stickers, special lettering, etc. Beginners must use a **minimum of four embellishments** in their 4 scrapbook pages (a minimum of four embellishments on the 4 required scrapbook pages, not four per page), 8 sides and tell a story with pictures.

Visual Arts Scrapbooking, Intermediate (50346)

Exhibit one album or notebook, either 8 ½" x 11" or 12" x 12", with a front and back cover. The album/notebook must have a minimum of 6 pages (front and back, 12 sides), exhibited in page protectors. **NOTE: the front and back album covers are NOT part of the "page" count.** "Embellishments" are defined as the decorations or special details and features that add to a page and make it more visually appealing. Embellishments may include, but are not limited to, ribbon, clips, stickers, special lettering, etc. Intermediate level exhibitors must use a **minimum of eight embellishments** in their 6 scrapbook pages (a minimum of eight embellishments on the 6 required scrapbook pages, not eight per page), 12 sides and tell a story with pictures and journaling.

Visual Arts Scrapbooking, Advanced (50347)

Exhibit one album or notebook, either 8 ½" x 11" or 12" x 12", with a front and back cover. The album/notebook must have a minimum of 8 pages (front and back, 16 sides), exhibited in page protectors. **NOTE: the front and back album covers are NOT part of the "page" count.** "Embellishments" are defined as the decorations or special details and features that add to a page and make it more visually appealing. Embellishments may include, but are not limited to, ribbon, clips, stickers, special lettering, etc. Advanced level exhibitors must use a **minimum of 12 embellishments** in their 8 scrapbook pages (a minimum of twelve embellishments on the 8 required scrapbook pages, not twelve per page), 16 sides and tell a compelling story with pictures, journaling, and other media.

Three-Dimensional Design/Mixed Media

Visual Arts Three – Dimensional Design/Mixed Media (50348)

Art pieces in this class must be comprised of **at least three different media**. No one medium can make up more than 40% of a piece. The piece should **be either freestanding or should be prepared to be hung**. It must be observable on at least three different sides. Originality and design are important concepts. Craft and preformed or assembled projects are not acceptable. Due to space limitations, any single exhibit in the Three-Dimensional Design/Mixed Media project should NOT exceed 48" x 48".

Visual Arts Three – Dimensional Design/Mixed Media - Diorama (50351)

Exhibit a model representing a scene with three-dimensional figures. The display must be built on rigid wood (i.e., plywood). Exhibits may include but are not limited to, farm displays, historical events, landmarks, habitats, or scenes from a book. Exhibits may include pre-manufactured items such as tractors, animals, or figurines, but should also include artistic elements where possible. Due to space limitations, any single exhibit in the Three-Dimensional Design/Mixed Media: Diorama project should NOT exceed 48" x 48".

Wood

Visual Arts Wood (50349)

Any original item made of wood (wood carving, sculpture, collage, wood burning, etc.). Utilitarian wood items made from patterns or kits (outdoor or indoor furniture, shelves, etc.) should be entered in Woodworking, **NOT** Visual Arts. Popsicle stick crafts are not acceptable for State Fair entry. Wood items that have been partially or totally created through the use of laser cutting programs/devices should be entered in Computer-Generated Art. All Visual Arts Wood exhibits MUST have an artistic element that the exhibitor can explain. Furniture built by the exhibitor aligns with the Woodworking project area, unless the element to be judged is wood carving or wood burning that is one element of the exhibit. Exhibits will be judged using a Visual Arts Rubric and not a woodworking construction rubric.

McLean County Projects Only:

Printing/Stenciling (Not State Fair Eligible): Must enroll in Computer Generated Art

If the art created is designed to hang, exhibit should be matted and/or framed and be at least 8" x 10" and not more than 22" x 28" including artwork, mat, and frame. Canvas paintings that continue "over the edges" are acceptable without frames; however, the piece must still be prepared for hanging.

Sub-Classes:

Printing: Block, slate, or screen used should be accompany item. Vegetables used to print should accompany the article.

Stenciling: Include stencil in a self-sealing plastic bag with member's name on bag. Stenciling may or may not be an item to hang. If to be hung, follow above instructions. If disposable self-adhesive vinyl stencils cut from craft machines are used, please include cutting pattern used, or duplicate unused vinyl stencil.

Ceramics (Not State Fair Eligible): Must enroll in Clay

Pre-formed from molds-non-original. Exhibit may be no larger than 15" high by 15" wide by 12" deep.

