County Fairs

GENERAL RULES

1. All exhibitors shall be members of a Grundy County 4-H Club and will be permitted to exhibit only the project unit(s) in which they were enrolled by their respective enrollment deadlines as indicated by the 4-H policy.
2. 4-H premiums will be awarded **if available**, by the X system. Under this system, X will be worth a specific currency amount based upon the amount of money appropriated for 4-H premiums for the year, the number of entries, and the distribution of blue, red, and white awards. The X value will then be multiplied by the factor indicated for a given show.

3. All livestock projects must be owned by the 4-H member prior to the latest starting date for the project unit except for horses and dogs that may be leased. A copy of the lease for horses must be filed in the Extension Office by February 1st of the current year along with photos of the horse/pony, a copy of a check showing lease payment, copy of the lease, and a copy of 2 bills being paid by the parent/child. For dogs, the lease must be filed in the Extension Office by June 1st. In the case of registered animals, the registration must indicate the name of the member or partnership or family farm name.
4. Exhibitors in all divisions will be required to choose which entries they will be exhibiting at the fair by completing an online registration form on Fair Entry by going to <http://grundy4-h.fairentry.com>. **All entries must be made by July 1st. If you are unable to make entries online, please call the office to make other arrangements or have them assist in the process.**
5. Not more than 2 entries will be accepted in any class in the following divisions: A) Beef; C) Dairy; E) Goats; G) Poultry (**Exception – limited to 1 entry in Pen classes**); H) Rabbits; I) Sheep; K) Swine.
6. 4-H members are allowed to receive one premium per class exhibited in premium eligible projects; therefore, **duplicate entries will only receive ribbons and no extra premium if premiums are available.**
7. Conference judging will occur in all exhibit areas. A 4-H'er may request special permission to be excused from conference judging if they are not going to be at the fair **OR** if they are showing another project at the same time (however judges/superintendents are quite generous about waiting if they know you are on the fairgrounds). Excused absences must be requested **in writing By July 1st** from the Extension Office. In addition, they must write a short paragraph explaining what they did and what they learned if they are not going to be present for conference judging. A 4-H'er who does not show up for conference judging and does not make a written request by the deadline, will receive a participation ribbon only and **no premiums.**
8. **READY4LIFE Challenge** – This project has been changed this year to instead be its own class rather than an option in each project area. You can find the rules and specific classes under the Ready4Life classes in the College and Career Readiness.
9. **INNOVATION** exhibit classes are included in several of the 4-H project areas. These classes are **ONLY** for exhibitors **13-18** enrolled in the **INNOVATION project** in that **specific project area**. Exhibits in this category must demonstrate the skills and knowledge you have gained through the project area. **Your exhibit should not fit in the other exhibit options for this project.** The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. Your exhibit should not fit in the other exhibit options for this project. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.
10. Ribbons of blue, red, and white will be awarded in each project and are abbreviated by B, R, W. Blue indicates meets standards; Red, needs improvement; and White means needs much improvement. This relates to the Recognition for Excellence program.
11. **All Livestock Exhibits must meet the necessary health requirement even though efforts have been made by the county Extension Office, 4-H club leaders, and the 4-H Association to assist 4-H club members in this respect. It is the responsibility of the individual member to acquire the necessary papers.** The Extension Office will provide health forms for rabbits and poultry after entries are made.
12. **Beef, Dairy, Sheep, Swine, Poultry, and Rabbit exhibits must be accompanied by a health certificate. All health papers will be picked up by the Superintendents. No animal will be permitted on the grounds without the necessary papers.**

13. **Exhibitors may show only show in the Showmanship Class that reflects their actual age as determined by the State of Illinois 4-H age standard.**
14. Department superintendents shall be responsible for receiving exhibits, recording placings, checking entries in their department and discharging any other duties assigned to them by the 4-H Association Board.
15. Exhibitors shall be responsible for having their animals ready for exhibit and brought to the show ring at the time announced by the superintendents. Another 4-H'er (not a Cloverbud member) may show another 4-H'ers animal (except in showmanship classes) only if the 4-H'er is busy showing a different animal or exhibit.
16. Exhibitors are responsible for the care of their animals and keeping their stalls clean. **EVERY LIVESTOCK EXHIBITOR WILL BE EXPECTED TO CLEAN UP STALLS, PENS, ETC. AFTER THE SHOW.**
17. The judges will be instructed to place all exhibits according to the Dual Merit System of Awards. **JUDGE'S DECISIONS WILL BE FINAL!**
18. Anyone who harasses another individual at the fair physically and/or verbally will be told to leave the fairgrounds by the order of the 4-H Association.
19. The 4-H Association and/or the Directors of the 4-H Association are not responsible for injury, theft or loss of exhibits.
20. **4-H'ers will not be permitted to stay on the grounds all night. Gates will be locked on Saturday after 9:00 p.m. and after the auction on Sunday. Gates will be opened at 6:00 a.m.**
21. All projects must be kept in stall/pen or assigned area for the duration of the fair which is from **check-in to check-out** at the conclusion of "Best of 4-H". Failure to do so will result in the following: 1) loss of premium for that project; 2) cannot show project at the State Fair; and 3) 4-H member will not be allowed to enroll in that project area the following year. Do not bring anything to the fair that you do not plan to leave for 3 days. All animals must be removed before scheduled gate closing on the Monday of the fair.
22. Every 4-H'er is expected to help clean up before and after the fair.
23. **NO SMOKING WILL BE ALLOWED IN THE BARNS!**
24. **NO ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES WILL BE ALLOWED ON FAIRGROUNDS!**
25. **NO PARKING WILL BE ALLOWED BETWEEN THE LIVESTOCK BARNS OR ALONG THE SOUTH ROAD.** Trailer parking will be allowed in designated areas by 4-H Association.
26. All 4-H'ers must be at least 8 years old by September 1, 2024 to exhibit at State Fair in all areas except tractor. HORSE ENTRIES FOR STATE FAIR ARE DUE BY JUNE 1, 2025 TO STATE FAIR. LIVESTOCK ENTRIES FOR STATE FAIR ARE DUE BY JULY 1, 2025 to STATE FAIR. In addition, 4-H'ers planning to exhibit at State Fair in Beef, Sheep, Swine, Dairy Goats, Poultry, Rabbits and Horses must have completed the Quality Assurance & Ethics via the website at <http://web.extension.illinois.edu/gaec>. Members should print and sign the affidavit as proof of compliance. Members exhibiting in Beef, Dairy, Swine, Sheep, and Goats must also complete the YQCA training yearly. The office will hold one training per year in early summer or you may complete it on your own online.
27. **Fitting is allowed but not mandatory for all livestock. If you choose to fit it has to be done by family members or Grundy County 4-H family/members or show staff.**
28. **NO ONE** will be allowed in the exhibit hall during conference judging except for exhibitor, officials, and judges. Dog Show, Cat Show, Cake Decorating Exhibition, are the exceptions.
29. **ALL EXHIBITS**, must be checked in at the designated times or rating will be lowered by one.
30. If class gives A, B, C, etc. exhibitor may select any **ONE** of the letter choices to exhibit. If class has numbers 1, 2, 3, listed underneath, exhibitor must do **all** numbered tasks.
31. If you need any special accommodations to attend 4-H Fair related events contact Extension staff or 4-H Association members.
32. **No golf carts, 4-wheelers, 3-wheelers, ATV's of any style, motorbikes, Mo-Peds, motor scooters, or motorcycles** will be located on or operated within the Fairgrounds property without the express written consent of the 4-H Association.
33. All livestock exhibitors are responsible and must clean out their stall(s) at the conclusion of the fair before they are allowed to leave the fairgrounds. Shavings and manure must not only be raked out of the stall but also into the skid loader or tractor. Approval must be made from the superintendent before leaving. Every member and/or family must be checked out before leaving the grounds.

2025 LIVESTOCK AUCTION RULES

**Auction: Sunday July 27, 2025 - 7:00 p.m.
Grundy County Fairgrounds**

The Livestock Auction will be held similarly to the 2023 Livestock Auction. Lots will be represented by their owners in the Auction Sale Ring and will be identified and available for viewing in each of their respective livestock barns. With the exception of Carcass Lots (see below), no Beef, Lambs or Hogs will be available for possession by buyers through the Auction. Buyers and Exhibitors are free to make private arrangements for purchase of these live animals; however, the Auction itself will have no responsibilities in this type of transaction. All lots of Beef, Lambs and Hogs (live and carcass) will be sold by the pound. Goats, Poultry, Rabbits will be sold by the head as was in the 2025 Livestock Auction and, if desired, are available for buyers to take possession after the conclusion of Best of 4-H on Monday, July 28, 2025. For live Beef, Lambs and Hogs, buyers will pay the difference between the winning bid price and the value of the animal as determined by the Auction Committee. Buyers of all Carcasses, Goats, Poultry (per head when sold by pen), Rabbits (per head when sold by pen) and dairy products will pay the full winning bid costs. Exhibitors must make arrangements to care for and dispose of all exhibited live animals through the end of the 4-H Fair. Exhibitors are also responsible for disposal of any exhibition Carcasses that do not qualify for the Auction.

1. Carcass lots will be sold based on live-weights on a per pound basis. Buyers will pay the full winning bid price and are required to take possession of the meat or donate it to 4-H to be auctioned at a later date, with proceeds to be used to benefit of the overall Grundy County Illinois 4-H Program.
2. In order to be eligible to place any animal in the Livestock Auction, 4-H members must have attended (or have excused absences) for 2/3 of the scheduled club meetings. This rule does not apply to exhibition eligibility.
3. All Exhibitors qualifying to participate in the Auction MUST be present at the Auction. Failure to attend without approval from the Auction Committee may result in deletion of the Lot from the sale.
4. Members have the right not to sell qualifying live animals or carcasses in the Auction but must communicate this with the respective Superintendent at the close of exhibition classes.
5. Members will be responsible for care and disposal of all fair-exhibited live animals and carcasses with the exception of carcasses selling in the Auction (carcasses become the possession of the buyer). No live Beef, Lambs or Hogs in the Auction will change hands as a result of the Auction. Goats, Poultry and Rabbits are available for buyers to take after Best of 4-H on Monday. NO animals will be transported to Chenoa Locker for processing.
6. The Auction Sale Order is listed on page 11 and provides a list of potential lots for sale.
7. Pictures will be required of each 4-H'er with their auction animal and each 4-H'er is required to be at the auction. Attempts will be made to take photographs during each of the shows; however, your cooperation in supplying photos prior to the fair is appreciated.
8. The Supreme Champion Market Beef, Lamb and Hog animals will be sold first in the Auction, unless removed from the sale by the seller's choice or by virtue of attendance in Rule 1.
9. The sale order of the Supreme Champions will follow the Lamb, Hog and Beef rotation from the previous year's order - up in the auction order from year to year.
10. If one or more of the Supreme Champions are not sold for any reason, there will be no replacement by any other animal and that Lot will not be filled.
11. All species of eligible carcass animals exhibited in the Hog, Beef and Lamb Premiere Carcass Classes will be sold together after sale of the Supreme Champions, unless removed from the sale by the seller's choice or by virtue of attendance in Rule 1.
12. The sale order of the carcass animals will follow the Lamb, Hog and Beef rotation order - up in the auction order from year to year.
13. If one or more of the carcasses are not sold for any reason, there will be no replacement by any other animal and that Lot will not be filled.
14. Carcasses will NOT be sold on a Premium-only basis. Buyers will be responsible to take possession of the carcass or donate it to 4-H to be auctioned at a later date, with proceeds to be used to benefit of the overall Grundy County Illinois 4-H Program.

15. Based on the number of animals exhibited in the Premiere Carcass Classes, the number qualifying for auction will be as described below - in the case of an odd number of carcasses shown, rounding up will be used to determine the number that will sell (i.e. 5 exhibited so the top 3 may sell).
16. Sheep – top half of class exhibited with a minimum of 2 and a maximum of 4 carcasses, sold as whole carcasses.
17. Hog – top half of class exhibited with a minimum of 4 and maximum of 8 carcasses, sold as whole carcasses.
18. Beef – whole rather than half carcasses will sell in two lots (1/2 carcass per lot). The top half of class
19. exhibited with a minimum of 2 and a maximum of 4 whole carcasses may be sold. Purchasers of the first has the right to purchase the second lot at the same price per pound. If they do not, the second lot will be auctioned.
20. Exhibitors are not responsible for the kill fees for animals qualifying for the Auction. Kill fees and processing fees for auctioned carcass are paid by the buyer or 4-H if donated to back to the 4-H program. Kill fees and other processing fees are paid by the Exhibitor for carcasses not sold in the Auction
21. If one or more carcass lots are not sold through the auction for any reason, there will be no replacement by any other carcasses and that Lot will not be filled.
22. For additional rules concerning Beef, lamb, and swine premiere classes, see Division A, I, and/or K.
23. All remaining species of market animals qualifying for the sale, by virtue of exhibition standings, will be sold immediately following the sale of carcass animals, unless removed from the sale by the seller's choice or by virtue of attendance in Rule
24. Live Lambs, Hogs and Beef will qualify for the sale by virtue of placing in the Top 5 of each species rather than on designation as a Champion or Reserve Champion. The exception being carcass and Rate-of-Gain classes, the number of which will sell as seen under Sections 8d and 9d.
25. The sale order will follow be as follows: Dairy, Poultry, Rabbits, and Goats (not subject to any rotation and will always be in this position in the Auction) followed by Lamb, Hog and Beef rotation from the previous year's species order – up in the auction order from year to year.
26. If one or more of the animals are not sold for any reason, there will be no replacement by any other animal and that Lot will not be filled.
27. Based on the number of animals exhibited in the Rate-of-Gain Classes, the number qualifying for auction will be as described below - in the case of an odd number of exhibited animals, rounding up will be used to determine the number sold (i.e. 5 exhibited so the top 3 sell will sell).
28. Sheep – top half with a minimum of 2
29. Beef – top half with a minimum of 2
30. Swine – no Rate-of-Gain class exists
31. Following sale of the qualifying sale animals, bonus Lambs, Hog and Beef will be sold.
32. Any Lamb, Hog or Beef exhibitor who has not qualified by virtue of Top 5 or other class standing to sell in the Livestock Auction will be allowed to sell one Beef, Lamb or Hog (live or carcass), as long as the 4-H member has met the attendance requirement of Rule 1.
33. The sale order of the Bonus animals will follow the Lamb, Hog and Beef rotation from the previous year's species order - up in the auction order from year to year.
34. Animals will be randomly ordered within their species.
35. All carcass buyers are responsible for contacting Chenoa Locker, 8 North Veto, Chenoa, IL 61726 (815) 945-7323 with cutting instructions and meat pick-up arrangements on Monday, July 29, 2024. Buyers are responsible for associated kill and cutting fees. Buyers of carcass animals will be responsible for the carcass, either by taking ownership or donation to be auctioned, with proceeds to be used to benefit of the overall Grundy County Illinois 4-H Program.
36. The following information will be published prior to the sale of all animals and will be available on a receipt at the time of checkout:
37. Name of 4-H'er, 4-H Club, Weight of animal, Class and Placing of Animal
38. Live Beef, Lamb and Hog and their respective carcass lots will be sold on a live weight per pound basis as determined by the pre-show weigh-in.
39. Buyers of live animals will pay only the difference between the bid price and the value of the animal as determined by the Auction Committee.
40. Buyers of carcasses will be required to pay the full per pound bid price for the ½ / whole carcass and either take possession of the carcass or donate it to 4-H for sale at a future date, with proceeds to be used to benefit of the overall Grundy County Illinois 4-H Program.

