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IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR 4-H'ERS

What time do I show my project? What do I need to know? 4-H General Show Club Exhibit/Check-In Times are on the next page.

Everyone meets at the check-in table, which will be set up inside the Mascoutah AG Building. Look for the check-in signs! Extension staff or volunteers will help your child get where they need to be. You will need to attach your exhibit tags to your projects upon arrival and before being judged. Once you check in your project, please wait outside the building. 4-H Staff will make announcements when to come in.

Conference judging takes about five minutes per project. Judging times vary based on the number of entries.

After the member completes their conference judging, members are free to go. All projects will be on display throughout the weekend, July 31 – August 3! Please bring your project book if your project area indicates that you need it at judging. You can find this out in the St. Clair County 4-H Showbook 2025. https://go.illinois.edu/2025StClairCounty4-HShowbook

If members cannot attend, please drop off projects at the Extension office (900 Hillsboro Ave, Suite 4, Edwardsville, IL 62025) by noon on Friday, July 25, and fill out the Absentee Exhibitor form located in your Showbook on page 7 or in the following link: https://extension.illinois.edu/sites/default/files/absent_from_judging_form_fillable.pdf.

Ribbons will be awarded to each completed project: blue=met requirements, red=needs some improvement, white=needs much improvement.

Project pick-up will be August 3 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. If you are unable to pick up your projects, please contact your leader to pick them up. At project pick, youth who are selected for State Fair Delegate need to confirm if they will be attending the State Fair on August 8. If a Delegate declines to go, then the Alternate will be asked.

Please dress for the weather! Bringing a bag chair is also a good idea. Families are asked to please wait outside the building during judging time.

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4-H ANIMAL WELFARE

During fair season, 4-H members have an opportunity to showcase our practice of ethical and humane treatment of animals and demonstrate our commitment to safe food production practices. While showing livestock, we are under the watchful eye of the public. Many people attending a local fair may have no idea how livestock is raised. Practicing these guidelines may prevent public misconceptions about livestock production.

- 1. Provide fresh, clean water to animals at all times. Feed animals on schedule.
- 2. Keep your pens clean and dry with good bedding at all times.
- Take extra care on days of extreme weather or activity.
- Sort and load animals safely and with concern for them.
- 5. Train animals to lead or be handled at a young age long before the fair.
- 6. Arrange for veterinary care in case of an animal emergency.
- 7. Handle animals in a very humane way.
- 8. Adhere to all antibiotic, drug, and feed additive withdrawal times.
- 9. Avoid stressing the animal.
- 10. Keep animals clean; a clean animal is viewed as a healthy animal.
- 11. Use show sticks, whips, and canes for showing only and never forcefully hit an animal.
- 12. Review your 4-H project manual and follow the care recommendations.
- Have a plan of action should a problem arise, and know which fair official or 4-H leader to contact to help solve it or answer questions.
- 14. Some words, such as "slaughter" or "killed," may cause a negative reaction from people unfamiliar with food production. IF ASKED what happens to your market animal after the fair, consider using words such as "harvested" or "sold to packing company."
- 15. If questioned or challenged by a stranger or group:
 - a. Remain calm, be polite, and answer any question the best you can. If you do not know an answer, tell them you will find an adult to explain more.
 - b. Do not argue or confront an individual or group who may have a different view about livestock production. Individuals may try to initiate a confrontation and use video of the incident on social media. If confronted, walk away, find an adult in authority, or call 911 if you feel threatened.
 - c. It is natural to think that giving people information will change their minds, but in some extreme cases, people may not want to learn; they want to confront to gain media attention. It is best to walk away without engaging in these situations.

Following these recommendations will reflect a positive image of our livestock industry and the 4-H program, as well as demonstrate the solid animal stewardship practices that are our 4-H tradition.

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Talking Points Best Practices:

- Don't feel obligated to speak "on the record" it's fine to politely decline an interview or to decline to speak unofficially on a topic
- Appoint a spokesperson for your county to handle the tougher questions The county superintendent of your species is a good point person for addressing tougher questions and topics. If any statements or questions make you feel uncomfortable, don't hesitate to ask an adult for help
- Don't feel like you have to respond to unfamiliar facts or statistics if a fact or statistic comes up that you are not familiar with, it's perfectly fine to say, "That's not something I'm familiar with," or "I can't speak to that, but I can speak to xyz."

Talking Points

Why do youth show livestock at the fair?

Exhibiting livestock is a visual appraisal of the hard work, care, and dedication youth go through as part of the educational process of livestock projects. Showing livestock teaches youth the value of hard work, dedication, sportsmanship, communication skills, work ethic, and more.

Don't you think it is unfair to keep your animal tied up/in pens/in stalls all day?

Animals are able to change positions and lie down throughout the day. Youth ensure their animals are comfortable by making sure they have access to food and water, clean bedding, and fans for air circulation.

Isn't the extreme heat or high temperatures going to bother your animal?

Youth take extra precautions for their animals during extreme heat, much the same as people need to take extra precautions when the weather is very hot. Animals have fans and space to allow air movement, clean and dry bedding, and tarps and draping to protect from the sun. If needed, youth can take their animals out to the wash rack to rinse them down during the hottest part of the day. Often during extreme heat, youth will hand water animals vs. having water sit out. This ensures access to cooler, cleaner water and youth can monitor how much water the animals are actually getting to make sure they're staying hydrated.

Why doesn't your animal have any food or water?

