SHELBY COUNTY 4-H FAIR 4-H PROJECTS

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR 4-H PROJECTS

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If you need a reasonable accommodation to participate in the 4-H Show (fair), please contact the Extension office at the following phone number and/or address: University of Illinois Extension-Shelby County, 1125 W. North 2nd Street, Shelbyville, (217) 774-9546 at least two weeks prior to the event.

NOTE: In addition to the general 4-H Requirements listed here, rules applying to specific divisions appear in the divisional listings.

Note:

• IRS Requirement—Program participants (including minors) will be required to provide their social security number or foreign national tax ID number prior to receiving a prize, gift or award to ensure IRS reporting as required by law. This sensitive information is kept confidential and handled through security protected software (PEAR). Participants will not be eligible for prize, gift or award if social security or foreign national tax ID information is not provided.

There are two options for exhibiting at the Shelby County 4-H Fair.

- A. In-person conference judging at the designated judging time.
- B. A Shelby County 4-H member may exhibit a project for another 4-H member who isn't able to attend the fair. The 4-H member not able to attend must complete a project report (ask the Extension office for the form) and submit the form with the project for judging. This project will not be eligible for the State Fair.

COVID - 19 Guidelines: Illinois 4-H will respond to and adjust events in response to evolving guidance as provided by the CDC, IDPH, and University of Illinois. Additional local venue guidelines will be followed.

- 1. The show is governed by Member Code of Conduct for 4-H Meetings and other 4-H Events and Activities. The Mission of the Illinois 4-H Program is to help youth acquire skills for living. Participation in 4-H programs is a privilege and participants are expected to show respect and cooperation to 4-H leaders and other participants.
 - A. Participants may be removed from 4-H programs or activities for misconduct.
 - B. The possession and use of weapons, drugs, inhalants, tobacco products, alcohol and other illegal substances by 4-H youth participants is prohibited at all 4-H sponsored activities. C.The 4-H program is governed by the Illinois 4-H Behavior Guidelines and Member Code of Conduct which is on file at the Extension Office.
- 2. All exhibitors must be members of Shelby County 4-H. Any person, regardless of race, color, religion, gender, national origin, ancestry, marital status, familial status, sexual orientation, or disability may participate in 4-H programs. Youth who are 8 years of age & have not reached their 19th birthday on or before September 1 of the current 4-H year may enroll in a 4-H club. Persons considered to be mentally challenged & older than the eligibility age for 4-H club membership may participate fully in 4-H. Extension units may allow 4-H enrollment by boys & girls who are 5, 6, or 7 years of age on or before September 1 of the 4-H year. This is a unit decision. If 4-H enrollment is offered to 5-7 year olds, they must be enrolled as 4-H CLOVERBUD members.
- 3. All 4-H members are required to attend at least three (3) local 4-H club meetings (college students must attend 2 meetings), participate in one county activity (such as 4-H workshops, 4-H week activities, other identified activities, etc.), and present a talk or demonstration on a 4-H project at their own club meeting in order to show projects at the Shelby County 4-H & Jr. Fair.
- 4. All members must have been enrolled in each project exhibited and be recorded in the Extension Office on or before April 1.
- NO ENTRY FEE IS REQUIRED.
- 6. All exhibits must be the work of the individual making the exhibit for the current 4-H year. 4-H year is September 1 to August 31. One item may <u>not</u> be shown for more than one project area.

- 7. Entries due June 3. NO LATE ENTRIES!
- 8. All exhibits must be in place according to the schedule.
- 9. Securely attach tag with name of exhibitor and the club to each item for all projects other than livestock, horse/pony and dogs.
- 10. Premiums for all grades (except County projects) will be paid based on available funds.
- 11. The Extension Office will not be responsible for 4-H members' projects which are lost or stolen.
- 12. Decisions concerning protests and grievances will be the responsibility of the superintendent of the involved department and the County Extension Director.
- 13. All livestock exhibitors must have their entries in place by Sunday, July 17 at 8:00 p.m. No entries shall be removed until Wednesday, July 20 at 9:30 p.m.
- 14. 4-H Center and Produce Building exhibitors need to check their project area for their check-in time. Release will be on Wednesday, July 20 from 9-10 p.m and Thursday morning at 7 a.m.
- 15. Members failing to comply with rules and regulations will automatically forfeit their premium
- 16. Trophies will be awarded in classes that have sponsors.
- 17. Entries will be judged by the merit or group system. Exhibits in each class will be rated and placed in one of three groups:
 - A. Project met standards, Blue Award
 - B. Project needs some improvement, Red Award
 - C. Project needs much improvement, White Award
- Ribbons or other suitable awards will be given to indicate the above placings.
- 18. As funds become available, premiums will be paid on the basis of the X factor, with 3X for Blue, 2X for Red, and 1X for White.

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS EXTENSION CODE OF CONDUCT FOR 4-H EVENTS & ACTIVITIES

All participants in events and/or activities planned, conducted, and supervised by the University of Illinois Extension and 4-H, are responsible for their conduct to U of I Extension personnel and/or volunteers supervising the events. This responsibility is necessary for the health, safety, and welfare of the participants, and will be rigidly adhered to and uniformly enforced.

The following conduct is not allowed while participating in any 4-H event or activity and is subject to disciplinary action:

Category 1

- a) Possession, use, or distribution of alcohol and other drugs, including tobacco products. No vaping allowed.
- b) Theft or destruction of public or private property
- c) Involvement in sexual misconduct or harassment
- d) Possession or use of dangerous weapons or materials (including fireworks)
- e) Fighting or other acts of violence that endanger the safety of the participant or others

Category 2

- a) Willfully breaking curfew
- b) Unauthorized use of vehicles
- Leaving the site of the event c)
- Participation in gambling ď)
- e) Absence from the planned program
- f) Intentionally interfering with or disrupting the event
- Use of profane or abusive language g)
- ħ) Disregard for public or personal property
- Public displays of affection or inappropriate actions
- i) j) Failure to comply with direction of Extension personnel, including designated adults acting within their duties and guidelines

Consequences:

The University of Illinois Extension reserves the right to restrict participation in future activities for those individuals who have been removed from an activity for behavior, as outlined in Category 1 or Category 2. In all cases, the participant will be responsible for restitution of any damages incurred by his/her actions.

