ANS: Records help show how much you learn and grow throughout your years in 4-H. Also, keeping accurate records is a part of life. No matter where you go, you will have to keep record of something at one point in your life. If you choose to go to college, a vocational field, or enter the workforce, all of these will require paperwork and forms to be completed. You can gain better understanding and confidence in completing these forms by filling out your 4-H records. You will be recognized for these records at the Achievement Program on November 10.

Re-enrollment participation deadline (returning members): December 13

Incentive deadline (returning and new members): December 13

Fair Participation Deadline (New members must be enrolled by this date to show): May 1

Project Selection Deadline (Returning and new members): May 1

Literature Order Deadline: May 15

Above are deadlines to meet throughout the 4-H year related to enrollment and projects.

To receive the incentive prize, you must be enrolled online, paid dues, and completed the lifetime liability form. Both new members and returning members are eligible to receive the incentive prize.

This year each family will receive a packet with forms to fill out and the Project Selection Guide to help you choose what you are interested in taking this year. Leaders will pick these up to distribute to members/families. The packet contains a letter explaining everything you need to know about the materials in these packets.

NOTE: When enrolling in 4HOnline, just add projects you wish to take and delete ones you do not want to take. You will not be adding the project books this year when you enroll.


Upcoming Events



New Opportunities!

Bank Steer Program

For the 2019-2020 4-H year, the Bank Steer Program will be introduced to help raise the number of livestock shown in the beef show. How does this work?

 Complete a proposed budget for the care of the steer. Be sure to include hay, feed, bedding, vet visits, and other expenses that may occur while you are raising the steer. *Not sure how to create a budget? Ask our office for help!



- 2. Sign a Letter of Intent in November guaranteeing you will purchase a steer in February.
- 3. Receive steer in February at weigh-in. Get interest-free loan and livestock mortality insurance.
- 4. Show and sell steer in July.
- 5. Once you receive the auction check, you pay the bank back the amount of your loan and you keep everything over the loan amount.

In order to participate, you must have completed at least one full 4-H year, be enrolled in 4HOnline, pay your dues, and completed the necessary forms. This is also open to members who currently show beef as well as those who have not shown beef before.

If you are interested in this program, contact the Extension Office to get more information. There will be additional rules and stipulations not listed in this general outline.

The loan will be provided by the First Neighbor Bank. You will need to purchase a livestock mortality insurance to cover the amount of the loan.

Parking Spot Designs

I have an exciting opportunity that I would like to share with you! I am in the process of designing parking spaces for our office. By painting our parking spots, I hope to create more visibility for 4-H and other Extension programming in our community. Here is how you can get involved:



- 1. Design the 4-H Parking space. You received a letter in the mail that has a place for you to design it on the back. There must be a 4" empty border between the design and the white parking lines. The only requirement for inside the spot is to include the 4-H clover. Keep your design inclusive and respectful. Be imaginative! Think outside the box. What do you think of when you think 4-H? What will catch the public's eye as they drive by? Designs are due by September 20. The winner will be chosen and announced the following week.
- 2. The second way to be involved is helping paint the actual parking spots. If you want to help create these spots, call the office to sign-up or send me an email. It will take multiple days, so all the assistance when available would be great. Let me know by September 20 if you intend to help. The remaining spots will be filled with other University of Illinois Extension programming.

Ways your club can promote 4-H during National 4-H Week

- Have a flag-raising ceremony at a local bank, park, business, veterans club or school.
- Attend a city council meeting and have the mayor/councilmen sign the Proclamation.
- Give presentations at schools, home school organizations, and youth-serving agency boards.
- Have members bring projects and speak at local civic organizational meetings.
- Host a project fair for the community to see work of 4H members and recruit new members.
- Have a poster contest with your members, then display them in local business windows.
- Ask banks to include a bookmark or flyer about 4-H at their drive-thru facilities.
- Host a special interest workshop open to the community sponsored by 4-H
- Host a quiz night—Are You Smarter than a 4-Her?
- Sponsor a dance for Jr. High youth.
- Promote 4-H livestock projects at the feed store.
- Promote 4-H technology projects at the electronic/phone/computer stores.
- Promote 4-H foods projects at the grocery stores.
- Promote 4-H entrepreneur projects at the banks.
- Promote 4-H family projects at the doctor offices.
- Host a "My 4-H Word Is" event in your community.
- Promote 4-H on local advertising signs, billboards, church message boards.
- Present a puppet show about how good it feels to be in 4-H.
- Start an email chain letter—What did you gain in 4-H? and distribute it to your contacts lists, then watch it spread.
- Take a plate of 4-H cookies to local businesses with an appreciation poster for them to post.
- Write letters to your congressional leaders about how important 4-H is to you.
- Take thank you flowers to all your club leaders.
- Hold a 4-H talent show and invite the public.
- Host a 4-H fun day with games and prizes for families.
- Have a day to wear a 4-H shirt to work or school.
- Host a blood drive.
- Host a fun run.
- Plant a tree in honor of 4-H.
- Have your 4-H flag displayed with the American flag at sporting events during the week.
- Carry groceries for customers at a store.
- Hold a dinner where everything made must come from a 4-H Food Project Manual.
- Carve pumpkins with a 4-H logo and take them to area homes, businesses.
- Post 4-H alumni signs, National 4H week signs, or join 4-H signs in the yards of current or past 4-H members.
- Have a 4-H related theme 'best decorated' car / truck / tractor contest at a local parking lot where all the entries must relate to 4-H in some way.
- Create a 4-H promotion to run at the local movie theater during previews.
