Over the summer, staff learned about the new tools and skills to make this transition and are now delivering virtual classes for OrganWise Guys, Great Garden Detective Adventure, Eat Play Grow and Healthy Cents nutrition programs. Unit SNAP-Ed community workers found creative ways to continue providing high-quality programming to clients.

4-H team embraces STEM

"Heading into another year of 4-H – especially during such a unique time – means we have an opportunity to take a fresh look at what youth want and need and meet them where they are in terms of interest." - Kyle Miles, Extension 4-H Youth Development Educator

Kyle is focused on supplementing traditional 4-H projects with additional STEM opportunities. In November, the 4-H team offered two webinars for youth in the five-county area that combined STEM concepts with common Thanksgiving themes. "Let's Talk Turkeys" took youth on a tour of a turkey farm and engaged them in an engineering design challenge. "STEM on the Mayflower" allowed the 4-H team to combine STEM with a multicultural experience through the Passport to the World project area, as well as incorporated a virtual hands-on building activity.

Mobile Markets support local families

When stay-at-home orders and mitigation efforts eliminated Extension's ability to personally host Mobile Markets, SNAP-ed Educator Ashley Hoffman worked tirelessly with community businesses and organizations, especially United Way of South Central Illinois and SSM Health Good Samaritan Hospital, so food distribution efforts and Mobile Markets could continue outside of the Extension umbrella. Because of these partnerships, 25+ Mobile Markets in Jefferson, Marion, and Washington counties have served over 7,000 families. Additional markets have been held in surrounding counties, as well.

Feedback from families and partners highlights the impact Ashley's efforts have had on the communities:


- "This box of food helps my family make it through the month. I work part time but with the COVID-19, hours at my job have been cut. Thank you."

In addition to traditional fresh dairy and produce offerings, families were also provided Thanksgiving and Christmas boxes to ensure they had the supplies to provide special holiday meals.

The markets in Centralia, Nashville and Mt. Vernon will continue on a monthly basis in 2021.



Festive 4-H Workshops Set the Tone for more Virtual Fun in 2021



The 4-H team provides a fun virtual experience for members each month. Two different sessions of a virtual Cloverbud Camp were held the weeks of Dec. 1 and 8, with 16 Cloverbuds participating with their families. Youth were guided through festive holiday activities like growing a Grinch heart, making marshmallow snowflakes, creating reindeer toothpaste, and helping Santa "drop" off his gifts.

Later in December, 4-H members and their families were invited to a holiday party via zoom. This was an opportunity to foster a feeling of belonging for members. Participants were encouraged to wear their favorite holiday gear and join in games and activities. Thirty-five families from across the Unit joined in the fun. The 4-H team will continue to host monthly 4-H activities via zoom through Spring, with opportunities to try different 4-H projects like Passport to the World, and Consumer Education.

Programs reach new audiences Online



Over the course of the past year virtual horticulture and natural resources programs have seen a rise in popularity. Lunch and Learn is newer program, created to offer a taste of programs offered by local Master Gardeners. They are the same programs that are traditionally offered to local garden clubs, and civic organizations. Additional virtual programs are offered each month on a wide range of timely topics. The virtual aspect has opened the doors to a much wider audience than only those who could be reached in person. Attendees often participate from multiple states, sometimes even different countries.

Evergreen webinar draws large audience

On Dec. 3, the agriculture and natural resources team hosted "Pining for Evergreens," an educational webinar featuring a presentation from educator Sarah Vogel on pruning and maintenance. Utilizing local and state marketing resources and social media, the webinar reached an audience of more than 125 participants. Jefferson County Master Gardeners Treasa Brookman and Pat Garren stepped outside their comfort zone to deliver an organic video demonstration on swaqmaking using local resources during the webinar.