41. Goats, Poultry, and Rabbit projects will be sold by the head including the number of animals in Poultry and rabbit pens (i.e. pen of 3 chickens is the winning bid price times 3). Buyers will pay full winning bid costs rather than a “premium-only” amount.
42. Checks should be made payable to Grundy County 4-H Association, and are requested the night of the sale, but can be delivered to the 4-H Fair Office on the Fairgrounds before 3:00 p.m. on Monday, July 30, 2024 or the Grundy County Extension Office by 4:30 p.m. on Tuesday, July 30, 2024. The Extension Office is located at 4004 N. Division St. (Farm Bureau Building) in Morris, Illinois. ALL BUYERS MUST CHECKOUT IMMEDIATELY AFTER THE AUCTION.
43. A 5% sales commission plus \$30 will be assessed on every Lot sold. The 5% commission supports auction expenses and the \$30 provides a pair of pork chop dinner tickets for the 2025 pork chop dinner for each buyer.

Important Carcass and Auction Information For 4-H'ers and Parents

THE 2025 AUCTION WILL BE STRUCTURED SIMILARLY TO THE 2024 AUCTION:

Livestock in the Auction will be identified and available for viewing in their respective barns prior to the sale. It is encouraged that the Owners be present with their animals to promote the Auction, encourage potential bidders and answer questions from 5:30 to 6:30 4-H'ers with livestock in the Auction are required to attend the Auction and go through the sale ring. Failure to be present without prior permission may result in elimination of the affected Lots in the Auction. It is anticipated that photos of the sellers and animals will be shown.

Market Beef, Lambs and Hogs will qualify for the Auction by placing in the top five of their respective shows (they will not qualify as Champion or Reserve male, female, breed, etc.). Rate-of-Gain and Carcass animals will qualify for the sale based on published "top half of animals exhibited" and "minimum number" guidelines. On-the Hoof Rate-of-Gain class winners will be eligible to show in the Top Five Competition.

At the time of weigh-in, each exhibiter must provide a biography to be read during the Auction.

The Auction order will be as follows: Supreme Market Animals (rotating order each year), followed by the carcass lots (rotating order each year), followed by Dairy, Poultry, Rabbits and Goats (not be subject to yearly rotation), followed by Bonus live or carcass Beef, Lambs and Hogs (rotating order each year).

Buyers of live Lambs, Hogs and Beef in the Livestock Auction will not have the option to take possession of the animals, unless arranged privately between the buyer and the seller (no animals to be released until after Best of 4-H on Monday and 4-H'ers are responsible for animals during their stay on the fairgrounds). Buyers of these species will pay to the Grundy County 4-H Association, only the difference between the Bid amount and the market value as determined by the Auction Committee prior to the Auction.

Exhibitors are responsible for care of all animals throughout the Fair and subsequent disposal of all live animals after the Fair.

Exhibitors are responsible for disposal of all carcasses that are not eligible for sale in the Auction.

There will be no transportation provided to Chenoa Locker.

Buyers of live Goats, Rabbits and Poultry in the Livestock Auction will pay the full bid price (per head in each Lot). Buyers may arrange with the seller to take possession of these animals (only available to leave the fairgrounds at the conclusion of Best of 4-H on Monday). Sellers are responsible for care of all live animals until removal from the fairgrounds after Best of 4-H. If animals are not removed by Buyers in a timely fashion (as determined by the relevant Superintendent) after Best of 4-H, the 4-H'er will be responsible for the removal and possession of the animals.

No carcasses will be sold on a "premium only" basis. Buyers are responsible to take possession of the carcass meat, or donate it to 4-H to be auctioned at a later date with proceeds to be used for the betterment of the overall 4-H Program.

Chenoa Locker will NOT carry ANY responsibility for distribution of privately, re-sold carcasses.

Whole Beef carcasses will sell in two halves (two lots). The buyer of the first lot has the right to purchase the second lot at the same price per pound. If they do not, the second lot will be auctioned.

Sellers will be required to submit completed thank you notes for each of their buyers at barn clean-up or sent to the Extension Office. Give completed Thank You Notes to Bill Chapin before or during Barn Clean-up or send to the office ASAP. All 4-H'er Thank You Notes must be accounted for before Auction checks will be issued to anyone that participated in the Livestock Auction.

As in the past 5% for auction costs and \$30 for a pair of Pork Chop Dinner Tickets will be assessed for each lot sold.

 - To learn responsibility for the care of cattle
 - To learn the process of halter breaking and showing cattle
 - To be involved in cattle project with a calf that is “size-appropriate” for the 4-H’er.
 - To take an animal from infancy to maturity. Bucket calves under 6 months of age will provide for a steer to be market ready the following year or a heifer to be shown in a yearling breeding class.
- ❖ All bucket calves will be stalled together at the Grundy County 4-H Fair – individually, not in pens.
- ❖ No health papers are required for these calves since they are under 6 month old.
- ❖ Beef or Dairy, steers or heifers are eligible, but must have been bottle/bucket feed milk (not fed long-term on milking females).
- ❖ Calves must be under 6 months of age at the time of the show at the Grundy County 4-H Fair
- ❖ Ownership must be by May 1st and ear tag numbers must be provided to the Dairy Superintendent (Cash Biros in 2024) by May 1st. It is preferable to provide the Superintendent with a photograph showing a legible ear tag number in the animal’s ear.
- ❖ Calves must be halter broken and ready to be shown in a show ring and for stalling without use of a pen gates.
- ❖ The class will be judged in the show ring in a similar fashion to showmanship, but the Bucket calf class will not be an official showmanship class. Animals will be expected to be lead solely by the 4-H’er owning the calf, but a parent or designated adult may at the edge of the ring for emergencies.
 - Confirmation of the calf will not be judged, but the calf should be washed and groomed as appropriate.
 - A large component of the judging will be based on the skills and knowledge learned by the 4-H’er as determined through conference judging.
- ❖ Judging of the Bucket Calf class will take place during the Dairy Show.
- ❖ Clover Buds are not eligible for the Bucket calf project.
- ❖ Bucket calves may be shown in Dairy Showmanship classes.
- ❖ Bucket calves are not eligible for the auction.
- ❖ Showing other livestock is not required to be in the Bucket calf project.
- ❖ **Bucket calves do not fulfill the requirement of showing a live animal if entered in the beef carcass class.**

1. 4-H Dog Show will be held Monday, July 28th at the Grundy County Fairgrounds. Dogs must be checked in between 8:00 and 8:30 a.m. Judging will start at 8:30 a.m.

2. Will County 4-H members enrolled in Dog are allowed to perform in **Obedience and Rally classes** at Will County 4-H Dog Show without premium, just for a qualifying score for state, and visa versa.

3. Dogs shall be free from communicable diseases and exhibitors **MUST** present to the superintendent of the show, signed veterinarian certificates showing distemper, hepatitis, and rabies inoculations for dog to be shown.

4. Parvo-Virus inoculation is highly recommended at least 30 days before the show.

5. **Exhibitors chosen for State Fair** must pay entry fee (\$5.00 or TBD- Please see state dog fair rules) include with their entry form a score sheet signed and dated by judge of county 4-H Show (Obedience, Showmanship and Rally Obedience), county 4-H obedience class graduation trial, or AKC obedience trial. The score sheet must have a qualifying score as noted for State Fair entry. Showmanship needs a signed and dated score sheets by judge and verification for showmanship class form signed and dated from show superintendent which is brought to the entry table at the state fair dog show. Showmanship needs a signed and dated score sheets by judge and verification for showmanship class form signed and dated from show superintendent which is brought to the entry table at the state fair dog show. **Entries for dogs 6 months of age or older must include a current official rabies vaccination certificate and brought to the table with signed score sheet for all entered classes.**

6. To be eligible for state fair in obedience, these are the requirements for obedience, showmanship and Rally Obedience.

- **Obedience:** a dog and handler team must have a qualifying score of **170 points or higher for all classes and completed 50% of each exercise in the class.**
- **Showmanship:** a dog and handler team must earn **first place** in the class.
- **Rally Obedience:** a dog and handler team must earn a qualifying score of **70 points or higher by completing the principal part of each station.**

7. Uncontrolled dogs or one that shows aggression towards handler, judge, or other dogs will be excluded from the show. Dogs must be under the exhibitor's supervision at all times either on leash or crated.

8. All dogs must be brought to the show on a six-foot leather, nylon, or canvas leash. Harnesses or gentle leaders **are not** acceptable show equipment.

9. No prong, or electronic collars will be allowed. Collars with identification tags are not show collars and should not be used in the show rings.

10. Dogs do not have to be registered or purebred. Judging will be on the dog's condition, coat, obedience, and/or handling.

11. Members are to groom their own dogs.

12. A dog cannot show in a class more than one year except in graduate novice, pre-open, open, graduate open, pre-utility class and utility class.

***If a dog has 3 qualifying scores in Beginner Novice or Novice three months prior to the State 4H Dog Show at either at the following events must move up to next higher class. The three qualifying scores can come from different shows or all from one show over time.

- County 4H Show
- State 4H Show
- AKC Sanctioned Match
- AKC Trail

13. Beginner Novice I class is for new handlers and inexperienced dogs only.

14. Beginner Novice II is for experienced handlers with inexperienced dogs or experienced dogs with inexperienced handlers.

15. Dogs do not have to be AKC registered to show in obedience. AKC rules will be used as a guideline for judging.

16. A dog being shown in the dog obedience project must be trained by the exhibitor and belong to the exhibitor or to a member of his immediate family or leased for the length of the project with a signed agreement filed at County Office by June 1.

17. In most classes, commands/signals given by handler will be either voice or hand, but not both. The “Stay” command can be both verbal and a signal given at the same time unless stated differently in class rules. AKC rules will be followed for each AKC class.

18. Exercises for all classes may be done in any order, depending upon scheduling and the judge’s preference.

19. Exhibitor shall be limited to one entry in each class. The same dog cannot be shown in more than one obedience class. The same dog can be shown in an obedience class and a showmanship class plus rally obedience class. A dog can only compete in one showmanship class: Junior or Senior.

20. **DOGS WILL BE TAKEN HOME IMMEDIATELY AFTER DOG SHOW.**

21. A 4-H'er will not be paid a premium for Dog Care and Dog Obedience with the same dog as care is part of the obedience project.

22. Showmanship: Must show own animal. Award will go to the highest scoring junior and senior showmanship winner.

23. Obedience Award will go to highest scoring dog in Beginner I, II, Graduate Beginner, Novice, Advanced Novice, Pre-Open, Open, Pre-Utility, or Utility Class.

24. Premiums **(if available)** for the Dog show will be distributed on the basis of a Blue award being valued at 3X, a Red award valued at 2X, and a White award valued at 1X.

25. **Project members must have a Dog Ownership Certificate or Lease Agreement on file at the Extension Office by June 1, 2025.**

Rally Obedience

Rally Obedience Classes

1. Dog & handler team must earn a qualifying score of 70 out of 100 points.
2. The event is timed. The qualifying team performing with the faster time will decide placements.
3. Dog & handler team must receive 3 qualifying scores at AKC Rally Trails, county show or state show before advancing to the next class level.
4. All dogs must enter and leave the show ring on leash for all classes. In the Advanced and Excellent classes, handler removes the leash after entering the ring but before judging starts and leaves with dog on leash before exiting the ring.

*Rally Novice is the introductory class and for dogs that have not earned a Rally Novice title.

All exercises are performed on leash. There is a requirement of 10-15 stations to complete with no more than five stationary exercises. Exhibitors may clap their hands, talk to their dogs or pat their legs or give additional commands and or signals. There are no jumps in this class.

*Rally Intermediate is for dogs that has earned a Rally Novice Title but not earned a qualifying score in Rally Advanced. It is a class for a dog not ready for off leash heeling in Advanced level.

All exercises are performed on leash. There is a requirement of 10-17 stations to complete at least three advanced signs with no more than seven stationary exercises and minimum of three advanced level signs. Exhibitors may clap their hands, talk to their dogs or pat their legs or give additional commands and or signals. There are no jumps in this class.

*Rally Advanced is for dogs that have earned a Rally Novice and/or Rally Novice Title.

All exercises are performed **off** leash. There is a requirement of 12-17 stations to complete at least three advanced signs with no more than seven stationary exercises plus one jump (board jump, high jump or bar jump). Exhibitors may clap their hands, talk to their dogs or pat their legs or give additional commands and or signals.

*Rally Excellent is for dogs that have earned a Rally Advanced Title.

All exercises are performed **off** leash. There is a requirement of 15-20 stations at least three advanced signs to complete with no more than seven stationary exercises plus two required jumps (board jump, high jump or bar jump) and Sit Stay exercise per class. **Exhibitors are not to clap their hands or tap their legs to encourage the dog.** Exhibitors are allowed talk to their dogs or give additional commands and or signals. **Exhibitors may not touch their dogs or make physical corrections.**

Exhibitors will be judged on handling skills, knowledge of breed standards of their dog, dog show terminology, and elementary dog anatomy. Dogs will be judged on cleanliness, general health and grooming.

Trick Dog

Rules:

1. 4H youth must be enrolled in the Grundy Co. 4H Dogs project to enter in Trick Dog classes.
2. Your dog needs to complete either the 4H Skills Test or AKC CGC tests before competing in the Trick Dog Classes. Those with AKC CGC can also earn official AKC Trick Dog Titles through completed class checklist and application to AKC 4H Outreach by County Unit Dog Leader- currently free of charge.
4H Trick Titles Only: are for those dogs not AKC registered and/or handler doesn't have Junior Handler Number. 4H Trick Dog Titles are not going for AKC Trick dog Titles through 4H AKC Outreach. They will receive a 4H Trick Dog Participation Certificate for the class.
3. Any purebred or mixed breed dog can compete in Trick Dog.
4. AKC junior handler number and dog registration number are required for all Official AKC Trick Titles. AKC Dog Registration number is either Purebred, PAL or CP (PAL with 2 Pictures of Dog and CP dogs are to be spayed or neutered.)
Refer to www.akc.org/trick-dog/ for further information about AKC Trick Dog Titles, testing or rules.
5. Dog must have rabies vaccination with proof presented to the Trick Dog evaluator or 4H dog show Superintendent/Leader or Evaluator.
6. Dogs need some basic obedience skills and/or equivalent proof of puppy, obedience, agility, rally training or approval of county dog training instructors.
7. Puppies age to compete is 6 months.
8. Uncontrolled dogs or one that shows aggression towards handler, judge, or other dogs will be excused from the show. Dogs must always be under the exhibitor's supervision either on leash or crated if not preforming.
9. All dogs must be brought to the show on a six-foot leather, nylon, or canvas leash. Harnesses, flexi/retractable leashes or gentle leaders are not acceptable show equipment. No prong, or electronic collars will be allowed. Collars with identification tags are not show collars and should not be used in the show rings. Identification tags on show/training collars need to be removed.
10. Equipment: leash, treats or other objects to perform tricks; examples: Frisbie, ball, dog toy, dumb bell, shoe, sock, dog crate, box, cups, basket/bucket or balance board to list a few are to be brought by 4H youth.
11. 4H youth must train their own dog in Trick Dog. The youth and dog must have practiced the tricks performed and prepared to perform to the best of their abilities, as a result of training and practice.
12. 4H youth may show more than one dog in the same Trick Dog class.
13. A dog can be shown more than one year in a Trick dog class until all tricks are performed or earns either an AKC or 4H Trick Dog title. Exception is at Performer Trick Dog level is indefinite.
14. A dog that has earned any Trick Dog Title can't be shown in the lower class.
 - A dog earning a Intermediate Trick Dog Tile cannot be shown at the Novice level.
 - A dog earning an Advanced Title can't be shown in Intermediate Trick Dog class.
 - A dog earning Performer Title can't be shown in Advanced class.
15. Swag Bags and certificates will be distributed for the Trick Dog Show for each class level.
16. 4H youths showing a dog that were only trained and/or shown by an adult or professional trainers are not eligible for high in trail trophy/medal. 4H youths are to train their dogs.

***Trick Dog Classes**

Trick Dog Novice is the beginning class for dogs with no prior Trick Dog Title.

