2020 VIRTUAL SHOW

On June 1st, University of Illinois Extension announced the cancellation of all in-person programs and activities through July 31st. This includes all university-sponsored events, including 4-H club meetings, events, livestock and general project shows, and other exhibit opportunities. The Christian County 4-H programs and summer exhibit opportunities are affected by this announcement and will be adapting their judging experiences accordingly.

CHRISTIAN COUNTY 4-H SHOW- Rules Governing 4-H Exhibits

- 1. Each **exhibitor** must be enrolled as a Christian County 4-H Club member before April 15, 2020 and enrolled in each project area they wish to exhibit before April 15 in order to exhibit at the 4-H show.
- 2. Each exhibitor must have submitted his/her show entries via 1) online entry using the FairEntry system, or 2) on an official 4-H Show Registration Form to the Christian County Extension office, 1120 N. Webster St., Taylorville, no later than Wednesday, June 24th at 4:30 pm. Anyone not submitting an entry form by this time will not be allowed to exhibit. All entries will be made online, via the Fair Entry system, for all 4-H shows.
- 3. 4-H members must be 8 years old by September 1, 2019 to exhibit at the Illinois State Fair. Any 4-H member who is present at the judging can be chosen to represent Christian County at the State Fair if they meet the eligibility rules for participation set by the Junior Department of the Illinois State Fair. Only "Blue" ratings are eligible for State Fair.
- 4. All exhibitors, leaders, parents, and spectators are expected to show respect and courtesy to judges and superintendents. Violations may result in disqualifying the exhibitor.
- 5. PARENTS WILL NOT BE ALLOWED IN THE JUDGING AREA. Exception: Youth identified by superintendent as

"children with special needs" may have another person with them during judging. Please notify the 4-H Extension Staff by July 1st, if you feel your child may fall into "children with special needs" so a pre-determined decision and accommodations can be made.

- 6. If any question arises that is not covered by the General Rules, the 4-H Superintendent of that project area, if available, shall make the necessary decision.
- 7. PROTESTS Any protest must be made to the Superintendent at time of show. The Superintendent in that particular project area will consult the 4-H staff (4-H Program Coordinator, 4-H Youth Development Educator and/or County Director) and a decision will be made at the show. If satisfactory treatment is not received, written charges/protests should be made and forwarded to University of Illinois Christian County 4-H Committee within 24 hours of the said infraction.
- 8. Entry tags for miscellaneous projects will be distributed during registration at the 4-H Show and a completed entry tag must be attached to each exhibit. Entry tags will not be used this year. Members should d
- 9. Premiums will be paid when the money is received from the Illinois Dept. of Agriculture. Premiums will be totaled and mailed in one check and must be cashed promptly. Please see the premium disclaimer on page 4.
- 10. No entry fee will be charged for 4-H Shows.
- 11. All 4-H members must be enrolled in the project area they are exhibiting in. If not, they will not be allowed to exhibit that project. All projects must be owned and cared for by the 4-H member.
- 12. All general projects are expected to be on exhibit at the fairgrounds until Thursday afternoon at 2:00 p.m., just prior to the auction. If this rule is not abided by, ribbons and premiums will be forfeited. Exceptions to projects that may go home early: Hobbies & Collections, Geology, Produce or food items. Other exceptions are at the discretion of the 4-H Program Coordinator, 4-H Youth Development Educator, and/or the County Director.
- 13. It is strictly up to the 4-H leader to determine who is in good standing in a club, and it is the leader's responsibility to inform the Extension office of any problems. Independent 4-H members' standing will be determined by the Extension Office.
- 14. Cloverbud club members will only be allowed to enter in the Cloverbud class. Cloverbud exhibits are not eligible for premiums. See Cloverbud class guidelines for more information.
- 15. 4-H members must be present at time of judging (General, Food & Clothing) in order to be eligible to be selected for State Fair UNLESS prior review by the 4-H Committee has verified another 4-H function, conflict, or employment. A "Permission for Absence" form must be completed and sent to Sara Marten, 4-H Youth Development Educator, Christian County Extension, 1120 North Webster St., Taylorville, IL 62568 by July 1st, 2020. The form can be found on page 76. Due to the virtual format this year, being present during the judging process will not be allowed. No absentee forms will be needed or required.
- 16. Exhibits that are vulgar or inappropriate in nature, contain lewd or offensive language, or in any does not uphold the image of 4-H and positive youth development are strictly prohibited.

- 17. (SF) denotes projects eligible for State Fair.
- 18. The Christian County 4-H program strives to keep county exhibit opportunities aligned with Illinois State Fair exhibit requirements. This fair book in essence is the Illinois State Fair Book with Christian County rules applied where necessary.
- 19. The Illinois State Fair rules are official and final. At the county level in the general project areas, we can show some flexibility. The entries you bring will most likely be judged, but following the rules is a large part of the exhibit experience and not complying with the requirements can greatly affect the rating you receive.
- 20. Visual Arts that are not ORIGINAL can be judged at the county level, but are not eligible for the State Fair. If you have specific project questions, call the Extension office at 287-7246 and get clarification on what you want to exhibit before the day of the exhibit.
- 21. In order to have a "Best of Show" or "Champion" in a class, there must be 3 or more exhibitors. Best of Show and/or Champions will be not be selected this year.

RIBBONS, AWARDS & RECOGNITION FOR VIRTUAL SHOWS

Projects will be reviewed by the judge and – based on the listed project and exhibition requirements – be given a rating and ribbon for each entry. The A, B, and C rating system (with corresponding blue, red, and white ribbons) will be used for all project areas. Judges will be instructed to use the comment boxes in Fair Entry to give any and all feedback.

A Rating/Blue Ribbon – Project meets or exceeds project and class requirements. B Rating/Red Ribbon – Project needs some improvement to meet project and class requirements. C Rating/White Ribbon – Project needs a lot of improvement or is missing major project or class requirements.

If a project is state fair eligible, the judge will select any projects that he/she deems eligible to move on. Judges are not required to select state fair delegates and not all open spots have to be filled in a given project area. ***Judges will not be selecting class champions or grand or reserves this year. ***

VIRTUAL EXHIBIT REQUIREMENTS

Original project exhibit requirements (found in this show book) identified what was needed for a judge to evaluate the learning and knowledge associated with each 4-H exhibit opportunity. While we believe completing all of these experiences still provides the best educational experience for the 4-H member, with the transition to a virtual 4-H exhibition experience, members are only required to upload the elements listed for the virtual experience. These new requirements are found in boxes within each class listing in this show book.

ILLINOIS 4-H Online Judging Exhibitor Tip Sheet

You have worked so hard on your 4-H projects and we are excited to see your work. Even though we can't see you in person this year, online judging is a chance to share what you have learned, and to get feedback from a judge to help you think about your goals and plans for next year. Exhibits will be judged in the closed-access FairEntry System. After judging is complete, we will look for different ways to share your exhibits for public viewing. Here are some tips to help you plan for your online judging experience:

- Most exhibit will require a 4-H Project Report and three photos (a photo of the overall exhibit and 2 photos that provide a close up of a skill, technique or content area that you would like to report). In a small number of project areas, additional documentation is required. Examples include a video showing your exhibit in action (such as robotics, computer program and live animals) or additional word document/PDF (such as crop record or creative writing sample).
- 2. This year for online judging a Microsoft PowerPoint option is available as an alternative to creating a physical poster presentation. If you have already started your poster, you can upload photos of your poster as previously described. The slideshow option is also available as an alternate to uploading several individual photo images. Slideshows should be no more than 10 slides. Slideshows of a maximum 20 slides are allowed for multi-year project binder/portfolio exhibits or large collection displays, including: My Financial Future: Adv., Entomology 3, RockHounds 1-2, Communications, Journalism, and Leadership 2-3.
- 3. An important part of the 4-H judging experience is to provide you an opportunity to share what you have learned with the judge. Because you are not able to meet in person with the judge, the <u>4-H Project Report</u> is a key part of sharing what you have learned. A project report template is available for you and should be saved and uploaded with your FairEntry registration. This is required for every 4-H exhibit and should be <u>no more than 1 page.</u>
- Each exhibit has different instructions on what documentation to upload into FairEntry. You can find the instructions for your project area and class in the <u>4-H Online Judging Exhibit Requirement Spreadsheet</u>. Showbook requirements still apply.
- 5. If you run into trouble with uploading your exhibit documentation, please contact Sara Marten at marten1@illinois.edu or Sara Isenberg at saradi@illinois.edu . We are here to help you!
- 6. Tips on Taking Photos of Your Exhibit:
 - Include a small card or piece of paper with your name and county in each photo
 - Remove glass or plastic before taking photos to avoid glare
 - Choose a location with good lighting to take photos of your exhibit use natural lighting if possible.
- 7. Note: A few exhibit areas are difficult to share via photos. A video of no more than 3 minutes is required for robotics, computer science, video, and maker projects. Instructions on how to share your videos for these projects will be forthcoming.
- 8. More detailed instructions for livestock, horse, dog and public presentation contests will be sent separately.
- 9. Remember: judging comments can be helpful, but they are only one person's evaluation.
- 10. Once completed, exhibit photos/videos and awards will be posted for public viewing. This is a requirement for Ag Premium Eligibility. Remember that Ag Premium awards are subject to modification or cancellation in any year for which the General Assembly fails to make an appropriation to fund the premiums." (30 ILCS 120/14(d))

CAPTURING & UPLOADING VIDEOS FOR VIRTUAL JUDGING

*Review updated project and class lists for upload requirements. Some general projects and most livestock/live animal projects will require members to upload one or multiple videos for judging. *

All videos are to be uploaded using the following link: go.illinois.edu/2020ChristianFairUploads

Entries MUST ALSO be entered in the Fair Entry system.

FOR ALL VIDEOS

- 1. Suggest 1080p videos. Most phones will automatically film in 1080p.
- 2. Class and project requirements will dictate the length of each video.
- 3. UPLOADING VIDEOS Use the following link to upload videos: go.illinois.edu/2020ChristianFairUploads
- 4. When saving/uploading videos, please include the following in the video description:
 - a. Name of Exhibitior (First & Last)
 - b. Project Area & Class (i.e. Video/Filmaking Animated Video)
 - c. If you have multiple videos that are similar (i.e. multiple of the same livestock species), please make sure you give a good description so we know which entry to pair them with (i.e. breed classes, entry number in FairEntry, etc.)