Category 1:

When notified of any of the actions listed under Category 1, the adult in charge, will ascertain the relevant facts, and, with concurrence from the U of I Extension staff, will notify the affected participant of the action and any supporting evidence. The participant will be allowed an opportunity to answer the allegations and, if necessary, law enforcement officials will be



- notified. While facts are being verified, the participant will be removed from the 4-H activity/ event and be under direct supervision of an adult chaperon.
- 2. The parent or guardian will be notified of the actions of the participant, and upon finding the allegations to be true, must immediately remove the participant from the activity at the parent's or guardian's expense.

3. Documentation must be completed on an "Incident Report Form."

Category 2:

- 1. When notified of any of the actions listed under Category 2, the adult in charge, will ascertain the relevant facts, and, with concurrence from the U of I Extension staff, will notify the participant of the action and any supporting evidence. The participant will be allowed an opportunity to answer the allegations and, if necessary, law enforcement officials will be notified. While facts are being verified, the participant will be removed from the 4-H activity/event and be under direct supervision of an adult chaperon.
- 2. The parent or guardian of the participants who violate curfew, use vehicles without authorization or leave the site of the event (as outlined in Category 2, letters a, b, c) will be notified of the actions by the participant. The parent or guardian must immediately remove the participant from the activity, at the parent's or guardian's expense. Participants who willfully disobey conduct as described in Category 2, letters d-I, will receive a verbal and written warning (initialed by the adult and the participant). Upon receiving a second warning, the parent or guardian will be notified of the behavior and must make arrangements for removal of the participant from the activity, at the parent's or guardian's expense.

Submitting 4-H fair entries indicates you have read the above and that you agree to the following: "We understand and accept the responsibility for following the "Code of Conduct" for this 4-H event or activity. We further understand that failure to do so will result in disciplinary action as outlined above and forfeiture of any participant's fees."

4-H MASTER SHOWMANSHIP

Tuesday, July 19

Judging will start at 7 p.m.

The Shelby County Master Showmanship winner is expected to participate at the Illinois State Fair Master showmanship contest to be held on August 12 at 7 p.m. The winner will need to find their own animals to compete at the state contest.

To qualify:

- The 2022 Senior and Premiere Showmanship winners in sheep and swine are automatically qualified to participate in the county contest. The 2021 Senior and Premiere Beef Showmanship winners will be allowed to participate and need to preregister by July 1. Exhibitors are not required to participate in the county Master Showmanship contest.
- 2. Exhibitors will need to pre-register with the Extension office by July 1. There will be a waiting list with the understanding that some of those who pre-register could automatically qualify by winning the Senior and/or Premiere contests in their species. There will be a maximum of 12 exhibitors.

Rules:

- 1. Exhibitor must exhibit at least one of the following species: beef, sheep, or swine at the Shelby County 4-H Fair.
- 2. Must be at least 14 years of age as of 9/1/21. (This is a state rule.)
- 3. It's your responsibility to find your own animals to compete in the county contest if you are not enrolled in that species. For example: You are a beef exhibitor but don't have sheep or swine, you must use your own beef and find a sheep and swine to borrow for the contest.
- 4. A special judge will be used for the Master Showmanship contest.

STATE FAIR REQUIREMENTS

General Projects showing at the Illinois State Fair

- 1. A 4-H'er must be 8 years of age by September 1, 2021 to be eligible to exhibit at the State Fair.
- 2. To be eligible for State Fair exhibition, the exhibit must have received an "A" rating.
- 3. Judges may select any number up to specified limits in different project areas, as determined by quality of projects.
- 4. Exhibitors must be present at the time of county judging to be selected as a State Fair Delegate.
- 5. State Fair Delegates must fill out the State Fair Delegate Form (dark purple) by Wednesday of the fair for their exhibit entry. Forms can be turned in at the 4-H Center, Fair Office, or the Extension office.
- State Fair Alternates must fill out the State Fair Alternate Form (light purple) by Wednesday of the fair.
- 7. State Fair Alternates will be contacted for openings in State Fair Exhibits. Forms can be turned in at the 4-H Center, Fair Office, or the Extension office.
- 8. State Fair exhibitors may exhibit one general project at the State Fair.
- 9. All State Fair exhibitors will have the opportunity to experience conference judging during the Illinois State Fair.

Animals showing at the Illinois State Fair

- 1. Beef, Dairy, Dairy Beef, Goats, Sheep, Swine, Rabbits, and Poultry are not shown on the same day as the other county projects. Any 4-H member meeting the State Fair requirements in the above projects listed in the Illinois State Fair Junior Department Premium Book can exhibit their animal at the State Fair and do not have to qualify at their county fair. Dogs must qualify during the dog show.
- 2. Illinois State Fair information can be accessed at the following website or by contacting the Extension Office. Junior Livestock entries are due on or before July 1 at the Illinois State Fairgrounds. The county office must sign your entry form. http://www.agr.state.il.us/isf/premium/junior.pdf.
- 3. Completion of the Quality Assurance & Ethics Clinic (QAEC) is **required** for all State Fair exhibitors in the horse, rabbit, dog and poultry classes. 4-H and FFA members complete the Quality Assurance & Ethics Clinic online using this url: http://web.extension.uiuc.edu/qaec/ by June 3.
- 4. Completion of the Youth For the Quality Care of Animals (YCQA) is **required** for all State Fair exhibitors in the beef, dairy, sheep, swine, and goat classes. 4-H members must complete a Face to Face training or Online training by June 30.

Horses showing at the Illinois State Fair

- Copies of the ownership and/or lease papers and one set of the photos for horse/ponies exhibiting at the State Fair must be on file with the Shelby County Extension Office by May 2, 2022.
 Any number of pictures with ownership/lease papers may be turned in by the May 2 deadline.
 No 4-H'er may show more than three (3) horse/pony combinations.
- 2. State Fair entry forms must be signed by Extension staff before the due date.
- 3. No replacement animals will be allowed in the State Fair Junior Horse Show unless that animal has already been registered in the Extension Office by the May 2 deadline. Replacement animals may be allowed only with a vet certificate and if the exhibitor has pictures on file with the Extension Office. The replacement horse may only be exhibited for the same classes as the horse being replaced was signed up for.
- 4. Violations of the ownership/leasing rules will not be tolerated. Violations may result in disqualification from current and/or the following year's State Junior Horse Show and forfeiture of all premiums and awards.

