Illinois Agriculture

In 2010, Illinois had 76,000 farms utilizing 26.7 million acres of land. The average size of a farm was 351 acres. The average price per acre as of Jan. 2011 was \$5,700.

In addition to farming, Illinois is a leading state in agricultural related industries, such as: ethanol production, corn processing, soybean processing, meat packing, dairy manufacturing, feed milling, vegetable processing, machinery manufacturing, foreign exports, and service industries.

In 2010, corn accounted for 49% of total cash receipts with soybeans 30%, hogs 8%, cattle and calves 4%, dairy products 2%.

- Each Illinois farmer feeds 155 people.
- The average age of an Adams County farmer is 55.6.
- In 2007, there were 72,400 farms in Illinois.
- Adams County has 1295 farms and over 374,000 acres of land in farms. Over 400 farms have less than 50 acres.

- Illinois ranks 4th in agricultural export shares. Soybeans and products are the top export.
- Illinois produces several top ranking crops. Illinois ranks #1 in the U.S. for pumpkins and horseradish; and #2 in the U.S. for both corn and soybeans
- There are over 1 million cattle; 10 million pigs; 51,000 sheep; and 3.2 million layers.

- Illinois dairy cattle produce 2 million pounds of milk and over 78,000 pounds of cheese.
- Illinois has 600 specialty farmers and 200 farmers markets. Adams County hosts 2 farmers markets.
- Consumption of poultry and cheese has doubled in 40 years.
- Illinois has approximately 1500 different soil types.
