

Location: Parkland Community College, Champaign IL (To be confirmed)

Sponsors: Compeer Financial and the Illinois 4-H Foundation

Qualifications: Enrollment in the Public Presentations project is required to participate in this section. No live animals are allowed in speeches. Youth must be selected in a local county 4-H contest to advance to the state contest. Each county is allowed three entries in the state contest. The entries may come from any of the four divisions. Each youth may only compete in up to one individual division and one group division in the state contest.

Participating Youth must be 8 years of age on or before September 1, 2021.

Participating youth turning 14 years of age on or before **April 30, 2022 must** enroll as advanced.

The time has come for us to release the Robotics Challenge documents!

This year's competition will revolve around the work of the 4-H in Space Mission Command Team, which is preparing curriculum and programming options for Illinois youth working with the International Space Station National Laboratories (ISS) and The Lab for Advanced Space Systems at Illinois, Dept. of Aerospace Engineering, (LASSI). These collaborations

will enable Illinois 4-H youth to send experiments to the ISS, and build/launch micro satellites into orbit.

The SpaceBot Mission Command Challenge will take place at the McLean County Fairgrounds in Bloomington, IL on Saturday, April 16, 2022. Team registration will open January 17, 2022 and will close March 16, 2022. There will be a \$20 Entry fee per team assessed at the time of registration. 



2022 – Livestock Birth, Ownership and Tattoo Dates for Illinois State Fair Junior Show

For complete Rules, Regulations, and nomination forms for Premiere Shows, please refer to the information from Dan Jennings.

STEERS:

- Calved on or after January 1, 2021
- Owned & personally cared for by exhibitor since February 1, 2022
- Weighed, Tattooed & Tagged
 - On or between the last Saturday in January (January 29, 2022) and February 27, 2022.
 - In addition to tattooing, steers that will be going to state fair are to be tagged with the
 electronic ID tags. Information forthcoming from Dan Jennings regarding obtaining the
 tags. Each tag should be recorded to the nomination sheet. All paperwork should be
 sent to Dan Jennings.

BARROWS: Regular Barrows

- Farrowed on or after January 1, 2022 and must be the property of the exhibitor by June 1, 2022.
- No weighing and tattooing required but must submit ear notches when making entry for ISF

BARROWS: Premiere Barrows (carcass class)

- Farrowed on or after February 10, 2022 and must have been the property of the exhibitor by June 1, 2022
- Weighed and Tattooed with Box A tattoo from February 10 to April 15, 2022
- Tattooed within 35 days of birth and not weigh more than 1.0 lbs/day of age
- Junior exhibitors can purchase pre-nominated barrows

SHEEP Market Wethers & Market Ewe Lambs: Live Show Wethers — No more Regional check-in sites — New nomination format

- Lambed on or after January 1, 2022
- Ownership Date May 15, 2022
- Self-nomination as follows: Nominations must be signed by local Extension Office.
- Exhibitors fill out and send in nomination form with photo of lamb's ear with scrapie tag
 installed in ear (close up photo of ear so scrapie tag can be read). This must be completed
 between March 15 and May 15, 2022. Send to Dan Jennings, Region 1 Office, 1100 E.,
 Warrenville Rd., Suite 170, Naperville, IL 60563.

Jr. and Open Premiere Wether & Ewe lambs: - Weigh-in, tattoo, and nomination procedures:

- Junior and open premiere lambs will be nominated, tattooed, and weighed at the county level.
- Premiere lambs must be weighed and tattooed with the Box A tattoo followed by a number starting with 1 = This must be witnessed by a local Extension employee or a person they designate, such as a volunteer or local sheep superintendent.

- Completed nomination forms must be signed by the local Extension Office.
- Send nomination forms to Dan Jennings (address above).
- Ownership and nomination deadline is March 15 to May 15, 2022.
- Lambed on or after January 1, 2022.


Quality Assurance & Ethics Certification is mandatory for all horse, rabbit, poultry, and companion animals. The website is now open. All county and state horse and dog exhibitors must complete QA&E Certification via this site one time during their showing career. Those that have completed it in the past do not have to complete it again.

The new YQCA program is mandatory for all dairy, beef, swine, sheep, and goat exhibitors in 4-H. Details on this program are available at your county Extension Office.

Horses – Ownership, Lease papers, photos, and Entries are to be sent in together directly to: **Stephanie** Hardy at the Illinois State Fair by June 1 for verification of State Fair entries. If units wish to keep copies of this information for their own shows, they should make photocopies or require the exhibitors to submit two sets of forms.

All junior exhibitors will need to pay entry fees for any/all animals entered. Fees will be due with class entries – June 1 for Horses, July 1 for all other livestock. Fees will be updated in the State Fair Premium Book.

Certified Livestock Manager Training: Freeport

February 17 | 9 AM

In 2022, <u>University of Illinois Extension</u> is hosting 10 Certified Livestock Manager Training Workshops throughout the state. The workshops will begin on January 18 in Effingham and conclude on February 23 at Illinois Pork Expo. Online CLM training is open all year round.

Who needs certification

According to the Livestock Facilities Management Act, in Illinois, livestock facilities that house 300 or more animal units (for example, 750 finishing hogs, 214 dairy cows, or 300 beef cattle) are required to have at least one person certified in the environmental protection aspects manure management. Facilities designed for 301 to 999 animal units must have at least one employee attend a workshop or complete the training online. Facilities with 1,000 or more animal units must have a certified livestock manager attend a workshop and pass the Illinois Department of Agriculture's exam or complete the online training and pass the online test.

Workshop Registration

Registrations will open one month before the workshop. Online registration at go.illinois.edu/CLMT is required, and at some locations, space is limited. The workshop fee is \$40 (each additional participant \$30), and IDoA's certification fee is \$30. We kindly ask all participants to wear a mask to comply with COVID-19 safety precautions. In case we need to cancel a workshop due to COVID restrictions or other unforeseen circumstances, we will inform you via email and refund your registration fee. Please check your email or our website for updates.

Online Training

Access online training at go.illinois.edu/CLMT. This new version of online training follows the same format as in-person workshops. There are nine modules (10-20 min videos), and you can work through these modules at your own pace. If you have more than 1,000 animal units, you can take the test online at the end of the training. You are allowed multiple attempts on the test. Each time you take the test, 50 questions will be randomly selected from our question bank. The online training fee is \$40 and IDoA's certification fee is \$30. Once you create an account, you will have access to the training videos and also enrichment videos for three months.