This exhibit class is open to any member eligible to participate in 4-H and show at the county/state fair. Exhibit one arc weldment/item demonstrating the skill level of the exhibitor. Members new to the project should consider selecting a weldment from the suggested <u>Weldment List</u> found on page 43 of Arcs and Sparks (4-H 573 – Shielded Metal Arc Welding). **This class is for industrial welding only.** (Members that wish to use welding to create objects with an artistic appeal should consider enrolling in the 4-H Visual Arts Metal project and consider entering those types of exhibits in the Visual Arts – Metal class.) Exhibits must be portable and cannot be exhibited on a trailer.

Sub-classes:

Welding Class 1, Ages 8–10 Welding Class 2, Ages 11–13 Welding Class 2, Ages 14+

Woodworking

Check-in on Tuesday, July 22, from 5:30–7 p.m.

Member will be present for judging.

Rules:

- A An exhibitor may enter one project per class in their appropriate age group.
- B All refinished exhibits must include a labeled picture(s) of the item prior to refinishing and pictures of the refinishing in progress. Only original wood species used when the item was made are allowed.
- C Exhibitors are encouraged to have a pictorial log of project construction showing the steps used.
- D Pre-cut kits are not allowed in any class.
- E All exhibit classes will be **conference judged**. Conference judging sign up will be available at check-in.
- F. Exhibits made from the 4-H manual. Exhibitors are encouraged to enhance their projects, for example stain, paint, embellish with decorations, etc.
- G Units 1, 2, and 3 in Woodworking have very specific restrictions on the tools used in building an item to display. This is done for reasons of safety and to provide a fair comparison among projects in a level. Exhibits must be portable and cannot be exhibited on a trailer. **Allowed tools in this level:** hand tools, power hand drill, miter box (non-powered), oscillating (pad) sander and jigsaw.

Sub-Classes:

Exhibit made from 4-H manual Refinishing Exhibit

Exhibit (Non-manual) Outdoor Project

Woodworking 3 (50359)

Any item made of wood constructed or refinished by the member, appropriate for their age, skills and ability in this project. Pre-cut kits assembled by the member are not acceptable. Exhibits must be portable and cannot be exhibited on a trailer. **Allowed tools in this level:** hand tools, power hand drill, miter box, jigsaw, scroll saw, power sanders, table saw, drill press, band saw, rabbet plane, jointer, and router.

Sub-Classes:

Exhibit made from 4-H manual Non-furniture (non-manual) Outdoor Project Exhibit (Non-manual) Refinishing Exhibit

Woodworking 4 (50360)

Any item made of wood constructed or refinished by the member, appropriate for their age, skills and ability in this project. Pre-cut kits assembled by the member are not acceptable. Exhibits must be portable and cannot be exhibited on a trailer. **Allowed tools in this level:** all those mentioned in levels 1–3, plus circular saw, radial arm saw, planer, wood lathe, chop saw, and other power tools needed to complete advanced projects.

Sub-Classes:

Exhibit made from 4-H manual Refinishing Exhibit Exhibit (Non-manual) Outdoor Project

3-D Printing and Design (Not State Fair Eligible)

Check-in on Tuesday, July 22, from 5:30–7 p.m. Member will be present for judging.

Exhibitors are expected to use the engineering design process to complete their designs. This process is important to the outcomes and exhibitors must keep a log outlining the step-by-step notes, sketches, and documentation from throughout the design and print process. The logbook should define the problem that is being solved/use of the object and describe in detail each step of the Engineering Design Process taken during the creation of the invention.

Classes (Not State Fair Eligible):