FOR LIVESTOCK-SPECIFIC VIDEOS

- 5. Showman should be dressed in show attire.
- 6. Videos should be roughly 45 seconds and should not exceed 60 seconds. Preferred format: 15 seconds of front view, 15 seconds of side view, 15 seconds of rear view.
- 7. Absolutely NO editing. All videos should be continuous, with no stopping or restarting. No zooming in and out showman/animal to showcase close-ups.
- 8. Phone must be held SIDEWAYS (horizontally).
- 9. Videos are recommended to be taken outside and on level ground. Poutrly, rabbits, cats, and some dogs can be shown on a table or stand. No tall grass or deep bedding.
- 10. The person filming should NOT move. They can twist their waist to follow the animal but should not walk while videoing. The showman should show to the camera as if it is the judge.
- 11. Do not narrate videos. Judges will be instructed to mute livestock judging videos.

IMPORTANT

Upload requirements (photos/videos, etc.) for virtual show will be listed in boxes for each project area and class.

RULES:

- **1.** Table displays are limited to 2' wide x 15" deep. Standard science display boards fit into the size limitation. Maximum poster size for hanging is 22" x 30".
- 2. Entry tags for projects will be distributed during registration at the 4-H Show and a completed entry tag must be attached each exhibit. Exhibits with multiple pieces must have a tag with the member's name and club on each stand-alone piece.
- 3. Projects should be in place no later than 9:00 a.m. the day of the show. Members are expected to be judged during their primary club's judging time UNLESS prior approval has been given prior to the show.
- 4. 4-H members must be present at time of judging in order to be eligible to be selected for State Fair UNLESS prior approval has been given to attend another 4-H function, conflict, or employment. A "Permission for Absence" form must be completed and sent to Sara Marten, 4-H Youth Development Educator, Christian County Extension, 1120 North Webster St., Taylorville, IL-62568 by July 1, 2020. The form can be found in the Forms and Resource pages of this show book.
- 5. Any 4-H member who is present at the judging can be chosen to represent Christian County at the State Fair if they meet the eligibility rules for participation set by the Junior Department of the Illinois State Fair. Only "Blue" ratings are eligible for State Fair.
- 6. Visual Arts exhibits which are not ORIGINAL can be judged at the county level but are not eligible for the State Fair. If you have specific project questions, call the Extension office at 287-7246 and get clarification on what you want to exhibit before the day of the show.
- 7. Original is defined as not being a kit, a pattern, or a copy of another item.
- 8. Copyright or Trademark items, pictures or slogans are NOT allowed.
- 9. NO exhibiting of any article made with products that do not uphold the image of 4-H.
- 10. (SF) denotes projects eligible for State Fair.
- 11. State Fair non-livestock exhibitors (Clothing, Food and General Projects) must declare their intentions **no later than July 30th** to be eligible to be promoted to the state fair.

AEROSPACE

Each county may send 2 entries total from 50130, 50131; and 1 entry from 50133.

Model Rocketry: (SF 50130)

For Aerospace 2, 3 & 4

Exhibit one model rocket assembled or made by the member. The exhibit will be a static display. The model rocket should be in good flying condition. DO NOT include the rocket engine with your exhibit. The rockets will not be launched. Attach the printed directions for construction of the rocket if any were used.

Upload should include:

- Completed 4-H Project Report
- 6 photos OR slideshow (max 10 slides). Images to include: fron, back, top-down, bottom-up, close up of in, close up of paint job.
- Photo or PDF of build instructions used if applicable.

Aerospace Display: (SF 50131)

For Aerospace 2, 3 & 4

Prepare a display related to the aerospace project which does not fit in the model rocketry class. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

Upload should include:

- Completed 4-H Project Report
- 3 photos OR slideshow (max 10 slides). Images to include: one of whole exhibit and two close-up of our choice that highlight a featured skill or content area.

ANIMAL SCIENCE

Open to all members enrolled in Beef, Cats, Dairy, Dogs, Goats, Horse & Pony, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep, Small Pets, and Swine

Each county may submit two entries in this section to state fair.

Animal Science (SF 50135)

Prepare a display focusing on any activity related to the animal science or livestock industry of the corresponding species. Demonstrate the skills and knowledge you have gained through the animal project you studied. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs,

websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period. Live animals are not permitted as exhibits in this area. For safety reasons, exhibits cannot include glass, syringes with needles or any other sharp objects.

Upload should include:

- Completed 4-H Project Report
- 3 photos OR slideshow (max 10 slides). Images to include: one of whole exhibit and two close-ups of your choice that highlight a featured skill or content area.

Animal Science Ready4Life Challenge (SF 50137) **Open to 11- to 18-year-olds enrolled in any Beef project.** *See Ready4Life Challenge guidelines and entry information on page 74.*

Animal Science Maker (SF 50400)

See Maker Class guidelines and entry information on page 74.

BICYCLE (not eligible for state fair)

Bicycle 1

Exhibitors will draw three situations from a bag that relate to activities from Level 1 and discuss/explain all three with the judge. Situations may include: Selecting bicycle safety equipment; Demonstrate how to fit a helmet; Identify bike parts and their function; Selecting the right size bike; How to check bicycle tires, brakes and chains; Recognizing traffic signs and their meaning; General discussion of bicycling hazards; and Items to consider when planning a bike trip.

Upload should include:

- Completed 4-H Project Report
- 3 photos OR slideshow (max 10 slides). Images to include: one of whole exhibit and two close-ups of your choice that highlight a featured skill or content area.

Bicycle 2

Exhibitors will draw three situations from a bag that relate to activities from Level 2 and discuss/explain all three with the judge. Situations may include: Factors to consider when choosing a bike; Comparing tire pressure, valve type and tread; Steps in fixing a flat tire; Steps to follow when cleaning, lubricating and replacing a bike chain; Evaluating the braking system on a bicycle; Factors to consider when mapping out a bike route; Rules for smart bike riding; and Planning a menu for an all-day bike ride.

- Completed 4-H Project Report
- 3 photos OR slideshow (max 10 slides). Images to include: one of whole exhibit and two close-ups of your choice that highlight a featured skill or content area.

Bicycle Ready4Life Challenge (not eligible for state fair) **Open to 11- to 18-year-olds enrolled in any Bicycle project.** *See Ready4Life Challenge quidelines and entry information on page 74.*

CATS (LIVE ANIMAL SHOW)

- 1. Each exhibitor is limited to two entries per class.
- 2. All entries will be judged in the following areas: coat, eyes, body condition, teeth, gums, legs, and temperament.
- 3. Members can exhibit a poster instead of an animal (but not both). Posters are to be shown under the Animal Science class in the General Projects Show.

Class 51 – Cats (6 months and over)

Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period. For safety reasons, exhibits cannot include glass, syringes with needles or any other sharp objects. Exhibit must include printed or electronic version of at least three completed activities from the manual.

Upload should include:

- Completed 4-H Project Report
- 3 photos OR slideshow (max 10 slides). Images to include: one of whole exhibit and two close-ups of your choice that highlight a featured skill or content area.

• Child Care 1: Infants and Toddlers

Prepare a display focusing on a topic related to child care of this age group such as selecting age appropriate activities, explaining child behavior, and/or recognizing safety concerns. Demonstrate the skills and knowledge you have gained through the child development project you studied. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period. For safety reasons, exhibits cannot include glass, syringes with needles or any other sharp objects. <u>Exhibit must include printed or electronic version of at least three completed activities from the manual.</u>

CLOTHING & TEXTILES

Each county may submit 3 STEAM entries total from 50151 a-c, 50152 a-c, 50153 a-c; 2 shopping entries from 50154, 50155, 50156; and 1 Ready4Life entry from 50157.

All exhibits entered in the clothing and textiles area will be judged based on their construction and fit (if applicable). Exhibitors bringing garments should not wear their garments when they arrive for judging The garment will be reviewed by the judges for construction first. Exhibitors will be asked to change into the garment as the second step of the judging process. If the garment was constructed for another individual, that individual must be present to wear the garment for the judge. (Only the exhibitor who made the garment is eligible for ribbon and premium.) Construction and appearance will both be considered during judging. If a pattern was used to make the item, the pattern instructions, either written or electronic, are to be included with the exhibit. Exhibit tags should be attached to the garment, not to the hanger.

Members wishing to exhibit knitted items should enroll in Visual Arts Fiber (if original) or Heritage Arts (if made from a pattern). Members who enroll in Clothing & Textiles with the intent of pursuing quilting can exhibit in the non-clothing exhibit category in STEAM Clothing 1—FUNdamentals. Quilts exhibited in the Clothing & Textiles area will be judged using a rubric that evaluates the sewing skills and construction of the item. All work on the quilt MUST be completed by the 4-H member. You cannot exhibit a quilt that was quilted by someone else. Quilts can be hand OR machine quilted as long as ALL work is completed by the exhibitor.

Raglan and loose flowing sleeves are acceptable.

Stories should be double-spaced. Poems may be single-spaced.

- Rhymed Poetry An interpretation of a subject in rhymed verse. Submit a collection of three poems.
- Free Style Poetry– An interpretation of a subject in unrhymed verse. Submit a collection of three poems.
- **Short Story** A fiction piece comprised of three basic elements: a theme, a plot and characters. Submit one story, maximum length –2,000 words.
- **Essay** A short nonfiction composition in which a theme is developed or an idea is expressed. Submit one essay, maximum length –500 words.
- **Feature Story** -- Nonfiction human-interest story judged on interest to readers, writing style, readability, and thoroughness of coverage. Submit one story, maximum length -1,000 words.

Formal Speeches share the presenter's own unique view and are intended to motivate, persuade, or inform an audience and may include a call to action. Youth deliver a speech on any topic they wish (Original Oratory), or choose one of these four topics on which to speak (Topical Response):

- Welcome to the Digital Age
- What is My Connection to the Global Community?
- Power: Who Has It, Who Doesn't, and Does It Matter?
- If I Could See tomorrow...

Illustrated Speech | Self-written | Notes allowed | Illustrations Required | Individual | 4-8 minutes Illustrated Speeches may be used to inform, persuade, or motivate the audience while using a visual aid. Visual aids may be two dimensional, three-dimensional, or digital. Youth may include audience participation. Digital visual aids must be stored on a USB flash drive. Illustrated speeches may be:

- How-to demonstrations which show the audience how to do something.
- Object lessons which use objects as metaphors to share a message.
- Educational models where drawings or diagrams help explain a topic.