For the Novice Trick Dog title, the dog must:

1. perform 10 tricks total, or 5 tricks performed, and 5 skills performed combined with taking AKC CGC Test or 4H Skill Test- **See Rules Number 2.**
2. A dog with CGC on record at AKC or 4H Skills Test with 4H Dog Leader needs to perform only 5 tricks (the other five tricks come from the CGC Test or 4H Skills Test.)
3. A dog can be shown in this class until all the listed skills have been passed or the dog achieves a Trick Dog Intermediate Title through AKC Trick Dog or 4H Trick Dog.

In the Novice Trick Dog test, handlers:

- May use food/toys as a lure (unless otherwise indicated for a specific trick). Lures are used to guide the dog into position.
- May use lures, hand signals and/or verbal cues unless otherwise indicated for a specific trick.
- May use food as a reinforcer and may also use clickers to mark behaviors. (Reinforcers come after the behavior to tell the dog the behavior was done correctly).
- Dog must do each trick 2 times for the evaluator.

- Dog must do each trick 2 times for the evaluator.

Trick Dog Performer is the upper level class after a dog has earned an advanced trick dog title. A dog performs 10 tricks that are unrelated or to a routine with a theme or storyline. Agility or obedience equipment can't be used in this class. Handlers can design their own equipment or props (example: dog is superman character jumping over a small cardboard building props. Scent article exercises are changed to toys, shoes or household items.)

For the Performer Trick Dog Title, the dog must:

1. Perform a total of 10 tricks. 3 tricks must be from the Performer trick level list below. The rest of the 7 tricks can be from Performer, Advanced or Intermediate trick dog levels must be tricks not used in previous titles but can be a more advanced version of the trick.
2. Three of the tricks must use props. Props are objects used by performers to tell a story.
3. The theme and or story can be read or narrated by another helper, performer (themselves) or written copy to evaluator.

In the Performer Trick Dog test, handlers:

- **May Not** use food/toys as a lure. Lures are used to guide the dog into position.
- May use lures, hand signals and/or verbal cues unless otherwise indicated for a specific trick.
- May use a reinforcer and may also use clickers to mark behaviors. (Reinforcers come after the behavior to tell the dog the behavior was done correctly).
- Dog must do each trick 1 time for the evaluator.

Illinois State Health Regulations for the current year apply to this division including the state requirements that all Illinois equine (12 months and older) be accompanied by a negative test for Equine Infectious Anemia/E.I.A conducted within one year of the event. Papers will be checked at the gate before entering fairgrounds. All horses are to be unloaded at the Horse Barn.
2. **By May 1st**, you must have turned in to the Extension Office, ownership papers and three photos of each animal – front and both sides. Pictures are mandatory for all horse and ponies, grade and registered animals. Please **DO NOT** submit **photocopies** of the pictures. They must be original. If your horse is registered, we need a copy of papers transferred in your name, showing ownership. Please note – substitution of horses cannot be made after the May 1 deadline. If your horse is leased, **all paperwork for leased horses must be turned in by February 1, 2025!** Photos of the horse/pony, a copy of a check showing lease payment, copy of the lease, copy of 2 bills (can be vet bill, farrier bill, etc.) being paid by parent/child, and coggins test in the 4-H member's name need to be turned into the Extension Office by this date.
3. **By July 1st**, 4-H members with a leased horse must turn in 3-4 more photos with the member and horse as well as another copy of a receipt/payment for the animal's care in the member or his/her immediate family member's name.
4. All exhibitors will conduct themselves as young ladies and gentlemen. Impolite behavior or poor sportsmanship may cause disqualification. Parents will be expected to conduct themselves in such a manner as to set a good example for the 4-H exhibitors and other spectators at the show. Ring courtesy dictates that exhibitors maintain a safe distance between animals in halter and performance classes.
5. **Exhibitors may show only one horse or pony in each class, including halter, trail, western riding, equitation, and gaming classes.**
6. **4-H members with leased horses may only lease one horse. Multiple horses may not be leased. For leased horses, one horse per rider is allowed.**
7. Members may not lease another horse to show if they already own their own animal.
8. Guidelines for Junior Horse Shows will govern this division where applicable.
9. **ALL RIDING AND EXERCISING MUST BE DONE IN THE ARENA. WARM UP TIME WILL BE PROVIDED.**
10. **Horses must be led to and from the arena.**
11. All pony classes shall be as follows:
 - Western Type Pony – under 56 inches
 - Western Horse Conformation – 56 Inches and Over
 - English Pony – not over 58 inches

12. Exhibitors must notify superintendent of number of stalls needed when entries are submitted. All horses will be assigned to stalls by superintendent.
13. **ONLY** weanling stallions are allowed - applies to horses, ponies, mules, and donkeys.
14. *If you are exhibiting a horse as a junior horse it must be five years or under and may be shown in a snaffle bit and ridden with two hands. If showing in a shank bit, the exhibitor must ride with one hand.*
15. There will be a 3-minute gate call allowance; an additional 2 minutes will be allowed if previously requested to announcer stand.
16. **FITTING AND SHOWING ANIMALS IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE 4-H MEMBER AND THEIR IMMEDIATE FAMILY – MOM, DAD, BROTHER, SISTER, OR GRANDPARENTS. PROFESSIONAL GROOMERS OR TRAINERS ARE NOT ALLOWED TO ASSIST OR RIDE. NO ONE OTHER THAN 4-H HORSE PROJECT MEMBERS AND THEIR IMMEDIATE FAMILIES ARE ALLOWED TO RIDE HORSES.**
17. Proper attire required for all events including gaming classes (i.e.: Long Sleeve Western shirt or English long sleeves or jacket, Boots, Western Hat or English Helmet, (any protective helmet acceptable) Breeches, or Pants). Ball caps and t-shirts are unacceptable attire for the 4-H Horse Show.

3. Rabbits will be weighed in the presence of the judge.
4. If any one rabbit in the pen **is older than 70 days, or is of a different breed or variety, the entire pen becomes disqualified. Each rabbit in the pen must weigh between 3 ½ and 51/2 lbs. or will be disqualified.**
5. Meat Pens will be judged as follows:
 - Meat Type - 40 pts.
 - Condition of Flesh – 30 pts.
 - Uniformity in body and weight - 20 pts. Fur - 10 pts.

Single Fryer

1. One (1) rabbit not over 70 days (10 weeks) of age.
2. **The rabbit must weigh between 3 ½ and 51/2 lbs or will be disqualified.** Rabbits will be weighed in the presence of the judge.
3. Rabbits will be weighed in the presence of the judge
4. Fryers are to possess the same qualities as a meat pen but judged as a single rabbit on its own merit.
5. Fryers will be judged as follows:
 - Meat Type – 50 pts
 - Condition of Flesh – 40 pts

There are no Health Papers required for Camelids).
2. ALL exhibited sheep are required to have a scrapies flock ear tag or tattoo from the flock of origin. This is a State of Illinois Regulation and applies to ALL breeding and ALL market animals (wethers and ewes).
3. Market lambs must be owned and in possession of the 4-H'er by the designated April weigh-in date. Breeding animals must be owned and in the possession of the owner by June 1.
4. All breeds of market wether lambs will show together in classes determined by weight and all breeds of market ewe lambs will show together in classes determined by weight.
5. Market ewe lambs cannot be shown in breeding classes. All market wethers and market ewe lambs will Be weighed Saturday morning at 9:30. All market classes (wethers, ewes, and pairs) will be divided by weight in order to ensure equitable classes. Rate-of-gain wethers will show in a single class.
6. Rate-of-Gain wethers must be designated at the time of the April weigh-in.
7. Rate-of-Gain wethers must be slick shorn prior to weigh-in. No wet rate-of-gain wethers will be weighed.
8. Rate-of-Gain wethers, as placed in the Hoof class portion of the competition, are eligible to show for placing in the Top 5 Market Lambs.
9. **All sheep and camelid exhibitors are responsible for (and must) clean any used stall(s) before release.**
10. Bedding must not only be raked out of stalls but exhibitors must be present to assist in loading the skid steer or tractor to finish cleaning the barn. Approval must be received from the Superintendent before leaving. Every member and/or family must be checked out before leaving the grounds.
11. 4-H'ers need not indicate breeds of market lambs. Species and age of camelids as well as the Breed and age of Breeding Sheep must be designated when making entries.
12. 4-H'ers must provide their own rate-of-gain wethers.
13. In order to qualify ANY market lamb in the Auction, Auction Rule 1 must be met. Only the Top 5 Market Lambs, ½ of the exhibited Rate-of-Gain lambs and ½ of the exhibited carcasses will qualify for the sale.
14. The Top 5 Market Lambs will be selected at the conclusion of weight classes and may contain any number of Wethers, Ewes or Rate-of-Gain entries (determined by hoof class placing).
15. Camelids are not considered a commodity and are not eligible for the Auction.

4. Lambs must weigh at least 85 pounds to be processed. Animals not weighing 85 pounds may be taken home and shown at the 4-H Fair as a market wether. All lambs weighing more than 85 pounds will be slaughtered.
5. There is no maximum live weight.
6. This will be a terminal show for all animals weighing more than 85 pounds.
7. Judging of the carcasses will be held Friday, July 26, 2024, at 10:00 a.m. at Chenoa, IL.
8. **All participants must attend the judging event or have obtained an authorized absence. Carcass exhibitors must show another animal of the same species at the 4-H Fair.**
9. Exhibitors are not responsible for the kill fees for carcasses qualifying for the Auction. Kill fees and processing fees for auctioned carcasses are paid by the buyer. Kill fees and other processing fees are paid by the Exhibitor for carcasses not sold in the Auction.
10. Health papers will be required as outlined under the General Requirements Section of the Livestock Health Requirements in the front of this Show Book.
11. ALL exhibited sheep are required to have a scrapie flock ear tag or tattoo from the flock of origin. This is a State of Illinois Regulation and applies to ALL breeding and ALL market animals.

GRUNDY COUNTY 4-H PORK PREMIERE

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. The name of the event will be the Grundy County 4-H Pork Premiere. It will be the pork carcass event at the Grundy County 4-H Show. Carcass exhibitors must show at least one live animal of the same species at the 4-H Fair.
2. To be eligible for this class, pigs must have been farrowed on or after January 20, current year. Both purebred and commercial barrows are eligible. Crossbreds must be one part of your production breed.
3. Each exhibitor may nominate one (1) to six (6) barrows. For nomination, each pig must be ear notched, tattooed, and castrated before they are 35 days of age. Pigs cannot weigh more than the equivalent of 1.0 pounds per day of age when tattooed.
4. Tattooing must be supervised by a vo-ag instructor, extension educator, or designated volunteer (Youth Leader). The completed nomination form will be filed with the Grundy County Extension Office and the University of Illinois.
5. The owner must give each pig a different ear notch number and each pig will be given a different tattoo number of individual identification.
6. Ultimately one of the six nominated pigs may be delivered to the 2024 4-H Show Pork Premiere event. The exhibitor selects the pig to deliver. **Exhibitors of carcass animals are not responsible for slaughter costs.**
7. Pigs may either be purchased or produced for this event. However, the exhibitor must know the birthdate of the pigs as well as own and be caring for the pigs at the time of nomination and meet requirements as listed in rule #3.
8. All barrows will be weighed on Wednesday, July 24; One weigh per barrow. **Weigh-in at RON FRYE'S FARM, 2857 NORTH 20TH ROAD; SENECA, IL 61360 @ 6:30am.**
9. Carcass evaluations will be held on Friday, JULY 26. at Chenoa, IL. Times will be sent to members after all entries are made. **All project members will be required to attend.**
10. Pigs will be weighed and identified as part of the Pork Premiere weigh-out listed in the 4-H fairbook. Pigs showing undesirable characteristics (rupture, injuries, etc.) at weigh-out will be disqualified from further competition. Premiums will be based on the X factor.
11. To be eligible for awards, carcasses must meet the following standards:
 - a) Minimum hot carcass weight of 170 pounds.
 - b) Minimum 10th rib fat thickness of 0.50 in.
 - c) Minimum carcass length of 30 in.
 - d) Tenth rib fat depth, and loin muscle area based on **hot** carcass weight as follows:

Hot Carcass Weight				
	170-179	180-189	190-199	200 & over
Tenth rib fat depth, in. (max)	1.00	1.15	1.30	1.45
Loin eye area, sq. in. (min.)	6.00	6.50	7.00	7.50

e) The loin muscle is evaluated for color, marbling, and firmness. The following scoring systems will be used.

Color: NPPC Official Color Standards range from 1.0 (pale pinkish gray to white) to 6.0 (dark purplish red). Loin muscle color scores of 2.0 or lower and 6.0 are disqualified.

Marbling: NPPC Official Marbling Standards range from 1.0 (1% intramuscular fat) to 10.0 (10% intramuscular fat). Loin muscle marbling scores of greater than 6.0 are disqualified.

Firmness/Wetness: A three point scale of assessing wetness and firmness of loin muscle will be utilized: 1 = exudative and soft; 2 = moist and firm, 3 = dry and very firm. Loin muscle firmness and wetness scores of 1 will be disqualified.

12. Pork carcasses that meet the requirements listed above will be ranked by percent fat-free lean (regular carcass show) or pounds of acceptable standardized fat-free lean gain per day on test (premiere carcass show) using the following equation:

13. Complications are subject to review, and decisions by the Livestock Committee will be final.
14. Carcasses placing in top ½, MINIMUM OF FOUR, MAXIMUM OF EIGHT, will be auctioned on Sunday, JULY 28 at the 4-H Livestock Auction. Exhibitors of carcasses placing below the top half must make arrangements to dispose of their carcasses. Carcasses will be sold on a live weight basis.

PHOTOGRAPHY

Each county may submit 3 entries total from 50268, 50269, 50270, 50271

ALL photos in exhibits must have been taken by the exhibitor. Photo/Model releases from individuals pictured in the exhibitor's photographs are required unless the photograph is of a group in a public place where identification would not be an issue. Meta data must be included on the back of the picture. The photo release and meta data tip sheet can be obtained at: go.illinois.edu/PhotographyProject. Photos may be taken with a camera, an electronic tablet (i.e. iPad), or a cell phone.

ALL photos must be accompanied by details of the camera settings that include:

- Camera/device used
- Aperture (F-stop)
- Exposure time (shutter speed)
- ISO (film/sensor sensitivity)
- Lighting used (flash, artificial, sunlight, other)
- Lens Filters (Ultra-Violet, Polarizing, etc.) if used.

Additional details required for Photo Editing ONLY:

- Photo editing software/application used (required for ALL edits and retouches except for cropping)
- Filters used (lens filters and or digital/software filters)

Members are allowed to shoot on a camera's automatic setting but should be able to find the metadata information on the photo to discuss the information above.

The exhibition size requirements for all photographs will be:

Exhibit a display illustrating how your group has used the Teens As Leaders model effectively in your club, community, school, or state. Leadership activities might include planning, advising, promoting, mentoring, teaching or advocating for change. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period. The display must be accompanied by at least 3 or no more than 10 4-H members at the time of the judge's critique. For a larger group please reach out to staff with an accommodation request at least one week prior to the exhibit event. Group members should make a 5- to 10-minute presentation to the judge. All group members present for the judge's critique should be able to discuss the project and answer questions. Only group members present for judging who participate in the actual critique and presentation are eligible for ribbons and premiums. The exhibit should include the project manual with the pages of the activity completed. You may also include live demonstrations of physical activities. Babysitting Display (SF 50141a)

Prepare a display that demonstrates the skills and knowledge you have gained studying babysitting. Topics might include, but are not limited to, selecting age-appropriate toys and activities, explaining child behavior, or recognizing child safety concerns. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters that you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period. For safety reasons, exhibits cannot include glass, syringes with needles or any other sharp objects.

Babysitting Video Tutorial (SF 50141b)

Create a short (1-5 minute) tutorial video intended for internet publishing that teaches the general public about a topic you learned about in your project learning. Topics for the tutorial video might include, but are not limited to, preparing healthy snacks for kids, looking for hazards in the home, things to avoid when selecting toys for kids, age-appropriate games or activities to use when babysitting, how to change a diaper, basic child first aid, etc.

