Educator Agventure Institute

Ten educators from Calhoun, Greene, Macoupin, and Montgomery counties explored more about agriculture during the Educator Agventure Summer Agricultural Institute conducted by the Macoupin County Agricultural Literacy Program June 17-18. During the institute, educators toured several sites and tried hands-on activities as they learned more about the agriculture industry. Educators earned 14 professional development hours.

Traveling workshops included Backwoods Berry Farm in Hettick, Baisch & Skinner in St. Louis, and Bayer Crop Science in Chesterfield, MO.

Teachers completed many hands-on activities, learned more about agriculture and career opportunities, and received resources to use in their classrooms.