Youth carefully monitor animal rations – allowing for overfeeding can make the animals too warm. Hand watering the animals also allows youth to monitor how much water they are getting and provides cooler, cleaner water vs. water that sits out.

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4-H Livestock Record Book Common Questions

Who has to turn in a livestock record book?

It is mandatory for any 4-H member who is participating in a <u>livestock market class</u> to complete a livestock record book.

Where do I find the livestock record book?

You can get the livestock record book on the Madison, Monroe and St. Clair Counties web-page at https://extension.illinois.edu/sites/default/files/livestock_record_writable.pdf.

Is there a tip sheet on how to fill out the livestock record book?

If I show in multiple livestock species for a market class, do I have to have one per each species?

If a 4-H member is showing multiple species in a market class, they must fill out a separate livestock record book for each species.

If I have more than one market animal in same species, can they be put on the same livestock record book?

If a 4-H member is showing multiple animals within the same species for a market class, they can choose to fill out the livestock record book for just one market animal, both market animals, or for the entire herd. For example, if a youth is showing two market wethers in the goat category, they can choose to fill out the record book for only one of them or include both animals in the same book. They can even add in their whole herd to the livestock record book if they want to.

When are livestock record books due?

4-H members must submit their record books to the Extension Office by September 15, 2025.

What happens if I do not submit my livestock record book?

4-H members who do not submit a livestock record book by Sept. 15, 2025, will not be able to show in that livestock market class for the 2026 4-H Show.

Who is keeping track of who has to turn in a livestock record book?

4-H staff are keeping track of who has to turn in a livestock record book.

Do 4-H leaders have to check livestock record books before the 4-H shows?

Leaders are encouraged to check in with the 4-H members to see if they have started their record books or need assistance. If help is needed, please refer to the attached tip sheet or contact our unit email (uie-mms@illinois.edu) to reach one of our 4-H staff for support.

840 TAGS IN BEEF, DAIRY CATTLE, AND SWINE

We are excited about our new 4-H year and hope you are! We have a couple of changes for livestock that we would like to bring to your attention as the new year has begun.

840 Tag Requirement

New this year, all swine, beef, and dairy cattle must have a USDA official animal

identification number ear tag (840 tag). The tag must be both visually and electronically readable. We know that there will be many questions, so here are a few answers to some basic questions:

- Who must have the 840 tag?
 - Beef all heifers, all cows, and all steers being exhibited at the fair
 - Dairy Cattle all heifers, all cows, all steers, and all calves being exhibited at the fair
 - Swine all gilts and all barrows being exhibited at the fair
- Where do I get the 840 tag?
 - Breeder from which you purchased your animal from (up to breeder)
 - Local Veterinarian
 - Purchase a tag from a farm supply store (Valley Vet, Nasco)
 - Purchase from the Department of Agriculture:

 - https://agr.illinois.gov/animals/animalhealth/premises-registration.html
- How do I purchase my own tags?
 - The location where the animal is being kept will have to have a registered Premise ID with the state of Illinois. With the Premise ID, you will be able to purchase tags from a farm supply store such as Valley Vet, Nasco, or the Department of Agriculture.
- We don't have a Premise ID, which hasn't been updated. What do we do?
 - You can obtain an application from the Illinois Department of Agriculture and send it in. The turnaround time is very quick.
 - If you have a Premise ID but need it updated, contact agr.premises@illinois.gov, and she will help you!
 - If you need a new Premise ID, you can log onto https://agr.illinois.gov and search for "Fillable Premise Form," then fill it out and email it to the address listed on the form.
- Will tags be checked when we arrive at the show?
 - Yes, superintendents will be checking that all beef, dairy cattle, and swine have the tag.
 - $\circ~$ If an animal does not have a tag, it is not allowed to be on the fairgrounds.
 - There is a chance that a State employee will be at the show monitoring that tags are checked, and if they are not, then 4-H and the fairgrounds can be fined.

2024-2025 4-H MEMBERSHIP POLICIES

Youth **five through seven years of age, on or before September 1** of the current 4-H year, may enroll in 4-H Cloverbud groups.

Youth who are **eight and have yet to reach their nineteenth birthday on or before September 1** may enroll in 4-H clubs.

<u>A youth who enrolls in a St. Clair County 4-H club must:</u>

- Attend at least four meetings to be called a 4-H member. Youth who do not comply are not eligible to participate in 4-H exhibitions, receive 4-H premiums, or other 4-H awards and recognitions available to 4-H members.
 (College students can be enrolled when they live away from home and must attend at least one meeting when they are home on breaks or virtually.)
- Present a talk or demonstration at a club meeting during the project year.
- Youth enrolled in a livestock market class must turn in a livestock record book by September 15. If not completed by September 15, the youth cannot participate in a livestock market class the following year.
- Complete enrollment by January 15 to exhibit projects at 4-H shows. Youth may enroll after this date, but are not eligible to exhibit projects at shows.
 Projects can be added up to this deadline, but the addition of projects is not accepted online after this date (except for SPIN Clubs).



LIVESTOCK & HORSE RECORD BOOKS

All members are encouraged to fill out a 4-H Record Book for livestock and/or horse projects exhibiting at a 4-H Show.

It is REQUIRED to fill out 4-H Record Books for any livestock that members are showing in a market class.

Members must complete a livestock record book for the current year to be eligible to show in a market class for the preceding year.

The PDF versions of the books are found here: <u>https://go.illinois.edu/LivestockRecord</u>. They may be filled in on your computer, or you may print them off and fill them in by hand (neatly).