As part of the video, youth must cite the sources of the information they present (either vocally or on screen as text). Videos should not include video or photo content not recorded by the 4-H'er. Videos should not promote any products and should follow all copyright guidelines. Videos in this category will be judged on the quality and accuracy of the information shared, as well as clarity of presentation, and how engaging they are to a general audience (not on filmmaking techniques).

Youth should have a signed model release for anyone appearing in the video besides themselves, and those should be brought to judging. Forms are available at go.illinois.edu/modelrelease.

You must furnish any equipment you need to show your video to the judge (laptop, tablet, etc.). Internet service is not guaranteed, so please have a hard copy of the video downloaded to your device to play. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period. All Exhibitors should also bring a copy of their video to be judged on a USB flash drive and saved in .MP4 format as a backup. In order for something to be on display at your local fair or show, fill out the video information sheet and bring it with you to judging: go.illinois.edu/4HBabysittingVideo. *Note: While exhibitors are encouraged to post their video on www.YouTube.com in advance of the fair, they are not required to do so. If they choose to upload to YouTube they may choose whether to make the video "public" (the video is searchable on the site), or "public, unlisted" (someone must have the link to view it). Each county may submit 3 clothing entries total from 50151 a-c, 50152 a-c, 50153 a-c; 2 shopping entries from 50154, 50155, 50156, 1 entry from 50157 a & b, and 1 entry from 50158 a-c.

1. Exhibits must be checked in on Saturday, July 26 between 9:00 and 10:00 a.m.
2. The garment must be on a hanger in a clear plastic bag, no garment bags. Exhibit tags should be attached to garment, not hanger.
3. **Note:** All exhibits entered in the clothing and textiles area will be judged based on their construction and fit (if applicable).
4. Members wishing to exhibit knitted items should be enrolled in Visual Arts and exhibit in Fiber (if original) or Heritage Arts (if made from a pattern). Members wishing to exhibit quilts are encouraged to enroll in Visual Arts Quilting.
5. Members who enroll in Clothing & Textiles with the intent of pursuing quilting can exhibit in the non-clothing exhibit category in STEAM Clothing 1—FUNDamentals. Quilts exhibited in the Clothing & Textiles area will be judged using a rubric that evaluates the sewing skills and construction of the item. The 4-H member **MUST** complete all work on the quilt. You cannot exhibit a quilt that was quilted by someone else. Quilts can be hand OR machine quilted as long as ALL work is completed by the exhibitor.
6. All clothing exhibits will be judged on Monday, July 28 at 9:00 a.m.
7. Exhibitors bringing garments should not wear their garments when they arrive for judging. The garment will be reviewed by the judges for construction first. Exhibitors will be asked to change into the garment as the second step of the judging process.
8. Purchased and constructed garments will be evaluated on the member, in addition to conference with the judge. Construction and appearance will both be considered. Garments constructed for another person are eligible for exhibiting in STEAM Clothing 1, 2, 3; **HOWEVER, the individual for whom the garment was constructed must be present to wear the garment for the judge.** (Only the exhibitor who made the garment is eligible for ribbon and premium, if available.).
9. Each 4-H'er participating in the Fashion Revue must complete their Information sheet (included in May/June 4-H newsletter) and return it to the Extension Office **by July 1st** for the county show.
10. 4-H'ers are not required to participate in the Fashion Revue on Monday, July 28 at 10:30 a.m. at the fairgrounds but have the option to participate if you have a wearable garment.
11. Garments will be judged according to age and experience in the project. Only those receiving a Blue rating will be considered for State Fair.
12. **If a pattern was used to make the item, the pattern instructions, either written or electronic, are to be included with the exhibit Failure to complete all requirements for the project could result in a lowered rating.**
13. **Each county may submit 3 clothing entries total from 50151 a-c, 50152 a-c, 50153 a-c; 2 shopping entries from 50154, 50155, 50156, 1 entry from 50157 a & b, and 1 entry from 50158 a-c.**

Costume Design & Clothing Embellishment

All exhibits entered in the Costume Design & Clothing Embellishment projects will be judged based on their creativity, planning, and execution. Exhibitors bringing garments should not wear their garments when they arrive for judging. The garment will be reviewed by the judges for construction first. Exhibitors will be asked to change into the garment as the second step of the judging process. If the garment was created for another individual, that person can come to judging to model the outfit, or photos of that person in the outfit can be supplied. (Only the exhibitor who made the garment is eligible for ribbon and premium.) If a pattern was used to make the item, the pattern instructions, either written or electronic, are to be included with the exhibit. Exhibit tags should be attached to the garment (preferably with a safety pin and string), not to the hanger. Garments may be worn before exhibiting but should be in good, clean condition. Both projects require youth to complete a project workbook and bring it to judging.

All clothing projects in these categories should follow copyright guidelines. See project resource guides for additional details.

Costume design members wishing to be judged primarily on the sewing construction techniques and fit of their costume should consider entering the Sewing projects instead of costume design. The level to be entered will depend on the sewing techniques used.

Class Name

[Costume Design \(SF 50157a, 50157b\)](#) *Costume Design Workbook – Required* 

Exhibit one costume, created by the member. The costume may contain multiple items. The costume may include supporting accessory pieces (shoes, jewelry, hats, etc.) that complete the look. Accessory items will not remain on display. If the member created any prop weapons as part of their costume (e.g. swords, firearms, bows, etc.) they may not bring them to judging. Those props can be included in the photographs of the completed look in the Illinois 4-H Costume Design Workbook. Bring a completed copy of the Costume Design Workbook (go.illinois.edu/4HCostumeWorkbook) to show your project journey. Youth should enter the class that aligns with their experience with costume design in any form (including outside of 4-H).

Exhibit one look or outfit, consisting of no more than three coordinated pieces that have been embellished with 1 or more clothing embellishment techniques. Bring a completed copy of the Clothing Embellishment workbook (go.illinois.edu/4HEmbellishmentWorkbook) to show your project journey. No accessory items (such as shoes, jewelry, hats,

etc.) should be brought to judging (they can instead be used in the final look photos in the project workbook). Youth should enter the class that aligns with the technique(s) used in their outfit).

Clothing Embellishment Applied (SF 50158a)

Decoration is attached by gluing, fusing, or painting. Examples: jewels, puff paints, appliqués, tie dye.

Clothing Embellishment Stitched (SF 50158b)

Decoration is hand-or machine-stitched. Examples: machine or hand sewing, such as

adding a collar or skirt, appliqué, satin stitch, embroidery, quilting, beading, knitting or crochet (4-H'er does not need to create the knit or crochet piece themselves, it could be purchased or made by others but attached by the 4-H'er).

Clothing Embellishment Combination (SF 50158c)

Decoration includes any combination of both applied **and** stitched techniques across the outfit.

Sewing 1-3

All exhibits entered in Sewing 1-3 will be judged based on their construction and fit (if applicable). Exhibitors bringing garments should not wear their garments when they arrive for judging. The garment will be reviewed by the judges for construction first. Exhibitors will be asked to change into the garment as the second step of the judging process. If the garment was constructed for another individual, that individual must be present to wear the garment for the judge. (Only the exhibitor who made the garment is eligible for ribbon and premium.) Construction and appearance will both be considered during judging. If a pattern was used to make the item, the pattern instructions, either written or electronic, are to be included with the exhibit. Exhibit tags should be attached to the garment, not to the hanger.

Members wishing to exhibit knitted items should enroll in Visual Arts Fiber (if original) or Visual Arts Fiber Non-Original AGES 8-10 ONLY (if made from a pattern and youth is ages 8-10). Youth over age 10 who use a pattern should enroll in Visual Arts Heritage Arts. **We strongly encourage youth interested in pursuing quilting to enroll and exhibit in the Visual Arts Quilting project area.** Youth may still exhibit quilts in any level of Sewing as a "Sewn Non-Clothing" item, but these quilts will be judged using the Sewing rubric that evaluates the sewing skills and construction of the item. If exhibiting quilts in the Sewing area, all work on the quilt MUST be completed by the 4-H member. You cannot exhibit a quilt that was quilted by someone else. Quilts can be hand OR machine quilted as long as ALL work is completed by the exhibitor.

Sewing 1 (SF 50151a, 50151b, 50151c) *STEAM Clothing 1: FUNdamentals – Required*

Exhibit one of the following in either the Non-Sewn, Sewn Non-Clothing, or Sewn Clothing exhibit divisions:

Non-Sewn Exhibits (SF 50151a) Exhibit one of the following:

- Clothing Portfolio – Complete at least three different samples/activities from Chapter 2 and/or Chapter 3 of the project manual. Examples of samples you might include: How Two Magically Become One, pages 85-86; No Fear of Fray, pages 93-95; Two Sides of the Moon, pages 97-99; On the Flip Side, pages 101-104; Basic Hand Sewing Skills, pages 106-108. The Portfolio should be placed in an 8 ½" x 11", 3 ring binder. Include an appropriate cover, dividers, and table of contents. NOTE – additional pages can be added each year but must be dated with the year. See pages 9-10 of the project manual for portfolio formatting.
- Fabric Textile Scrapbook – Must include at least 5 different textile samples. Use Textile Information Cards template on page 41 in the project manual to identify fabric swatches. Completed textile cards should be placed in an 8 ½" x

Beginning Sewing Exhibits – exhibits in Sewing 1 must be made from medium weight woven fabrics that will sew and press smoothly, flannel/fleece is acceptable. Solid color fabrics or those having an overall print are acceptable. We strongly advise youth do not select fabrics with plaid or stripe patterns as judges will expect stripes to match at seams, which is a more advanced-level skill. NO NAPPED or JERSEY KNIT fabric. Patterns should be simple WITHOUT DARTS, SET-IN SLEEVES, and COLLARS. Raglan and loose flowing sleeves are acceptable.

Sewing 2 (SF 50152a, 50152b, 50152c) STEAM Clothing 2: Simply Sewing – Required 

Exhibit one of the following in either the Non-Sewn, Sewn Non-Clothing, or Sewn Clothing exhibit divisions:

Non-Sewn Exhibits (SF 50152a) Exhibit one of the following:

- Clothing Portfolio – Complete at least four different samples/activities from Chapters 2, 3 AND/OR 4 of the project manual. The Portfolio should be placed in an 8 ½" x 11", 3 ring binder. Include an appropriate cover, dividers, and table of contents. NOTE – this can be a continuation of a Portfolio created in Sewing 1. Additional pages can be added each year but must be dated with the year created. See project manual, pages 9-11, for portfolio formatting.
- Expanded Textile Science Scrapbook – Must include at least 10 different textile samples. Use Textile Information Cards template on page 39 in the project manual to identify fabric swatches. Completed textile cards should be placed in an 8 ½" x 11", 3 ring binder. Include an appropriate cover. See project manual, pages 40-82, for fabric science experiments.
- Design Basics – Understanding Design Principles – Exhibit should include a learning experience that demonstrates the design principles and elements involved when selecting fabric for clothing and accessories. See project manual, pages 17-20, for design suggestions.
- Entrepreneurial Sewing – Exhibit should highlight items you made for sale online. Create an exhibit that displays products you made and posted online. Refer to the project manual, pages 161-167, for information on how to analyze the cost of similar purchased items to determine pricing of your products. The exhibit may be a notebook, poster or small display.

Sewn Non-Clothing Exhibits (SF 50152b) Exhibit one of the following:

- Recycled Clothing Accessory – Create a clothing accessory made from a used item. The item must be changed in some way in the redesign process. The finished accessory must reflect at least one skill learned in the project and exhibitor should be able to identify the skill used. A before picture and a description of the redesign process must accompany the exhibit. Clothing accessory may include: hat, bag, scarf, belt, etc.
- Non-Clothing Item OR Clothing Accessory – Create a non-clothing item or clothing accessory using at least one skill learned in this project. Exhibitor should be able to identify the skill used.

Sewn Clothing Exhibits (SF 50152c) Exhibit one of the following:

- Recycled Clothing – Create a garment from used textile-based items. The original used item must be redesigned (not just embellished or decorated) in some way to create a new wearable piece of clothing. The finished garment must reflect at least one skill learned in this project and exhibitor should be able to identify the skill used. A before picture and a description of the redesign process must accompany the exhibit.
- Constructed garment – Any garment with facings or curves. Should use at least one skill learned in this project and exhibitor should be able to identify the skills used. Garment should be appropriate for the age and experience of the member.

Sewing 3 (SF 50153a, 50153b, 50153c) *STEAM Clothing 3: A Stitch Further – Required* 

Exhibit one of the following in either the Non-Sewn, Sewn Non-Clothing, or Sewn Clothing exhibit divisions:

Non-Sewn Exhibits (SF 50153a) Exhibit one of the following:

- Clothing Portfolio – Complete at least four different samples/activities from Chapters 2, 3 AND/OR 4 of the project manual. The Portfolio should be placed in an 8 ½" x 11", 3 ring binder. Include an appropriate cover, dividers, and table of contents. NOTE – this can be a continuation of a Portfolio created in Sewing 1 and/or Sewing 2. Additional pages can be added each year but must be dated with the year created. See project manual, pages 11-13, for portfolio formatting.
- Expanded Textile Science Scrapbook – Must include at least 10 different textile samples. Use Textile Information Cards template on page 29 in the project manual to identify fabric swatches. Completed textile cards should be placed in an 8 ½" x 11", 3 ring binder. Include an appropriate cover. See project manual, pages 39-52, for fabric science experiments.
- Advanced Entrepreneurial Sewing – Using knowledge gained in project manual, Chapter 5, display one sample product with a business plan that includes a business ID and logo. The exhibit may be a notebook, poster or small display.

Sewn Non-Clothing Exhibit (SF 50153b) Exhibit one of the following:

- Recycled Clothing Accessory – Create a clothing accessory made from a used item. The item must be changed in some way in the redesign process. The finished accessory must reflect at least one skill learned in the project and exhibitor should be able to identify the skill used. A before picture and a description of the redesign process must accompany the exhibit.
- Non-Clothing Item OR Clothing Accessory – Create a non-clothing item or clothing accessory using at least one skill learned in this project. Exhibitor should be able to identify the skill used.

Sewn Clothing Exhibit (SF 50153c) Exhibit one of the following:

- Recycled Clothing – Create a garment from used textile-based items. The original used item must be redesigned (not just embellished or decorated) in some way to create a new wearable piece of clothing. The finished garment must reflect at least one skill learned in this project and exhibitor should be able to identify the skill used. A before picture and a description of the redesign process must accompany the exhibit.
- Constructed garment – Any garment constructed by the member which is appropriate for the age and experience of the exhibitor. Should use at least one skill learned in this project and exhibitor should be able to identify the skills used. Possible examples are wool garment, dress or jacket with set in sleeves and zipper or buttons and button holes, suit, evening gown or sport outfit.

Shopping in Style (SF 50154, 50155, 50156) *Shopping in Style Digital – Required*

Members are encouraged to spend more than one year involved in this project, so they have time to learn what clothing styles look best on them while they also gain skills in building a versatile wardrobe and staying within their budget. Each year enrolled in Shopping should build on previous year's learning experience. For all levels of this project, participants should bring a garment to display and model for the judge.

Exhibit one of the following options that align with the Shopping in Style level:

Shopping in Style: Beginning (Levels 1 & 2) (SF 50154) Choose **one** of the following activities from Unit 1 or Unit 2 of the project book to exhibit:

- Exhibit should consist of a garment that reflects your personal style along with a poster or report that 1) explains how this garment reflects your style and how it influences what others think of you; **OR** 2) how your personal style either aligns or contradicts what is "in style" today. **OR**
- Exhibit should include a garment you purchased along with a poster or report that explains or illustrates how this garment is either 1) a modern version of a fad or fashion from an earlier decade; **OR** 2) how this garment reflects a different ethnic or cultural influence. Exhibit should include garment you purchased along with a poster or report that provides 1) a body shape discussion and how body shape influences clothing selections; **OR** 2) a color discussion that provides an overview of how different colors complement different hair colors and skin tones and how that influenced garment selection. Poster or report may include pictures from magazines, the internet or actual photos of garments. **OR**
- Exhibit should include garment you purchased along with a poster or report that 1) explains how this garment uses the principles of design lines to create an illusion to alter appearance; **OR** 2) explains how color and texture of fabrics can complement or enhance appearance. Poster or report may include pictures from magazines, the internet, or actual photos of garments.