4-H LIVESTOCK RULES

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4-H AGRICULTURE DIVISION ELIGIBILITY

- 1. Each exhibitor will comply with the general requirements for all 4-H exhibits.
- 2. All livestock exhibitors must have their entries in place by Sunday, July 17, at 8:00 p.m. No entries shall be removed until Wednesday, July 20 at 9:30 p.m. Any exhibitor failing to comply with the above rules will forfeit their premiums won during the fair
- No artificial coloring will be allowed in livestock classes.
- 4. All animals exhibited in showmanship classes must be owned and cared for by the exhibitor. All animals will be exhibited in the Show Ring by 4-H'ers.
- 5. All livestock must comply with "Illinois Exhibition Livestock Health Requirements." See information in the front of this book.
- 6. Three (3) showmanship classes will be offered in the Rabbits, Poultry, Goats, Beef and Swine divisions. Age groups will be split 8-11, 12-14, 15-18 years of age. The winner of each age group will be eligible to show in the next higher age bracket the following year. Inclusion in age brackets will be based on the 4-H'er's age as of September 1, 2021. 4-H'ers may win each division only one time except for premiere.
- 7. Two (2) showmanship classes will be offered in the sheep, and dairy divisions. These classes will be divided 12 years and younger and 13 years and older. Junior class winners are eligible to compete in the Senior division the following year. Exhibitors may win the Junior and Senior showmanship classes only one time. Inclusion in age brackets will be based on the 4-H'er's age as of September 1, 2021.
- 8. Two (2) showmanship classes will be offered in Horse and Ponies. One class will be for Junior exhibitors 13 and under as of September 1, 2021; the other for Senior exhibitors, 14 and over. The top 2 places in each class will compete for champion. Exhibitors may win the Champion Showmanship Class more than once.
- 9. <u>PREMIERE SHOWMAN AWARD</u> The Premiere Showman Award is open to current and <u>all past</u> Senior Winners and <u>all past</u> Premiere Winners in the Beef, Swine, Goat, Sheep, Dairy, Dairy Beef, Rabbit and Poultry departments that are still eligible for 4-H. Ribbons will be presented to Grand and Reserve Grand Champion Premiere Showmen. <u>This year's winner will be eligible for next year's contest</u>.
- 10. MASTER SHOWMANSHIP CONTEST See page 50 for the 4-H Master Showmanship rules.

 Showman must exhibit their own animal of the species they qualified for the event.
- 11. Animals showing at the Shelby County 4-H & Jr. Fair and the State Fair Completion of the Quality Assurance & Ethics Clinic (QAEC) is <u>required</u> for all State Fair exhibitors in the horse, rabbit, and poultry classes. 4-H and FFA members must complete the Quality Assurance & Ethics Clinic online using this url: http://web.extension.uiuc.edu/qaec/ by June 3. Those who have previously taken the QAEC training are maintained on the approved list and will not need to be re-certified. Be sure to complete the species you are showing.

 12. Completion of the Youth For the Quality Care of Animals (YCQA) is <u>required</u> for all 4-H'ers exhibiting at the Shelby County 4-H & Jr. Fair and the State Fair in the beef, dairy, sheep, swine, and goat classes. 4-H members must complete a Face to Face training or Online training by June 30. This is a yearly certification that must be completed.



4-H BEEF DIVISION

Wednesday, July 20

Judging will start at 8:00 a.m. in the Show Arena Animals must be in place by 8:00 p.m. Sunday, July 17.

Superintendent – Austin Rincker Asst. Superintendent - Kolton Smith

- 1. Anyone weighing market beef & crossbred heifers must be present for weigh-in on Monday, July 18 at 8:00 a.m.
- 2. Each exhibitor will be limited to one entry in each class.
- 3. Animals may be purebred or crossbred.
- 4. Health papers will be checked by a veterinarian on Sunday, July 17 from 7-8:00 p.m. in the Fair Office.
- 5. Please refer to the section of "Exhibition Livestock Health Requirements" in front of this book.6. The superintendent will direct the assigning of stalls.
- 7. Order of showing will be determined by the superintendent.
- 8. Exhibitors may enter and show 4 steers.
- 9. All market beef must have milk teeth in place.
- 10. Animals cannot be tied out until 7:30 p.m. Neck ties are required on all tie-outs.
- 11. SUPERINTENDENT AND ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENTS CAN LIMIT NUMBER OF FANS AN EXHIB-ITOR IS USING.
- 12. Dying or artificially changing the color of an animal is prohibited. Coloring agents may only be used up to the hock (knee). Powders are not allowed on any part of the animal. Animals will be given a white towel test as they enter the show ring. Cattle are to be shown in their natural conformation. The use of FALSE TAIL HEADS is prohibited. The addition of HAIR, HEMP, or ANY SIM-ILAR SUBSTANCE to any part of an animal is prohibited. No tail ties will be allowed for breeding stock or steers. Excess adhesive on the legs beyond what is needed to groom the animal's hair is grounds for disqualification.
- 13. All beef steers and market heifers must have been weighed at county weigh-in on February 12, 2022.
- 14. NO BUTT FANS ARE ALLOWED IN THE BARN.
- 15. No tack in stalls.

When making entries, please include breed and date of birth of heifers.

Ownership Requirements:

Steers & Market Heifers

- -Calved on or after January 1, 2021
- -Owned & personally cared for by exhibitor since February 1, 2022

<u>Heifers</u>

- -Age requirement is from September 1, 2020 to March 31, 2022
- -Owned and personally cared for by exhibitor since June 1, 2022

Performance Cow

- Owned and personally cared by exhibitor since January 1, 2022
- Cows must be born before September 1, 2020 (Cow-Calf Class only)

<u>Female Classes</u> - Females will be shown by age and breed. Females include **Cow/Calf pairs** and heifers. Cows may not be shown by themselves, but a heifer calf may be pulled from the cow and entered into the heifer class.

