

Online Record Books

We were asked to pilot a new online record book. This pilot is still happening even if exhibitions are held virtually. There is still time to participate! All we ask is that you complete on online record for one of your projects. This fall, we will ask for your feedback on the technological aspects of the website, the content of the record books, and the ease of use. You will be rewarded,

in some way, for your participation. Here is the important information:

- Website to access online record book is: 4h.zsuite.org.
- A parent/adult should create the initial account.
- Individual youth can then create their own accounts with their own record books under that parent account.
- There are record books tailored to project areas.
- As you are filling out sections of the record book, think about how it could be made better/easier.

If you have questions about the website itself, they have a great help section. If you have questions about the pilot process or the content required, contact Jennifer.

We are living in a world where things change minute-by-minute and our "normal" no longer exists. It stinks. We know it stinks. It is very hard to operate amid all this uncertainty.


Luckily, those of us in the 4-H world are experienced in rolling with the punches and making it up as we go along. Rest assured that we are working very hard to make something positive out of this situation.