Shopping in Style: Intermediate (Levels 3 & 4) (SF 50155) *Shopping in Style Digital – Required*

Choose **one** of the following activities from Unit 3 or Unit 4 of the project book to exhibit:

- Exhibit should include two clothing items that were previously a part of your wardrobe that still fit but you don't wear anymore and pair them with something new to make them wearable again. Also include a report that explains why the garment was not being worn and what you did to transform it into a wearable garment again. **OR**
- Exhibit should include at least five pieces of clothing that exhibitor can mix and match to create multiple outfits. Include a poster or report that includes a clothing inventory AND describes what you have learned by completing this activity. Please bring at least one complete outfit from the selected clothing to display and model for the judge. **OR**
- Exhibit should include garment you purchased along with a poster or report that 1) includes a wardrobe inventory which indicates why you selected the garment you did, clothing budget, and cost of garment; **OR** 2) explains how advertising influences clothing purchases making a distinction between wants and needs; and how the purchase of this garment compliments and/or extends your wardrobe. **OR**

- Exhibit should include garment you purchased along with a poster or report that 1) describes a cost comparison of this item completed by the exhibitor when purchasing the garment; should include variety of shopping options and/or price tracking at stores over a period of time; **OR** 2) provides a quality comparison rating the specific clothing item purchased based on care, construction, cost and unique features; should include construction quality details, design features that influenced selection, cost per wearing, and garment care.

Shopping in Style: Advanced (Level 5 & 6) (SF 50156) *Shopping in Style Digital – Required*

Choose **one** of the following activities from Unit 5 or Unit 6 of the project book to exhibit:

- Exhibit should include garment you purchased along with a poster or report that summarizes care requirements not only for this garment but also for garments made of other natural and synthetic fibers; exhibit should also include a care cost analysis for garments of different fibers. **OR**
- Exhibit should include garment you purchased which you have repaired or altered along with a poster or report that provides a clothing inventory list which includes cost savings for repaired items as compared to purchasing replacement garments. **OR**
- Exhibit should include multiple garments you purchased along with a poster or report that provides plans and commentary for a fashion show that would capture the attention of an audience. Fashion show plans should identify target audience, include show venue, purpose of the show, and logistical plan for the fashion show. This should also include a financial plan. Exhibitor should be prepared to demonstrate modeling skills and bring at least one garment to display and wear.

Class Name (Not eligible for State Fair)

1. Exhibitors in this class may be enrolled in any of the following projects STEAM Sewing 1-3, Shopping in Style, and/or Visual Arts: Knitted garments.
2. Modeled items must be garments constructed or purchased by exhibitor and must be worn by exhibitor. Pillows or other non-garment items are not appropriate for Fashion Revue.
3. 4-Hers enrolled in more than one clothing project will only need to model 1 garment (preferably one they have sewn.)

1. Exhibits will be "checked in" at the exhibit hall between 9:00 and 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, July 26th. Exhibits will be judged conference style in the exhibit hall beginning at 10:15 a.m.
2. Bars, coffeecake, or cookies should be displayed on a disposable plate placed in a zip-sealing plastic bag. **Non-disposable dishes should be clearly marked with tape and claimed after judging Saturday, July 26th.**
3. A portion of the baked goods will be cut off for judging. The remaining will be sold at the Food Stand
4. Use the recipe from the project book unless otherwise indicated. The recipe and menu (if indicated) may be written or typed on a note card or on a piece of paper. Non-compliance will lower rating. Menu should include the food product being judged.
5. Each county may submit 2 entries from the food science classes: 50204, 50205, 50206, 50207, 50209
6. **All educational nutritional displays and food demonstrations must relate to the project area in which the member is enrolled.** Perishable foods may not be included in the display. 4-H'ers may use food models (commercially purchased or made by the individual), pictures from magazines, etc. Non-perishable items such as sealed or canned products may be used. For Educational Displays and demonstrations, no commercial names should be visible on products used.
7. Best Cooking Exhibit - Award (101, 201, 301, 401, Preservation, and Candy making)

4-H Cooking 101 (SF 50200a, 50200b, 50200c) 4-H Cooking 101 – Required

Using the recipes included in the project manual (*which are also available at go.illinois.edu/Cooking101Recipes*), prepare an exhibit for **one** of the classes below. No icing should be on any products. **No ingredient additions or substitutions should be made to the recipes**, unless they are to accommodate food allergies, sensitivities, or special diets (i.e. nut allergy, gluten intolerance, vegetarian/vegan diet, etc.). If you make changes to the recipe due to the reasons listed above, bring a copy of the recipe with your changes and be prepared to discuss them with the judge. Bars, coffeecake, or cookies should be displayed on a disposable plate placed in a zip-sealing plastic bag. In addition to your food exhibit, complete the What's on Your Plate? Activity on pages 10-11 in the 4-H Cooking 101 project manual (*and for download at go.illinois.edu/Cooking101Activity*). Bring a document with printed pictures of your 3 or more plates and the answers to questions 1-7 to remain on display with your project. The words on the plates must be legible and clearly visible in the picture. Pictures, graphics or photos are acceptable. Due to space limitations at State Fair, the size of the activity document should be no larger than an 8 ½" x 11" binder or folder.

Cereal Bars (SF 50200a) - 3 cereal marshmallow bars

Coffeecake (SF 50200b) - ¼ of 8" square or round coffeecake

Cookies (SF 50200c) - 3 cookies

Youth interested in exhibiting a food item from the project book not listed above, making changes to the provided recipes, or exhibiting a display related to information in the project manual should investigate the Foods Innovation class.

4-H Cooking 201 (SF 50201a, 50201b, 50201c) 4-H Cooking 201 – Required

Using the recipes included in the project manual (*which are also available at go.illinois.edu/Cooking201Recipes*), prepare an exhibit for **one** of the classes below. **No ingredient additions or substitutions should be made to the recipes**, unless they are to accommodate food allergies, sensitivities, or special diets (i.e. nut allergy, gluten intolerance, vegetarian/vegan diet, etc.). If you make changes to the recipe due to the reasons listed above, bring a copy of the recipe with your changes and be prepared to discuss them with the judge. Bread, biscuits, or scones should be displayed on a disposable plate placed in a zip-sealing plastic bag. In addition to your food exhibit, complete Experiment with Meal Planning Activity on page 91 in the 4-H Cooking 201 project manual (*and for download at go.illinois.edu/Cooking201Activity*). Bring either page 91 with your completed answers or a document with the answers to remain on display with your project along with a picture of the meal you prepared. You do not need to complete the Challenge Yourself section on page 91. Due to space limitations at State Fair, the size of the activity document should be no larger than an 8 ½" x 11" binder or folder.

Scones (SF 50201b) - 3 scones

Nut Bread (SF 50201c) - ½ loaf (9" x 5") of basic nut bread (no variations)

Youth interested in exhibiting a food item from the project book not listed above, making changes to the provided recipes, or exhibiting a display related to information in the project manual should investigate the Foods Innovation class.

4-H Cooking 301 (SF 50202a, 50202b, 50202c, 50202d, 50202e) 4-H Cooking 301 – Required

Using the recipes included in the project manual (*which are also available at go.illinois.edu/Cooking301Recipes*), prepare an exhibit for **one** of the classes below. If icing is used on the tea ring or sweet rolls, the recipe for the icing must also come from the book. The yeast bread/roll dough may be prepared in a bread making machine; however prepared mixes are not permitted. **No ingredient additions or substitutions should be made to the recipes**, unless they are to accommodate food allergies, sensitivities, or special diets (i.e. nut allergy, gluten intolerance, vegetarian/vegan diet, etc.). If you make changes to the recipe due to the reasons listed above, bring a copy of the recipe with your changes and be prepared to discuss them with the judge. Display exhibit on a disposable plate or pie tin and place in a zip-sealing plastic bag. In addition to your food exhibit, complete one of the six experiments: Experiment with Flour p. 33-34, Experiment with Kneading p. 35-36, Experiment with Yeast p. 37-38 or 39, Experiment with Butter p. 62-63 or Experiment with Cheese p. 104-105. Copies of all experiments are available to download at go.illinois.edu/Cooking301Experiments. Bring a document with a printed picture of your experiment and the answers to the experiment questions to remain on display with your project. Due to space limitations at State Fair, the size of the experiment document should be no larger than an 8 ½" x 11" binder or folder.

Dinner Rolls (50202a) - 3 dinner rolls

Yeast Bread (50202b) - loaf of yeast bread

Tea Ring (50202c) - 1 tea ring

Sweet Rolls (50202d) - 3 basic sweet dough rolls

Cake (50202e) - one layer of a rich white cake or rich chocolate cake, top side up (*without frosting*)

4-H Cooking 401 (SF 50203a, 50203b, 50203c, 50203d) 4-H Cooking 401 – Required

Using the recipes included in the project manual (*which are also available at go.illinois.edu/Cooking401Recipes*), prepare an exhibit for **one** of the classes below. **No ingredient additions or substitutions should be made to the recipes**, unless they are to accommodate food allergies, sensitivities, or special diets (i.e. nut allergy, gluten intolerance, vegetarian/vegan diet, etc.). If you make changes to the recipe due to the reasons listed above, bring a copy of the recipe with your changes and be prepared to discuss them with the judge. Display exhibit on a disposable plate and place in a zip-sealing plastic bag. In addition to your food exhibit, pick one of the recipes from Cooking 401 that is not a choice for exhibit. Make the recipe and take a picture of the results. Bring a document with a printed picture of the food you made from the recipe and the answers to the following two questions: 1.) If you made this recipe again, what would you do differently? 2.) What did you learn that can help you in other ways besides preparing food? Due to space limitations at State Fair, the size of the activity document should be no larger than an 8 ½" x 11" binder or folder.

Focaccia Bread (50203a) - ¼ of a 15" x 10" loaf of focaccia bread (do not include dipping oil)
Pie Shell (50203b) - one baked pie shell – traditional, oil, or whole wheat (no graham cracker)
Sponge Cake (50203c) - ¼ golden sponge cake, top side up, without frosting
French Bread (50203d) - ½ loaf French bread

Food Preservation (SF 50208a, 50208b, 50208c, 50208d, 50208e, 50208f)

Prepare an exhibit using ONE of the following food preservation methods: canning; freezing; drying; pickles/relishes; jams, jellies and preserves **OR** a combination of these (see Preservation Combination option below), excluding Freezing. **No freezer jam exhibits will be allowed for Freezing; Jams, Jellies, and Preserves; or for the Preservation Combination options.** Be sure to review all of the Food Preservation rules that follow the class list so you can follow all exhibit requirements.

Fruits/Vegetables (SF 50208a) – The exhibit should include two different canned foods in appropriate jars for the products. Food may be fruit, vegetable, or tomato product (i.e. salsa, juice, etc.).

Freezing (SF 50208b) – Prepare a nutrition display that illustrates a freezing principle. There is NOT a food exhibit option for this preservation method.

Drying (SF 50208c) – Exhibit two (2) different dried foods packed in plastic food storage bags. Choose from fruit, vegetable, fruit leather or meat jerky.

Pickles and Relishes (SF 50208d) – Exhibit two (2) pint jars of different recipes of pickles and/or relishes made from produce.

Jams, Jellies, and Preserves (SF 50208e) – Exhibit two (2) half-pint jars of two different jams, jellies, and/or preserves.

Preservation Combination (SF 50208f) – Exhibit two (2) different preserved food products from two different categories above, excluding Freezing, in appropriate jars/packaging (Drying). For example, exhibit 1 jar of tomatoes (Fruits/Vegetables) and 1 half-pint of jelly (Jams, Jellies, and Preserves).

All preserved products should be prepared and processed according to the current USDA/Extension information. USDA information on preserving food, including recipes, can be found at: www.homefoodpreservation.com or <https://extension.illinois.edu/food-preservation/food-preservation>.

Recipes must be processed in a water-bath or pressure canner. **Per the 4-H general show rules, entries must be produced (preserved) this 4-H year (between September 1, 2024 and August 31, 2025).**

All food preservation exhibits must be labeled with: 1) The name of the food; 2) The date preserved; 3) Appropriate method(s) of food preservation (For canned projects: boiling water bath or pressure canner; For drying projects: Specify equipment used (food dehydrator, oven, etc.)).

Examples:

- Strawberry jam, boiling water bath. July 13, 2025.
- Green beans, pressure canner. July 13, 2025.
- Beef jerky, food dehydrator and oven. July 13, 2025.

All food preservation exhibits must be accompanied with the recipe(s) – typed or written, with the source of the recipe(s) listed. **Required recipes and sources for food preservation exhibits** – all food preservation recipes must be from an approved source. Those sources are:

- *PUT IT UP! Food Preservation for Youth* website or manuals
- National 4-H Home Food Preservation Project Manuals
- U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA)
- National Center for Home Food Preservation
- Ball/Kerr Canning (recipes after 1985)
- Mrs. Wages

DO NOT BRING RECIPES FROM: Magazine or newspaper clippings, Pinterest (unless it is from a source listed above), a recipe from a family member or friend without a source, cookbooks (excluding the Ball, Kerr, Put It Up!, and 4-H Home Food Preservation books).

Canning Equipment Requirements: All canned products must be canned in clear, standard jars in good condition (no chips or cracks). Jars must be sealed using two-piece canning lids (flat lid and band). Must use a new, unused flat lid. Bands must not be rusty or severely worn.

Youth interested in exhibiting a food item from the project book not listed above, making changes to the provided recipes, or exhibiting a display related to information in the project manual should investigate the Foods Innovation class.

Global Gourmet (SF 50204) *Global Gourmet – Required*

Prepare a display, digital presentation, or poster exhibit that demonstrates the knowledge and understanding gained through the completion of the Global Gourmet project. Your exhibit should include at least two activities to highlight what you learned from completing this project. Be ready to answer questions about how you shared the information you learned with others. Examples include talks and demonstrations and hosting or assisting with a workshop. Be sure to bring your completed project guide for others to see and for you to share as needed during the conference judging.

Kitchen Boss (SF 50206) *Kitchen Boss – Required*

Prepare a display, digital presentation, or poster exhibit that demonstrates the knowledge and understanding gained through the completion of the Kitchen Boss Gourmet project. Your exhibit should include at least two activities to highlight what you learned from completing this project. Be ready to answer questions about how you shared the information you learned with others. Examples include talks and demonstrations and hosting or assisting with a workshop. Be sure to bring your completed project guide for others to see and for you to share as needed during the conference judging.

Science Fun with Dairy Foods (SF 50207) *Science Fun with Dairy Foods – Required*

Prepare a display, digital presentation, or poster on one of the activities you completed from the manual. Share 1) the topic you investigated; 2) process used to conduct the experiment; 3) results and observations; 4) what you learned; and 5) how you have applied this information. You must furnish any equipment you need for the exhibit. Internet service is not provided. Be ready to answer questions about how you shared this information with others. Examples include talks and demonstrations and hosting or assisting with a workshop. Although it is not required, it is a good idea to bring your project guide for others to see and for you to share as needed during the conference judging.

Science Fun with Kitchen Chemistry (SF 50209) *Science Fun with Kitchen Chemistry – Required*

Prepare a display, digital presentation, or poster on one of the activities you completed from the manual. Share 1) the topic you investigated; 2) process used to conduct the experiment; 3) results and observations; 4) what you learned; and 5) how you have applied this information. You must furnish any equipment you need for the exhibit. Internet service is not provided. Be ready to answer questions about how you shared this information with others. Examples include talks and demonstrations and hosting or assisting with a workshop. Although it is not required, it is a good idea to bring your project guide for others to see and for you to share as needed during the conference judging.