Cow/Calf Pair, 1 class (Calf must be born after January 1, 2022)

Angus, 4 classes Hereford, 4 classes Simmental, 4 classes Shorthorn, 4 classes AOB/Crossbred, 5 classes

Market Beef Classes are based upon weigh-in numbers

Angus, 2 classes Hereford, 2 classes Simmental, 2 classes Shorthorn, 1 class AOB/Crossbred, 3 classes

Bank Steers, 3 classes **No adhesives allowed on bank steers.**

Market Heifer, 1 class

Pair – Females, 2 classes Pair – Steers, 2 classes

Bucket Beef Calf, 5 classes (male or female) - must be born after January 1, 2022 and owned by June 1, 2022. Calf must be bottle or bucket fed by 4-H'er for at least the first 30 days of life. Calves must be healthy and clean; no fitting or clipping allowed. Only one entry per exhibitor.

Rate of Gain, Steer - awarded to best rate of gain steer from weigh-in to show (Does not include bank steers or market heifers.)

Judging will start at 1:00 p.m. (or after Swine Show is completed) in the Show Arena. Animals must be in place by 8:00 p.m. Sunday, July 17.

- Each exhibitor will be limited to one entry in each age class.
- Please refer to "Exhibition Livestock Health Requirements" in front of this book.
- 3. Health papers will be checked by a veterinarian on Sunday, July 17 from 7-8:00 p.m. in the Fair Office.
- 4. Entries in cow classes may or may not be in milk; however, all animals in milk must show in cow classes. All purebred animals must be registered in member's name.
- 5. Separate class will be provided for GRADES AND PUREBREDS.6. There will be no championship grade class. When you enter your animals, please note on the entry blank if the animal is not registered.
- 7. Date of birth (day, month, and year) for animals must be listed on the entry blank.

Ownership Requirements:

Judging will start at 8:00 a.m. in the Show Arena. Animals must be in place by 8:00 p.m. Sunday, July 17.

Superintendent - Debbie Cruit

- 1. Health papers will be checked by a veterinarian on Sunday, July 17 from 7-8:00 p.m. in the Fair
- 2. Please refer to "Exhibition Livestock Health Requirements" at the beginning of this book.
- 3. Each exhibitor will be limited to two breeds (one entry per breed) in the sheep breeding classes.
- 4. Exhibitors may have only one entry in each class.
- 5. Entries to breeding classes may be purebred, crossbred or grade.
- 6. Lambs born after 9/1/2021 may be shown in the "under one year" class.7. All market lambs must be docked and castrated.
- 8. All market lambs must be slick shorn before weighing.
- 9. Animals shown in the breeding classes may not compete in the market class.
- 10. Exhibitors can weigh and show 6 single market lambs (either ewes or wethers), regardless of the weight class. Note: An exhibitor will only be paid premiums for a maximum of one entry per class.
- 11. Market lambs will be weighed on July 17 from 5-6:00 p.m. and divided into weight classes at that time.

Ownership Requirements:

Wethers: Ownership date is May 15, 2022. Lambed on or after January 1, 2022.

Ewes/Rams: Owned and personally cared for by June 25, 2022.

BREEDING CLASSES - Each class will be divided into 5 breeding classes.

Yearling Ewe - Ewe 1 year and under two

Ewe Lamb - Ewe Lamb under 1 year

Pair of females

Ram Lamb - Ram under 1 year

Ram and Ewe (any age)

Market Lamb Classes: Market Lambs will be equally divided into 13 classes after they have been officially weighed at the fair.

Each exhibitor <u>must</u> have on file by <u>May 2</u> at the Extension Office a copy of ownership/lease papers for animals exhibited in the Shelby County 4-H Fair Horse Show or at the State 4-H Horse Show, with 2 photos (one of each side of animal). *** <u>No horse or pony may be shown in the Junior Fair Horse Show without the required photos that are due to the Extension Office by May 2, 2022.</u>
- 10. Any number of pictures with ownership/lease may be turned in by the May 2 deadline.
- 11. No exhibitor may show more than three (3) horse/pony combinations.
- 12. No replacement animals will be allowed in the Show unless that animal has already been registered in the local Extension Office by the May 2 deadline.
- 13. Replacement animals may be allowed only with a vet certificate and if the 4-H'er has pictures on file with the Extension Office. The replacement horse may only be exhibited in the same classes as the horse it is replacing. The only substitution would be mare and gelding halter classes and between the horse and pony classes.

Example: If you were signed up for all the pony classes, provide a vet certificate that the pony is unable to be shown and have a back-up horse's picture on file, you then could substitute the horse into the same horse classes that the pony was signed up.

- 14. If needed for safety reasons, only parents/siblings should be working/riding horses, ponies, donkeys, and mules before or during the show!
- 15. All 4-H members are required to wear a properly fitted ASTM or SEI standard F1163 (or above) certified equestrian helmet whenever mounted or driving at all 4-H horse and pony events, shows, activities, or practices. - Cloverbud members may not receive premium money.
- Cloverbud participation ribbons will be awarded.
- Cloverbud members may make projects related to Cloverbud project areas.

State 4-H Rule-Livestock Projects

- Per the State 4-H Office, Cloverbud members **MAY NOT** exhibit any type of animal projects.
- Members may make a poster that includes pictures and information about their animal. The poster will be displayed in the 4-H Center.

Cloverbud projects should be in place in the 4-H Center between 4-8:00 p.m. Sunday, July 17. Projects will be released between 9:00-10:00 p.m. Wednesday, July 20 or Thursday, July 21 between 8-8:30 a.m.

Chit Chat with a Cloverbud will take place on Wednesday, July 20 at 1 p.m. at the Cook Shack Pavilion. Members will need to register via email at a later date if they plan to participating in the Chit Chat opportunity. Special awards will be awarded to those members who participate. Clarifications for 4-H General Projects for 2022

Definition of a display - The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. The 4 -H'er must furnish any equipment needed for the exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

Ready4Life Challenge

Exhibits in this category must include the following:

- Must be enrolled in the specific Ready4Life project to exhibit:
- Must be 11 years by September 1, 2021 or older.
- A physical representation of the career or business product such as a model, prototype or display/portfolio that includes images of accomplished work.
- Verbal or written explanations that demonstrate knowledge of the related career or business fields, potential careers, and the appropriate requirements for achievement in those fields.
- The judging criteria for this class values thoroughness of career and/or business exploration and pursuit above the workmanship of the physical specimen on display.