Original Works | Self-written | Notes allowed | Props and Costumes Allowed | Individual or 2-Person Team | Manuscripts sent in Advance | 4-8 minutes

Original works must be written entirely by the presenter. It may be presented as an individual or a twoperson team entry. Manuscripts must be sent in advance to the contest. Presentations may be designed for TV, radio, or online media and must be presented live. The types of entries could include:

- Prose and Short Stories
- Poetry
- Broadcast Media Program
- Theatrical
- Combined Program: Combine any number of the above elements along with other creative presentation forms

Oral Interpretation | Published work | Props and Costumes Allowed | Individual or 2-Person Team | Manuscripts sent in Advance | 4-8 minutes

Presentations in Oral Interpretation must be published works, and manuscripts or transcripts must be submitted prior to the event. They may be presented as an individual or a two-person team entry. The types of entries could include:

- Prose and Short Stories
- Poetry
- Theatrical Interpretation
- Published Speech Recitation: Excerpt from a spoken presentation delivered by a public figure, such as Winston Churchill, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., or Maya Angelou

Combined Program: Combine any number of the above elements along with other presentation forms

Food Demonstration (Not Eligible for State Fair) Individual or 2-Person Team | 8-10 minutes

TO ENTER IN FAIRENTRY: Christian Fair >> General Show >> Foods & Nutrition >> Food Demonstration All 4-H members enrolled in a foods project are eligible to exhibit a Food Demonstration.

The food demonstration must relate to the state-offered project area in which the member(s) is/are enrolled.

- Food demonstrations should be approximately 8-10 minutes in length. However, there will not be a time penalty. The time limit will be taken into consideration at the judges' discretion.
- The Extension Office will provide the food demonstration table and one additional table for each presentation. Exhibitors are responsible for all other supplies and equipment needed.
- Demonstrations may be done by an individual or team of two members.

COMPUTER SCIENCE

Each county may submit 3 entries total from 50159, 50160, 50161, 50162; and 1 entry from 50164.

Exhibitors may bring computer equipment for demonstration purposes. Computers will not be furnished. Internet connections are not available for use by exhibitors. Any member found to be using computer software in a manner that infringes on copyright laws will be disqualified.

Beginning Visual Programming (not eligible for state fair)

Open to youth in Computer Science Visual Based Programming

Exhibit a simple program using Scratch (or other simple graphic programming language). The program should include 8 different commands including looping and getting input from the keyboard and mouse. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a poster or printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

- Code from Scratch program
- Video in which you explain your code as compared to the actions on the screen (max 3 minutes)

Intermediate Visual Programming (SF 50159)

Open to youth in Computer Science Visual Based Programming

Exhibit a program using Scratch (or other simple graphic programming) that you have downloaded from the internet and modified. Compare the two programs and demonstrate the changes you made to the original program; **OR** create an animated storybook using Scratch (or other simple graphical programming language). All exhibits must include something visual, such as a poster or printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

Advance Visual Programming (SF 50160)

Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

Computer Open Source / Innovation CS (SF 50162)

Open to youth enrolled in Computer Science Text-Based Programming or robotics project).

Demonstrate the skills and knowledge you have gained through the Computer project. The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games,

apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. Your exhibit should not fit in the other exhibit options for this project. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. Exhibits in this class may also demonstrate successful application of open source (publicly available) computing software and/or hardware, such as Raspberry Pi and Linux, to accomplish a task. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a poster or printed copy of a digital presentation or programing flowchart, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Exhibits in this area will be judged on the computer science programming. Youth enrolled in a robotics project should choose this class if you want the exhibit to be judged on the programming of the robot. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

DOG (LIVE ANIMAL SHOW)

- 1. Members may show only one dog per class.

Dog Care (50300)

(Not eligible for state fair) Animals will be judged on cleanliness, grooming, condition and behavior.

- 45 second video OR 4 photos that showcase the following: whole body of animal, close up of face to view eyes and nose, close up of teeth and gums, close up of inside of ears

DOG OBEDIENCE

Dogs shown in the dog obedience project must be trained by and belong to the exhibitor, or a member, of the 4-Her's immediate family, or leased for the length of the project with a signed agreement. The ownership or lease agreement must be in effect by June 1 of the year in which the dog is being exhibited. Exhibitors in dog obedience classes at the Illinois State Fair must be enrolled 4-H members during the year in which they are exhibiting. Additional obedience classes are available at the State Dog Show for qualified exhibitors.

50401: Dog Obedience, Beginner Novice 1 (SF)

For new handlers and inexperienced dogs only.

Dogs in this class must not have had training beyond the beginner level. Dogs will perform all exceriss on leash. These include: heel, figure 8 (forward halt, right turn, left turn, slow, normal and fast), stand for examination, recall, long sit and long down.

50402: Dog Obedience, Beginner Novice 2 (SF)

For experienced handlers with inexperience dogs OR experienced dogs with inexperienced handlers. Dogs in this class must not have had training beyond this level. Dogs will perform the same tasks as in the Beginner level except they will be done OFF leash.

50402: Dog Obedience, Preferred Novice (SF)

Dogs must not have had training beyond this level. Dogs will heel off leash, stand for examination off leash, heel free and figure 8, drop on recall, and three minute long sit and five minute long down (handler out of sight).

RALLY OBEDIENCE

- 1. To be eligible to move on to the sate contest, dog/handler must present a qualifying scoresheet at checkin showing at least 70 out of 100 to compete at the state level.
- 2. The event will be timed. In the event of a tie score, the fastest time will break the tie.
- 3. A dog/handler must receive 3 qualifying scores before advancing to the next level.
- 4. Rally rings will be between 2000 X 3000 square feet with a minimum width of 30 feet.
- 5. Unless otherwise noted, handler may speaker to the dog, pat their leg, or clap their hands to encourage.

50413: Rally Novice (SF)

10-15 signs are used (not including start and finish). Three to seven of the signs must be "stationary" signs. Performed on leash.

50414: Rally Intermediate (SF)

A total of 12-17 signs are used (not including start and finish). Three to seven of the signs must be "stationary" signs. At least three "advanced" signs. Performed on leash.

50415: Rally Advanced (SF)

A total of 12-17 signs are used (not including start and finish). Three to seven of the signs must be "stationary" signs. At least three "advanced" signs. Dog must jump once. Performed <u>off leash</u>.

50416: Rally Excellent (SF)

A total of 15-20 signs are used (not including start, finish, or call marker). Dog must jump twice. Two or more of the signs must be "advanced" signs. Three or more of the signs must be "excellent" signs. Must include a "sit stay" sing. Performed <u>off leash</u>. Cannot pat leg or clap hands for encouragement.

Electricity 1 (SF 50177)

(May only be battery-powered projects using battery components and wiring). Exhibit a momentary switch, simple switch, basic circuit, electromagnet, galvanometer, **OR** an electric motor. All projects must include a report explaining how the project was constructed and the principles demonstrated. Recommendations can be found on the website. Projects using paper clips, cardboard, thumbtacks, & brads are not eligible for state fair exhibits in electricity. Members wishing to exhibit these types of projects should consider exhibiting in Junkdrawer Robotics 1 or 2.

Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

Upload should include:

ENTOMOLOGY: BEEKEEPING

Create an exhibit that shows the public what you learned in the beekeeping project this year. **Note**: No bee hives may be exhibited. (Honey moisture content will be measured.) Fill level: the honey should be filled to the jar shoulder, not over, nor under. Chunk honey should go in a wide-mouth jar, preferably one specially made for chunk honey (see beekeeping catalogs). Be careful to distinguish "chunk honey" (comb in jar) from "cut comb" (comb only in plastic box). *Honey exhibited (including chunk, cut comb, and sections) must be collected since the previous year fair.*

Beekeeping 1 (SF 50188)

Exhibit an educational display for one (1) of the following:

- Flowers Used to Make Honey. Display pressed flowers from ten (10) different Illinois plants that bees use for making honey.
- Uses of Honey and Beeswax.
- Setting Up a Bee Hive.
- Safe Handling of Bees.
- Equipment needed by a Beekeeper.

- Completed 4-H Project Report
- 3 photos or slideshow (max 10 slides). Images to include: one of whole exhibit and two close-up of your choice that highlight a featured skill or content area.

Beekeeping 2 (SF 50189)

Exhibit one (1) of the following:

The words on the plates must be legible and clearly visible in the picture. Pictures, graphics or photos are acceptable.

Electronic equipment will only be used during your judging time and will not remain on display during the exhibit period.

Upload should include:

Sports Nutrition (SF 50206)

Prepare a display, digital presentation, or poster on one of the activity chapters in the manual that you completed. The activity chapters are listed by page number in the table of contents. Your exhibit should include, at minimum, information on one physical fitness component and one food/recipe component from the activity chapter. The exhibit should include the project manual with the pages of the activity completed. You may also include live demonstration of physical activities. Do not bring food made using the recipes, but consider adding pictures of the completed recipes to your exhibit. You must furnish any equipment you need for the exhibit. Internet service is not provided. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation. Electronic equipment will only be used during your judging time and will not remain on display during the exhibit period.

Examples for Activity 1

Example A: Make a video of yourself practicing flexibility, strength and endurance physical fitness activities and making pasta salad with different vegetable, pasta and dressing ideas. Bring a screen shot and brief description of your video to leave on display.

Example B: Make a poster of pictures of flexibility, strength and endurance physical fitness activities and information on the results of making the spinach and mandarin orange salad. Include answers to the questions in the book.

FOOD PRESERVATION

Food Preservation (SF 50208)

Prepare an exhibit using ONE of the following food preservation methods: canning; freezing; drying; pickles/relishes; jams, jellies and preserves **OR** a combination of these (see Preservation Combination option below), excluding Freezing. No freezer jam exhibits will be allowed for Freezing; Jams, Jellies, and Preserves; or for the Preservation Combination options.

- **Canning** The exhibit should include two different canned foods in appropriate jars for the products. Food may be fruit, vegetable, or tomato product (i.e. salsa, juice, etc.).
- **Freezing** Prepare a nutrition display that illustrates a freezing principle. There is NOT a food exhibit option for this preservation method.
- **Drying** Exhibit two (2) different dried foods packed in plastic food storage bags. Choose from fruit, vegetable, fruit leather or meat jerky.
- Pickles and Relishes Exhibit two pint jars of different recipes of pickles and/or relishes.
- Jams, Jellies, and Preserves Exhibit half-pint jars of two different jams, jellies, and/or preserves.
- **Preservation Combination** Exhibit two different preserved food products, excluding Freezing, in appropriate jars/packaging (drying). For example, exhibit 1 jar of tomatoes (Canning) and 1 half-pint of jelly (Jams, Jellies, and Preserves).