What's on Your Plate, Exploring Food Science 1-4 (SF 50204) *What's on Your Plate? Unit 1-4 Youth Science Journal – (Choose appropriate Level) - Required*

Prepare a display, digital presentation, or poster on one of the food science experiments from the manual that you completed. Share 1) the food science question you investigated; 2) process used to conduct the experiment; 3) results and observations; 4) what you learned; and 5) how you have applied this information. You must furnish any equipment you need for the exhibit. Internet service is not provided. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation. Electronic equipment will only be used during your judging time and will not remain on display during the exhibit period.

Foods Innovation Class (SF 50211)

Open to youth enrolled in any Foods project.

Demonstrate the skills and knowledge you have gained through the project. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original recipes, results of experiments not in the foods project books, variations on recipes or experimenting with unique cooking or baking methods. Your work can be displayed by a food product, demonstrations, digital presentations, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. Your exhibit should not fit in the other exhibit options for this project. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. 7. **Each county may submit TWO entries from:**

8. Articles exhibited are to be made during the current 4-H year and created by the exhibitor (except in heritage arts which may follow a pattern AND Fiber-Non Original Ages 8-10 ONLY). Exhibitor is encouraged to date the project when it is made.
9. 4-H'er may have no more than 2 entries in each class. General Rule #6 will apply.
10. Kits and preformed molds are not considered original and are not accepted in any visual arts class. (Kits are defined as any prepackaged item where the manufacturer predetermines the materials. Examples of preformed molds would be purchased greenware or whiteware.) Combining parts of patterns (pictures, photographs, images from the internet or

a magazine) with the member's own ideas can result in an original design, but changing the color, pattern, and/or the size does **not** make the design original. This also includes ideas found on a site such as Pinterest. If you see something on Pinterest that you like, use the concept and create something different using the concept; however if it **MUST NOT** look exactly like something the judge can search for and find on the internet. (Exception: Heritage Arts and Fiber Non-Original Ages 8-10 items may follow a pattern). **Only at county 4-H fair there will be original and non-original divisions.**

Members wishing to exhibit quilts made from a pattern may enter it in Heritage Arts. Quilts exhibited in the Visual Arts – Heritage Arts area will be evaluated using a visual arts rubric which takes into account correct use of design elements; craftsmanship; and creativity. All work on the quilt **MUST** be completed by the 4-H member. You cannot exhibit a quilt that was quilted by someone else. Quilts can be hand OR machine quilted as long as ALL work is completed by the exhibitor.

11. **Copyrighted/Trademark designs are not acceptable.** This includes Team or School Logos, and/or characters from movies such as Mickey Mouse, Iron Man, etc.
12. The exhibit must combine parts of different patterns and/or ideas with the concepts of the member, however changing the color or changing the size of the item or pattern used does NOT make it original. If you create a replica of what you see somewhere else, it is not your original design. If a photo, sketch, or other idea source was used, submit it with your entry, firmly attached to your exhibit. However, it **MUST NOT BE AN EXACT REPLICA**. Be prepared to explain how and where you got the idea for this project.

Visual Arts Food Decorating Beginning (SF 50332)

Exhibit one of the following:

- Exhibit four decorated cookies, using a minimum of four different Level 1 techniques. Exhibit may use cookies OR cookie forms.
- Exhibit four decorated cupcakes, using a minimum of four different Level 1 techniques. Exhibit may use cupcakes OR cupcake forms.
- Exhibit a single-layer decorated cake, using a minimum of four different Level 1 techniques. Exhibit may use cake OR cake form.

Visual Arts Food Decorating Intermediate (SF 50333)

Exhibit one of the following:

- Exhibit four decorated cookies, using a minimum of five Level 2 techniques. Exhibit may use cookies OR cookie forms
- Exhibit four decorated cupcakes, using a minimum of five Level 2 techniques. Exhibit may use cupcakes OR cupcake forms.

- Exhibit a single-layer or two-layer cakes, using a minimum of five Level 2 techniques. Exhibit may use cake OR cake forms.

Visual Arts Food Decorating Advanced (SF 50334)

- Exhibit a decorated, stacked or multi-layer cake; or a tiered cake, using a minimum of four Level 3 techniques. Exhibit may use cake OR cake forms.

Visual Arts Food Decorating Master (SF 50335)

Exhibit an original design decorated cake using more than five techniques. Exhibit may use cake OR cake forms. In addition, include a one-page written description of your project, including goals, plans, accomplishments, and evaluation of results. Up to four pictures of your accomplishments may be included in the description.

Visual Arts Chalk/Carbon/Pigment: Division A, B, or C

Enter the division based on the type of material on which the art was created.

Chalk/Carbon/Pigment: Division A: Canvas (SF 50336a)

Any original artwork created with pencils, chalk, pens, ink, paint, charcoal, dyes, etc. on canvas. This would include all painting, sketching, drawing, cartooning, original non-computer-generated graphics, printing, etc. Drawings and paintings should be matted or framed under glass. (Exceptions: Oil and acrylic paintings do not require glass and are not required to be matted.) Watercolor, chalk, pen & ink, etc. do require some protective covering. Gallery frames are acceptable. Canvas paintings that continue “over the edges” are acceptable without frames; however, the piece must still be prepared for hanging. Matted pieces without frames are acceptable, however the piece must be prepared for hanging OR it must include a photo of the artwork being displayed in a non-hanging manner. There is no specific requirement for the type of mat used.

Chalk/Carbon/Pigment: Division B: Paper (SF 50336b)

Any original artwork done with pencils, chalk, pens, ink, paint, charcoal, dyes, etc., on paper. This would include all painting, sketching, drawing, cartooning, original non-computer-generated graphics, printing, etc. Drawings and paintings should be matted or framed under glass. (Exceptions: Oil and acrylic paintings do not require glass and are not required to be matted.) Watercolor, chalk, pen & ink, etc. do require some protective covering. Gallery frames are acceptable. Matted pieces without frames are acceptable, however the piece must be prepared for hanging OR it must include a photo of the artwork being displayed in a non-hanging manner. There is no specific requirement for the type of mat used.

Chalk/Carbon/Pigment: Division C: Glass, Wood, Metal, Textiles (SF 50336c)

Any original artwork done with pencils, chalk, pens, ink, paint, charcoal, dyes, etc., on glass, wood, metal, and textiles. This would include all painting, sketching, drawing, cartooning, original non-computer-generated graphics, printing, etc. Painted and/or glazed pre-formed ceramics and painted porcelain dolls are not eligible for the State Fair exhibit. Drawings and paintings should be matted or framed under glass. (Exceptions: Oil and acrylic paintings do not require glass and are not required to be matted.) Watercolor, chalk, pen & ink, etc. do require some protective covering. Gallery frames are acceptable. Matted pieces without frames are acceptable, however the piece must be prepared for hanging OR it must include a photo of the artwork being displayed in a non-hanging manner. There is no specific requirement for the type of mat used.

Visual Arts Clay (SF 50337)

Any original item made of clay; may be fired or unfired, hand formed or thrown on a wheel. Self-hardening clays are fine. Fire/oven-cured and cornstarch clay could be accepted. Items can include, but are not limited to, clay statues, bowls, jewelry, etc. Pre-formed ceramics are not eligible for State Fair exhibit.

Visual Arts Computer-Generated Art (SF 50338)

Any original art created in any software package. Exhibit may not include scanned work, clip art, downloaded images from the internet, any imported image, or photographs. All pixels must be original. Photo mosaics are NOT allowed. Exhibitors in this class (like all other classes in this sub-section) must be enrolled in Visual Arts; Computer project enrollment is not required. **NOTE:** Wood and metal exhibits created through the use of laser cutting programs/devices should be entered in this class. Plastic exhibits with an artistic focus created using a 3-D printer should be entered in this class. If the art created is designed to hang, then the entry should have some protective covering, such as a glass frame, and prepared for hanging. If the art is something that has been created with a laser cutting program/device and is NOT designed to hang, it does not require protective covering nor does it need to be prepared to hang.

Visual Arts Computer-Generated Art Graphic Design (SF 50370)

Any original art created in any software package that displays visual information, such as an advertisement, publication, website, or any other type of visual communication by effectively combining text and graphics. If using clip art, downloaded images, imported images, or photographs, they must be either royalty-free or owned by the exhibitor.

Visual Arts Fiber (SF 50339)

Any original item made of fiber. Examples include but are not limited to fabric collage, soft sculpture, stitchery, weaving, embroidery, cross-stitch, wearable art, hooking, braiding, duct tape artistry, string art, and baskets. **Original** cross-stitched, knitted, or crocheted items belong in this Fiber class. **Non-original** cross-stitched, knitted, or crocheted items should be entered in Heritage Arts. Machine knitted items are not appropriate for this class.

Visual Arts Fiber Non-Original AGES 8-10 ONLY (SF 50350)

Any non-original item made of fiber. Examples include but are not limited to fabric collage, soft sculpture, stitchery, weaving, embroidery, cross-stitch, crocheting, knitting, weaving, hooking, and felting. Exhibitors may use a pattern and/or an idea generated from another source.

Visual Arts Glass & Plastic (SF 50340a, 50340b, 50340c)

Any original item made of glass or plastic.

- **50340a– Glass** - Possible items to exhibit include stained glass, etched glass (original design), mosaics made of glass, glass beading.
- **50340b– Plastic** - Possible items to exhibit include plastic jewelry (friendly plastic); recycled plastic art; plastic that can be molded into 3D shapes.
- **50340c – Plastic Block Art** - Any original item made entirely of plastic building blocks. This must be an **original design created by the exhibitor**. Structures are NOT eligible in the Visual Arts Plastic Block Art exhibit area. The exhibit will be judged using a Visual Arts rubric. The exhibit must be attached to a board or frame for display and prepared to be hung or presented as 3-dimensional piece of table art, however NOT a structure (unacceptable items would include buildings, rollercoasters, etc.).

Interlocking building block creations (i.e. LEGOS) are ONLY suitable for 50340C exhibit option of the Visual Arts Glass & Plastic class. Steppingstones can be entered as a Visual Arts exhibit in Glass & Plastic; however they must have an intentional design created using glass and/or plastic and the exhibitor must be prepared to discuss the design elements associated with their exhibit. Due to space limitations, any single exhibit in the Glass & Plastic project should NOT exceed 48" x 48".

Visual Arts Heritage Arts (SF 50341) Exhibit an item of **traditional** art learned from another person or **from a pattern** (NO KITS may be entered in this class). Non-original cross-stitched, knitted and crocheted items by pattern fit in this class. ALL ORIGINAL cross-stitched, knitted and crocheted items should be exhibited in Fiber Arts; (machine knitted items ARE NOT

acceptable for this class.) Other possibilities include: needlepoint, counted cross-stitch, crewel, embroidery, cut work, hardanger embroidery (embroidery openwork), macramé, candles, blacksmithing, pysanki (decorated eggs), baskets (made using a traditional pattern), traditional handmade dolls with handmade costumes, soaps made using nature dyes and/or candles.

Exhibitors in Heritage Arts MUST also bring 1) the pattern or a copy of the pattern they used to create their traditional art; and 2) be prepared to explain the traditional origins of their art choice.

Visual Arts Leather (SF 50321)

Exhibit one of the following options using leather:

- A. **Leather Stamping:** Exhibit should utilize one or more stamping techniques – exhibit examples include items such as belt; coasters; bookmark; key chain; wrist bracelet.
- B. **Leather Carving or Tooling:** Exhibit should use simple swivel knife tooling techniques or may incorporate several swivel knife-tooling designs or patterns – exhibit examples include items such as belt; pictorial carving; key case.
- C. **Leather Lacing:** Exhibit to include stamping and/or carving techniques incorporated with lacing techniques – exhibit examples include items such as wallets; purses; etc.
- D. **Leather Stitching:** Exhibit may include stamping, carving and/or lacing techniques and should be a leather item or article of apparel, which incorporates hand-sewing and/or machine stitching techniques. Hand-sewing and/or machine stitching must be the work of the exhibitor.

Visual Arts Metal (SF 50342)

Any original item made of metal such as sculpture, tin punch, engraved metal, and jewelry. Items intended for industrial use (such as tools and/or shop items) are not considered part of this Visual Arts project and are not eligible for entry. Metal items that have been partially or totally created through the use of laser cutting programs/devices should be entered in Computer-Generated Art.

Visual Arts Nature (SF 50343)

Any original item made of natural material such as wreaths, cornhusk dolls, etc. Items should be made of natural materials (which may be purchased) but securing elements such as glue and wire may be used in the inner construction as long as they do not detract from the overall "natural" appearance. Engineered wood may be utilized as part of the exhibit to adhere natural materials, not as an element of the design. Articles such as dried pressed flowers may be displayed under glass if viewed as necessary for protection/preservation of the natural materials. Candles are not suitable as entries and instead should be entered in Heritage Arts. All baskets should be entered in Heritage Arts.

Visual Arts Paper (SF 50344a & SF 50344b)

Any original item made of paper. Exhibitors should create an exhibit that aligns with one of the following categories:

- **50344a Two-Dimensional Paper Art** – Exhibits should be a 2-dimensional image. Paper art which falls into the 2-dimensional category includes: Greeting Cards; paper-cut designs; hand-made paper; paper collage; quilling.
- **50344b Three-Dimensional Paper Art** – Exhibits should be a 3-dimensional image. Exhibits in the 3-dimensional category must have multiple layers and/or levels. This is defined as more than 3 layers so the image truly has dimensions that can be viewed from at least three sides; or is at least ½" tall. Paper art which falls into the 3-dimensional category includes but is not limited to: Origami; Paper Mache; Paper models of architecture, paper-cut designs; quilling.

PLEASE NOTE THE FOLLOWING:

1. Paper-cut designs and quilling have the potential, depending on the design, to align with either of the categories. The key design element is whether the design is 2-dimensional or 3-dimensional.
2. Paper twist articles made from a kit or directions in a craft book or store ARE NOT original and not appropriate in

the Visual Arts Paper exhibit area. Scrapbooks are also not eligible in Visual Arts Paper but should be exhibited in Visual Arts Scrapbooking.

3. If creating origami, folded pieces should either be used to create a bigger project such as a mobile or wreath, or multiple pieces of origami should be displayed. Exceptions would be if exhibitor created their own folding pattern.

Visual Arts Quilting – You Can Quilt (Level 1) (SF 50331a)

Exhibit one of the following quilting options. All exhibits should include a card which 1) Identifies the item as an original design created by the exhibitor; as a pattern created by someone else; OR as a pattern that has been adapted by the exhibitor. AND 2) Identifies the type of batting used. The item may be quilted using any method – tie, hand, or machine quilted. **All work must be completed by the 4-H member.** Exhibit one of the following:

- A Doll Quilt (maximum size of 24" x 30"); OR
- A Baby Quilt (maximum size of 48"x 48"); OR
- A Quilted Table Runner (maximum size of 18" x 36"); OR
- A small Wall Hanging (square or rectangular (maximum size of 36" x 36")). Hanging should include tabs or a pocket on the back for it to be hung.

Visual Arts Quilting – Quilting the Best Better (Level 2) (SF 50331b)

Exhibit one of the following quilting options. All exhibits should include a card which 1) Identifies the item as an original design created by the exhibitor as a pattern created by someone else; OR as a pattern that has been adapted by the exhibitor; 2) Identifies the type of batting used; AND 3) Provides details on any special techniques that were used (applique, embroidery, free-motion quilting, etc.). The item may be quilted using any method – tie, hand, or machine quilted. **All work must be completed by the 4-H member.** Exhibit one of the following:

- A Lap Quilt (width ranging from 42" – 58" length ranging from 56" – 70"); OR
- A Large Quilted Wall Hanging (can be rectangular or square, sized larger than 36" x 36"). Hanging should include tabs or a pocket on the back for it to be hung; OR
- A Quilt that fits any size bed (Twin, Double, Queen or King).