Exhibits in this category are designed to be multi-disciplinary in nature, innovative, and must not fit into any other exhibit category. To qualify for this category, your project MUST abide by the following guidelines:

- Exhibitors must complete the DIY Make & Build Curriculum, and answer all the questions at the end of each lesson. You must display (or upload if virtual) your answers to these questions, as well as your Maker Log from the DIY Make and Build curriculum.
- Exhibits must be an object or device that has an intended purpose and uses technology in either a mechanical way, digital (computer) way, or combination of the two. Your device or object **cannot** be one of the included activities in the DIY Make and Build Curriculum.
- The device must be something that can be used in everyday life by multiple people (a target audience), and MUST be manufactured/built by the exhibitor (If not fully manufactured by the exhibitor, the device MUST be modified structurally or be reprogramed to perform a different function other than what it was designed to do).
- Exhibits MUST be able to interact with the outside world. (e.g. an on off switch, input sensors, feedback, etc.)
- Exhibits MUST include a detailed build log with instructions on how to make or build the exhibit, AND contain either a 3D rendering or detailed and labeled sketches of the device/product.
- All parts and software used in the design/build MUST be listed in a detailed Bill of Materials including cost per item and total cost. Total time spent on the build must be documented in your build log.

In addition, exhibitors are HIGHLY encouraged to use tools such as 3-D printers, laser cutters, routers and/or other hand/power tools to help in the manufacturing process (NOTE: Simply 3-D printing or laser cutting an object without the other specifications does not qualify as a Maker Project). It is also HIGHLY encouraged that exhibits use Open Source software and/or hardware in the build.

Note: There are innovation classes added in some of the General Projects. An exhibitor may bring only a class project or innovation project, but NOT BOTH.

All exhibits entered in the clothing and textiles area will be judged based on their construction and fit (if applicable). Exhibitors bringing garments should not wear their garments when they arrive for judging. The garment will be reviewed by the judges for construction first. Exhibitors will be asked to change into the garment as the second step of the judging process. If the garment was constructed for another individual, that individual must be present to wear the garment for the judge. (Only the exhibitor who made the garment is eligible for ribbon and premium.) Construction and appearance will both be considered during judging. If a pattern was used to make the item, the pattern instructions, either written or electronic, are to be included with the exhibit. Exhibit tags should be attached to the garment, not to the hanger.

Members wishing to exhibit knitted items should enroll in Visual Arts Fiber (if original) or Visual Arts Heritage Arts (if made from a pattern). We strongly encourage youth interested in pursuing quilting to enroll and exhibit in the Visual Arts Quilting project area. Youth may still exhibit quilts in any level of Clothing as a "Sewn Non-Clothing" item, but these quilts will be judged using the Clothing rubric that evaluates the sewing skills and construction of the item. If exhibiting quilts in the Clothing area, all work on the quilt MUST be completed by the 4-H member. You cannot exhibit a quilt that was quilted by someone else. Quilts can be hand OR machine quilted as long as ALL work is completed by the exhibitor.

Garment/items will not be placed on display unless covered in a clear plastic bag (no garment bags). Exhibit tags should be attached to the GARMENT, not to the hanger.

Bring either page 91 with your completed answers or a document with the answers to remain on display with your project along with a picture of the meal you prepared. You do **not** need to complete the Challenge Yourself section on page 91.

Drying (50208C) – Exhibit two (2) different dried foods packed in plastic food storage bags. Choose from fruit, vegetable, fruit leather or meat jerky.

Pickles and Relishes (50208D) – Exhibit two pint jars of different recipes of pickles and/or relishes.

Jams, Jellies, and Preserves (50208E) – Exhibit half-pint jars of two different jams, jellies, and/or preserves.

Preservation Combination (50208F) – Exhibit two different preserved food products, excluding Freezing, in appropriate jars/packaging (drying). For example, exhibit 1 jar of tomatoes (Canning) and 1 half-pint of jelly (Jams, Jellies, and Preserves).

All preserved products should be prepared and processed according to the current USDA/ Extension information. USDA information on preserving food, including recipes, can be found at: www.homefoodpreservation.com or web.extension.illinois.edu/foodpreservation/ Recipes must be processed in a water-bath or pressure canner.

All food preservation exhibits must be labeled with: 1) The name of the food; 2) The date preserved; 3) Appropriate method(s) of food preservation (For canned projects: boiling water bath or pressure canner; For drying projects: Specify equipment used (food dehydrator, oven, etc.))

Examples:

Strawberry jam, boiling water bath. July 13, 2022. Green beans, pressure canner. July 13, 2022 Beef jerky, food dehydrator and oven. July 13, 2022.

<u>All food preservation exhibits must be accompanied with the recipe(s)</u> – typed or written, with the source of the recipe(s) listed. <u>Required Recipes and Sources for Food Preservation Exhibits</u> – all food preservation recipes be from an approved source. Those sources are:

- PUT IT UP! Food Preservation for Youth manuals
- U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA)
- National Center for Home Food Preservation
- Ball/Kerr Canning (recipes after 1985)
- Mrs. Wages
- DO NOT BRING RECIPES FROM: Magazine or newspaper clippings, Pinterest (unless it is from a source listed above), Grandma's or a recipe from a family member or friend without a source, Cookbooks (excluding the Ball, Kerr and Put It Up! book).

Canning Equipment Requirements: All canned products must be canned in clear, standard jars in good condition (no chips or cracks). Jars must be sealed using two-piece canning lids (flat lid and band). Must use a new, unused flat lid. Bands must not be rusty or severely worn.

50313------ Herb Display (Open to youth in Vegetable Gardening A, Vegetable Gardening B, Vegetable Gardening C, and Vegetable Gardening D) Herbs should be grown in pots (8" maximum diameter). Categories: Mint, Oregano, Rosemary, Sage, Thyme, and all other herbs. Herbs should be labeled with common and Latin names.

Herbs should be in your care for a minimum of three months for state fair exhibits. Remove dead leaves from plants and check that the soil is clear of debris such as dead leaves. In addition to class Champions, Herb Category Grand and Reserve Grand Champions may be selected. When exhibiting herb plants, be sure to grow the plants in the container to be displayed to avoid transplant shock. Exhibits will be evaluated based on cleanliness, uniformity, condition, quality, and trueness to variety. Additional herb resources are located on the project resources section of the Illinois 4-H website.

