Extension helps local Jefferson County food pantry find funding for Thanksgiving dinner food give-away

Park Ave. Baptist Church Food Pantry was able to purchase turkeys, but had no additional funds to complete the meal for their clients. Community Outreach Worker, Kristen Buttrum, used local connections and a partnership with Casey Ave. Baptist Church to find the funds needed. This support allowed the food pantry to purchase side items to make complete meals for 116 families on Thanksgiving Day.

efforts – from youth to retired volunteers – whose work revolves around meeting this challenge throughout the five counties we serve.

Through the fall months, Extension staff and volunteers hosted garden-based events in Salem, Mt. Vernon and Pocahontas with a combined attendance of about 100. "The purpose behind Community Garden Events is to introduce our community to the real possibility of growing part of their own produce; help prolong their growing season; and increase their harvest yield as well," said Jordee Koehler, Extension Director for Bond, Clinton, Jefferson, Marion, and Washington counties. "Our passionate and knowledgeable Ag and Natural Resources team does an incredible job of making these events fun, engaging, and incredibly valuable."

While this was a first-year event in Salem and Pocahontas, Mt. Vernon has been hosting a Picker-Treat Garden Day in October for the past few years with great success.
