What is Horsemaster?

Horsemaster is a special award given to one junior and one senior horse project member who have shown the most interest and enthusiasm through their participation in all aspects of the horse project. Horsemasters are recognized on 4-H Night during the fair, and presented with an award. Horsemasters will also serve as the horse show color guard on show day. You do not need a horse to participate. Some dates below are TBD (to be determined). Failure to meet the requirements listed for any item will result in a no-score for that item.

How do you become a Horsemaster?

The junior (age 13 and under) and senior (age 14-19) 4-H members who accumulate the most points* will represent McHenry County as the 2019-2020 Horsemasters. An individual cannot receive the Horsemaster award in consecutive years.

You must earn a **minimum of 90 points** to qualify **and submit a checklist** of completed horsemaster items **by July 1** to Lorraine Kraeplin to verify points earned. If you plan to exhibit a horse science poster at the fair, please indicate this on your checklist and points will be verified the week of the fair.

- 1. **10 points:** FEB. 29 Compete in the IL 4-H state horse judging contest (see supplemental contest info sheet for registration details)
- 2. **10 points:** MARCH 10 Compete in the McHenry County Hippology Contest* (competition scores/averages will be used to determine horsemaster tie breaker)
- 3. **10 points**: MARCH 28 Compete in the IL 4-H regional Hippology contest (must register by March 2. Contact Coach Lisa Kunzie BEFORE then at <u>lisa.kunzie13@gmail.com</u> to register)
- **4. 10 points:** APRIL 4 Present a horse formal speech or illustrated talk at the McHenry County Communications Mini Fair (register with the extension office, contact Michele Aavang)
- **5. 20 points:** APRIL 18 Present a horse speech at the IL 4-H Horse Speaking state contest (see supplemental contest info sheet for details, categories and registration)
- 6. **10 points:** TBD Attend a horse judging clinic hosted by Nell Tekampe (contact Lorraine Kraeplin for details)
- 7. 10 points each (max of 30 pts. possible): MAY to JULY Attend "clinic nights" at weeknight warmups at the fairgrounds. Excludes "open riding" nights. You must sign in if you wish to receive credit. Dates and topics begin in May TBD. The Horse Committee will release this information later. No horse required, but you must remain in attendance for the duration of the clinic.

- **8. 10 points:** JULY 1 Write a 300-500 word report titled "My 4-H Horse Project Past Experiences, Future Plans." The report must be emailed to Lorraine Kraeplin at <u>lorrainekraeplin@yahoo.com</u> *by* July 1, 2020. Failure to meet any of these requirements will result in no score.
- **9. 10 points:** JULY/AUGUST TBD Exhibit a Horse Science poster in the county fair (dates will be announced in fair book)
- 10. 10 points: Volunteer** at one of the designated volunteer locations listed in your 2020 Horse Project Packet. You must email a photo/scan of a dated note signed by the program organizer and indicate where you volunteered to receive credit. Email <u>lorrainekraeplin@yahoo.com</u>. (Participation in this will be used as a secondary tie-breaker if necessary)

STATE 4-H HORSE SPEAKING CONTEST

April 18 | David Kinley Hall, University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign | 10 AM Any 4-H members may participate. No pre-qualifying is needed, but you must register at the Extension office by mid-March. Cost is \$3 per entry. You'll share ideas with others as you develop the ability to speak in public about the horse industry and the 4-H Horse project. Learn more @ go.illinois.edu/4Hhorsespeaking. There are 5 divisions

Original individual formal speech

- **Original individual presentation**: either demonstration (step by step process) or illustrated talk on an idea or topic; both use visual aids.
- **Original team presentation**: either demonstration (step by step process) or illustrated talk on an idea or topic; both using visual aids.
- **Extempore speaking**: topic is selected at the event and participants have 25 minutes to prepare a 4 to 6 minute speech.
- NEW IN 2020: **Interpretive Reading** is the art of reading aloud from a printed page. The reading must be published works that are horse-related. They may be prose, poetry, short stories, play cuttings, narratives, book or review, or theatrical. You should NOT memorize; they are intended to be read from a page.

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
