



Lesson Objectives:

To help youth learn about each other and to introduce them to public speaking.

Time: 20 minutes

Equipment and supplies:

- Large paper or banners
- Markers
- Tape

Preparations:

- Review Lesson
- Gather equipment and supplies
- Have a teen or leader prepare a banner and give an example introduction of themselves.

Ice Breaker: Name Banners

This activity has two benefits for your 4-H club members. First, it serves as an ice breaker activity and helps the 4-H members to get to know each other. Secondly, it introduces the idea of public speaking in a non threating way. As the 4-H members do simple presentations like this, they grow in confidence and will be better prepared for doing 4-H talks.

Instructions:

- 1. Tell the 4-H'ers that they will be making a creative banner about themselves and then they will use the banner to introduce themselves to the other 4-H members.
- 2. Give everyone paper and markers to create their banner.
- 3. Each 4-H'er should think of something special about themselves for each letter of their first name. Here is an example:
 - B-biology is my favorite subject
 - R—run track at school
 - I-interested in computers
 - A—always eats pizza
 - N-new kid in school this semester.
- 4. When the 4-H'ers finish, have them introduce themselves by sharing the information included on their banner. If you have a large club you could break down into 2 or 3 circles and have several presentations going on at the same time.
- 5. If you have space available, have the 4-Hers tape their designs to the wall for the duration of the meeting. It will help new youth learn other members names.

Note: It is great for the 4-H leader to participate in this activity as well, it is just as important for the 4-H'ers to learn about you!
