Students Learn the Value of Shopping Local

University of Illinois Extension is instilling the importance of local shopping with the youngest cohort of consumers: elementary school students. Created by Community and Economic Development Extension Specialist Susan Odum, the *Cha-Ching! Into the Community Chest* is a simulated exercise that teaches the importance of shopping local while encouraging entrepreneurial thinking in a fun, interactive way. The program includes a "buy local" board game that introduces the students to the concept of shopping local so they have a better understanding of the community services that are supported through local dollars. The game demonstrates how spending money in the local economy can lead to activities and initiatives that would interest them such as new parks or special events in the town they live in.



Harvesting Native and Indigenous Perennial Seeds



During a recent seed collecting workshop hosted by University of Illinois Extension, Horticulture Educator Austin Little shared tips and techniques on collecting and harvesting seeds for use in the spring. He spoke specifically about native species which are a great addition to butterfly gardens, rain gardens and backyards. These plants are adapted to the local climate and soil conditions where they naturally occur.