All preserved products should be prepared and processed according to the current USDA/Extension information. USDA information on preserving food, including recipes, can be found at: <u>www.homefoodpreservation.com</u> or <u>web.extension.illinois.edu/foodpreservation/</u> Recipes must be processed in a water-bath or pressure canner.

<u>All food exhibits must be labeled with:</u> 1) The name of the food; 2) The date preserved; 3) Appropriate method(s) of food preservation (For canned projects: boiling water bath or pressure canner; For drying projects: Specify equipment used (food dehydrator, oven, etc.))

Examples:

- Strawberry jam, boiling water bath. July 13, 2014.
- Green beans, pressure canner. July 13, 2014.
- Beef jerky, food dehydrator and oven. July 13, 2014.

<u>All food exhibits must be accompanied with the recipe(s)</u> – typed or written, with the source of the recipe(s) listed.. <u>Required Recipes and Sources for Food Preservation Exhibits</u> – all food preservation recipes be from an approved source. Those sources are:

- *PUT IT UP! Food Preservation for Youth* manuals
- U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA)
- National Center for Home Food Preservation
- Ball/Kerr Canning (recipes after 1985)
- Mrs. Wages

DO NOT BRING RECIPES FROM: Magazine or newspaper clippings, Pinterest (unless it is from a source listed above), Grandma's or a recipe from a family member or friend without a source, Cookbooks (excluding the Ball, Kerr and Put It Up! book).

Canning Equipment Requirements: All canned products must be canned in clear, standard jars in good condition (no chips or cracks). Jars must be sealed using two-piece canning lids (flat lid and band). Must use a new, unused flat lid. Bands must not be rusty or severely worn.

(NOTE: Exhibitors choosing lilies should include no more than 2/3 of foliage for their exhibit.)

Exhibitors should be knowledgeable about various aspects of the vegetables, including but not limited to different varieties, soil testing, fertilizers used, etc. Vegetable exhibits should be prepared according to the Illinois Vegetable Garden Guide website: <u>http://web.extension.illinois.edu/vegguide/</u>. Waxes and oils may not be used on vegetables or fruits. Any plant infested with insects will be removed from the exhibit area and will not be eligible for a Superior exhibit.

Vegetable Display (SF 50314)

(Open to youth in Vegetable Gardening A, Vegetable Gardening B, Vegetable Gardening C, and Vegetable Gardening D)

- 1. This class is allowed a 2'6" x 2'6" space for display.

PHOTOGRAPHY

Each county may submit 3 entries total from 50268, 50269, 50270, 50271, 50272; and 1 entry from 50274.

ALL photos in exhibits must have been taken by the exhibitor. Photo/Model releases from individuals pictured in the exhibitor's photographs are required unless the photograph is of a group in a public place where identification would not be an issue. The release can be obtained at:

<u>https://4h.extension.illinois.edu/members/projects/photography</u>. Photos may be taken with a camera, an electronic tablet (i.e. iPad), or a cell phone.

ALL photos (including Photo Editing exhibits) must be accompanied by details of the camera settings that include:

- a. Camera/device used
- b. Aperture (F-stop)
- c. Exposure time (shutter speed)
- d. ISO (film/sensor sensitivity)
- e. Lighting used (flash, artificial, sunlight, other)
- f. Photo editing software/application used (required for ALL edits and retouches except for cropping)
- g. Filters used (lens filters and or digital/software filters)

Members are allowed to shoot on a camera's automatic setting but should be able to find the metadata information on the photo to discuss the information above.

The exhibition size requirements for all photographs will be:

Minimum image size: 5X7 Maximum image size: 8X10 Maximum exhibit size (including frame): 18X20

All exhibitors must include unframed (taped to the back of the framed exhibit or attached to the project booklet) **un-edited** versions of either the same subject or the examples of the same technique that the framed image represents. This will assist the judge in understanding the choices made by the photographer to build the exhibited composition.

NOTE: Images taken with devices that apply an automatic filter will not be eligible for award.

Photography 1 (SF 50268)

Exhibit one framed photo which demonstrates your understanding of a technique you learned from your Photography 1 project manual. No photo editing is allowed in this class except cropping and red eye removal. Be prepared to show the page in the manual of the technique you are demonstrating.

- Any other programmable robot kit such as Arduino or Raspberry Pi, should be exhibited under Innovation Open Source class.

Robotics 1: Beginning (not eligible for state fair)

Exhibitors will design, build and program a robot that can autonomously follow a predetermined path that changes direction at least 4 times during a single run. They will bring their Robotics Notebook to share what they learned about the engineering design process and programming.

Robotics 1: Intermediate (SF 50285)

Exhibitors in this class must use at least one sensor in their robot design. They will bring their Robotics Notebook to share what they learned about the engineering design process and programming.

Robotics 2 (SF 50286)

SHOOTING SPORTS

4-H members enrolled in 4-H Shooting Sports may choose to exhibit a display in addition to or instead of participating in a Shooting Sports Event. Members must be a member of an approved 4-H Shooting Sports Club to exhibit. All exhibits should be posters or stand-alone items suitable for display to the general public. **No live ammunition, actual firearms or parts of a firearm that could be reassembled should be included.** Stand-alone items have the intent to enhance the discipline such as a quiver, gun case, gun sling, locking cabinet, gun or target stand, sporting clays equipment wagon, etc. Exhibits deemed to be inappropriate by a superintendent will not be displayed.

NOTE: Shooting Sports Displays are <u>prohibited</u> from displaying the following:

- No live ammunition
- No knives or arrow tips (including field points, hunting broadheads, etc.)

- No functional or non-functional bows, firearms or firearm parts that could be reassembled are allowed.
- No humanoid shaped targets or reference to paintball, laser tag, air-soft, or pointing of any type of firearm or bow toward another person is allowed.
- No display involving primarily tactical design firearms (i.e. AR platform or military type firearms)
- No reference or use of the word "weapon" should be used in a display
- Make sure there are no safety violations in your display. (Example: no earplugs or safety glasses in a picture of a person shooting a firearm.)

- **Ignition System**: Identify the parts of the Ignition System and explain how magnetic energy is produced through the ignition system to ignite the spark plug; **OR**

These displays are limited to multicopters (tri, quad, hex, and octocopters), as well as FPV airplanes and flying wings with wingspans up to 36". The UAV MUST have a Flight Controller and utilize a camera/video transmission system. The exhibit will be a static display. The Drone should be in good flying condition with batteries fully charged, and all UAS components (including Video System) ready to demonstrate. DO NOT display your UAV with the propellers on, but rather on the table to the side of your UAV. The Drone will not be flown unless the weather permits, and flights have been approved by the local FAA/Air Traffic Control Tower. Attach the printed directions of the UAV if any were used.

The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. Your exhibit should not fit in the other exhibit options for this project. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

The exhibit may include, but isn't limited to, original works, objects, demonstrations, digital presentations, programs, websites, games, apps, performances, or posters which you have made. Choose whatever method best shows what you've learned. You must furnish any equipment you need for your exhibit. Internet service will not be provided for the exhibit. All exhibits must include something visual, such as a printed copy of a digital presentation, which will remain on display during the exhibition. Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period. Live animals are not permitted as exhibits in this area. For safety reasons, exhibits cannot include glass, syringes with needles or any other sharp objects.

VIDEO/FILMMAKING

Each county may submit 3 entries total from 50324, 50325, 50326, 50327, 50328; and 1 entry from 50330. Enrollment in the Video project is required to exhibit in the classes in this section.

All Exhibitors must bring their video to be judged on a USB flash drive and saved in .MP4 format. Exhibitors are encouraged to post their video on YouTube.com in advance of State Fair. Exhibitors may choose whether to make the video "public, unlisted" (someone must have the link to view it), or "private" (only people you choose may view it). This will allow fairgoers to view the exhibits on display. There will be monitors at the exhibit table for viewing videos so exhibitors will NOT need to bring a laptop or device for viewing.

Requirements that apply to ALL video classes:

Video submissions should be no longer than five (5) minutes in length (unless noted differently in class description.). Videos are to be original and a result of the member's current year's work. Criteria for judging shall include: (1) Evidence of story line; (2) Use of camera angles; (3) Use of zooming techniques; and (4) Smoothness of scene changes. Image and sound quality will be considered in relation to equipment available to and used by exhibitor. All videos should comply with copyright regulations and display an image that is appropriate for 4-H audiences. No time or date should be imprinted on the video footage. All videos should include an opening title screen, as well as closing credits which include date of production, name of video exhibitor and research sources if appropriate. All Video/Filmmaking exhibitors must include a printed copy of materials which will remain on display.

Commercial or Promotional Video (SF 50324)

Prepare a short video (30 seconds to 1 minute in length) that promotes an event, advertises a specific project/product, or is a public service announcement. The video should demonstrate skills in making and editing

video.

Electronic equipment will only be used during your personal judging time and will not remain on display during the entire exhibit period.

VISUAL ARTS

Each county may submit one entry from these projects:

Exhibitors must be enrolled in the Visual Arts project category in which they are exhibiting. Exhibitors are encouraged to date the project when it is made. All visual arts exhibits are evaluated using a visual arts rubric which takes into account correct use of design elements; craftsmanship; and creativity.

Articles exhibited must be an original design created by the exhibitor (except in heritage arts which may follow a pattern AND Fiber-Non Original Ages 8-10 ONLY). Copyrighted or trademarked designs are not acceptable; this includes Team or School logos. Kits and preformed molds are not considered original and are not acceptable in any Visual Arts Class. Combining parts of different patterns (pictures, photographs, images from the internet or a magazine) with the member's own ideas can result in an original design, but simply changing the color, pattern and/or size of a pattern does NOT make the design original. This also applies for ideas found on a site such as Pinterest. If you see something on Pinterest that you like, use the concept and create something different using the concept; however if it MUST NOT look exactly like something the judge can search for and find on Pinterest. The exhibit must combine parts of different patterns and/or ideas with the concepts of the member, however changing the color or changing the size of the item or pattern used does NOT make it original. If you create a replica of what you see somewhere else, it is not your original design. If a photo, sketch, or other idea source was used, submit it with your entry, firmly attached to your exhibit. Be prepared to explain how and where you got the idea for this project.

