Mark your calendars! If you have a market sheep animal, you need to weigh it in to show. The Sheep Weigh-In will be on April 27 from 9-10 AM at the storage shed in Greenup. This will be on the concrete pad in the alley behind the big blue shed behind the Greenup Municipal Building. It is catty-corner from Events by MLB and the same block at Gray's Feed & Seed. If you have questions, contact the office.

Lambs for the 2019 Illinois State Fair Junior and Open Premiere (carcass) Shows must be, nominated, weighed, and tattooed, between (including) March 15 and May 15, 2019 at the local county level. The animals will be weighed and tattooed with the box "A" tattoo, and fill out the nomination form. The form must be signed by a local Extension employee. For the Illinois State Fair Junior and Open Premiere classes, an exhibitor may nominate a total of ten (10) wethers. Lambs must have been castrated prior to tattooing for the wether classes at the Illinois State Fair.

Non-Premiere lambs and goats for state fair (those showing in the live show only) <u>NO MORE REGIONAL CHECK-IN SITES</u> – New nomination format

All non-premiere lambs and goats for state fair junior show will be Self-Nominated in 2019 as follows:

Exhibitors fill out and send in nomination form with photo of lamb's ear with scrapie tag installed in ear (close up photo of ear so scrapie tag can be read). Nominations must be signed by local Extension Office. This must be completed between March 15 and May 15, 2019.



Fair Entry will be open from May 1 to June 1. Leaders—if you want to set up an evening for me to come assist you with sign-ups of your members please contact me to arrange that.

Handbooks have been distributed to new families to 4-H for the 2018-19 year. These have all the rules and guidelines for exhibition in them. Including the classes you can exhibit in for all of the projects.

Ethics Certification for New Members

If you are a new member and intend to show any animal (excluding small animals) you need to complete the online QAEC training. This is an online ethics training that teaches members about humanely and ethically treating animals they will exhibit. This is MANDATORY for anyone showing beef, cats, dairy, dogs, goats, horse, llamas, alpacas, poultry, rabbits, sheep, and swine. If you are showing a poster on the any of the species above, you must also complete this training. Below is the website the training can be accessed at. When completing it, make sure to select CUMBERLAND county and complete the training for at least one specie. You will not be allowed to show if you do not complete the training. This is a state rule. This training is due by June 1. I will be checking to see who and has not completed the training the last week in May.

Andy Potter of Genesis Aviaries is giving away two red golden pheasants and a pair of Creole Old English Bantams. These are open for any 4-H Member (ages 8-18). Members don't have to be currently enrolled in 4-H poultry project but interested in poultry. Members in poultry project are currently eligible as well. If selected, members MUST show these birds at the 2019 Poultry Show. To be eligible, members must write a minimum 100 word essay on why they want to show these birds and how they intend to take care of them. Submit this essay with name and club by April 19 to the Extension Office. These are beautiful birds, so don't miss out on this opportunity!



Summer will be here soon, and that means records will need to be completed! Miscellaneous project records are available in the office or with your leaders. REMEMBER: Records must be presented before animals can show and project sheets must be given with judging.
