Food Pantry Network of Southern Illinois

In collaboration with the Jackson County Health Department, Southern Illinois Healthcare and Southern Illinois University-Carbondale, University of Illinois Extension's SNAP-Education Educator, Toni Kay Wright has worked to create the Food Pantry Network of Southern Illinois. Food pantries play a critical role in helping many families throughout the region meet basic nutrition needs. This program is designed to help food pantries address hunger throughout southern Illinois and improve their nutrition environment. During the pilot meeting, food pantry managers and volunteers discussed their capacity to meet the needs of the individuals and families that they serve, the challenges they face and gaps that exist within their pantry. While many of the participating pantries fare well with their workforce, volunteer support and their distribution site, they

struggle with financial support, collaboration with other agencies for referrals and services and insufficient technology and office equipment. In addition, it was reported that personal safety for pantry staff and volunteers are a top priority as many of our local pantries are staffed with only one or two people during a distribution time. The Food Pantry Network of Southern Illinois will continue to meet quarterly to help foster networking among area food pantry managers and provide assistance to help address the challenges that they face.

Jackson County 4-H STEAM Night

Over 200 participants attended this fun, free event and explored hands-on activities such as 3-D printing, learning about bees, photography, creating edible dirt cups, arts and crafts, robotics and dissecting owl pellets. These science, technology, engineering, arts and math (STEAM) activities are designed to instill curiosity, critical thinking and help kids develop the skills needed to be successful in life. The event was made possible through the University of Illinois Extension's partnership with local sponsors and representatives such as the Murphysboro Park District, Murphysboro Youth & Rec Center, Illinois Department of Natural Resources, Home Community Education, Carbondale Community High School, SIU, Jackson County Farm Bureau, Sallie Logan Public Library, Southern Illinois Beekeeping Association and Oak Street Art.











Harvesting History!

The trial field at the Ewing Demonstration
Center has been in continuous no-till
production for 50 years! With no-till, the land is
left undisturbed from harvest through planting,
preserving a canopy of crop residue on the
surface to protect the soil from the battering
impact of erosion. Yielding 186 bushels/Acre of
corn this season, this the highest yield we have
recorded in the last 50 years.