Members wishing to exhibit quilts made from a pattern may enter it in Heritage Arts. Quilts exhibited in the Visual Arts – Heritage Arts area will be evaluated using a visual arts rubric which takes into account correct use of design elements; craftsmanship; and creativity. All work on the quilt MUST be completed by the 4-H member. You cannot exhibit a quilt that was quilted by someone else.

Visual Arts Food Decorating Beginner (SF 50332)

Exhibit one of the following:

- Exhibit four decorated cookies, using a minimum of four different techniques. Exhibit may use cookies OR cookie forms
- Exhibit four decorated cupcakes, using a minimum of four different techniques, Exhibit may use cupcakes OR cupcake forms.
- Exhibit a single layer decorated cake, using a minimum of four different techniques. Exhibit may use cake OR cake form.

Upload should include:

Visual Arts Food Decorating Intermediate (SF 50333)

Exhibit one of the following:

- Exhibit four decorated cookies, using a minimum of five Level 2 techniques. Exhibit may use cookies OR cookie forms
- Exhibit four decorated cupcakes, using a minimum of five Level 2 techniques. Exhibit may use cupcakes OR cupcake forms.
- Exhibit a single layer or two-layer cakes, using a minimum of five Level 2 techniques. Exhibit may use cake OR cake forms.

Upload should include:

- Completed 4-H Project Report
- 6 photos or slideshow (max 10 slides). Images to include: whole exhibit and closeup of a minimum of five Level 2 techniques.

Visual Arts Food Decoarting Advanced (SF 50334)

Exhibit a decorated, stacked, and/or tiered cake, using a minimum of four Level 3 techniques. Exhibit may use cake OR cake forms.

Upload should include:

- Completed 4-H Project Report
- 5 photos or slideshow (max 10 slides). Images to include: image showing entire decorated item, image of decorating technique #1, image of decorating technique #2, image of decorating technique #3.

Visual Arts Food Decorating Master (SF 50335)

Exhibit to include a one-page written description of your project, including goals, plans, accomplishments, and evaluation of results. Include up to four pictures of your accomplishments **AND** exhibit an original design decorated cake using more than five techniques. Exhibit may use cake OR cake form.

Upload should include:

- 4 photos or slideshow (max 10 slides). Images to include: whole exhibit and closeup of a minimum of five Level 2 techniques.

Visual Arts Chalk/Carbon/Pigment: Enter the division based on the type of material on which the art was created. Division A: Canvas, Paper, Glass: (SF 50336)

Any original art work done with pencils, chalk, pens, ink, paint, charcoal, dyes, etc. on canvas, paper, or glass. This would include all painting, sketching, drawing, cartooning, printing, etc. Painted and/or glazed pre-formed ceramics and painted porcelain dolls are not eligible for State Fair exhibit. Drawings and paintings should be matted or framed under glass. (Exceptions: Oil and acrylic paintings do not require glass and are not required to be matted.) Water color, chalk, pen & ink,

computer-generated art, etc. do require some protective covering. Gallery frames are acceptable. Canvas paintings that continue "over the edges" are acceptable without frames; however, the piece must still be prepared for hanging. Matted pieces without frames are acceptable, however the piece must be prepared for hanging OR it must include a photo of the artwork being displayed in a nonhanging manner. There is no specific requirement for the type of mat used.

Division B: Wood, Metal, Textiles: (SF 50352)

Any original art work done with pencils, chalk, pens, ink, paint, charcoal, dyes, etc., on wood, metal, or textiles. Painted and/or glazed pre-formed ceramics and painted porcelain dolls are not eligible for State Fair exhibit. Any exhibits created as a piece of wall art must be prepared for hanging.

Upload should include (for Chalk/Carbon/Pigment, Division A & B):

- Completed 4-H Project Report
- 3 photos or slideshow (max 10 slides). Images to include: one of whole exhibit and two close-ups of your choice that highlight a featured skill or content area.

Visual Arts Clay: (SF 50337)

Any original item made of clay; may be fired or unfired, hand formed or thrown on a wheel. Self-hardening clays are fine. Fire/oven-cured and cornstarch clay could be accepted. Items can include, but are not limited to, clay statues, bowls, jewelry, etc. Pre-formed ceramics are not eligible for State Fair exhibit.

Upload should include:

- Completed 4-H Project Report
- 3 photos or slideshow (max 10 slides). Images to include: one of whole exhibit and two close-ups of your choice that highlight a featured skill or content area.

Visual Arts Computer-Generated Art: (SF 50338)

Any original art created in any software package. Exhibit may not include scanned work, clip art, downloaded images from the internet, any imported image, or photographs. All pixels must be original. Photo mosaics are NOT allowed. Exhibitors in this class (like all other classes in this sub-section) must be enrolled in Visual Arts; Computer project enrollment is not required. <u>NOTE:</u> Wood and metal exhibits created through the use of laser cutting programs/devices should be entered in this class. Plastic exhibits with an artistic focus created using a 3-D printer should be entered in this class. If the art created is designed to hang, then the entry should have some protective covering, such as a glass frame, and prepared for hanging. If the art is something that has been created with a laser cutting program/device and is NOT designed to hand, it does not require protective covering nor does it need to be prepared to hang.

Upload should include:

- Completed 4-H Project Report
- 3 photos or slideshow (max 10 slides). Images to include: one of whole exhibit and two close-ups of your choice that highlight a featured skill or content area.

Visual Arts Fiber: (SF 50339)

Any original item made of fiber. Examples are quilts, fabric collage, soft sculpture, stitchery, weaving, embroidery, cross-stitch, wearable art, hooking, braiding, duct tape artistry, and baskets. **Original** cross-stitched, knitted, crocheted or quilted items belong in this Fiber class. **Non-original** cross-stitched, knitted, crocheted or quilted items should be entered in Heritage Arts. Machine knitted items are not appropriate for this class.

Visual Arts Fiber Non-Original AGES 8-10 ONLY: (SF 50350)

Any non-original item made of fiber. Examples are fabric collage, soft sculpture, stitchery, weaving, embroidery, cross-stitch, crocheting, knitting, weaving, hooking, and felting. Exhibitors may use a pattern and/or an idea generated from another source.

Upload should include (for Fiber classes – 50339 & 50350):

- Completed 4-H Project Report
- 3 photos or slideshow (max 10 slides). Images to include: one of whole exhibit and two close-ups of your choice that highlight a featured skill or content area.

Visual Arts Glass/Plastic: (SF 50340)

Any original item made of glass or plastic. Possible items to exhibit include stained glass, etched glass (original design), mosaics made of glass, glass beading, plastic jewelry (friendly plastic). Interlocking building block creations (i.e. LEGOS) are not suitable for State Fair entry. Stepping-stones or wall hangings that include cement decorated with glass or plastic items are not suitable for this class.

Upload should include:

- 3 photos or slideshow (max 10 slides). Images to include: one of whole exhibit and two close-ups of your choice that highlight a featured skill or content area.

Visual Arts Heritage Arts: (SF 50341)

Exhibit an item of *traditional* art learned from another person or *from a pattern* (NO KITS) may be entered in this class. Non-original cross-stitched, knitted and crocheted items by pattern fit in this class. ALL ORIGINAL cross-stitched, knitted and crocheted items should be exhibited in Fiber Arts; (machine knitted items ARE NOT acceptable for this class.) Other possibilities include: needlepoint, counted cross-stitch, crewel, embroidery, cut work, hardanger (embroidery openwork), macramé, baskets, candles, pysanki (decorated eggs), leather, quilts, baskets (made using a traditional pattern), traditional handmade dolls with handmade costumes, or candles. No machine quilting allowed in Heritage Arts. Exhibitors must also bring 1) the pattern or a copy of the pattern they used to create their traditional art; and 2) a description of the traditional origins of their art choice.

Upload should include:

- 3 photos or slideshow (max 10 slides). Images to include: one of whole exhibit and two close-ups of your choice that highlight a featured skill or content area.

Visual Arts Leather: (SF 50321)

Exhibit one of the following options using leather.

- Leather Stamping: Exhibit should utilize one or more stamping techniques exhibit examples include items such as belt; coasters; bookmark; key chain; wrist bracelet.
- Leather Carving or Tooling: Exhibit should use simple swivel knife tooling techniques or may incorporate several swivel knife-tooling designs or patterns exhibit examples include items such as belt; pictorial carving; key case.
- Leather Lacing: Exhibit to include stamping and/or carving techniques incorporated with lacing techniques exhibit examples include items such as wallets; purses; etc.
- Leather Stitching: Exhibit may include stamping; carving and/or lacing techniques and should be a leather item or article of apparel, which incorporates hand-sewing techniques.

Upload should include:

- 3 photos or slideshow (max 10 slides). Images to include: one of whole exhibit and two close-ups of your choice that highlight a featured skill or content area.

Visual Arts Metal: (SF 50342)

Any original item made of metal such as sculpture, tin punch, engraved metal, and jewelry. Items intended for industrial use (as tools and/or shop items) are not considered part of this Visual Arts project and are not eligible for entry. Metal items that have been partially or totally created through the use of laser cutting programs/devices should be entered in Computer-Generated Art.
Upload should include:

- Completed 4-H Project Report
- 3 photos or slideshow (max 10 slides). Images to include: one of whole exhibit and two close-ups of your choice that highlight a featured skill or content area.

Visual Arts Nature: (SF 50343)

Any original item made of natural material such as wreaths, cornhusk dolls, etc. Items should be made of natural materials (which may be purchased) but securing elements such as glue and wire may be used in the inner construction as long as they do not detract from the overall "natural" appearance. Articles such as dried pressed flowers may be displayed under glass since it is necessary for protection/preservation of the natural materials. Candles are not suitable as entries. All baskets should be entered in Heritage Arts.

Upload should include:

- 3 photos or slideshow (max 10 slides). Images to include: one of whole exhibit and two close-ups of your choice that highlight a featured skill or content area.

Visual Arts Paper: (SF 50344)

Any original item made of paper. Examples could include origami; greeting cards; paper-cut designs, paper mache, hand-made paper, paper collage, paper models of architecture, quilling, etc. Paper twist articles, made from directions in craft books and stores ARE NOT original and are not appropriate for this class. Scrapbooks should be exhibited in Visual Arts Scrapbooking.