50314----- Vegetable/Fruit Display- 1 Entry

1. This class is allowed a 2'6" x 2'6" space for display.

- 2. Display must include 6 or more different kinds of vegetables or fruits. There may not be more than 2 different varieties of any vegetable/fruit. For example, red and white potatoes would be classified as two different varieties. Acorn squash and zucchini would be classified as two different vegetables.
- 3. The number and type of vegetables/fruits used must conform to the Vegetable/ Fruit Plate/Display List. Fruit Plate list is below vegetable plate list.



Photo/Model releases from individuals pictured in the exhibitor's photographs are required unless the photograph is of a group in a public place where identification would not be an issue. ALL photos must be accompanied by details of the camera settings that include:

- Camera/device used
- Aperture (F-stop)
- Exposure time (shutter speed)
- ISO (film/sensor sensitivity)
- Lighting used (flash, artificial, sunlight, other)
- Lens Filters (Ultra-Violet, Polarizing, etc) if used.

Members are allowed to shoot on a camera's automatic setting, but should be able to find the metadata information on the photo to discuss the information above.

Additional details required for Photo Editing ONLY:

- Photo editing software/application used (required for ALL edits and retouches except for cropping)
- Filters used (lens filters and or digital/software filters)

The exhibition size requirements for all photographs will be:

Minimum image size: 5X7 Maximum image size: 8X10

Maximum exhibit size (including frame): 18X20

All exhibitors must include unframed (taped to the back of the framed exhibit or attached to the project booklet) **original or un-edited** versions of either the same subject or the examples of the same technique that the framed image represents. Formal Speech | Self-written | Notes Allowed | No props | Individual | 4-6 minutes Formal Speeches share the presenter's own unique view and are intended to motivate, persuade, or inform an audience and may include a call to action. Youth deliver a speech on any topic they wish.

Illustrated Speech | Self-written | Notes Allowed | Illustrations Required | Individual | 4-6 minutes

Illustrated Speeches may be used to inform, persuade, or motivate the audience while using a visual aid. Visual aids may be two dimensional, three-dimensional, or digital. Youth may include audience participation. Digital visual aids must be stored on a USB flash drive. Illustrated speeches may be:

- •How-to demonstrations which show the audience how to do something.
- •Object lessons which use objects as metaphors to share a message.
- •Educational models where drawings or diagrams help explain a topic.

Original Works | Self-written | Notes Allowed | Props and Costumes Allowed | Individual or 2-Person Team | Manuscripts sent in Advance | 4-6 minutes

Exhibitors will design, build and program a robot that uses sensors and programming to complete one of the challenges selected challenges from the 2022 4-H State Robotics Challenge (Eligible Challenges will be Marked in the Challenge Documents on the Illinois 4-H website). They will bring their project book, their program code (on laptop or on paper), and a short journal sharing changes they made to the robot and/or program along the way, and to describe their experience with completing the challenge.

<u>Junk Drawer Robotics:</u> All exhibits should be original designs made with everyday objects and materials. Exhibits with purchased kits will not be accepted. Exhibitors are also required to bring their Junk Drawer Robotics Youth Robotics Notebook with the sections completed for the project they are exhibiting, including the sections leading up to the activity they are exhibiting. - No live ammunition
- No knives or arrow tips (including field points, hunting broadheads, etc.)
- No functional or non-functional bows, firearms or firearm parts that could be reassembled are allowed.
- No humanoid shaped targets or reference to paintball, laser tag, air-soft, or pointing of any type of firearm or bow toward another person is allowed.
- No display involving primarily tactical design firearms (i.e. AR platform or military type firearms)
- No reference or use of the word "weapon" should be used in a display.

4-H'er must be present for judging.
Exhibitor limited to one entry.

Enrollment in the Video project is required to exhibit in the classes in this section. Entries in 360° video may be enrolled in video/film or computer science projects.

All Exhibitors must bring their video to be judged on a USB flash drive and saved in .MP4 format. Exhibitors are encouraged to post their video on YouTube.com in advance of State Fair. Exhibitors may choose whether to make the video "public, unlisted" (someone must have the link to view it), or "private" (only people you choose may view it). This will allow fairgoers to view the exhibits on display. There will be monitors at the exhibit table for viewing videos so exhibitors will NOT need to bring a laptop or device for viewing.

Requirements that apply to ALL video classes:

Video submissions should be no longer than five (5) minutes in length (unless noted differently in class description.). Videos are to be original and a result of the member's current year's work. Criteria for judging shall include: (1) Evidence of story line; (2) Use of camera angles; (3) Use of zooming techniques; and (4) Smoothness of scene changes. Image and sound quality will be considered in relation to equipment available to and used by exhibitor. All videos should comply with copyright regulations and display an image that is appropriate for 4-H audiences. No time or date should be imprinted on the video footage. All videos should include an opening title screen, as well as closing credits which include date of production, name of video exhibitor and research sources if appropriate. All Video/Filmmaking exhibitors must include a printed copy of materials which will remain on display.

- 50324 ------ **Commercial or Promotional Video:** Prepare a short video (30 seconds to 1 minute in length) that promotes an event, advertises a specific project/product, or is a public service announcement. The video should demonstrate skills in making and editing video.
- 50325 ------ **Animated Video:** Video in this class should represent creative animation of original artwork created by the exhibitor and may include stop motion techniques. Media might include images created with graphics software or hand-drawn images.
- 50326 ------ **Documentary:** Video in this class should represent a research-based investigation into a topic of choice. Video credits should list research sources and may include paper or electronically published materials, as well as, and/or interviews with experts or constituents related to the topic of investigation.
- 50327 ------Short Story or Short Narrative: Prepare a short video that tells a story. The video should demonstrate skills in making and editing video.

4-H VISUAL ARTS

Judging - Tuesday, July 19

Judging will start at 1:00 p.m.
Exhibits must be checked in between 4:00-8:00 p.m., Sunday, July 17
4-H'er must be present for judging.
Exhibitor limited to one entry per class.

ALL projects must have been checked in with superintendent by 9:00 a.m. on Tuesday.

The Superintendent will have your exhibitor tags.

Exhibitors must be enrolled in the Visual Arts project category in which they are exhibiting. Articles must have been made **during the current 4-H year** which started September 1, 2020. Exhibitors are encouraged to date the project when it is made. All visual arts exhibits are evaluated using a visual arts rubric which takes into account correct use of design elements; craftsmanship; and creativity.

