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4-H Enrollments

Check with your leader to make sure you are enrolled in the right projects, or email jblout@illinois.edu to ask. May 1, 2021 is the deadline for making changes (except for those livestock production projects which had a January deadline — see the November/December 4-H Newsletter). Young persons may join 4-H at any time of the year, but to show at the 4-H Shows, they must be enrolled at the County Extension Office by May 1st of each year.

To be a 4-H member in this 2020-21 4-H year, youth must be at least 8, and not more than 18, as of 9/1/20.

Youth must be enrolled to participate in club meetings and activities. We are asking for paper enrollments this year. If you are attending 4-H club meetings, in person or online, you must be enrolled.

4-H Virtual Fun Night

4-H Federation members are busy planning a 4-H Virtual Fun Night via Zoom. This will be on —

January 23, at 5:00 p.m.

You must sign up by one week ahead of time by emailing jblout@illinois.edu or calling 547-3711. Then we will send you the Zoom sign-in information, mail you bingo cards(!), and tell you the app you'll need to download ahead of time.

4-H Meetings

4-H Federation Meeting

4-H Spark Camp Virtual Workshops

We are excited to announce the winter sessions of 4-H Spark Camp. They are a fun way to learn new things and connect with new people. Emails were recently sent with registration information, plus it was posted on our Facebook page.

Space is limited, and we ask that you please consider only registering for the sessions that you are able to attend online at the designated time. If the date and time don't work for your schedule, please select the option within the registration link to receive the materials list and recording.

4-H Spark Camp is free and open to all young people, but is most appropriate for elementary and middle school youth. All sessions will be held on Zoom, and connection details will be emailed out to those registered. Some sessions also include a supply kit that can be picked up at your local Extension office a few days prior to the session.

Steer Tattoo and Weigh-In Date

If you want your steer(s) to be eligible for the County Rate of Gain Contest, the Illinois State Fair Junior Show, or the Illinois State Fair Premiere Contest, you must bring your steer(s) to be weighed and tattooed on the following date:

Saturday, February 6, 2021 — At the Fairview Sale Barn, from 8:00-10:00 a.m. (arrival times).

Please wear a mask or other face covering.

This will be the only steer weigh-in this year in Fulton County. Volunteers from Avon will come over and volunteer at this one again instead of hosting one there.

No pre-registration is required, but you must arrive in the time frame listed.

In the event of <u>extremely</u> severe weather, call 338-2543 that morning, to see if the weigh-in has been postponed. Any cancellation notice would also be given over WBYS AM 1560 and on our Facebook group page.

Steers must be castrated prior to tattooing. If possible, exhibitors should be present during tattooing. Electronic ear tags will also be used.

If you are only weighing in the steer(s) for County Rate of Gain purposes, you don't have to get the tag, but without the tag, your animal will <u>NOT</u> be eligible to go to State Fair Junior Show—and you CANNOT get the tag later.

Each livestock member may nominate up to 10 steers for the State Fair Open and Junior Premiere Classes. Junior Premiere Steers are eligible for the Open Premiere Class, if they are properly entered at the time that State Fair Open entries are made. To qualify, carcasses must grade at least low select, have a yield grade lower than 4.0, and weigh 950 pounds or less. To qualify for State Fair, calves must have been born on or after January 1, 2020. They must be owned and personally cared for by the exhibitor since February 1, 2021.

Barrow Weigh-In and Tattooing

Rules For Barrows —

To be eligible for the County Rate-of-Gain Contest or the Illinois State Fair Premiere Contest, your barrow(s) must be weighed and tattooed before they are 35 days old. All pigs must be tattooed by April 15, 2021. Tattooing of barrows is done at the Extension Office, **by appointment only**, and must be done by the deadlines listed. Call 547-3711 to schedule an appointment.

You only have to do this if you are showing in the Rate of Gain class at the Fulton County Fair, or if you are showing Premiere (carcass) at State Fair.

For State Fair, all barrows must have been farrowed on or after January 1, 2021. For State Fair Premiere Barrows and County Rate of Gain Contest, the farrowing date is on or after February 10, 2021.

Barrows must be castrated and ear-notched prior to tattooing. Both purebred and crossbred pigs are eligible. Each exhibitor may nominate a maximum of 25 barrows at the time of tattooing. Pigs cannot weigh more than the equivalent of 1.0 pounds per day of age when tattooed.

Please read the rules and deadlines carefully, and check the age and weight per day of age to determine when you may need to have your barrows weighed and tattooed.

YQCA and Quality Assurance — Animal Project Information

Cat, Dog, Horse, Poultry, and Rabbits

If a 4-H member is taking Cat, Dog, Horse, Poultry, or Rabbits – They are required to complete Quality Assurance and Ethics training, one time during their 4-H years. The website for that is – https://web.extension.illinois.edu/qaec/

Animal Science Posters or Displays at 4-H General Show

For any animal projects -- If a 4-H member is showing a poster or other display (not a live animal) at 4-H General Show, they do NOT have to do any type of ethics training. They can do it if they want to. It is still a good learning experience.

Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goat, and Dairy Cattle (with live animals as a project)

Statewide requirement is that members in these projects must complete YQCA – Youth for the Quality Care of Animals, in order to show and be premium eligible.

Must be done every year they are in the project. Premiums are only given to those exhibitors who complete it. State Fair entries will only be approved for those who complete it. There are two options —

Youth may attend one in-person training at the Extension Office, *which WE HOPE* can be offered several times in the spring, one hour long.

- Pre-registration online is required.
- \$3 per person online payment ahead of time is required.
- Adults may attend with their kids, but do not register. Adults may not be certified in this by attending, just youth.

or

Youth may take training online individually. http://yqca.org

- Cost for this is \$12 per person.

Fulton County 4-H Offers College Scholarships

Fulton County 4-H announces college scholarships being offered to Fulton County 4-H members.

Several scholarships, in various amounts, will be awarded to county 4-H members at his or her high school graduation or awards program. The scholarships are sponsored by individuals or groups, and are listed as possibilities, pending funding decisions by the grantors.

One group of scholarships is given in memory of Hilda Rock, by her family. Mrs. Rock was a 4-H leader in the Cuba area for many years.

The family of Gary Eathington will sponsor a \$500 scholarship to a member pursuing an Animal Science or Agriculture degree, preferably a student attending the University of Illinois. Gary was a 40-year 4-H leader from Avon, who passed away in 2012.

In memory of Roberta Mahr, a devoted former 4-H leader who passed away in 1997, a \$100 scholarship will be awarded to a 4-H member. The Roberta Mahr Memorial Scholarship is sponsored by the Farmington Lucky Clovers 4-H Club.

In memory of Merle L. Jenkins, a dedicated supporter of youth in Fulton County, the \$150 Merle L. Jenkins Agricultural Scholarship is also available, sponsored by his family.

The Virginia Barnard Memorial Scholarship will be given to one student, preferably a Canton High School student majoring in agriculture or home economics, and beginning studies at Spoon River College. This \$500 scholarship will be given as two \$250 payments over a two-year period.

The \$500 Phillips Scholarship is sponsored by Roger and Cathy Phillips of St. David. Mr. Phillips says 4-H helped him a lot in his youth, and he wants to give back by helping a 4-H member with his/her education.

For each scholarship, the recipient must be a current 4-H member; must also be an achievement member; and must actively participate in 4-H events. The application will include a place for the 4-H member to list accomplishments and career goals. Family financial information is not required.

The scholarships will be given to seniors in high school; therefore, these scholarships can only be received once by individuals.