Upload should include:

Visual Arts Scrapbooking, Beginning: (SF 50345)

Exhibit one album or notebook, either 8 ½" x 11" or 12"x12", with a front and back cover. The album/notebook must have a minimum of 4 pages (front and back, 8 sides), exhibited in page protectors. "Embellishments" are defined as the decorations or special details and features that add to a page and make it more visually appealing. Embellishments may include, but are not limited to, ribbon, clips, special lettering, etc. Beginners must use a minimum of four embellishments and tell a story with pictures.

Visual Arts Scrapbooking, Intermediate: (SF 50346)

Exhibit one album or notebook, either 8 ½" x 11" or 12"x12", with a front and back cover. The album/notebook must have a minimum of 4 pages (front and back, 8 sides), exhibited in page protectors. "Embellishments" are defined as the decorations or special details and features that add to a page and make it more visually appealing. Embellishments may include, but are not limited to, ribbon, clips, special lettering, etc. Intermediate level exhibitors must use a minimum of eight embellishments and tell a story with pictures and journaling.

Visual Arts Scrapbooking, Advanced: (SF 50347)

Exhibit one album or notebook, either 8 ½" x 11" or 12"x12", with a front and back cover. The album/notebook must have a minimum of 4 pages (front and back, 8 sides), exhibited in page protectors. "Embellishments" are defined as the decorations or special details and features that add to a page and make it more visually appealing. Embellishments may include, but are not limited to, ribbon, clips, special lettering, etc. Advance level exhibitors must use a minimum of 12 embellishments and tell a compelling story with pictures, journaling, and other media.

Upload should include (for Scrapbooking – Beginning, Intermediate, Advanced):

- Completed 4-H Project Report
- 5 photos: image of album/notebook cover, four images each sowing two pages opened flat.
- OPTIONAL: 3 photos of additional pages

Visual Arts Three-Dimensional Design/Mixed Media: (SF 50348)

Art pieces in this class must be comprised of **at least three different media**. No one medium can make up more than 40% of a piece. The piece should **be either freestanding or should be prepared to be hung**. It must be observable on at least three different sides. Originality and design are important concepts. Craft and preformed or assembled projects are not acceptable.

Upload should include:

- 3 photos or slideshow (max 10 slides). Images to include: one of whole exhibit and two close-ups of your choice that highlight a featured skill or content area.

Visual Arts Wood: (SF 50349)

Any original item made of wood (wood carving, sculpture, collage, wood burning, etc.). Utilitarian wood items made from patterns or kits (e.g. outdoor or indoor furniture, shelves) should be entered in woodworking, not in visual arts. Popsicle stick crafts are not acceptable for State Fair entry. Wood items that have been partially or totally created through the use of laser cutting programs/devices should be entered in Computer-Generated Art. All Visual Arts Wood exhibits MUST have an artistic element that the exhibitor can explain. Furniture built by the exhibitor aligns with the Woodworking project area – unless the element to be judged is wood carving or wood burning that is one element of the exhibit. Exhibits will be judged using a Visual Arts Rubric and not a woodworking construction rubric.

READY 4 LIFE CHALLENGE EXHIBITS (various classes)

Open to 11- to 18-year old members in qualifying project areas.

Exhibits in this category must include the following: a) a physical representation of the career or business product such as a model, prototype or display/portfolio that includes images of accomplished work; b) verbal or written explanations that demonstrate knowledge of the related career or business fields, potential careers, and the appropriate requirements for achievement in those fields. The judging criteria for this class values thoroughness of career and/or business exploration and pursuit above the workmanship of the physical specimen on display.

Exhibitors are limited to one exhibit per project area in this class (e.g. one entry in Leadership Ready4Life, one entry in Natural Resources Ready4Life, and one entry in Interior Designs Ready4Life. Counties may submit 1 entry per project area for the state fair.

MAKER CLASS EXHIBITS (SF 50400)

Open to all exhibitors in all state fair eligible project areas. Exhibitors are limited to one exhibit per project area in this class. (e.g. One entry in Computer Maker, one entry in Floriculture Maker, and one entry in Photography Maker.)

Counties may submit 3 entries TOTAL from all Maker exhibit divisions.

Exhibits in this category are designed to be multi-disciplinary in nature, innovative, and must not fit into any other exhibit category. To qualify for this category, your project MUST abide by the following guidelines:

- Exhibits must be an object or device that has an intended purpose and uses technology in either a mechanical way, digital (computer) way, or combination of the two.
- The device must be something that can be used in everyday life by multiple people (a target audience), and MUST be manufactured/built by the exhibitor (if not fully manufactured by the exhibitor, the device MUST be modified structurally or be reprogramed to perform a different function other than what it was designed to do
- Exhibit MUST be able to interact with he outside world. (e.g. an on/off switch, input sensors, feedback, etc.)
- Exhibits MUST include a detailed build log with instructions on how to make or build the exhibit, AND contain either a 3-D rendering or detailed and labeled sketches of the device/product.
- All parts and software used in the design/build MUST be listed in a detailed Bill of Materials including cost per item and total cost. Total time spent on the build must be document in your build log.

In addition, exhibitors are HIGHLY encourage to use tools such as 3-D printers, laser cutters, routers, and/or other hand/power tools to help in the manufacturing process (NOTE: Simply 3-D printing or laser cutting an object without he other specifications does not qualify as a Maker Project). It is also HIGHLY encouraged that exhibits use Open Source Software and/or Hardware in the build.

CHRISTIAN COUNTY 4-H Livestock SHOW- Rules Governing 4-H Exhibits

- 1. Each **exhibitor** must be enrolled as a Christian County 4-H Club member before April 15, 2020 and enrolled in each project area they wish to exhibit before April 15 in order to exhibit at the 4-H show.
- Each exhibitor must have submitted his/her show entries through the online FairEntry system or on an official 4-H Show Registration Form to the Christian County Extension Office, 1120 N. Webster St., Taylorville, no later than Wednesday, June 24th. Anyone not submitting an entry form by this time <u>will not be allowed to exhibit</u>.
- 3. *NEW IN 2020*. All members exhibiting an animal at one of the following livestock shows are REQUIRED to complete Youth for the Qualtity Care of Animals(YQCA) training: Beef, Dairy, Sheep, Goats, Swine. Training is available online or in-person, at pre-determined workshops set by Extension Office staff. Training must be completed no later than May 1st to be eligible to show at the county and state fairs. Members must retrain and recertify each year. https://yqca.learngrow.io/Account/Login

Members enrolled in the following animal projects OR members enrolled in the above animal projects that are NOT brining a live animal are expected to keep their Quality Assurance and Ethics Certification (QAEC) training active: rabbit, poultry, dog, cat, horse, small pets. This certification is completed once in the member's 4-H career for each animal specie/project the member is enrolled in. http://web.extension.illinois.edu/qaec/

- 4. All exhibitors, leaders, and parents are expected to show respect and courtesy to judges and superintendents. Violations may result in disqualifying the exhibitor.
- 5. Animals must be in place by 6:00 pm on Tuesday before weigh in.
- 6. Animal's health papers are required to be checked by a vet on the fairgrounds before the show.
- 7. PARENTS WILL NOT BE ALLOWED IN THE JUDGING AREA. Exception: Youth identified by superintendent as "children with special needs" may have another person with them during judging. Please notify the 4-H Extension Staff by June 24th if you feel your child may fall into "children with special needs" so a pre-determined decision can be made.
- 8. If any question arises that is not covered by the General Rules, the 4-H Superintendent of that project area, shall make the necessary decision.
- 9. PROTEST Any protest must be made to the Superintendent at time of show. The Superintendent in that particular project area will consult the 4-H staff (4-H Program Coordinator, 4-H Youth Development Educator and/or County Director) and a decision will be made at the show. If satisfactory treatment is not received, written charges should be made and forwarded to University of Illinois Christian County 4-H Committee within 24 hours of the said infraction.

10.-No stall rent or entry fee will be charged for 4-H Shows.

11. All 4-H members must be enrolled in the project area they are exhibiting in. If not, they will not be allowed to exhibit that project. All projects must be owned and cared for by the 4-H member, except for Horses (in which

case the animal may be leased.)

- 12. The superintendents may make a check of Registration papers; all animals without registration papers will be shown in the crossbred division.
- 13. Satisfactory proof of the breeding of each animal must be provided if requested.
- 14. Christian County 4-H members are allowed to have two animals in the show ring. Any 4-H member or anyone of 4-H age may assist or show for a 4-H member regardless of where they live. *Christian County 4-H members may only receive ONE premium and ribbon per class.*
- 15. Every 4-H member, in good standing, who enters the show ring, will receive either a placing or participation ribbon and premiums if premium money is available.
- 16. It is strictly up to the 4-H leader to determine who is in good standing in a club, and it is the leader's responsibility to inform the Extension office of any problems.
- 17. The 4-H Livestock Committee reserves the right to tattoo or identify in some manner any or all4-H animal projects if so desired under the authority of the Unit 18 University of Illinois Extension Council.
- 18. Cloverbud club members are not allowed to show livestock. Cloverbud members are those under the age of 8 as of 9/1/2019.
- 19. The Christian County 4-H program strives to keep county exhibit opportunities aligned with Illinois State Fair exhibit requirements. This fair book in essence is the Illinois State Fair Book with Christian County rules applied where necessary.

Farm Bureau Master Showmanship Contest

The Farm Bureau Master Showmanship Contest will be held on Wednesday 30 minutes after the Beef Show. The following contest rules will be in effect:

- 1. Each participant will arrange to borrow animals from another person if they don't have that specie. All eligible ages are invited to participate, but only those older than 14 may represent the county at the Illinois State Fair competition.
- 2. Three species will be shown: beef, sheep, and swine.
- 3. Participants will be Christian County 4-H or FFA members.
- 4. WINNER MUST BE ABLE TO ATTEND STATE CONTEST DURING ILLINOIS STATE FAIR.

2020 Virtual Contest for Christian County

The 2020 Christian County Master Showmanship Contest and selection will be held virtually. Any senior livestock exhibitor (14-18 years old as of September 1, 2019) who wishes to compete in the contest should complete the following application **no later than July 23rd, 2020**. Complete applications will be reviewed locally to select the one exhibitor that will represent Christian County at the state contest.

Members must be enrolled in at least one virtual livestock show class to be eligible (swine, sheep, or cattle.)