- **3-D Design Beginner:** No 3-D Printer or 3-D printed object is required for this exhibit. Exhibit a simple 3-D rendered design using Computer Aided Design (CAD) Software such as Tinker CAD or Inventor. The design must be an object that performs a specific task, and may not be based on already existing 3-D models. It must be able to be 3-D printed. Any CAD software can be used, but files must be in .STL format. Bring your design on a jump driveto be viewed forjudging. Exhibits in this class may not have multiple parts, doors, hinges, or any sort of mechanics.
- **3-D Design Advanced:** Exhibitors are expected to go above and beyond those expectations set in 3-D design beginner. No 3-D Printer or 3-D printed object is required for this exhibit. Exhibit a complex 3-D rendered design using Computer Aided Design (CAD) Software such as Tinker CAD or Inventor. The design must be an object that performs a specific task and may not be based on already existing 3-D models. It must be able to be 3-D printed. Any CAD software can be used, but files must be in .STL format. Bring your design on a jump drive to be viewed for judging. Exhibits in this class MUST have multiple parts, doors, hinges or some sort of mechanistic feature to accomplish a specific task.
- 3-D Printing Beginner: Exhibit a simple 3-D printed object designed using Computer Aided Design (CAD) Software such as Tinker CAD or Inventor. The 3-D printed object must perform a specific task, and may not be based on already existing 3-D models. It must be 3-D printed using ONLY A COMMERCIALLY AVAILABLE HOME/DESKTOP 3-D PRINTER. In addition, original design files must accompany each exhibit. These files must be in .STL format. Bring your design on a jump drive to be viewed for judging. Exhibits in this class may not have multiple parts, doors, hinges or any sort of mechanics.
- **3-D Printing Advanced:** Exhibitors are expected to go above and beyond those expectations set in 3-D Printing beginner. Exhibit a Complex 3-D printed object designed using Computer Aided Design (CAD) software such as Tinker CAD or Inventor. The 3-D print must be an object that performs a specific task and may not be based on already existing 3-D models. Exhibits in this class MUST have multiple parts, doors, hinges or some sort of mechanical feature. It must be 3-D printed using ONLY A COMMERCIALLY AVAILABLE HOME/DESKTOP 3-D PRINTER. In addition, original design files must accompany each exhibit. These files must be in .STL format. Bring your design on a jump drive to be viewed for judging.

Unity Community Center 4-H Art Show April 4 at 3:30 p.m. at Unity Community Center

Rules:

- A. Exhibitor will pre-register for the event.
- B. See the Rules & Regulations (page 6) and Conference Judging Rules (page 7) for general requirements for entries and exhibits. Failure to meet requirements will result in lowering of placing by one grade.
- **C.** To participate in the Unity Community Center (UCC) 4-H Art Show, an exhibitor must attend be a registered participant of UCC.
- D. The UCC 4-H Arts Show follows the Illinois 4-H Visual Arts Rules.
- E. A, B, and C ratings will be determined at the time of the competition based on conditions and the overall scores in each class.
- F. Show date and time are subject to change. The McLean County Extension Office will notify registered participants of any change.

Chalk/Carbon/Pigment

Visual Arts Chalk/Carbon/Pigment: Division A, B, or C

Enter the division based on the type of material on which the art was created.

Chalk/Carbon/Pigment: Division A: Canvas

Any original artwork created with pencils, chalk, pens, ink, paint, charcoal, dyes, etc. on canvas. This would include all painting, sketching, drawing, cartooning, original non-computer-generated graphics, printing, etc. Drawings and paintings should be matted or framed under glass. (Exceptions: Oil and acrylic paintings do not require glass and are not required to be matted.) Watercolor, chalk, pen & ink, etc. do require some protective covering. Gallery frames are acceptable. Canvas paintings that continue "over the edges" are acceptable without frames; however, the piece must still be prepared for hanging. Matted pieces without frames are acceptable, however the piece must be prepared for hanging OR it must include a photo of the artwork being displayed in a non-hanging manner. There is no specific requirement for the type of mat used.

Chalk/Carbon/Pigment: Division B: Paper

Any original artwork done with pencils, chalk, pens, ink, paint, charcoal, dyes, etc., on paper. This would include all painting, sketching, drawing, cartooning, original non-computer-generated graphics, printing, etc. Drawings and paintings should be matted or framed under glass. (Exceptions: Oil and acrylic paintings do not require glass and are not required to be matted.) Watercolor, chalk, pen & ink, etc. do require some protective covering. Gallery frames are acceptable. Matted pieces without frames are acceptable, however the piece must be prepared for hanging, OR it must include a photo of the artwork being displayed in a non-hanging manner. There is no specific requirement for the type of mat used.

Chalk/Carbon/Pigment: Division C: Glass, Wood, Metal, Textiles

Any original artwork done with pencils, chalk, pens, ink, paint, charcoal, dyes, etc., on glass, wood, metal, and textiles. This would include all painting, sketching, drawing, cartooning, original non-computer-generated graphics, printing, etc. Painted and/or glazed pre-formed ceramics and painted porcelain dolls are not eligible for the State Fair exhibit. Drawings and paintings should be matted or framed under glass. (Exceptions: Oil and acrylic paintings do not require glass and are not required to be matted.) Watercolor, chalk, pen & ink, etc. do require some protective covering. Gallery frames are acceptable. Matted pieces without frames are acceptable, however the piece must be prepared for hanging, OR it must include a photo of the artwork being displayed in a non-hanging manner. There is no specific requirement for the type of mat used.