Visual Arts Scrapbooking, Beginning (SF 50345)

Exhibit one album or notebook, either 8 ½" x 11" or 12" x 12", with a front and back cover. The album/notebook must have a minimum of 4 pages (front and back, making it 8 sides), exhibited in page protectors. **NOTE – the front and back album covers are NOT part of the "page" count.** "Embellishments" are defined as the decorations or special details and features that add to a page and make it more visually appealing. Embellishments may include, but are not limited to, ribbon, clips, stickers, special lettering, etc. Beginners must use a **minimum of four embellishments** in their 4 scrapbook pages (a minimum of four embellishments on the 4 required scrapbook pages, not four per page), 8 sides and tell a story with pictures

Visual Arts Scrapbooking, Intermediate (SF 50346)

Exhibit one album or notebook, either 8 ½" x 11" or 12" x 12", with a front and back cover. The album/notebook must have a minimum of 6 pages (front and back, 12 sides), exhibited in page protectors. **NOTE – the front and back album covers are NOT part of the "page" count.** "Embellishments" are defined as the decorations or special details and features that add to a page and make it more visually appealing. Embellishments may include, but are not limited to, ribbon, clips, stickers, special lettering, etc. Intermediate level exhibitors must use a **minimum of eight embellishments** in their 6 scrapbook pages (a minimum of eight embellishments on the 6 required scrapbook pages, not eight per page), 12 sides and tell a story with pictures and journaling.

Visual Arts Scrapbooking, Advanced (SF 50347)

Exhibit one album or notebook, either 8 ½" x 11" or 12" x 12", with a front and back cover. The album/notebook must have a minimum of 8 pages (front and back, 16 sides), exhibited in page protectors. **NOTE – the front and back album covers are NOT part of the “page” count.** “Embellishments” are defined as the decorations or special details and features that add to a page and make it more visually appealing. Embellishments may include, but are not limited to, ribbon, clips, stickers, special lettering, etc. Advanced level exhibitors must use a **minimum of 12 embellishments** in their 8 scrapbook pages (a minimum of twelve embellishments on the 8 required scrapbook pages, not twelve per page), 16 sides and tell a compelling story with pictures, journaling, and other media.

Visual Arts Three-Dimensional Design/Mixed Media (SF 50348)

Art pieces in this class must be comprised of **at least three different media**. No one medium can make up more than 40% of a piece. The piece should **be either freestanding or should be prepared to be hung**. It must be observable on at least three different sides. Originality and design are important concepts. Craft and preformed or assembled projects are not acceptable. Due to space limitations, any single exhibit in the Three-Dimensional Design/Mixed Media project should NOT exceed 48" x 48".

Visual Arts Three-Dimensional Design/Mixed Media - Diorama (SF 50351)

Exhibit a model representing a scene with three-dimensional figures. The display must be built on rigid wood (i.e., plywood). Exhibits may include but are not limited to, farm displays, historical events, landmarks, habitats, or scenes from a book. Exhibits may include pre-manufactured items such as tractors, animals, or figurines, but should also include artistic elements where possible. Due to space limitations, any single exhibit in the Three-Dimensional Design/Mixed Media: Diorama project should NOT exceed 48" x 48".

Visual Arts Wood (SF 50349)

Any original item made of wood (wood carving, sculpture, collage, wood burning, etc.). Utilitarian wood items made from patterns or kits (outdoor or indoor furniture, shelves, etc.) should be entered in woodworking, **NOT** Visual Arts. Popsicle stick crafts are not acceptable for State Fair entry. Wood items that have been partially or totally created through the use of laser cutting programs/devices should be entered in Computer-Generated Art. All Visual Arts Wood exhibits **MUST** have an artistic element that the exhibitor can explain. Furniture built by the exhibitor aligns with the Woodworking project area – unless the element to be judged is wood carving or wood burning that is one element of the exhibit. Exhibits will be judged using a Visual Arts Rubric and not a woodworking construction rubric.

Models (Not eligible for State Fair)

Exhibit a basic model. **Kit instructions must accompany display.**

COMPUTER SCIENCE

Each county may submit 3 entries total 50135, 50136, 50137, 50138, 50139.

1. Exhibitors may bring computer equipment for demonstration purposes. No computers will be furnished
2. Internet connections are not available.
3. Any member found to be using computer software in a manner that infringes on copyright laws will be disqualified.
4. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a poster or printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.
5. Best Computer Exhibit – Award

Class Name

Beginning Visual Programming (SF 50135)

Open to youth in Computer Science Visual Based Programming

Exhibit a simple program using Scratch (or other simple visual programming language). The program should include 8 different commands including looping and getting input from the keyboard and mouse. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a poster or printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

Intermediate Visual Programming (SF 50136)

Open to youth in Computer Science Visual Based Programming

Exhibit a program using Scratch (or other simple visual programming language) that you have downloaded from the internet and modified. Compare the two programs and demonstrate the changes you made to the original program; **OR** create an animated storybook using Scratch (or other simple graphical programming language). All exhibits must include something visual, such as a poster or printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

Advanced Visual Programming (SF 50137)

Open to youth in Computer Science Visual Based Programming

Exhibit a video game you have created in Scratch (or other simple visual programming language). All exhibits must include something visual, such as a poster or printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

Website Design (SF 50138)

Open to youth in any Computer Science Project Area

Exhibit an original website that you have designed using a programming language such as HTML (cannot be made with website builder like Wix or Squarespace). Internet access will not be provided, so exhibitors must supply their own internet hotspot or the website must be hosted on the exhibitor's computer. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a poster or printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

Text-Based/Open Source Computer Science (SF 50139)

Open to youth enrolled in any Computer Science or Robotics project Demonstrate the skills and knowledge you have gained through the Computer Science project using a text-based programming language (Python, Java, C, etc.). The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. Your exhibit should not fit in the other exhibit options for this project. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. Exhibits in this class may also demonstrate successful application of open source (publicly available) computing software and/or hardware, such as Raspberry Pi and Linux, to accomplish a task. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a poster or printed copy of a digital presentation or programming flowchart, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Exhibits in this area will be judged on the computer science programming. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period. Exhibits in this class must be able to fit on no more than a 3' x 2' space (or ground footprint).

FILMMAKING/VIDEO

Each county may submit 3 entries total from 50324 a & b, 50325 a & b, 50326 a & b, 50327 a & b, 50328 a & b.

1. Enrollment in the Video project is required to exhibit.
2. Video submissions should be no longer than 5 minutes in length (unless noted differently in class description). All videos are to be original and a result of member's current year's work.
3. Criteria for judging shall include: 1) Evidence of story line; 2) Use of camera angle; 3) Use of zooming techniques; and 4) Smoothness of scene changes. Image and sound quality will be considered in relation to equipment available to and used by exhibitor.
4. All videos should comply with copyright regulations and display an image that is appropriate for 4-H audiences.
5. No time or date should be imprinted on the video footage.
6. All videos should include an opening title screen, as well as closing credits which include date of production, name of video exhibitor, and research sources if appropriate.
7. Each county may submit 3 exhibits for State Fair total in Video/Filmmaking Classes (Commercial or Promo, Animated, Documentary, Short Story, and Innovation)
8. **Video/Filmmaking exhibitors should include a printed copy of online materials which will remain on display.**
9. **All Exhibitors must bring their video to be judged on a USB flash drive and saved in .MP4 format at the State Fair.** Wireless Internet access is not necessarily available. Exhibitors are encouraged to post their video on YouTube.com in advance of State Fair. Exhibitors may choose whether to make the video "public, unlisted" (someone must have the link to view it), or "private" (only people you choose may view it). This will allow fairgoers to view the exhibits on display. There will be TV monitors at the exhibit table for viewing videos so exhibitors will NOT need to bring a laptop or device for viewing at the State Fair. However, at the county level, you need to bring your own device (including a way for your judge to hear your video) for viewing.
10. Photo/Model releases from individuals appearing in the videos are required unless the video is of a group in a public place where identification would not be an issue. The photo release can be obtained at: go.illinois.edu/PhotographyProject.

11. Best Video/Filmmaking Award – Award

Commercial or Promotional Video Individual (SF 50324a) Group (SF 50234b)

Prepare a short video (30 seconds to 1 minute in length) that promotes an event, advertises a specific project/product, or is a public service announcement. The video should demonstrate skills in making and editing video.

Animated Video Individual (SF 50325a) Group (SF50324b)

Video in this class should represent creative animation of original artwork created by the exhibitor and may include stop motion techniques. Media might include images created with graphics software or hand-drawn images.

Documentary Individual (SF 50326a) Group (SF 50326b)

Video in this class should represent a research-based investigation into a topic of choice. Video credits should list research sources and may include paper or electronically published materials, as well as interviews with experts or constituents related to the topic of investigation.

Short Story or Short Narrative Individual (SF 50327a) Group (SF50327b)

Prepare a short video that tells a story. The video should demonstrate skills in making and editing video.

Video/Filmmaking Innovation Class Individual (SF 50328a) Group (SF 50328b)

Open to youth enrolled in Video/Filmmaking

Demonstrate the skills and knowledge you have gained through the Video project. **Your exhibit should not fit in the other exhibit options for this project.** The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

ROBOTICS

Each county may submit 3 entries total from 50285, 50286, 50287, 50288, 50289, 50290, 50292.

1. If applicable for their class and display, exhibitors must bring their own computers for demonstration purposes; computers will not be provided. Internet access will not be available.
2. Exhibits in classes 50285, or 50286 are designed to be used with LEGO Mindstorms (NXT, EV3, Lego Inventor, Lego Spike Prime). Any other programmable robot kit such as Arduino or Raspberry Pi, should be exhibited in Robotics 3 (50292). Members should bring their robot to the state fair.
3. Best Robotics Exhibit – Award

Robotics 1 (SF 50285) Robotics 1 with EV3 or go.illinois.edu/RoboticsActivities1 – Required



Exhibitors will design, build and program a robot that uses at least one sensor to autonomously follow a path, respond to and/or avoid obstacles. **The robot must be autonomous and cannot be controlled remotely.** Exhibitors in this class must use at least one sensor in their robot design. Exhibiting youth must complete and display a build log which contains a diagram (drawing or 3D rendering) of their robot with each of the key components labeled, an explanation of why they made the design/programming decisions they made, and a short journal sharing what they learned about the engineering

design process and programming throughout their work in the project (as well as while preparing the exhibit). In addition, each youth must bring their program code (on laptop or on paper), and their robot to demonstrate. The robot and obstacles must be able to fit on a 4' x 8' robotics table when being judged, and a 2' x 2' area when being displayed.

[Robotics 2 \(SF 50286\)](#) *Robotics 2: EV3 N More* **or** go.illinois.edu/RoboticsActivities2 – Required

Exhibitors will design, build and program a robot that uses sensors and programming to complete two of the selected challenges from the 2025 4-H State Robotics Challenge. **The robot must be autonomous and cannot be controlled remotely.** Eligible challenges will be marked in the Challenge Documents and on the Illinois 4-H Robotics website (go.illinois.edu/4HRoboticsProjectPage). Exhibiting youth must complete and display a build log which contains a diagram (drawing or 3D rendering) of their robot with each of the key components labeled, an explanation of why they made the design/programming decisions they made, and a short journal sharing what they learned about the engineering design process and programming throughout their work on the project (as well as while preparing the exhibit). In addition, each youth must bring their program code (on laptop or on paper), and their robot to demonstrate. The robot and obstacles must be able to fit on a 4' x 8' robotics table when being judged, and a 2' x 2' area when being displayed.

[Robotics 3 \(SF 50292\)](#) go.illinois.edu/4HRoboticsProjectPage

Open to youth enrolled in Robotics 3, but may also include youth in Robotics 1 or 2 if the exhibit meets the guidelines.

Exhibit an original robot, either homemade or a kit that does not fall under Robotics 1 or 2 that can complete a task using MULTIPLE sensors. **The robot must be autonomous, Text Based (Python, C etc.) and cannot be controlled remotely.** If a robot kit is used, then some parts of the robot must be built using other components such as wood, plastic or metal. The robot can include any type of motors, pneumatics or sensors. This class can also be used for LEGO Mindstorms/Spike Prime, etc. or Vex kits where the exhibit does not fall under Robotics 1 or 2 exhibit options. Autonomous control of the robot may also be achieved using an “open source” platform such as Arduino or Raspberry Pi and can be programmed using a coding language that is publicly available. Exhibitors must complete and display a build log which contains a diagram (drawing or 3D rendering) of their robot with each of the key components labeled, an explanation of why they made the design/programming decisions they made, and a short journal sharing what they learned about the engineering design process and programming throughout their work in the project (as well as while preparing the exhibit). In addition, each youth must bring their program code (on laptop or on paper), and their robot to demonstrate. Exhibits in this class must be able to fit on no more than a 6' x 2' table (or ground footprint) and must be fully assembled 15 minutes prior to the judging start time. No Exceptions.

Junk Drawer Robotics

All exhibits should be original designs made with everyday objects and materials. Exhibits with purchased kits will not be accepted. Exhibitors are also required to bring their Junk Drawer Robotics Youth Robotics Notebook with the sections completed for the project they are exhibiting, including the sections leading up to the activity they are exhibiting. For example, if a youth is bringing Activity E from Junk Drawer Level 1, they should have robotics notebook sections A-E completed. For Innovation Class, all sections should be completed for your level.

Junk Drawer Innovation Class (SF 50290) *Youth Notebook – Required (See Level Above)*

This class is open to any youth in Junk Drawer Robotics 1, 2, or 3. Exhibit any item that incorporates two or more activities into a single robot/machine to accomplish a task. There must be a clear task being accomplished with an end goal in mind. Feel free to think outside of the box as you find ways to combine the principles and mechanics to make something new. You will be judged on your creativity and ability to explain your design choices in addition to the construction and performance of your robot.

UAV Display (SF 50375) *Unmanned Aerial Vehicles/Systems: Drones – Required*

Prepare a display related to the Drones/UAV project on the topic of your choosing. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period. Non-UAV/ Drone projects should not be entered in this class (see Aerospace Display).

UAV Unmanned Aerial Systems (SF 50376) *Unmanned Aerial Vehicles/Systems: Drones – Required*

Exhibit one unmanned aerial vehicle and associated system assembled or made by the member. UAV or drone exhibits in this class must be either originally designed or built from a kit of reconfigurable parts and components. These displays are limited to multicopters (tri, quad, hex, and octocopters), as well as FPV airplanes and flying wings with wingspans up to 36". A detailed build log with pictures, as well as a mission logbook must be included. The UAV MUST have a flight controller and utilize a camera/video transmission system. The exhibit will be a static display. The drone should be in good flying condition with batteries fully charged, and all UAS components (including video system) ready to demonstrate. DO NOT display your UAV with the propellers on, but rather on the table to the side of your UAV. The drone will not be flown. Attach the printed directions/instructions of the UAV if any were used.

AEROSPACE

Each county may send 2 entries total from 50130 and 50131.

1. Best Aerospace Exhibit - Award

Class Name

Model Rocketry (SF 50130)

Open to youth in Aerospace 1, Aerospace 2, Aerospace 3, and Aerospace 4

Exhibit one model rocket assembled or made by the member. The exhibit will be a static display. The model rocket should be in good flying condition. DO NOT include the rocket engine with your exhibit. The rocket will not be launched. Attach the printed directions for construction of the rocket if any were used.