Articles exhibited must be an original design created by the exhibitor (except in heritage arts which may follow a pattern AND Fiber-Non Original Ages 8-10 ONLY). Copyrighted or trademarked designs are not acceptable; this includes Team or School logos. Kits and preformed molds are not considered original and are not acceptable in any Visual Arts Class. Combining parts of different patterns (pictures, photographs, images from the internet or a magazine) with the member's own ideas can result in an original design, but simply changing the color, pattern and/or size of a pattern does NOT make the design original. This also applies for ideas found on a site such as Pinterest. If you see something on Pinterest that you like, use the concept and create something different using the concept; however it MUST NOT look exactly like something the judge can search for and find on Pinterest. The exhibit must combine parts of different patterns and/or ideas with the concepts of the member, however changing the color or changing the size of the item or pattern used does NOT make it original. If you create a replica of what you see somewhere else, it is not your original design. If a photo, sketch, or other idea source was used, submit it with your entry, firmly attached to your exhibit. Be prepared to explain how and where you found the idea for this project.

Quilts entered in Visual Arts should ONLY be entered in the Quilting Project area. Either You Can Quilt 50331A OR Quilting the Best Better 50331B. All work on the quilt MUST be completed by the 4-H member. You cannot exhibit a quilt that was quilted by someone else.

All items must be properly prepared for exhibit. Items which are intended to be hung must be prepared for hanging. The hanging device must be sturdy enough to support the weight of the object. Framed items not intended to be hung should be noted as such on the exhibit tag and a photo of the artwork being displayed should be included.

- 50332 ------ Visual Arts Food/Cake Decorating Beginning Exhibit one of the following: Exhibit four decorated cookies, using a minimum of four different techniques. Exhibit may use cookies OR cookie forms OR
 - Exhibit four decorated cupcakes, using a minimum of four different techniques. Exhibit may use cupcakes $\sf OR$ cupcake forms. $\sf OR$

Exhibit a single layer decorated cake, using a minimum of four different techniques. Exhibit may use cake OR cake form.

50333 ----- Visual Arts Food/Cake Decorating Intermediate—Exhibit one of the following:

Exhibit four decorated cookies, using a minimum of five Level 2 techniques. Exhibit may use cookies OR cookie forms. **OR**

Exhibit four decorated cupcakes, using a minimum of five Level 2 techniques. Exhibit may use cupcakes OR cupcake forms. **OR**

Exhibit a single layer or two-layer cakes, using a minimum of five Level 2 techniques. Exhibit may use cake OR cake form.

50334------Visual Arts Food/Cake Decorating Advanced: Exhibit a decorated, stacked or multi-layer cake; or a tiered cake, using a minimum of four Level 3 techniques. Exhibit may use cake or cake form.

50335------ **Visual Arts Food/Cake Decorating Master:** Write a one-page written description of your project, including your goals, plans, accomplishments, and evaluation of results. Include up to four pictures of your accomplishments **AND** exhibit an original design decorated cake using more than five techniques. Exhibit may use cake or cake form.

Visual Arts Chalk/Carbon/Pigment: Enter division A or B based on the type of material the art was created.

50336—Division A: Canvas, Paper, Glass:

Any original art work done with pencils, chalk, pens, ink, paint, charcoal, dyes, etc. on canvas, paper, or glass. This would include all painting, sketching, drawing, cartooning, original non-computer generated graphics, printing, etc. Painted and/or glazed pre-formed ceramics and painted porcelain dolls are not eligible for State Fair exhibit. Drawings and paintings should be matted or framed under glass. (Exceptions: Oil and acrylic paintings do not require glass and are not required to be matted.) Water color, chalk, pen & ink, computer-generated art, etc. do require some protective covering. Gallery frames are acceptable. Canvas paintings that continue "over the edges" are acceptable without frames; however, the piece must still be prepared for hanging. Matted pieces without frames are acceptable, however the piece must be prepared for hanging OR it must include a photo of the artwork being displayed in a non-hanging manner. There is no specific requirement for the type of mat used.

50352—Division B: Wood, Metal, Textiles:

Any original art work done with pencils, chalk, pens, ink, paint, charcoal, dyes, etc., on wood, metal, or textiles. Painted and/or glazed pre-formed ceramics and painted porcelain dolls are not eligible for State Fair exhibit. Any exhibits created as a piece of wall art must be prepared for hanging.

- 50337------ **Visual Arts Clay:** Any original item made of clay; may be fired or unfired, hand formed or thrown on a wheel. Self-hardening clays are fine. Fire/oven-cured and cornstarch clay could be accepted. Items can include, but are not limited to, clay statues, bowls, jewelry, etc. Pre-formed ceramics are not eligible for State Fair exhibit.
- 50338-----
 Visual Arts Computer-Generated Art: Any original art created in any software package. Exhibit may not include scanned work, clip art, downloaded images from the internet, any imported image, or photographs. All pixels must be original. Photo mosaics are NOT allowed. Exhibitors in this class (like all other classes in this subsection) must be enrolled in Visual Arts; Computer project enrollment is not required. NOTE: Wood and metal exhibits created through the use of laser cutting programs/devices should be entered in this class. Plastic exhibits with an artistic focus created using a 3-D printer should be entered in this class. If the art created is designed to hang, then the entry should have some protective covering, such as a glass frame, and prepared for hanging. If the art is something that has been created with a laser cutting program/device and is NOT designed to hand, it does not require protective covering nor does it need to be prepared to hang.
- 50339------**Visual Arts Fiber:** Any <u>original item</u> made of fiber. Examples are fabric collage, soft sculpture, stitchery, weaving, embroidery, cross-stitch, wearable art, hooking, braiding, duct tape artistry, string art, and baskets. **Original** cross-stitched, knitted, or crocheted items belong in this Fiber class. **Non-original** cross-stitched, knitted, or crocheted items should be entered in Heritage Arts. Machine knitted items are not appropriate for this class.
- 50350------ **Visual Arts Fiber Non-Original AGES 8-10 ONLY:** Any non-original item made of fiber. Examples are fabric collage, soft sculpture, stitchery, weaving, embroidery, cross-stitch, crocheting, knitting, weaving, hooking, and felting. Exhibitors may use a pattern and/or an idea generated from another source.
- 50340----- Visual Arts Glass/Plastic: Any original item made of glass or plastic. Possible items to exhibit include stained glass, etched glass (original design), mosaics made of glass, glass beading, plastic jewelry (friendly plastic). Interlocking building block creations (i.e. LEGOS) are not suitable for entry. Stepping stones or wall hangings that include cement decorated with glass or plastic items are not suitable for this class.



- Visual Arts Heritage Arts: Exhibit an item of *traditional* art learned from another person or *from a pattern* (NO KITS) may be entered in this class. Non-original cross-stitched, knitted and crocheted items by pattern fit in this class. ALL ORIGI-NAL cross-stitched, knitted and crocheted items should be exhibited in Fiber Arts; (machine knitted items ARE NOT acceptable for this class.) Other possibilities include: needlepoint, counted cross-stitch, crewel, embroidery, cut work, hardanger embroidery (embroidery openwork), macramé, baskets, candles, pysanki (decorated eggs), leather, baskets (made using a traditional pattern), traditional handmade dolls with handmade costumes, soaps made using nature dyes also can be made using hand-made molds or broken into chunks for display, or candles. Exhibitors must also bring 1) the pattern or a copy of the pattern they used to create their traditional art; and 2) a description of the traditional origins of their art choice.
- 50321------ **Visual Arts Leather:** Exhibit one of the following options using leather. Leather Stamping: Exhibit should utilize one or more stamping techniques – exhibit examples include items such as belt; coasters; bookmark; key chain; wrist bracelet.


OR Leather Carving or Tooling: Exhibit should use simple swivel knife tooling techniques or may incorporate several swivel knife-tooling designs or patterns – exhibit examples include items such as belt; pictorial carving; key case.

OR Leather Lacing: Exhibit to include stamping and/or carving techniques incorporated with lacing techniques – exhibit examples include items such as wallets; purses; etc. **OR**

Leather Stitching: Exhibit may include stamping; carving and/or lacing techniques and should be a leather item or article of apparel, which incorporates hand-sewing and/or machine stitching techniques. Hand-sewing and/or machine stitching must be the work of the exhibitor.

- 50342----
 Visual Arts Metal: Any original item made of metal such as sculpture, tin punch, engraved metal, and jewelry. Items intended for industrial use (as tools and/or shop items) are not considered part of this Visual Arts project and are not eligible for entry. Metal items that have been partially or totally created through the use of laser cutting programs/devices should be entered in Computer-Generated Art.
- 50343-----
 Visual Arts Nature: Any original item made of natural material such as wreaths, cornhusk dolls, etc. Items should be made of natural materials (which may be purchased) but securing elements such as glue and wire may be used in the inner construction as long as they do not detract from the overall "natural" appearance. Articles such as dried pressed flowers may be displayed under glass since it is necessary for protection/preservation of the natural materials. Candles are not suitable as entries. All baskets should be entered in Heritage Arts.
- 50331A ------ Visual Arts Quilting You Can Quilt: Exhibit one of the following quilting options.

 All exhibits should include a card which identifies the quilt as an original design created by the exhibitor or as a pattern created by someone else. Item may be quilted using any method tie, hand, or machine quilted. All work must be completed by the 4-H member. Exhibit one of the following:
 - A Mini Quilt for a doll; OR a Quilt sized for an infant (maximum size of 48"x48");
 OR
 - A Quilted Table Runner (width ranging from 15-18"; length ranging from 24-48")
- 50331B ------ **Visual Arts Quilting Quilting the Best Better:** Exhibit one of the following quilting options. All exhibits should include a card which identifies the quilt as an original design created by the exhibitor or as a pattern created by someone else. Item may be quilted using any method tie, hand, or machine quilted. All work must be completed by the 4-H member. Exhibit one of the following:
 - Lap Quilt (width ranging from 48-60"; length ranging from 60-72"); OR
 - Large Quilted Wall Hanging (may be rectangular or square, sized larger than 48" x 48"). Hanging should include tabs or a pocket on the back in order for it to be hung; OR Quilt that fits any size bed (Twin, Double, Queen or King).

- ♦ 4th place Pink ribbon
- ♦ 5th place Yellow ribbon

Champion - A Jr. Fair Champion ribbon will have the IL Seal on the rosette and is purple. The project was chosen as the best project in that project area.

Reserve Champion - A Jr. Fair Reserve Champion ribbon will have the IL Seal on the rosette and is lavender in color. The project was chosen as the runner up project in that project area.

Best of Show - A Best of Show ribbon is red, white and blue. It is awarded to the best project over an entire project area such as "Best of Show - Woodworking."

High Point - Points are accumulated by exhibitor's placings in the Foods and Horticulture area's. 1st place = 5 points, 2nd place = 4 points, etc. The top placing exhibitor is awarded with the High Point ribbon. The High Point ribbon is red, white and blue.

Reserve High Point - The second top placing exhibitor is awarded the Reserve High Point ribbon. The Reserve High Point ribbon is light blue, yellow, and green.

Shelby County 4-H Ribbons

A Rating - An A rating ribbon is a blue ribbon with a 4-H clover on it. This ribbon means that the project met the project standards.

B Rating - A B rating ribbon is a red ribbon with a 4-H clover on it. This ribbon means that the project needs some improvement.

C Rating - A *C* rating ribbon is a white ribbon with a 4-H clover on it. This ribbon means that the project needs much improvement.

State Fair - A State Fair ribbon is purple and means the project has been selected to go to the IL State Fair.

State Fair Alternate- A State Fair alternate ribbon is lavender and means the project has been selected to go to the IL State Fair if the State Fair winner chooses not take his/her project.

Top Project - The judge thought the project was very well done and deserved extra recognition.

Champion - A 4-H Champion ribbon will have a 4-H Clover on the rosette and is purple. The project was chosen as the best 4-H project in that project area.

Reserve Champion - A 4-H Reserve Champion ribbon will have a 4-H Clover on the rosette and is lavender. The project was chosen as the runner up 4-H project in that project area.

Champion and Reserve Showmanship - Champion and Reserve Champion Showmanship ribbons are presented to the winners and runner-ups in each age division in the livestock, rabbits, poultry and horse shows. Showmanship classes are based on the 4-H'er and how they exhibit their animal, knowledge of their animal, and overall presentation.
