Master Naturalists then give back to their communities by sharing their unique knowledge, skills, and passion for the natural world with others.

Who is a Master Naturalist?

Master Naturalists are a dedicated group of individuals who generously give their time and expertise to their community. Anyone adult who is passionate about the environment and wants to help can become a Master Naturalist. You do not need a college degree or experience, just a sincere desire to learn and share.

Learn with us.

Volunteers will learn about botany, environmental ethics, archaeology, climate, forestry, geology, prairies, mammals, birds, insects, urban and agricultural systems, and more.

Want to join?

The 12-session training is hosted at partner sites throughout the four-counties. It includes 40 hours of:

- Classwork
- Activities
- Discussion
- Field trips

A \$250 fee covers training, materials, and the manual. Fund assistance may be available.

Once training is done, volunteers must log 60 hours over two years as an intern to become certified. To remain certified, Master Naturalists must complete 30 hours of volunteer time and 10 hours of continued education annually.
