
ISP REFLECTIONS & IMPACT




LESSONS LEARNED

ILLINOIS WOMEN IN BROADBAND EXTENSION MENTOR: NANCY OUEDRAOGO, EXTENSION STATE SPECIALIST, CED

- With a background in qualitative research and analysis and a love of listening to stories, I decided to develop a podcast.
- For Illinois Women in Broadband, I interviewed women doing broadband equity and inclusion work throughout the state.
- I purposefully recruited women from diverse backgrounds (ethnic, class, education, age, linguistic, etc.) to discuss their roles in promoting broadband.
- My working idea that the digital divide is a human rights issue is not new and is supported with evidence from the data I generated from my interviews.
- The theme across the episodes is, like many basic human rights causes, women are central to closing the digital divide, performing much of the labor, and making invaluable contributions toward achieving lasting change.



ISP REFLECTIONS & IMPACT

- Through my work with the Illinois Office of Broadband, I was inspired toward advocacy and research.
- I proposed to my mentor, Director Matt Schmit, creating a Center for Excellence in Broadband Equity and Inclusion on the Illinois campus, borne out by the Illinois Broadband Lab.
- I researched other university-related centers for excellence to determine the feasibility of establishing a center at Illinois.
- I also found Illinois has a long-standing commitment to digital equity and inclusion through the iSchool and its faculty initiatives.
- As I continue my broadband work with the Illinois Innovation Network as a Visiting Coordinator for Broadband, one hope is to help establish this center.



LESSONS LEARNED

What are some take aways from being an ISP Scholar? Know yourself and be proud of who you are and what you've achieved. Embrace your brand! It is imperative to re-establish and promote yourself and your unique skill set in this new work setting.



Broadband Mapping and Capacity Building




Illinois Works Apprenticeship Initiative

- Illinois Works- Aims to increase the representation of women and people of color in the construction industry.
- Created the <u>Pre-Apprenticeship Program heat map</u>
 - Referring interested candidates to nearest Pre-Apprenticeship Programs (creates supply of target population pre-apprentices)
 - Identifying areas with high target population
 - Assessing demand and supply gaps by mapping the Illinois Works Apprenticeship Initiative (creates demand) eligible projects
- Collaboration with State Agencies to assess needs, customize forms and compliance processes, and monitor compliance with the 10% Apprenticeship goal




BROADBAND MAPS REVIEW NANCY OUEDRAOGO, EXTENSION CED STATE SPECIALIST

- Repository for all state broadband maps in the country
- Scored maps based on data layers made available

- Assisted with broadband planning for 20 communities across the state
- As the construction workforce in the state is aging, created a good base for the Illinois Apprenticeship Initiative and now it is about following through and ensuring maximum compliance, so we can drive up the demand for apprentices in the state

Developing Program Measures for Graduate and Professional Students


Graduate and professional students comprise at least **one third of hired staff** in the higher education institutions of Illinois.

More than 33% of higher education students in Illinois are at graduate and professional level


There are limited measurements available to do analysis on this group of students




- 33% of all higher education students in Illinois are at graduate and professional level
- About two-third of graduate students are at Master's degree (Fall 2018 Enrollment)



- White students are the largest racial group
- International students are the second largest racial group
- More than 60% of Master's students in Illinois are female




- Illinois institutions admit international students from 166 countries (according to the United Nations there are 193 countries in the world)
- Almost 30% of international students are from China
- Indian students are the second largest international student group




Rates are for Master's Cohort Fall 2018

- More than 75% of Illinois Master's students are from Illinois
- Florida, California, and Ohio are the first three states where Illinois Master's students come from




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- 31% of Master's students in Illinois go to public institutions
- There are 12 public institutions and 75 private institutions in Illinois that offer Master's programs



- Master's students' graduation by the 3rd year rate is **70%**
- Females and males have similar rates of graduation