YOUTH FOR THE QUALITY CARE OF ANIMALS (YQCA)

Beginning in 2020, all 4-H youth enrolled in the following livestock project areas will be required to complete the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) certification annually to be eligible to show their live animals at both the county and state fairs:

Beef Cattle - Dairy Cattle - Goats - Sheep - Swine

If this certification is not completed by your county's deadline, 4-H members will not be eligible to show their livestock projects. This certification does not apply to members who plan to show an animal poster at their local 4-H show instead of a live animal. Once you complete the program – offered online or in-person – youth will receive a certificate of completion that is valid for one year. Certification must be kept valid in order to show livestock locally or at the state level.

QUALTIY ASSURANCE AND ETHICS CERTIFICATION (QAEC)

Beginning in 2013, all 4-H youth enrolled in specific animal project areas will be required to complete the online Quality Assurance and Ethics Certification (QAEC) one time in order to stay enrolled in an animal project area. QAEC has been developed to review what is expected of youth when preparing for and exhibiting animals in competition.

Who is required to complete this certification?

All Illinois 4-H Youth enrolled in the following 4-H project areas are required to complete QAEC*:

Horse – Poultry – Rabbit – Cat – Dog – Small Pet

All county 4-H exhibitors and Illinois State Fair Junior Show exhibitors are required to complete the certification. QAEC certification is completed once within the 4-H member's career in each project area they are enrolled in (i.e. once for cats, once for dogs, once rabbits, etc.)

Please note: Certification requirements could change annually. Please check with the Extension Office if you have questions.

Due to the transition to a virtual fair and cancellation of in-person training, YQCA will NOT be required to show livestock at the Christian County 4-H Show. Requirements for state fair could still exist.

Members should still complete the QAEC certification, if applicable, prior to judging. Note that both certifications will be required each year, moving forward.

Upload Requirements for all BEEF or DAIRY CATTLE Classes:

- Completed 4-H Project Report (submit for each class, could be duplicate report)
- 45-60 second video OR 4 photos that showcase the front, back, and both sides of animal

RULES:

- 1. Each exhibitor must comply with general requirements for the 4-H Show and the rules governing livestock exhibits.
- 2. All animals must be the property of the members exhibiting them. The name, registration number and tattoo must be turned into the Extension office by June 1. All purebred breeding entries must present registration papers to the Beef Superintendent at the same time health papers are checked. All 4-H heifers and steers will have a pedigree check and/or tattoo check Tuesday, 6:30 p.m. at weigh-in. Any unregistered female animals will be shown as crossbreds.
- 3. Steer classes are limited to animals calved on or after January 1 of the preceding year. No steer can be shown, regardless of birth date that does not have all milk teeth in place and no permanent teeth showing. All steers will be mouthed when weighed in at the show ring. Any exhibitor who fails to bring steers in for mouthing will be disqualified from showing.
- 4. Dates for required ownership are:
 - a. Beef steers must have been owned by weigh-in.
 - b. Beef purebred heifers and heifer calves must have been owned by June 1.
- 5. All market beef taken as 4-H projects will have to be tattooed on the county tattooing date (or snow date) to be eligible to show at the Christian County 4-H Show.
- 6. No false tail heads or artificial coloring will be permitted. It is the recommendation of the Livestock Committee that all beef exhibits should be fitted by the exhibitor or their immediate family.
- 7. Three animals of any one breed constitute a class, as determined by superintendent.
- 8. Crossbred heifers will be divided by age.
- Member may exhibit a poster or display instead of showing an animal (but not both).
 Display or poster is to be exhibited in the Animal Science class during the General Projects show.
- 10. As of 2020, market heifers are no longer being shown. This is to align with the state fair, which removed their market heifer classes in 2018.

BUCKET CALF – Dairy and Beef Calves

- 1. All Bucket Calf project animals must be on the grounds by 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday.
- 2. Calf must have been born between January 1 and May 1 (current year).
- 3. Calves will be shown at halter.

- 5. Grooming with adhesives, etc., and clipping are prohibited. Calf just needs to be washed and clean.

CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION AND/OR TEST RECORDS MUST BE AVAILABLE FOR INSPECTION AT ANY TIME WHILE ANIMALS ARE ON THE FAIRGROUNDS.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

These Exhibition Health Requirements apply to all livestock present at the fair including those animals that are not entered in competitive events.

Health Certificate / Certificate of Veterinary Inspection

The term "Health Certificate" or "Certificate of Veterinary Inspection" (CVI) means a legible record, made on an official form of the state of origin, issued by an accredited veterinarian, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet the health requirements of the state of destination.

A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI):

1. Must accompany animals, except as noted, and be available on request by Animal Health Officials;

All out-of-state animals shall require an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available by calling the Illinois Department of Agriculture, Monday through Friday from 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM, at 217/782-4944. Permits may also be obtained online at: <u>http://www.agr.state.il.us/AnimalHW/animalregistry/login.php</u>

- 2. Must show results of required tests and/or vaccinations;
- 3. Must show name and address of owner or exhibitor;
- 4. Must be dated and signed by an accredited veterinarian;
- 5. Must show only one(1) identification per line on the CVI; and

- 6. Must show the official identification of each animal.
- 7. For out-of-state livestock, a CVI shall be void thirty (30) days after issuance.
- 8. For Illinois origin livestock, a CVI shall be void ninety (90) days after issuance.
- 9. If animals are from tuberculosis accredited, brucellosis certified, pseudorabies qualified, or brucellosis validated herds, the identifying herd number(s) along with the date of the last herd test(s) shall appear on the CVI.

Note: No Corrections or Additions will be allowed on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

Any Illinois cattle, bison, cervidae or goats being exhibited in non-accredited free states must be isolated from the remainder of the herd/flock upon return to Illinois and retested for tuberculosis 60-120 days post entry.

Animals with active lesions of ringworm with resulting loss of hair, soremouth, caseous lymphadenitis or multiple warts easily visible without close examination, will not be permitted to exhibit. Animals infested with scabies or mange will not be permitted to exhibit.

As a condition of entry in Illinois State Fair events, all exhibitors agree to cooperate fully with testing protocols including ultrasound. Department personnel may collect blood, tissue, milk or urine samples from any animal being exhibited and/or raced at any Illinois Fair to test for the presence of any substances, practices or other adulterants which may give the animal a competitive advantage. The Illinois Department of Agriculture may also collect blood, tissue or other test samples from exhibition animals at the time of slaughter.

Market animals (steers, barrows, wethers) at the Illinois State Fair must meet the requirements regarding drug withdrawal and eligibility for slaughter. If any therapeutic drugs are used just prior to the fair, they must have a withdrawal time such that they are slaughter eligible by the time they arrive at the fairgrounds.

Upon entry to the Illinois State Fairgrounds, no person shall administer internally or externally any medication or drug, including prescription and non-prescription, unless prior written authorization is received from the State Veterinarian's Office. Any medication or drug administered without written authorization or in an unauthorized dosage constitutes a violation of show rules, and all premiums and awards from all shows for the owner, exhibitor and/or trainer will be withheld.

All exhibitors of animals at any Illinois Fair shall comply with the provisions of the Illinois Humane Care for Animals Act. If violations are observed, the animal(s) will be excused from exhibition and be ordered removed from the grounds with all awards and premiums being forfeited.

Any practice or deviation from normal, accepted care, including physical or mechanical application, will constitute a violation of show rules and is subject to the above provisions.

CATTLE

Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be either a fully healed and legible tattoo, approved official ear tag, registration number, or individual brand, if brand is recorded on the registration certificate.

Illinois Cattle

Brucellosis

1. Illinois is a Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Illinois cattle.

Tuberculosis

Illinois is an Accredited Tuberculosis- Free State. Tuberculin test is not required for Illinois cattle.

Please note: Illinois calves under 6 months of age, and Illinois steers are not required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

Out-of-State-Cattle

All out-of-state cattle are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available by calling the Illinois Department of Agriculture, Monday through Friday from 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM, at 217/782-4944. Permits may also be obtained online at: <u>http://www.agr.state.il.us/AnimalHW/animalregistry/login.php</u>

Brucellosis

- 1. Female cattle six (6) months of age and older and bulls eighteen (18) months of age and older shall be negative to an official test for brucellosis within thirty (30) days prior to entry, unless exempt by one (1) of the following:
 - A. Originate directly from a certified brucellosis-free herd.
 - B. Official vaccinates of dairy breeds under twenty (20) months of age or official vaccinates of beef breeds under twenty-four (24) months of age.
 - C. Animal originated from a "Class Free" state (if entire state is so classified)
 - D. Steers and spayed heifers are not required to be tested for brucellosis.

2. The negative brucellosis test shall be conducted at a state or federal laboratory within 30 days prior to exhibition.

Tuberculosis

- 1. Accredited Tuberculosis Free States
 - A. No tuberculin test required. All cattle, including steers, originating from an Accredited Tuberculosis Free State, may enter Illinois for exhibition when accompanied by a CVI issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days.
- 2. Non-Accredited Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
 - A. Cattle must originate from a herd where a complete herd test was conducted within the past year.
 - B. The individual animals entering Illinois must be negative to an additional tuberculin test conducted within 30 days prior to exhibition.
 - C. Cattle that enter Illinois for exhibition and remain in Illinois (animal does not return to the state of origin within 30 days) must be isolated and retested for TB 60-120 days from the last official TB test date.

SWINE

Illinois Swine

Identification

- 1. Swine shall be identified by an official ear tag, tattoo or recognized breed ear notch.
- 2. Ear notch identification is acceptable for all barrows, crossbred gilts and breeding swine.

(Note: Ear notch identification of crossbred swine does not satisfy USDA identification requirements for interstate movement or official testing.)

Brucellosis

Brucellosis testing is not required for Illinois swine.

Pseudorabies

Pseudorabies testing is not required for Illinois swine.

Out-of-State Swine

All out-of-state swine are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available by calling the Illinois Department of Agriculture, Monday through Friday from 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM, at 217/782-4944. Permits may also be obtained online at: http://www.agr.state.il.us/AnimalHW/animalregistry/login.php

Identification

- 1. Individually identified by an official ear tag, tattoo or recognized breed ear notch.
- 2. Ear notch identification **is not** acceptable for crossbred animals.