Aerospace Display (SF 50131)

Open to youth in Aerospace 1, Aerospace 2, Aerospace 3, and Aerospace 4

Prepare a display related to the aerospace project that does not fit in the model rocketry class. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters that you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

BICYCLE (Not State Fair Eligible)

1. On Sunday, July 28th at 9:00 a.m. be prepared to drive your bicycle through a safety lane and observe all rules and regulations. **All riders must bring and wear safety helmets during the riding exercises.**
2. **The Bicycle Rodeo is limited to 4-H members who are currently enrolled in the Bicycle Project.**
3. **For Grundy County 4-H Fair only:** exhibitors MUST bring their own bicycle and may wish to bring a chain and lock. Bicycles may not be ridden on the Fairgrounds except when performing in the classes. Bicycles will be released at the end of the rodeo.
4. Best Bicycle Exhibitor – Award

Class Name

Bicycle Rodeo

The Rodeo will consist of the following:

1. Written test on proper maintenance, adjustment, operation, and bicycle parts and safety laws/rules regarding bicycles.
2. Inspection of exhibitor's bicycle, including brakes, height, safety equipment, etc.
3. Riding "test" through a safety course, observing all rules and regulations.
4. Additional information as listed below for specific class.

Bicycle 1

Exhibitors will draw three situations from a bag that relate to activities from Level 1 and discuss/explain all three with the judge. Situations may include: Selecting bicycle safety equipment; Demonstrate how to fit a helmet; Identify bike parts and their function; Selecting the right size bike; How to check bicycle tires, brakes and chains; Recognizing traffic signs and their meaning; General discussion of bicycling hazards; and Items to consider when planning a bike trip.

Bicycle 2

Exhibitors will draw three situations from a bag that relate to activities from Level 2 and discuss/explain all three with the judge. Situations may include: Factors to consider when choosing a bike; Comparing tire pressure, valve type and tread; Steps in fixing a flat tire; Steps to follow when cleaning, lubricating and replacing a bike chain; Evaluating the braking system on a bicycle; Factors to consider when mapping out a bike route; Rules for smart bike riding; and Planning a menu for an all-day bike ride.

ELECTRICITY

Each county may submit 3 entries total from 50177, 50178, 50179, 50180.

1. It is strongly suggested that members use recommended construction details including proper color coding provided by the Energy Education Council (EEC) that have been provided on the EEC website:
<http://www.energyeducationcouncil.org/4h.html>
2. All projects must include a report explaining how the project was constructed and the principles demonstrated. Recommendations can be found on the website. Projects using paper clips, cardboard, thumbtacks, & brads are not eligible for state fair entry. Members wishing to exhibit these types of projects should consider exhibiting in Junkdrawer Robotics 1 or 2.
3. 3 entries total can be selected for State Fair from Electricity 1-3
4. Best Electricity Exhibit - Award

Class Name

Electricity 1 (SF 50177)

(May only be battery-powered projects using battery components and wiring). Exhibit a momentary switch, simple switch, basic circuit, electromagnet, galvanometer, **OR** an electric motor. All projects must include a report explaining how the project was constructed and the principles demonstrated. Projects using paper clips, cardboard, thumbtacks, and brads are not eligible for state fair exhibits in electricity. Members wishing to exhibit these types of projects should consider exhibiting in Junk Drawer Robotics 1 or 2.

Electricity 2 (SF 50178)

(May only be battery-powered projects using battery components and wiring). Exhibit a circuit board demonstrating parallel and series switches, including a circuit diagram; 3-way or 4-way switch circuit using DC/battery; **OR** a basic electrical device (examples: rocket launcher, burglar alarm, etc.). All projects must include a report explaining how the project was constructed and the principles demonstrated. Projects using paper clips, cardboard, thumbtacks, and brads are not eligible for state fair exhibits in electricity. Members wishing to exhibit these types of projects should consider exhibiting in Junk Drawer Robotics 1 or 2.

Electricity 3 (SF 50179)

Exhibit a 120V lighting fixture or other appliance that uses a switch; **OR** two electrical household circuits using 120V materials to comply with National Electrical Code, one with a simple on/off switch to control bulb, and one using 3-way switches to control light from two locations; **OR** other project which demonstrates principles in the Wired for Power book. All electricity projects must include a report, explaining how the project was constructed, and principles for its operation.

Electricity 4 (SF 50180)

Exhibit any electronic or solid-state appliance. Exhibitor must be able to explain how the project was constructed, how it is to be used and how it works. When a project is being constructed, general safety and workmanship should be considered. All Electricity 4 projects must include a report explaining how the project was constructed, and principles for its operation.

MAKER

Each county may submit 3 entries from 50400.

Maker: Open to youth in all projects. (SF 50400) go.illinois.edu/DIYMakeBuild – Required 

Exhibits in this category are designed to be multi-disciplinary in nature, innovative, and must not fit into any other exhibit category. To qualify for this category, your project **MUST** abide by the following guidelines:

- Exhibitors must complete at least two activities in the DIY Make & Build Curriculum and answer all the questions at the end of each lesson. You must display your answers to these questions, as well as your Maker Log from the DIY Make and Build curriculum.
- Exhibits must be an object or device that has an intended purpose and uses technology in either a mechanical way, digital (computer) way, or combination of the two. Your device or object **cannot** be one of the included activities in the DIY Make and Build Curriculum.
- The device must be something that can be used in everyday life by multiple people (a target audience), and **MUST** be manufactured/built by the exhibitor (If not fully manufactured by the exhibitor, the device **MUST** be modified structurally or be reprogramed to perform a different function other than what it was designed to do).
- Exhibits **MUST** be able to interact with the outside world. (e.g. an on off switch, input sensors, feedback, etc.)
- Exhibits **MUST** include a detailed build log with instructions on how to make or build the exhibit, **AND** contain either a 3D rendering or detailed and labeled sketches of the device/product.
- All parts and software used in the design/build **MUST** be listed in a detailed Bill of Materials including cost per item and total cost. Total time spent on the build must be documented in your build log.

In addition, exhibitors are **HIGHLY** encouraged to use tools such as 3-D printers, laser cutters, routers and/or other hand/power tools to help in the manufacturing process (**NOTE: Simply 3-D printing or laser cutting an object without the other specifications does not qualify as a Maker Project**). It is also **HIGHLY** encouraged that exhibits use Open Source software and/or hardware in the build.

SMALL ENGINES

Each county may submit 1 entry total for 50294.

1. Small Engine displays must be no larger than 4' x 4' display board.
2. Exhibits must be portable.
3. No complete engines, lawn tractors, tillers, chainsaws, etc. are permitted for display.
4. No electrical power is available for displays/exhibits.
5. Best Small Engines/Welding Exhibit – Award

Small Engines 1-3 (SF 50294)

- Exhibit a display, selecting one of the following items:

- **Ignition/Electrical System:** Identify the parts of the Ignition System and explain how magnetic energy is produced through the ignition system to ignite the spark plug; **OR**
- **Compression System:** Explain how heat energy is produced and engine power is measured by an engine and/or converted into mechanical energy through transmissions; **OR**
- **Heat Transfer:** Explain how heat is transferred through the cooling and lubrication system of an air cooled or water cooled engine; **OR**
- **Filter Maintenance:** Explain the proper maintenance and cleaning of the air, fuel and oil filters of an engine; **OR**
- **What does a serial number reveal?:** Explain the various information that can be learned from the serial number or identification number stamped on the shroud of a Briggs & Stratton engine; **OR**
- **Tools to do the job:** Identify and explain the function(s) of different specialty tools needed for small engine work; **OR**
- **Experimentation:** Explain through illustration an experiment you conducted from the project manual showing the results of your work.

Tractor A (SF 50306) *Level A: Starting Up – Required* 

Exhibit a display or poster that illustrates one of the following topics: tractor safety; care and maintenance; the tractor as a valuable farm machine; or an activity listed in the 4-H project manual.

Tractor B (SF 50307) *Level B: Tractor Operation – Required* 

Exhibit a display or poster that illustrates one of the following topics: cause and prevention of rollovers; diagram how an air cleaner works; diagram and identify an engine cooling system; regulations for battery & oil disposal; or another activity listed in the 4-H project manual.

Tractor C (SF 50308) *Level C: Moving Out – Required*

Tractor Operator's Contest

Tractor Operator's Contest will be held on Sunday, July 28th at 1:00 p.m. Entrants are limited to 4-H members who are currently enrolled in the Tractor Project and have completed a project book for unit in which they are enrolled.

The contest will consist of the following:

- 1) A written examination on proper maintenance, adjustment, operation, and safety of farm machinery.
- 2) Safety inspection of a tractor.
- 3) Two-wheel driving event.

These events are described in the publication, "4-H Tractor Maintenance Program, Illinois Tractor Operator's Contest" available at the Extension Office.

Winner is invited to participate at State Tractor Contest in Bloomington on TBD. Details will be available at the Extension Office.

WOODWORKING

1. **Exhibitors must be portable and cannot be exhibited on a trailer. (If selected for state fair, exhibitors will be allowed to drive to the Orr building to drop-off and pick-up these exhibit items.)**
2. Units 1, 2, and 3 in Woodworking have very specific restrictions on the tools used in building an item to display. This is done for reasons of safety and to provide a fair comparison among projects in a level. **Articles made with tools other than those listed in a level will not be eligible for class awards in that level.**

Woodworking 4 (SF 50360)

Any item made of wood constructed or refinished by the member, appropriate for their age, skills and ability in this project. Pre-cut kits assembled by the member are not acceptable. Exhibits must be portable and cannot be exhibited on a trailer. **Allowed tools in this level:** all those mentioned in levels 1- 3, plus circular saw, radial arm saw, planer, wood lathe, chop saw, and other power tools needed to complete advanced projects

Pebble Pups 1 (SF 50218)

Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

SHOOTING SPORTS

Each county may submit 2 entries total from 50380, 50381, 50382, 50384.

1. No live ammunition, actual firearms or parts of a firearm that could be reassembled should be included. Any manufactured part of a sporting arm may not be displayed.
2. Human Silhouette targets will not be displayed.
3. All exhibits should be posters suitable for display to the general public. Exhibits deemed to be inappropriate will not be displayed.
4. 4-H members enrolled in Shooting Sports may choose to exhibit a display in addition to or instead of participating in the Shooting Sports Event and must be a member of an approved 4-H Shooting Sports Club to exhibit.
5. Participants must be a member of an approved 4-H Shooting Sports Club to exhibit.
6. Stand-alone items have the intent to enhance the discipline such as a quiver, gun case, guns ling, locking cabinet, gun, or target stand, sporting clays equipment wagon, etc.

Floriculture A (SF 50192)

Exhibit one of the following options. Please note that flower arrangements, including the vase or container, must be no larger than 12" x 12".

- Create a flower arrangement, either a round arrangement or a bud vase. No silk flowers are permitted; **OR**
- Create a photo collage or a collection of pictures of flowers that you have raised. Label your flowers by name and tell if you started with a seed, cutting or transplants. Mount pictures on a poster board; **OR**
- Exhibit in one container: 3 stems of blooms - each with attached foliage. Foliage that would go inside the container may be removed. All three blooms or stems should be the same variety, color, shape and size and must have been grown from seed, young seedling plants, bulbs or rhizomes by the exhibitor. (NOTE: Exhibitors choosing lilies should include no more than 2/3 of foliage for their exhibit.)

Floriculture B (SF 50193)

Exhibit one of the following options, please note that space required for container exhibits, artistic displays, and fairy gardens must not exceed 24" x 24" x 48" unless otherwise indicated.

- Display a mixed planter that may include herbs with foliage plants and/or flowering plants. The planter should include three or more kinds of plants. The container exhibit space must not exceed 18"x18"x18".
- Create an artistic display of dried flowers and/or herbs explaining how each was dried; **OR**
- Create a photo collage or collection of pictures of plants from your theme garden. Label your plants by name and explain how the plants were chosen to fit the theme.

Floriculture C (SF 50194)

- Create an exhibit of forced bulbs in a pot.

(Open to youth enrolled in Floriculture A, Floriculture B, Floriculture C, or Floriculture D)

Present an exhibit of the member's choice that focuses on some aspect of floriculture which does not fit in the categories above. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, dish gardens, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

Class Name

Herb Container Display (SF 50313)

(Open to youth in Vegetable Gardening A (Level 1), Vegetable Gardening B (Level 2), Vegetable Gardening C (Level 3), or Vegetable Gardening D (Level 4))

Herbs should be grown in pots (8" maximum diameter). Categories: Mint, Oregano, Rosemary, Sage, Thyme, and all other herbs. Herbs should be labeled with common and Latin names. Herbs should be in your care for a minimum of three months for state fair exhibits. Remove dead leaves from plants and check that the soil is clear of debris such as dead leaves. When exhibiting herb plants, be sure to grow the plants in the container to be displayed to avoid transplant shock. Exhibits will be evaluated based on cleanliness, uniformity, condition, quality, and trueness to variety. Additional herb resources are located on the project resources section of the Illinois 4-H website.

- Display must include 4 or more different kinds of herbs. There may not be more than 2 different varieties of any herb. For example, peppermint and chocolate mint would be classified as two different herb varieties.
- In instances where containers display more than one variety of herb, special care should be taken that each distinct variety is accessible and clearly visible to the judges to ensure full points for cleanliness.

Vegetable/Fruit Display (SF 50314)

(Open to youth in Vegetable Gardening A, Vegetable Gardening B, Vegetable Gardening C, or Vegetable Gardening D)

1. This class is allowed a 2'6" x 2'6" space for each display.
2. Display must include 6 or more different kinds of vegetables or fruits. There may not be more than 2 different varieties of any vegetable/fruit. For example, red and white potatoes would be classified as two different varieties. Acorn squash and zucchini would be classified as two different vegetables.
3. The number and type of vegetables/fruits used must conform to the Vegetable/Fruit Plate/Display List. *Fruit Plate list is below Vegetable Plate list.*
4. Exhibitors must provide the name and variety of all vegetables/fruits used. (i.e. Cabbage – Golden Acre; Cucumber, slicing – Straight Eight; Tomatoes, slicing – Rocky Top; Snap Beans – Contender, etc.).

Vegetable Plates (SF 50315)

(Open to youth in Vegetable Gardening A, Vegetable Gardening B, Vegetable Gardening C, or Vegetable Gardening D)

1. Exhibit must include 2 single vegetable plates. (Exhibitor will furnish the disposable plates.)
2. Exhibitors must provide the name and variety of all vegetables/fruits used. (i.e. Cabbage – Golden Acre; Cucumber, slicing – Straight Eight; Tomatoes, slicing – Rocky Top; Snap Beans – Contender, etc.). Number of vegetables on plates must conform to plate list below.
3. Only one variety on each plate.
4. An exhibitor cannot show two plates of the same type vegetable. (i.e.: Cannot exhibit red *and* white potatoes or zucchini *and* straightneck summer squash.)

A cover crop might include any plant that is sown in between primary production crops for the benefit of overall farm health rather than crop yield (examples: pennycress, clover, radish, annual ryegrass, etc.). The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

Plants & Soils 1 (SF 50281a) It's More Than Just Dirt – Required

Prepare a 36" X 48" display or a poster no larger than 36" X 48" and 15" deep that illustrates an activity from the project manual. The display should demonstrate an understanding of environmental and internal factors that affect plant growth and the function and characteristics of soil. Include your project journal that documents activity recordkeeping requirements, answers activity questions, and details personal thoughts and ideas in response to each activity.

Plants & Soils 2 (SF 50281b) Stems and Stamens – Required

Prepare a 36" X 48" display or a poster no larger than 36" X 48" and 15" deep that illustrates an activity from the project manual. The display should demonstrate an understanding of the composition of plants, the functions of individual plant parts, plant life cycles, and the many ways plants reproduce. Include your project journal that documents activity recordkeeping requirements, answers activity questions, and details personal thoughts and ideas in response to each activity.

Plants & Soils 3 (SF 50281c) Sprouting Out and Growing UP – Required

Prepare a 36" X 48" display or a poster no larger than 36" X 48" and 15" deep that illustrates an activity from the project manual. The display should demonstrate an understanding of the relationship between soil and other cycles found in nature. Displays should also provide an example of a leadership or service learning experience focused on environmental stewardship. Include your project journal that documents activity recordkeeping requirements, answers activity questions, and details personal thoughts and ideas in response to each activity.