Brucellosis

- 1. Breeding swine 4 months of age and older shall be negative to an official test for brucellosis within 30 days prior to exhibition unless exempt by one (1) of the following:
 - A. Originate immediately and directly from a validated brucellosis-free herd.
 - B. Originate directly from a validated brucellosis-free state.
- 2. Swine brucellosis tests for exhibition shall be conducted at a state or federal laboratory.

Pseudorabies

- **1.** Swine originating from a Pseudorabies Stage IV or V state are exempt from the pseudorabies testing requirement.
- 2. Swine originating from a Pseudorabies Stage III state shall be negative to an official test for pseudorabies conducted within thirty (30) days prior to entry or originate immediately and directly from a qualified pseudorabies negative herd.
- **3.** Swine originating from a Pseudorabies Stage I or II state shall be negative to an official test for pseudorabies conducted within the 10 days prior to entry.
- **4.** Barrows and females in market classes must meet the same requirements as breeding swine.

SHEEP

Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be by an ear tattoo or official metal or plastic tag. A microchip ID is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.

Ear tattoos may be used when a registration certificate, listing the tattoo number, accompanies the animal.

When using ear tags, the tag must indicate the premises ID and state of origin. The tag number must be assigned by a state or APHIS representative and recorded in the Scrapie Record Database.

Market Lambs

All market lambs must be slick shorn (show ring ready) before weigh-in so that show lamb fungus can be identified.

Illinois Sheep

- 1. Sheep originating from a herd or flock that has previously been classified as either an infected or source herd or flock can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved herd/flock plan.
- 2. For any animal born after 1/1/2002, the CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

Out-of-State Sheep

All out-of-state sheep are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available by calling the Illinois Department of Agriculture, Monday through Friday from 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM, at 217/782-4944. Permits may also be obtained online at: http://www.agr.state.il.us/AnimalHW/animalregistry/login.php

- 1. Sheep originating from a herd or flock that has previously been classified as either an infected or source herd or flock can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved herd/flock plan.
- 2. For any animal born after 1/1/2002, the CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

GOATS

Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be by an ear tattoo or official metal or plastic tag. A microchip ID is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.

Tattoos may be used when a registration certificate, listing the tattoo number, accompanies the animal.

When using ear tags, the tag must indicate the premises ID and state of origin. The tag number must be assigned by a state or APHIS representative and recorded in the Scrapie Record Database. Ears should be used for tattooing when possible. If there is no space in the ear, the flank or tail fold may be used.

Illinois Goats

- 1. Goats originating from a herd or flock that has previously been classified as either an infected or source herd or flock can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved herd/flock plan.
- 2. For any animal born after 1/1/2002, the CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

Out-of-State Goats

All out-of-state goats are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available by calling the Illinois Department of Agriculture, Monday through Friday from 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM, at 217/782-4944. Permits may also be obtained online at: <u>http://www.agr.state.il.us/AnimalHW/animalregistry/login.php</u>

- 1. Goats originating from a herd or flock that has previously been classified as either an infected or source herd or flock can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved herd/flock plan.
- 2. Tuberculosis- Goats from areas or states that are not Accredited Bovine Tuberculosis Free, must be accompanied by a CVI indicating that the goats originated from a herd where a complete negative herd test has been conducted within the past twelve (12) months and the individual animals are negative to a tuberculin test conducted within thirty (30) days prior to entry. For any animal born after 1/1/2002, the CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

HORSES, PONIES, MULES AND OTHER EQUIDAE

Illinois Equine

- 1. All horses and other equidae, twelve (12) months of age and older attending an advertised equine event, shall be accompanied by a negative test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) conducted within the last twelve (12) months. A copy of this test shall accompany the animal.
- 2. AGID (Coggins) or ELISA tests are accepted.

- 3. An advertised equine event means a show, rodeo, sale, auction, exhibition, trail ride, or horse fair that is posted or media promoted.
- 4. A CVI is not required for Illinois equine.

Out-of-State Equine

All out-of-state horses and other equidae, are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available by calling the Illinois Department of Agriculture, Monday through Friday from 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM, at 217/782-4944. Permits may also be obtained online at: <u>http://www.agr.state.il.us/AnimalHW/animalregistry/login.php</u>

- 1. All horses and other equidae entering Illinois that are twelve (12) months of age or older, shall be accompanied by a negative test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) conducted within the last twelve (12) months. A copy of this test shall accompany the animal.
- 2. AGID (Coggins) or ELISA tests are accepted.
- 3. All horses and other equidae shall be accompanied by a CVI issued within thirty (30) days prior to entry.

POULTRY

- 1. All entries (except waterfowl, i.e. domesticated fowl that normally swim, such as ducks and geese) in a show or exhibition shall have originated from a U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or equivalent hatchery or flock OR have a negative pullorum-typhoid test within 90 days prior to exhibition. Exhibitor shall show proper information as to name and address of owner or exhibitor, name and address of the authorized testing agent, date of the testing and the number, breed, and species of those tested.
- 2. Prior to being used to transport poultry to a show, all crates, boxes, containers and vehicles shall be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected.
- 3. Any poultry vaccinations must be performed at least 4 weeks prior to delivery to the show.
- 4. Upon admission to a show, all entries shall be examined by an official fair veterinarian or qualified state personnel who shall also receive and examine all certificates necessary for admission of birds to a show. Birds not in show condition will be excused from exhibition and removed from the premises. Any fowl showing signs of illness during the fair will be removed from the exhibition grounds.
- 5. All out-of-state turkeys must originate from flocks that are officially classified as U.S. Mycoplasma Gallisepticum Clean in accordance with the provisions of the National Poultry Improvement Plan or be negative to a test for Mycoplasma gallisepticum within 30 days prior to entry.
- 6. A permit is also required for out-of-state poultry. A permit may be obtained by calling (217)782-4944.

Please note: These poultry exhibition requirements do not apply to 4-H and FFA 1-day poultry shows where the entries are taken to the show and returned home the same day.

Exotic Newcastle Disease

Illinois prohibits the importation of all members of the avian species or avian products that have originated from or been transported through any area where Exotic Newcastle Disease has been diagnosed and is under quarantine by any state, federal or tribal agency.

CERVIDAE

(Deer, Elk, Reindeer, Caribou, Moose, Red Deer and other related species)

Identification

All animals shall be individually identified with an approved tag, microchip or tattoo. Elk are required to have two official/approved unique identifiers.

Illinois Cervidae

Chronic Wasting Disease

For cervidae changing ownership or moving within the State, the owner must obtain a permit issued by the Department prior to movement and the cervid must originate from a herd that is enrolled in the Certified Monitored Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) Program or the Contained Monitored Chronic Wasting Disease Program. Permits are available from Monday through Friday, 8-4:30 p.m. (CST), by calling (217) 782-4944. The permit shall be obtained no more than 72 hours in advance of the movement of the cervids by providing the following information:

- A) Name and complete mailing address of person exhibiting the cervids;
- B) Certified Monitored Chronic Wasting Disease or Contained Monitored Chronic Wasting Disease Herd number;
- C) Name and complete mailing address of location where the animals will be exhibited;
- D) Number of animals and unique identification of the animals.

Tuberculosis

Illinois is an Accredited Tuberculosis- Free State. Tuberculin test is not required for Illinois cervidae.

Out-of-State Cervidae

Chronic Wasting Disease

- 1. All cervidae entering Illinois must be in compliance with the Illinois Wildlife Code [520 ILCS 5]. For more information, contact the Illinois Department of Natural Resources at 217/782-6384.
- 2. All cervidae entering Illinois must be accompanied by a permit from the Department and a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection that:
 - a. has been issued by an accredited veterinarian of the state of origin or a veterinarian in the employ of the United States Department of Agriculture;
 - b. is approved by the Animal Health Official of the state of origin;
 - c. shows that the cervidae are free from visible evidence of any contagious, infectious or communicable disease or exposure thereto, do not originate from a CWD endemic area (any county and surrounding counties where CWD has been diagnosed in the past five years);
 - d. shows that the cervidae are not originating from a herd under quarantine for any contagious, infectious or communicable disease;
 - e. shows that the animals originate from a herd that has been monitored for at least 5 years under a state-approved CWD certification program.
- 3. A permit number can be obtained Monday through Friday, from 8-4:30 p.m. (CST), by calling (217) 782-4944. Applicant for permit shall furnish the following information to the Department:
 - a. Name and post office mailing address of Illinois destination;
 - b. Name and post office mailing address of the consignor and/or source herds;
 - c. Name and post office mailing address of the herd veterinarian;
 - d. Number and unique identification of cervidae in shipment.

Brucellosis

Cervidae six (6) months of age and older must have a negative brucellosis card or PCFIA test within sixty (60) days prior to entry.

Tuberculosis

1. Accredited Tuberculosis Free States

All cervidae twelve (12) months of age and over shall be negative to two (2) single cervical test for bovine TB no less than ninety (90) days apart with the second test conducted within ninety (90) days prior to entry. These animals shall be isolated from all other members of the herd during the testing period unless they originate from an accredited, qualified or monitored herd.

A. Cervidae from an accredited herd may be moved into Illinois without further TB testing provided that a certificate stating that such cervids originated from an accredited herd accompanies them.

- B. Cervidae originating from qualified or monitored herds may enter with a negative test within ninety (90) days prior to entry and a certificate stating that the animals originate from a monitored herd.
- 2. Non-Accredited Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
 - A. All cervidae shall originate from a herd where a complete herd test was conducted within the past year.
 - B. The individual animals entering Illinois must be negative to two (2) additional tuberculin tests conducted within 180 and 30 days prior to entry or exhibition.

RATITES* (Ostriches, Emus, Rheas, Cassowaries and Kiwis)

Illinois Ratites

There are no requirements governing the movement of ratites within Illinois.

Out-of-State Ratites

- 1. Must be accompanied by a CVI and permit number. Entry permit numbers are available by calling the Illinois Department of Agriculture, Monday through Friday from 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM, at 217/782-4944.
- 2. Individually identified by leg band or microchip.
- 3. Negative test for Avian Influenza within 10 days prior to entry.

PIGEONS*

There are no requirements governing the movements of pigeons within or into Illinois.

RABBITS

There are no requirements governing the movements of rabbits within or into Illinois.

LLAMAS

There are no requirements governing the movement of llamas within Illinois. A permit and health certificate is required for out-of-state llamas. Entry permit numbers are available by calling the Illinois Department of Agriculture, Monday through Friday from 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM, at 217/782-4944. Permits may also be obtained online at:
